


# **Modular System Installation Guide**



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## 1 Overview

The Meridian Norstar\* Modular Pocket Installation Guide is designed to help you in the successful installation of the Meridian Norstar Business Communication System.

Some of the features of this Guide include:

- A Norstar Components section with descriptions and photographs of the system hardware.
- A Glossary so you can quickly find definitions of Norstar terms.
- An Index and a Table of Contents designed around the installation process.
- Extensive use of photos, drawings, and charts to save you installation time and make your job easier.
- Numbered procedures which guide you through the hardware installation steps.
- Flowcharts which show the first steps involved in programming the Norstar Business Communication System.

#### **About this Guide**

Four box-shaped symbols are used throughout this Guide to show which buttons to press for procedures and to identify the responses which appear on the Liquid Crystal Display (LCD) of the telephones. For example:

Press "5" on the dial pad

Press the "Feature" button

A typical display

Press "QUIT" display button

QUIT

This Guide uses checklists, photographs and illustrations to help you remember important installation information. Refer to the Guide when unpacking and installing the Key Service Unit (KSU), Trunk Module (TM), Station Module (SM), Norstar Telephones and Auxiliary Equipment. Also refer to the Guide for programming procedures and for wiring information. After finishing the installation leave the Guide with the KSU. Refer to the Norstar Modular Maintenance Guide for troubleshooting, maintenance and repair of the Norstar system.

The button caps labels and display information on the M7208, M7310 and M7324 telephones are available in two languages per system. The feature codes are:




Figure 1.1 - The Norstar Modular System

## 2 Pre-Installation

Check the location for installing the Norstar system modules, the telephone sets and auxiliary equipment. This includes making sure sufficient space is available to install the components and that the requirements for the environment and for the equipment are met.

## Check the environment

Environmental Requirements

Livi official requirements
Clean, dry and well-ventilated
Temperature: 0° C to 50° C (32° F to 122° F)
Humidity: 0% to 95%, non-condensing
Location: at least 4m (13.1 ft) from equipment such as
copiers, electrical motors and other equipment that can
produce electromagnetic, radio frequency and electrostation
interferences

Note: Installers should also check the lightning protectors at the cable entry point to the building with special attention to the ground. Any problems should be reported to the Telco in writing. Norstar set wiring must not leave the buildings as it is not lightning-protected.

## Equipment requirements for the ac power outlet

Dedicated 120 V ac nominal, 50/60 Hz, 15 amperes service with a third wire ground
 Non-switched outlet
 No more than 1.5 m (4.9 ft) from KSU. The actual distance from the KSU to the power bar may vary with additional Trunk and Station Modules. Do not use an extension cord between KSU and power bar.

#### **WARNING:**

The ac outlet must be equipped with a third wire ground to avoid electromagnetic interference.

#### **CAUTION:**

All modules must be mounted well above the floor to prevent water damage.

#### **CAUTION:**

Mount the KSU vertically to avoid overheating.

If a smooth surface is not available, cut a backboard large enough to accommodate the system modules and distribution block. The system module dimensions are listed on Chart 2.2.

#### Order for Installation

**Physical Mounting:** The Key Service Unit (KSU), Trunk Module(TM) and Station Module(SM) can be physically mounted in any order.

# Norstar Modular System Hardware Configuration

Chart 2.1 shows the combinations of Trunk Modules (TM), Trunk Cartridges (TC) and Station Modules (SM) for expanding the Modular system. How to read chart 2.1 is described in detail on the next page. A key to the terms in the chart is on the next page.

#### Key to the terms for chart 2.1

TM	Number of Trunk Modules
TC	Number of Trunk cartridges (maximum of 3 for each TM)
SM	Number of Station Modules
8-24	The KSU has a minimum of 8 lines and 24 sets.

#### How to Read Chart 2.1

To find the maximum number of lines and telephone sets for a particular configuration of KSU, TM(s) and SM(s):

- 1. Find the number of TMs in the left column.
- 2. Find the number of SMs in the top row.
- Read across to the right from the TM column and down from the SM row. A pair of numbers indicates lines and sets for that combination of TMs and SMs.

For each pair of numbers on the chart:

- left number = maximum number of lines.
- right number = maximum number of sets.

#### Examples:

- 8-24 = 8 lines & 24 sets (KSU without TMs or SMs).
- 12-24 = 12 lines & 24 sets (KSU lines & sets plus one TM
  - with 4 more lines and no SMs).
- 12-40 = 12 lines & 40 sets (KSU lines and sets plus one
  - TM and one SM with 16 more sets).

## Hanging modules on Mounting brackets:

**Top:** Leave about 150 mm (6 inches) of space above the

screw holes of the mounting bracket. This allows room to lift the KSU, TM and SM ON and OFF the bracket and provides space for venting the heat

from the modules.

Bottom: Ensure there is about 100 mm (4 inches) of space

between the bottom of the cable trough and the floor, or any object that may block the flow of air

from the bottom, for cooling.

**Sides**: Leave enough room to be able to open the doors of

the modules and to run cabling out to the side(s).

Between

modules: The space between two modules hung on the

mounting brackets is approximately 3 mm (1/8 inch).




Figure 2.1 - Dimensions of the Norstar Modular System. Modules may be installed in any order. If possible, leave enough room for expansion as indicated.

# Check the existing telephone set wiring

All new or existing wiring must meet the following specifications:  one twisted or spiraled pair per phone dc loop resistance less than 59 ohms cable length (24 AWG) not exceeding 305 m (1000 ft) A Norstar Station Auxiliary Power Supply can be used to extend the length of the loop if the cable length exceeds 305 m (1000 ft) but is less than 785 m (2600 ft) no bridge taps
Check equipment, tools & supplies
When unpacking the equipment, keep the boxes and inserts in case any of the equipment has been damaged and has to be shipped back.

## **Norstar System Components**

## **Key Service Unit (KSU)**

The M8x24 KSU is the hub of the Norstar Modular System. It can function on its own as a basic system (with 24 Norstar telephones and eight CO lines). The system may also be expanded by adding any combination of up to six Trunk Modules (TM) for more CO lines and/or Station Modules (SM) to accommodate more Norstar telephones. The KSU is connected to the other modules by connecting DS-30 cables and either a Two-port or a Six-port Expansion cartridge. These items are shipped separately.




Figure 2.2 - KSU without cable trough installed

## **Feature Cartridge**




Figure 2.3 - Feature Cartridge

The Feature cartridge, shown in Figure 2.3, contains the software required to run the system. This cartridge should not be removed or inserted unless the KSU power is OFF, otherwise damage to the cartridge or KSU may result.

## **Mounting Brackets**




Figure 2.4 - Mounting Brackets

Mounting brackets as in Figure 2.4, which are used to hang the KSU, TM and SM on a wall, come in the box with each module. The brackets are available in three sizes:

Size:

**Mounting for:** 

Full size - Key Service Unit

1/2 size - Trunk Module

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> size - Station Module

Brackets are notched at the ends to aid in mounting modules.

### **Cable Troughs**

The cable troughs, which are included with each module, are used to provide an orderly method of containing the cabling from the KSU, TM and the SM.

The cables normally routed through the cable trough are:

25-pair cables

(upper shelf)

DS-30 cables

(upper shelf)

AC power cords

(lower shelf ONLY)

The cable trough is also divided into two halves. Due to regulatory requirements, the lower shelf is ONLY to be used for ac power cords and power bars. The upper shelf is for the 25-pair cables and the DS-30 cables.

There are two sizes of cable troughs:




Figure 2.5 - Cable trough for KSU and TM (1/2 size)

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>-size (Figure 2.5)




Figure 2.6 - Cable trough for SM (1/4 size)

1/4-size (Figure 2.6)

Two  $^{1}/_{2}$ -size cable troughs are used on the KSU; one  $^{1}/_{2}$ -size cable trough is used on the TM; and the  $^{1}/_{4}$ -size cable trough is used on the SM.

Cable troughs are detachable from the KSU, TM and SM.

## **Expansion Cartridges**

#### **Two-port Expansion Cartridge**




Figure 2.7 - Two-port Expansion Cartridge

The Two-port expansion cartridge (Figure 2.7) allows up to two additional Modules (TM and/or SM) to be connected to the system.

#### Six-port Expansion Cartridge




Figure 2.8 - Six-port Expansion Cartridge

The Six-port expansion cartridge (Figure 2.8) allows any combination of modules (TM and/or SM), to a maximum of six, to be connected to the system.

These Modules are connected to the expansion cartridge by DS-30 cables plugged into the ports on the face of this cartridge.

#### **DS-30** cables




Figure 2.9 - DS-30 Cables

The DS-30 cables, as shown in Figure 2.9, are used to connect the TMs and SMs to the KSU. One end of the cable plugs into the appropriate connector in the TM or SM and the other end plugs into a connector in the Expansion Cartridge (either a Two-port or a Six-port cartridge. See DS-30 installation for more information).

## Trunk Module (TM)




Figure 2.10 - TM without cable trough attached

The M12x0 Trunk Module, shown in Figure 2.10, allows additional Trunk Cartridge (TC) installation, which in turn allows more CO lines installation to the Norstar system. The TM has three slots in front for inserting Trunk Cartridges (TC). Each TM can add a maximum of 12 CO lines (four CO lines per Trunk Cartridge (TC).

## Trunk Cartridge (TC)




Figure 2.11 - Trunk Cartridge (TC)

Trunk cartridges, as shown in Figure 2.11, can be inserted into the three slots of the TM to add more CO lines. A TM needs at least one Trunk cartridge to be able to function.

Each Trunk cartridge adds four CO lines. Up to three Trunk cartridges can be added to a TM for a maximum of 12 lines in one TM. The number of TMs and TCs required will vary according to the particular installation.

## Station Module (SM)




Figure 2.12 - SM without cable trough

A M0x16 Station Module, as shown in Figure 2.12, is used to add more Norstar telephones to the Norstar system. Each SM allows a maximum of 16 Norstar telephones to be added to the system.

Note: Only Norstar telephones can be connected to an SM.

#### Power bar




Figure 2.13 - Power bar

This CSA/UL approved power bar MUST be used when the system has one or more TMs and/or SMs. The power bar (Figure 2.13) is equipped with four plug-in outlets. If more modules are required than can be plugged into one power bar, a second power bar MUST be used.

**Note:** The ac cord from the second bar must be plugged into the first power bar.

The power bar should be installed in the lower half of the cable trough.

## Norstar telephones

Norstar telephones are digital telephones to be used only with the Norstar system.

The three types of Norstar telephones available are:

#### M7208

- · one-line display
- eight memory buttons with indicators




Figure 2.14 - M7208 telephone

#### M7310

- two-line display
- display buttons
- 10 memory buttons with indicators
- 12 dual memory buttons without indicators
- shift button

## **Emergency Telephones (ET)**

Analog single-line telephones are used as emergency telephones on the Norstar system. Norstar telephones are not used for this function. An emergency telephone can provide emergency telephone service if the Norstar system ceases to function (for example, during a commercial power failure). The KSU has two ET lines (lines 01 and 02) and the TM has one ET line.

### QCBIX or equivalent distribution block

The distribution block (a Northern Telecom QCBIX or equivalent) is used to cross-connect 25-pair cables from the Norstar system to station wiring. Norstar CO lines are cross-connected to external CO lines on the distribution block by an RJ-21/CA-21 interface. Norstar station set lines cross-connect to wiring for Norstar telephones. Norstar auxiliary equipment lines and emergency telephones also cross-connect to the appropriate wiring through the distribution block.

### 25-pair cables and 50-pin connectors

The 25-pair cables (24 AWG) are used to connect KSU CO lines, KSU Station set wiring, TM CO lines and SM Station set wiring to the QCBIX or equivalent distribution block. The number of 25-pair cables may vary depending on the installation (see Chart 2.3).

Each 25-pair cable needs a 50-pin connector (female) on one end to connect to the KSU, to the TM and to the SM as shown in Chart 2.3. Connect the other end of the 25-pair cable to the distribution block.

#### **Optional Equipment**

Optional equipment for the Norstar system, described later in this Guide, includes:

**Auxiliary Ringer -** Connections are provided to allow specific CO lines or Station Sets to ring a customer-supplied external ringer.

**External Music Source -** A connection is provided for an external music source, such as a radio, to provide music for callers on hold and/or for Background Music.

**External Paging System -** For use with loudspeakers and amplifiers supplied by the customer to receive paging announcements.

**Busy Lamp Field (BLF) -** Shows the Busy/Not Busy status of Norstar telephones. To be installed on M7310 telephone only.

Central Answering Position Module (CAP) - The central answering position provides the capability to show the status of up to 48 Norstar telephones (96 with a second CAP). To be installed on an M7324. You can have a maximum of two CAPs for an M7324.

**Analog Terminal Adapter (ATA) -** Converts the Norstar digital interface to allow the connection of analog devices such as: single line telephones, FAXs, Modems, Answering machines. It can also be used to provide OPX service.

**Station Auxiliary Power Supply (SAPS)** - To provide power for a CAP module or for Norstar telephones more than 305m (1000 ft) from the KSU.




Figure 2.18 - Analog Terminal Adapter (ATA)




Figure 2.19 - Central Answering Position module (CAP)

## 3 Installation

## Mount the KSU, TM and SM

Physical Mounting: The KSU, Trunk Module(s) and Station Module(s) can be physically mounted in any order. Allow suitable wall space as identified pre-installation for installing Trunk and Station modules for future expansion.

**Note:** The doors of the KSU, TM and SM should not be removed.

# Recommended Routing of cables in Cable Troughs

Cable troughs beneath the KSU, TM and SM hold the 25-pair wires, the DS-30 cables, the power cord(s) and the power bar (if required for a particular installation).

The cable troughs have been designed to keep the ac power cables and ac power bar separate from the 25-pair cables and to allow ease of access after the installation. Place the cabling in the two shelves as described in the following chart:

### **Cable Placement**

#### Upper shelf

All 25-pair wires and DS-30s ONLY.

- Place 25-pair cables in the BACK.
- Place the DS-30 cables in the FRONT.

#### Lower shelf

All power cords and the power bar(s) ONLY.




Figure 3.1 - Key Service Unit (KSU)




Figure 3.2 - Trunk Module (TM)




Figure 3.3 - Station Module (SM)

## Mounting procedure for KSU, TM & SM




Figure 3.4 - Installing the KSU Mounting Bracket

1. Position metal mounting bracket(s): Hold the KSU bracket, as shown in Figure 3.4, and fasten to the wall using four 19 mm (3/4 inch) long screws. Orient KSU as in Figure 3.7.

Hint: Use a level and draw a pencil line to align the KSU.

This will be useful to line up Trunk and Station modules if they are part of the system.

2. Slide the KSU, TM or SM onto the mounting brackets as shown in Figure 3.5. Line up with the notches on either side of the mounting bracket as you slide the KSU onto the mounting bracket(s). This facilitates accurate hanging.




Figure 3.6 - Cable trough installation

3. Attach cable trough(s) to the appropriate module(s) as shown in Figure 3.6.

- 4. Open the cable trough door and allow the door to swing down.
- 5. Fasten the bottom of the KSU, TM and SM with 38 mm (1½ inch) long screws through the holes provided in the lower tray of the cable trough as shown in Figure 3.6. The KSU cable trough needs four screws; the TM and SM need only two screws each.




Figure 3.7 - KSU, TM and SM installed

- 6. Close the door(s) of the cable trough(s) as shown in Figure 3.7.

7. Do **not** connect power at this point.

# Connect KSU and TM Central Office (CO) Lines

## Central Office (CO) lines cable and wiring material required

☐ KSU: One 25-pair, 24 AWG cable (for the CO lines and
auxiliary equipment) terminated with a female 50-pin
connector on one end.
☐ TM: One 25-pair, 24 AWG cable (for the CO lines and
auxiliary equipment) terminated with a female 50-pin
connector on one end.
QCBIX (or equivalent) distribution block for each 25-pair
cable.

**Note:** Installers should also check the lightning protectors at the cable entry point to the building with special attention to the grounding. Any problems should be reported to the Telco in writing.

## Connecting outside lines procedure

The following procedure is an example of one of several methods for cross-connecting KSU and Trunk Module CO Lines and for cross-connecting KSU Auxiliary Equipment Lines and the TM Emergency Telephone.




Figure 3.8 - KSU CO connection

- 1. Plug the 50-pin connector of a 25-pair cable into the corresponding CO line connector on the KSU as in Figure 3.8. (The connector is labeled with an icon which represents telephone poles as shown here.)




Figure 3.9 - TM CO connection

- 2. Perform the same step for any TM(s) in the installation as shown in Figure 3.9.

3. Route the 25-pair cable(s) through the upper shelf of the cable trough to the distribution block.

Note: Route the 25-pair cables straight out to one side of the cable trough in a bundle. Use cable ties to secure them to the wall and to support their weight. This prevents undue stress on the cable trough shelf when several 25-pair cables are present.

- 4. Cross connect the CO Lines to the distribution block (see KSU and TM CO line wiring charts and diagrams).
- 5. Connect the Auxiliary Equipment Lines to the distribution block (see KSU and TM CO line wiring charts and diagrams).

**Note:** Auxiliary Equipment must not be connected to the RJ-21/CA-21 interface.

To connect CO lines to a standard RJ-21/CA-21 interface:
 Bring the outside Central Office cable to the distribution block and use the distribution block to cross-connect to the corresponding KSU and TM CO lines according to the KSU

and TM CO line wiring charts and diagrams (see:

Chart 3.1 M8x24 KSU to CO lines and Auxiliary Equipment;

Chart 3.2 M12x0 Trunk Module Wiring;

Figure 3.12 Wiring Arrangement for KSU;

Figure 3.13 Wiring Arrangement for TM).

7. Wire the Auxiliary Equipment lines separately (see KSU and TM CO line wiring charts and diagrams).

**Note:** For the TM, the Auxiliary Equipment Line is an Emergency Telephone (ET).

## Connect KSU and SM Station Set wiring

#### **WARNING:**

Norstar phones must not be used as Off Premises Station Sets (OPX). Norstar phones are for use with Norstar equipment only. Connecting a Norstar telephone directly to a CO line may result in equipment damage. For OPX applications use the Norstar Analog Terminal Adapter (ATA) with single-line telephones.

## Station set cable and wiring material required:

KSU: one 25-pair, 24 AWG cable with a female 50-pin
connector installed on one end.
SM: one 25-pair, 24 AWG cable with a female 50-pin
connector installed on one end.
QCBIX (or equivalent) distribution block unit.
Sufficient 25-pair, 50-pin QCBIX (or equivalent)
distribution blocks to accommodate the station wiring.

# Connecting KSU and SM station wiring procedure:

The following procedure is an example of one of several methods for cross-connecting KSU and SM station wiring.




Figure 3.10 - KSU Stations connector

1. Plug a 50-pin connector of a 25-pair cable into the



corresponding station connector on the KSU as in Figure 3.10. (The connector is labeled with an icon which represents a Norstar telephone set as shown here.)




Figure 3.11 - SM Stations connector

2. Perform the same step for the SM(s) in the installation. The SM stations connector is located at the bottom of the cable channel on the right, front of the SM as in Figure 3.11.

3. Route the 25-pair cable(s) through the upper shelf of the cable troughs underneath the KSU and SM, to the distribution block.

Note: Route the 25-pair cables straight out to one side of the cable trough in a bundle. Use cable ties to secure them to the wall and to support their weight. This prevents undue stress on the cable trough shelf when several 25-pair cables are present.

- Connect the KSU and SM 25-pair wires to the appropriate pins on the distribution block. (see KSU and SM Station set wiring charts: Chart 3.3 M8x24 KSU Station Sets Wiring Chart 3.4 M0x16 SM Station Sets Wiring).
- Cross-connect the KSU and SM station wires to the corresponding station pins on the distribution block for telephone wiring (see KSU and SM station set wiring charts).
- 6. Using a single pair of wires for each Station Set, connect each of the phones as per the wiring charts 3.3 and 3.4.




Figure 3.12 - Wiring Arrangement for KSU




Figure 3.13 - Wiring Arrangement for TM

## **Port Number Coding Explanation**

The code shown for "Ports" on Chart 3.2 (for TMs) and Chart 3.4 (for SMs) shows the link between particular port numbers and the wiring on the distribution block. This is useful for tracking down faults during a Maintenance session found in the *Norstar Modular Pocket Maintenance Guide*, where codes appear on a telephone display indicating error messages.

The code shown on the charts (for example: "X12") has two components:

- "X" corresponds to the number which appears on the face of the Expansion Cartridge Port to which the TM or SM is connected.
- Numerical Digits (for example "01" or "12") identify an individual port number associated with that Expansion Cartridge.

#### For example:

The code "812" appearing as part of an error message for a TM indicates Expansion Cartridge port #8 and internal port "12". The corresponding TM pins on the distribution block are Pin 47 (Violet-Orange) and Pin 22 (Orange-Violet). These codes apply to both TMs and SMs (up to "X16" for SMs for up to 16 telephone sets; up to "X12" for TMs for up to 12 CO lines).

## **Expansion Cartridge Installation**

Installation for both the Two-port and Six-port Expansion cartridges follow the same procedures.

#### **CAUTION:**

Do not touch the printed circuit board. This is an electrostatic-sensitive device.

- 1. Turn OFF the power to the KSU before installing or removing an expansion cartridge.
- 2. Remove the faceplate covering the expansion cartridge slot in the KSU. Use a screwdriver at the bottom of the faceplate, as indicated by the icon, to help detach the faceplate from the KSU expansion cartridge slot.




Figure 3.14 - Faceplate Removal

3. Make sure you are wearing a grounding strap when handling any cartridge.




Figure 3.15 - Installing Six-port Expansion Cartridge

4. While holding the latches open, insert the Expansion cartridge, as shown in Figure 3.15, in the appropriate slot and close the latches at the same moment to align the cartridge properly.

## Trunk Cartridge (TC) Installation

#### **CAUTION:**

Do not touch the printed circuit board. This is an electrostatic-sensitive device.

- 1. Turn OFF the power to the TM before installing or removing the Trunk Cartridge(s).
- 2. Remove the appropriate faceplate covering the Trunk Cartridge (TC) slot on the TM. Use a screwdriver at the bottom of the faceplate, as indicated by the icon, to detach the faceplate from a Trunk Cartridge (TC) slot.

**Note:** The Trunk Cartridges (TC) are installed starting from the left slot to the right slot.




Figure 3.16 - Faceplate Removal




Figure 3.17 - Installing Trunk Cartridge (TC)

## **Connect DS-30 Cables**




Figure 3.18 - Plug in TM DS-30 cable




Figure 3.19 - Plug in SM DS-30 cable

1. Plug one end of the DS-30 cable into the DS-30 port on the front of a TM or SM (as shown in both Figures 3.18 and 3.19).

- 2. Route the cable through the cable clips on the right side of the TM or SM.
- 3. Route the cable through the upper shelf of the cable trough(s) to the KSU and up through the cable clip to the expansion cartridge.




Figure 3.20 - Plug DS-30 cables into KSU Two-port Expansion cartridge




Figure 3.21 - Plug DS-30 cables into KSU Six-port Expansion cartridge

- 4. **Trunk Modules:** Plug the end of the DS-30 cable of the first TM into the **HIGHEST** available port of the expansion cartridge and work **DOWN** (see Figures 3.20 and 3.21 on the next page).

**Station Modules:** Plug the end of the DS-30 cable of the first SM into the **LOWEST** available port of the expansion cartridge and work **UP** (see Figures 3.20 and 3.21 on the next page).

## **Port Numbering**

## Flexible Numbering Plan

Numbering plan refers to the digits dialed by the user to access other Norstar telephones. These are the Intercomnumbers (also called Directory Numbers or DNs).

A Non-expanded system, which *only* consists of a KSU (no TM or SM) will have two-digit DNs by default. For an Expanded system (with an Expansion Cartridge installed) the length of DNs changes automatically to three digits. To match the numbering plan to that of an existing Centrex or Private Branch Exchange (PBX) system you can change the Norstar DN length to four digits (on both Non-expanded and Expanded systems).

All Intercom numbers must have the same number of digits. Line Pool access codes do not have to be the same length as the Intercom numbers or other access codes. A Line Pool access code can not begin with the same digit as an Intercom number. For example, the Intercom number 2345 can co-exist with the Line Pool access code 321, but not with the Line Pool access code 231. In the second case, the Line Pool access code would have to be four digits and not begin with 231.

Symbols such as an asterisk (\*) or a pound sign (#) cannot be used in Intercom numbers or Line Pool access codes.

No Intercom number or Line Pool access code can begin with the number "1"; this number is reserved as the first digit of Retrieve Park codes. The same digits can not be used for two Intercom numbers, for two Line Pool access codes, or for both an Intercom number and a Line Pool access code. All numbers must be unique.

## **B1 and B2 Directory Numbers (DN)**

The terms B1 and B2 correspond to channels on Norstar for transmitting both voice and data. Each DN Port number has one B1 DN and one B2 DN associated with it. Devices such as the M7208, M7310 and M7324 only need and use the B1 channel and the B1 DN. Other devices may need both B1 and B2 channels thus having B1 and B2 DNs associated with them.

Chart 3.5 shows the numbering associated with the KSU. Charts 3.6 and 3.7 show the numbering associated with the installation of Two-port and Six-port Expansion cartridges.

## **Key Service Unit (KSU)**

The Key Service Unit (KSU) has eight lines and twenty-four station sets. Chart 3.5 shows the Port and Station numbers assigned to lines and sets in the KSU.

Notice that although there are no Physical DS-30 ports on a non-expanded KSU, the Port numbers of the sets and lines within the system have been assigned ports 101-124 and 201-208 respectively.

A Non-expanded system has two-digit default DNs. By expanding the system with an Expansion cartridge, the default DNs become three-digit to accommodate the additional DNs.

## **Two-port Expansion Cartridge**

The Two-port Expansion cartridge may accommodate DS-30 cables for any combination of Trunk and Station Modules up to a total of two. Chart 3.6 shows the Port numbers assigned to the line and station DNs on a Two-port cartridge.

# Upgrading the system with a Two-port or a Six-port Expansion Cartridge

See the next section, 4. Upgrading the Norstar System, for procedures to upgrade expansion cartridges and modules.

## 4 Upgrading Norstar system

Upgrading a Norstar system may involve installing and replacing the following hardware:

- Two-port or Six-port Expansion Cartridge
- Trunk Cartridges (TC)
- TM(s) and / or SM(s)
- DS-30 cables for each module
- Power bar(s)

## Note on Numbering Plan and DS-30 cables:

To avoid gaps in the numbering plan, use the rule described in Chapter 3 in the section on Connect DS-30 cables. Plug in Trunk Module DS-30s in the TOP Port and work down; plug Station Module DS-30s in the BOTTOM Port and work up.

# Add an Expansion Cartridge to a Non-expanded system

A Non-expanded System consists of a KSU alone (without an Expansion Cartridge, TM, or SM).

To expand the Norstar system with TMs or SMs, install the appropriate Two-port or Six-port Expansion Cartridge to the existing Non-expanded system.

**Note:** A power bar is required when TMs or SMs are added to the Norstar system.

- 1. Install mounting brackets for any additional TMs or SMs and hang these modules.
- 2. Unplug the KSU ac power cable from the ac outlet.
- 3. Install the appropriate Expansion Cartridge (the Two-port or the Six-port) for the upgrade. This is described in an earlier section on Expansion Cartridge Installation.
- 4. Plug DS-30 cables into the appropriate connector(s) on the new TM(s) and/or SM(s) as described earlier in Chapter 3 Connect DS-30 Cables.
- 5. Plug the other ends of the DS-30 cables into the expansion cartridge.
- 6. Install the power bar(s) as described in the section on Power bar installation and plug the ac power cords from the KSU and the modules into the power bar(s).
- 7. Power up the system again by plugging the ac power cord from the appropriate power bar into the ac outlet.

# **Upgrade from a Two-port to Six-port Expansion Cartridge**

An Expanded System consists of a KSU with an Expansion cartridge. The cartridge is connected to one or more TMs or SMs by DS-30 cable(s).

- 1. Install mounting brackets for any additional TMs or SMs and hang these modules.
- 2. Unplug the Power bar ac power cable from the ac outlet.
- 3. Unplug DS-30 cables from Two-port Expansion cartridge.

**Note:** Label the DS-30 cables if you have not already done so.

- 4. Remove Two-port Expansion cartridge while wearing a ground strap.
- 5. Install Six-port Expansion cartridge. This is described earlier in the section on Expansion Cartridge Installation.
- 6. Re-connect the original SM DS-30 cable(s) from the Twoport Expansion cartridge into the Six-port cartridge starting from the BOTTOM Port (**Port#3**) and working UP. This maintains the numbering plan sequence of DNs.
- 7. Plug any new SM DS-30 cable(s) into the Six-port Expansion cartridge starting at the next highest port available on the Expansion cartridge and working UP.
- 8. Plug the original TM DS-30 cable(s) from the Two-port Expansion cartridge into the Six-port cartridge, starting from the TOP Port (**Port #8**) and working DOWN.
- 9. Plug any new TM DS-30 cable(s) into the Six-port Expansion cartridge, starting at the next lowest port available on the Expansion cartridge and working DOWN.

**Note:** Remember to re-label the DS-30s at both ends with the new Port number on the Six-port Expansion Cartridge.

- 10. Plug the ac power cords from the new TM(s) and SM(s) into the ac power bar.
- 11. Power up the system again by plugging the power cord from the power bar into the ac outlet.

#### Add a new M12x0 Trunk Module

M12x0 TMs can be connected to an existing M8x24 KSU without having to power down the KSU if enough ports on the Expansion Cartridge are available to plug in the new module(s).

However, if a new Expansion cartridge is needed, the KSU must be powered down to allow installation of the cartridge. See the sections on Expansion Cartridge Installation or Upgrade Two-port Expansion cartridge to Six-port Expansion cartridge for the procedure.

**Note:** Installing a TM where the KSU has not been powered down often results in a delay before the system recognizes the new TM. The delay may be a maximum of two minutes.

- 1. Unpack the TM and the Trunk Cartridges (TC) for the TM.
- 2. Insert the Trunk Cartridges (TC) into the TM before powering up the TM. Insert the cartridge(s) starting at the left slot (Slot #1).

#### **CAUTION:**

To avoid possible equipment damage ensure that TM power is OFF when installing a Trunk Cartridge (TC).

- 3. Install the TM according to the procedures shown in the chapter on Installation :
  - Mounting Procedure for KSU, TM and SM
  - Connect KSU and TM Central Office (CO) Lines
  - M12x0 Trunk Module CO Lines Wiring Chart 3.2
  - Connect DS-30 Cables.
- 4. Power up the TM by plugging the ac power cord into the power bar.
- 5. Do the Configuration and Administration programming for the additional lines following procedures and charts provided in the Programming section of this Guide.

#### Add a new M0x16 Station Module

M0x16 SMs can be connected to an existing M8x24 KSU without having to power down the KSU if enough ports on the Expansion cartridge are available to plug in the new module(s).

However, if a new Expansion cartridge is needed, the KSU must be powered down to allow installation of the cartridge. See the section on Expansion Cartridge Installation or Upgrade Two-port Expansion cartridge to Six-port Expansion cartridge for the procedure.

- 1. Unpack the SM.
- 2. Install the SM according to the procedures shown in the chapter on Installation:
  - Mounting Procedure for KSU, TM and SM
  - Connect KSU and SM wiring procedure
  - Chart 3.4 M0X16 SM Station Sets
  - Connect DS-30 Cables
- 3. Power up the SM by plugging the ac power cord into the power bar.
- 4. Do the Configuration and Administration programming for the additional sets following procedures and charts provided in the Programming section of this Guide.

# 5 Emergency Telephone

# **Install Emergency Telephones**

The Emergency Telephones (ET) are standard (500/2500) single-line telephones that provide emergency telephone service in case of power failure or when power to the Norstar system is disconnected.

**Note:** The KSU has two ET connections (ET1 and ET2). Each TM has one connection.

## Connecting ET sets for the KSU:

**Note:** See Chart 3.1 M8x24 KSU to CO Lines and Auxiliary Equipment.

1. Wire a modular jack or equivalent to each set of ET pins on the 50-pin connecting block for KSU CO lines:

2. Connect a single line telephone to the modular jack.

#### Connecting the ET set for the TM:

2. Connect a single line telephone to the modular jack.

#### **Test the Emergency Telephones**

- 1. Ensure that power to the KSU (and modules) is OFF.
- 2. Pick up the Emergency Telephone receiver.
- 3. Listen for dial tone:

If dial tone	If no dial tone
check that the ET telephone is functioning properly.	<ul> <li>check that the outside line is connected properly.</li> <li>verify telephone set is working properly.</li> <li>verify that the ac power to the KSU or TM is OFF.</li> <li>verify that Dial Tone is connected on lines 1 and 2 of the KSU and line 1 of the TM.</li> </ul>

- 4. If all previous steps have been verified and there is still no dial tone at the emergency telephone, replace the KSU or TM.
- 5. Repeat the telephone test if necessary.

# 6 Norstar telephones

#### **WARNING:**

Norstar telephones must not be used as Off Premises Station Sets (OPX). Norstar telephones are for use with Norstar equipment only. Connecting a Norstar telephone directly to a CO line may result in equipment damage. For OPX applications use the Norstar Analog Terminal Adapter (ATA) with single-line telephones.

Installers should also check the lightning protectors at the cable entry point to the building with special attention to the ground. Any problems should be reported to the Telco in writing. Norstar set wiring should not leave the buildings as it is not lightning-protected.

#### **Hearing Aid Compatibility**

Meridian Norstar Telephones are Hearing Aid compatible, as defined in Section 68.316 of Part 68 FCC Rules.

# Install the M7324, M7310 and M7208 telephones

- Connect the receiver cord to the receiver jack in the telephone (right hand jack when viewed from the rear).
   Route the cord through the cord guide in the bottom of the telephone.
- 2. Connect the line cord. Route the cord through the cord guide.
- 3. Plug the other end of the line cord into the modular jack which had been previously wired to the distribution block.
- 4. Check the telephone displays; the indicators should flash for up to 20 seconds while the set is initializing. Time and date is then displayed for example,

Jan 1 1:00 am

# Installing a wall-mounted telephone

The M7324, M7310 and M7208 telephones can be mounted on the wall.




Figure 6.1 - Remove mount

1. Remove the bevelled wall-mounting base from the back of the telephone. Grip the base, and with your two thumbs, push on the top to pop out as in Figure 6.1.

2. Remove the receiver clip from the base. Install the clip in the forward lip of the receiver rest as in Figure 6.2.




Figure 6.3 - Remove panel

3. Use a screwdriver or similar tool to remove the center knock-out panel as in Figure 6.3.




Figure 6.4 - Mount base

4. Mount the base "upside down" on the wall so the modular jack projects through the knockout as in Figure 6.4.




Figure 6.5 - Connect line cord

5. Connect the line cord between the modular jack and the telephone jack (right hand jack when viewed from the bottom as in Figure 6.5).




Figure 6.6 - Mount telephone

6. Mount the telephone on the wall base. Route the cord through the cord guide as in Figure 6.6.

7. The indicators should flash for up to 20 seconds while the set is initializing. Time and date is then displayed.

# Automatic telephone set relocation

When automatic set relocation has been enabled in configuration, existing Norstar telephone sets of the same type can be moved to new ports and re-connected in any order without loss of programming data and intercom numbers. Recognition of the telephone by the KSU may take up to 45 seconds. If set relocation has not been enabled, set replacement (as described below) occurs.

**Note:** Automatic set relocation is disabled by default . To enable set relocation see chapter 12 Configuration

under 4. Miscellaneous Set relocation: N

#### Telephone set replacement

A new Norstar telephone set (one which is not in service on the system), plugged into a port occupied previously by a Norstar telephone of the same type, acquires the Administration profile and intercom number of the telephone that was previously in that port. This is normally done to replace a defective telephone.

If the new telephone is a different type than the replaced telephone, the new telephone retains the intercom number of the previous telephone but receives a default profile for a telephone of its type.

After telephone set replacement, the telephone that was replaced loses its profile and intercom number because these were given to the new telephone. The replaced telephone (if still functional) is treated by the system now as a telephone not previously in service with this system.

# Apply the button labels

Apply the button labels when you have powered up the system and finished the configuration and Administration procedures. If you expect the customer to re-program some or all of the buttons it is better not to apply the button labels until all the re-programming is done.




Figure 6.7 - Button Designation Label Kit

Use Button Inquiry Feature \* 0 to verify that the label agrees with the programming for that button. There are two types of labelled buttons, pre-printed labels and blank labels you fill out yourself. Leave the labels and extra button kits, as shown in Figure 6.7, with the individual telephones or the System Coordinator.

#### **Types of Button Caps:**

- Unlabeled, Clear button caps with appropriate green or grey paper on which line numbers and features have to be typed in.
- Pre-printed, Colored button caps in green or grey .




Chart 6.1 - Example of button caps

#### Type the telephone numbers

Type the individual telephone numbers on the labels and attach them to the appropriate telephones. Type the telephone number and the inside extension number on the appropriate Receiver Card for each type and color of phone which is to be installed. Cover the Receiver Card underneath the receiver of each telephone with the plastic lens.

## **Default Button Assignment Templates**

During the System Startup process, initial default features are assigned automatically to the programmable buttons on Norstar telephones. This is designed to assist the installer in programming the system.

During Startup, an installer chooses one of four default templates: Square, Hybrid, Centrex, or PBX. The default feature assigned to each button depends on the type of template chosen and on the type of telephone. A default feature associated with a particular button appears on the button automatically unless the button has been assigned as an external line button, intercom button, Answer DN or Handsfree button in System Administration. These defaults are shown on the following pages.

**Note:** Telephones are shipped with the buttons in place for the Square template.

#### Rules of default assignment

In case of contention for available buttons, the buttons are assigned in the following order:

#### Handsfree/Mute button

If assigned to the telephone in programming, this feature appears on the bottom right hand button (the bottom button on the M7208) moving the intercom button(s) up one position.

#### Intercom button

A telephone may have a maximum of eight intercom buttons. Intercom buttons appear above the handsfree button (if assigned) on the bottom right hand buttons (the bottom button on the M7208).

#### Answer button

Each telephone can have up to four Answer buttons. An Answer button is assigned automatically to a telephone when that telephone is assigned an Answer DN in section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming. Answer buttons appear above intercom buttons in the righthand column and continue up from the bottom in the lefthand column replacing the features on those buttons. (On the M7208 Answer buttons appear above intercom buttons and below external line buttons in a single column of buttons.)

#### External line buttons

External line buttons appear in ascending line order, starting at the top key in the left hand column (the top button for the M7208). If more than five external lines are assigned to the M7310, or more than 12 to the M7324, assignment continues down the right hand column, replacing the features on those buttons. Line buttons overwrite feature access buttons but not Handsfree/Mute, Intercom or Answer buttons.

### Telephone set button defaults

Defaults shown on the following pages are for a system with 3-digit DNs. Other configurations may have 2-digit or 4-digit DNs (for example: DN 21, DN 221 or DN 2221).

**Note:** A telephone set will not allow its own DN to be assigned to an inside Autodial button.

#### How to read the following charts:

Button defaults for the Square template are shown in the left column. In the Centrex, Hybrid and PBX columns, the defaults shown are specific to these templates. Where no default is shown, the default is the same as the Square template. Line numbers in the chart are represented by 'X' (for example, Line<XX>).




Chart 6.2 - M7208 Norstar Telephone Templates



# 7 Power bar installation

# Power bar(s) installation procedure:




Figure 7.1 - Power bar installation

- 1. Slide the power bar(s) into the lower shelf of the cable trough as in Figure 7.1. All power cords must go only in the lower shelf of the cable troughs. Where four or more Trunk and/or Station Modules are present use a second power bar to provide the additional ac plugs. The ac power cord from the second power bar must be plugged into the first power bar.
- 2. Route power cord from the KSU, TM and SM through the cable clips located in the lower shelf of the cable trough.




Figure 7.2 - Cable trough wiring and power bar

3. Plug ac power cord from the KSU, TM and SM into the power bar (Figure 7.2).

#### **CAUTION:**

Only a CSA certified and UL listed power bar with a third wire ground must be used.

4. See next section for instructions on powering up the system.

# 8 Power up Norstar system

- 1. Double check all wiring before applying power to the system.
- 2. Plug the power bar into the ac outlet.

Note: Use a non-switchable, third-wire ground ac outlet.

- 3. Check to see that the red power LEDs are ON. (The KSU, TM and SM each have one LED.)
- 4. If none of the LEDs are ON, check for power at the ac outlet. If there is no ac power, ask the owner of the system to check with building maintenance.

#### OR

If there is ac power at the outlet, replace the module(s) which do not have a red LED ON.




Figure 8.1 - LEDs for KSU, TM and SM

# 9 Optional equipment

# **Auxiliary Ringer Control Installation**

The Norstar KSU provides a control contact to operate an external loud ringer. The auxiliary ringer can be activated by:

- Night Service
- Auxiliary ring for specific CO lines
- Auxiliary ring for specific sets

Refer to the programing section for more details. Refer specifically to the following headings in Administration and Configuration:

- 1. Line Data (CONFIG)
- 6. Permissions (ADMIN)
- 7. Night Service (ADMIN)
- 1. Follow the manufacturer's installation instructions.
- Connect the Auxiliary Ring Generator to the 50-pin distribution block (see Auxiliary Equipment on Chart 3.1 M8x24 Key Service Unit (KSU) to CO lines and Auxiliary Equipment connecting arrangements; also see Chart 9.1 below):

These pins provide a control contact. They do not provide ring current or dc voltage. The ringer must not draw more than 50 mA from a 40 V dc source.

## **External Music Source Installation**

This feature plays music for callers on hold and/or for Background Music. These features must be enabled through programming. Refer to the programing section for more details. Refer specifically to the following headings in Configuration:

3. Call Handling	On Hold: Music
4. Miscellaneous	Background Music: Yes

Chart 9.2 - External Music programming

The music source can be any low-power device such as a radio with a high-impedance earphone jack. The recommended KSU input level is 1 Vrms across an input impedance of 3300 ohms.

1. Connect the earphone from the music source (signal and ground) to the 50-pin distribution block.

#### **CAUTION:**

To avoid damage to audio equipment ensure that the polarity of the audio input is the same as identified in the KSU Station Set Chart 9.3 for pins 50(Violet-Slate) and 25(Slate-Violet).

2. Adjust the volume of the music source to a comfortable level by making a call into the system on an outside line and then putting the call on hold.

# **External Paging System Installation**




Figure 9.1 - External paging control contacts.

The Norstar system allows a customer supplied external paging system to be connected to and operate in conjunction with the Norstar paging feature (shown in Figure 9.1). The system allows pages and announcements to be made in offices, warehouses and buildings. The paging output from the Norstar KSU is 775 mV across an input impedance of 600 ohms.


- 1. Follow the manufacturer's installation instructions.
- 2. Connect the paging system audio input (see Chart 9.4) to the 50-pin distribution block (Paging Output 775 mV across 600 ohms).

**Note:** Norstar external paging will only support talk-back paging equipment if a CO line port is used.

In addition, the Norstar KSU provides a relay contact which can be used for other applications (for example, switching ON or OFF music). See Chart 9.4 for details.

The Norstar Modular KSU provides both a "Make" (normally open) and a "Break" (normally closed) set of contacts that operate in conjunction with the External Page feature.

These contacts can be used to control various external devices.

The external device being connected through these contacts must not draw more than 50 mA from a 40V dc source.

# Norstar Busy Lamp Field (BLF) Installation

This section shows you how to:

- Install a Busy Lamp Field (BLF) on an M7310 telephone
- Test the BLF to ensure that it is functioning
- · Remove the BLF(should the need arise).

#### Installing the BLF

- 1. Identify and unplug the M7310 Telephone to which the BLF is to be attached.
- 2. Remove the base from the telephone.
- 3. Locate the 10-pin connector on the bottom of the telephone, and the cable on the BLF.
- 4. Connect the BLF cable to the 10-pin connector.
- 5. Align the BLF to the telephone and snap it into place. The BLF replaces the base of the M7310 telephone.
- 6. Plug the telephone into the wall outlet.
- 7. Leave the *Busy Lamp Field User Card* and the original M7310 base with the phone for the person who will use the BLF.

## **Testing the BLF**

- 1. Dial any phone on the Norstar system using a dual memory button.
- 2. Answer the call at the other phone. Do not end the call.
- 3. Go back to the M7310 phone with the BLF. On the BLF, the indicator associated with the dual button you pressed should be lit (dark).
- 4. End the call at both phones.

### Removing the BLF

- 1. Unplug the phone.
- 2. Pick up the phone and hold the front part of the phone with the BLF, display and buttons facing you.
- 3. Hold front of the phone against you. Press down on top left of the BLF base with both thumbs to remove it from the phone.
- 4. Once the first prong has been levered away from the phone with both thumbs, the other prongs will follow easily for removal.
- 5. Re-attach the original base of the phone and plug in the phone after routing the cord through the telephone base.

# Central Answering Position (CAP) Module Installation

The CAP Module can only be connected to an outlet supported by a six wire cable. The cable connecting a CAP Module to the wall outlet and the cable connecting two CAP Modules must both be six wire cables. The M7324 telephone and the CAP Modules are connected in the following manner:

The CAP Module is first plugged into the M7324 and then connected to the system.

If you have two CAP Modules:

- 1. Plug the first CAP Module into the M7324.
- 2. Plug the second CAP Module into the first CAP.
- 3. Plug the second CAP into the wall jack.

After the CAP Module is connected to the system, the indicators will turn on and in a few moments, begin to flash. When the indicators flash, you may set your CAP Module. A Station Auxiliary Power Supply is required to power the CAP. See the later section on Station Auxiliary Power Supply and Norstar Central Answering Position Module Applications for installation procedures.

#### **Setting the CAP Module**

To ensure that default settings are established, you should reset each Module when it is installed, or when you wish to revert to the default settings. When a CAP Module is moved, it retains any programmed changes.

Setting a Module is easy to do, but can only be done immediately after plugging the Module into the system and an M7324 telephone or into another CAP Module (if you are adding a

second CAP to an M7324 telephone). Each CAP Module must be set individually; setting a second Module will not change the settings stored on the first Module attached to a telephone.

#### To set the CAP Module:

- 1. Plug the CAP into the system and an M7324 telephone or another CAP.
  - The indicators turn ON but do not flash. When the indicators begin to flash, you may set the Module. The indicators on the LCD panels flash for ten seconds. If you do not set the Module during this time, you must unplug it and begin again.
- 2. Press the two Inside Autodial buttons in the bottom lefthand corner of the Module and the two buttons in the bottom right-hand corner of the Module at the same time. The indicators will be turned on one by one in sequence, beginning at the bottom right-hand corner of the Module and ascending. The indicators will then turn OFF; the Module is now set to its default values and ready for use.

# Norstar Analog Terminal Adapter (ATA) Installation

#### The ATA as a Norstar Interface

The Analog Terminal Adapter (ATA) is an interface between a digital Meridian Norstar telephone port and a standard analog voice device (single line telephone or answering machine), or data communications device (modem or fax machine).

## **Installation Requirements**

Before installation, check the following:

**Note:** See Data section for loop lengths when the ATA is used for Data Applications.

#### **ATA Default Settings**

The Norstar Analog Terminal Adapter is a unique type of terminal on the Norstar system. It has the following characteristics:

- Plugging in an ATA causes specific ATA default settings to automatically override previous defaults. This includes defaults programmed by a Startup Templates such as the Square, Centrex, Hybrid or PBX templates. It also overrides programming done in System Administration.
- ATA default settings never appear on the display. Normal default settings will appear unchanged on the display but these have no effect. Attempting to change the settings in System Administration changes on the display but not the actual setting.

#### **ATA Installation**

- 1. Mount the ATA unit within 305m (1000 ft.) of the Norstar Key Service Unit (KSU). The ATA may be mounted vertically on a wall using an appropriate screw (#8 screw recommended), taking care to ensure the heat vents are not blocked.
- 2. Connect the analog device to the jack labeled (Terminal).
- 3. Connect the jack labeled Norstar telephone port.
- 4. Plug the ATA power cord into a standard three-prong ac wall-outlet. Ensure the analog device connected to the ATA is on-hook during power-up.

**Note:** Maximum transmission loss from the ATA analog device to the central switching office should be 10db or less at 1kHz.




Figure 9.2 - ATA installation diagram (voice)

#### **Finding the ATA Directory Number**

The directory number for each ATA must be known in order that administration can be performed.

To determine the directory number for an ATA:

- 1. Connect a single line phone to the ATA.
- 2. Lift the receiver.
- 3. If you do not hear dial tone then;

  Press LINK then dial 9 to get an intercom line.
- 4. Dial the intercom number of a known Norstar phone, equipped with a display.
- If the called phone does not ring:
   An overflow tone is heard.
   Press LINK then dial 9 to get an intercom line and then redial the intercom number of a known Norstar phone equipped with a display.

The called phone rings and displays:

Set <nn> calling

- 6. Note the number <nn>. This is the directory number for the ATA.
- 7. Hang up the phone connected to the ATA.

**Note:** The Automatic set relocation feature applies to the ATA.

### **Norstar Configuration Requirements**

- Enter Norstar Configuration from an M7310 or M7324
   Norstar telephone. See the programming section of the System Coordinator Guide and/or this Installation Guide for programming details.
- 2. Ensure that the following assignments have been made for the ATA's station number:
  - assign only one outside line to appear on the set
  - set the ringing ON/OFF as applicable
  - assign either the outside line or intercom line as Prime Line

Note: The default programming on the Norstar Modular system is No Prime Line Select, thus no dial tone will be given to the ATA set when going off-hook unless a Prime Line has been assigned in programming. The default programming on the Norstar Modular system is prime Intercom Select.

Important: Do Not Assign a Line Pool as Prime Line.

3. Set the following system options: Ensure Held Line Reminder is ON.

**Note:** As the Installer or System Coordinator, check for any special conditions to be configured (for example, Tone or Pulse dialing, Restrictions, Overrides, Line Pool access etc.) where they apply.

- 4. Exit Configuration by pressing RIs to end the session.
- 5. Set the the ATA to Tones ON or Tones OFF depending on the user requirements. Refer to *Analog Terminal Adapter User Card* for details. (Default is Tones OFF.)

#### **Testing the ATA**

- 1. Confirm that the ATA is operational by connecting a single line telephone and making an intercom call and an outside call, and by calling the ATA from another Norstar set.
- 2. Refer to the *Analog Terminal Adapter User Card* for details.

### **Using the ATA for Data Communications**

The Analog Terminal Adapter (ATA) can be used to connect standard analog data devices such as a FAX machine or modem to the Norstar System. This section details the additional steps required to install an ATA for data communications.

#### Data transmission requirements

When using the ATA for data transmission the analog loop resistance should be 200 ohms (max.) across 730m (3,850 ft) of 24 AWG wire.

Note: The central office line assigned to the ATA should conform to the transmission network requirements specified in the data communication device's specifications. Transmission (Baud) rates over 1200 bits per second require a modulation scheme which is compatible with telephone line bandwidth. A conditioned central office line may be required to prevent data corruption during transmission over ordinary telephone lines.

Maximum loss from the ATA analog terminal to the central switching office should be 10db or less at 1kHz, or the line should be conditioned to this loss level.

#### Modem transmission compatibility

Modulation compatible with;

- FSK Frequency Shift Key
- · DPSK Differential Phase Shift Key
- QAM Quadrature Amplitude Modulation

#### Speeds supported;

300, 1200, 2400, 4800, 9600 bits per second

#### FAX transmission compatibility

Group 1, 2 and 3 FAX transmission formats are supported.

1. Check your FAX machine and outside central office lines for transmission specifications.




Figure 9.3 - ATA installation diagram (data)

#### **Setting TONES to OFF**

- 1. Before disconnecting the single line phone ensure that the ATA is in the Tones OFF mode.
- 2. Lift the receiver and press LINK then dial 1 8

#### ATA data requirements

1. Ensure analog loop resistance is less than or equal to 200 ohms for data applications.

**Note:** The ATA may also be mounted adjacent to the data communications device, if necessary, to maintain a maximum loop resistance of <200 ohms.

- 2. Unplug the single line phone from the ATA.
- 3. Plug the data communications device into the ATA.

#### **ATA Troubleshooting**

Ensure that there is AC power connected to the ATA.

Check that the ATA is in the Tones OFF mode. (For Data Applications only)

Check that the ATA's Norstar telephone port is properly configured for data communications by;

- Ensuring a Prime Line is assigned
- Making sure a Ringing Line is assigned if required (for example, Auto Answer Modems, FAX machines, etc.)

Check the wiring from;

- ATA to device; must be 200 ohms or less for data applications or 1300 ohms or less for voice applications.
- KSU to ATA; must be equivalent to 1000 feet of 24 AWG wire or less
- Outside line to KSU; outside Line must have dial tone and be properly connected to the KSU.

Check for dial tone at the ATA by; substituting a single line phone for the Data Communications Device.

If there is no dial tone at the ATA:

- Disconnect the LINE side of the ATA and connect a Norstar telephone in place of the ATA to verify that the connection from the ATA to the KSU is functioning properly.
- 2. If the telephone does not function, refer to the troubleshooting section of the Norstar Modular Maintenance Guide.


If there is dial tone at the ATA's Prime Line and ringing line(s):

- 1. Disconnect the ATA's outside Prime Line from the KSU and connect the data device directly to this outside line.
- 2. Try a call; if problem persists the device or outside line is likely at fault.

# Station Auxiliary Power Supply (SAPS) Installation

### General

The Station Auxiliary Power Supply provides auxiliary regulated direct current power as required by some Norstar applications. The installation instructions given here explain how to install the Norstar Station Auxiliary Power Supply in long loop applications and for the Central Answering Position Module (CAP).



### Components

The Norstar Station Auxiliary Power Supply consists of:

- a power supply (an ac power transformer, input 110 Vac, 60 Hz; output 24 Vdc, 250 mA)
- a 2.1 m (7 ft), four-wire conductor line cord

### **Long Loop Applications**

The Norstar Station Auxiliary Power Supply may be used to enable up to three Norstar telephones (M7208, M7310 or M7324) to operate on station loops over 305 m (1000 feet), up to 790 m (2600 feet), 24 AWG.

### Installation




Figure 9.4 - Norstar Station Auxiliary Power Supply Installation

- 1. Ensure that each long loop (>305 m (1000 ft.), 24AWG wire) Norstar telephone has four-wire conductor station wiring between the station block and the common equipment room. (See Figure 9.4).
- 2. At the station connection block (#625 type, or equivalent), connect the four wires of the station wiring cable to the four screw terminals as shown in Figure 9.4.

Make note of the color codes of the positive and negative wires.

- 3. If the Norstar telephone is equipped with a two-wire conductor line cord, replace it with the four-wire conductor cord provided.
- 4. In the common equipment room, terminate the positive station wire (noted in step 2) on the positive screw terminal of the power supply. Terminate the negative station wire on the negative screw terminal of the power supply. Repeat for up to three Norstar telephone station runs. (A four screw connection box may be used to make multiple set

**Note:** The telephone can appear to function normally even though polarity has been reversed. If unsure of polarity, use a voltage meter for confirmation.

#### Caution:

Norstar Station Auxilliary Power Supply wiring is polarity sensitive. Polarity reversal will not damage the telephone but the telephone may not operate

- power connections easier, see Figure 9.4).
- 5. Connect the remaining pair of wires from each station run to its Norstar KSU station port.
- 6. Plug in the power supply and test the Norstar telephones.

# Station Auxiliary Power Supply and Norstar Central Answering Position Module (CAP) Applications

The Norstar Station Auxiliary Power Supply is required to provide power for the one or two CAP modules installed on a Norstar M7324 telephone. If only one CAP is added to an M7324 telephone the actual wiring should remain the same to allow for future addition of another CAP to that telephone. Norstar M7324 telephones equipped with CAP modules are limited to maximum loop lengths of 305m (1000 ft.); they do not operate in long loop applications.

### Installation




Figure 9.5 - Norstar Station Auxiliary Power Supply Installation for the Central Answering Position Module (CAP)

- 1. Ensure that each M7324 telephone that you will be adding a CAP Module(s) to has six conductor station wiring between the station block and the common equipment room. (See Figure 9.5.)
- 2. At the station connection block (#625 type, or equivalent), connect the six wires of the station wiring cable to the six screw terminals as shown in Figure 9.5.
  - Make note of the color codes of the positive and negative wires.
- 3. If the M7324 telephone is equipped with a two or four conductor line cord, replace it with the six conductor cord provided with the CAP Module.
- 4. In the common equipment room, terminate the positive station wire (noted in step 2) on the positive screw terminal

- of the power supply. Terminate the negative station wire on the negative screw terminal of the power supply.
- 5. Connect the remaining pair of wires from the M7324 and CAP module station run to its Norstar KSU station port.
- 6. Plug in the power supply and test the Norstar telephones.

### **Overview of Norstar Programming**

Programming a newly installed Norstar Modular System involve the following:

### System Startup

Normally, Startup is performed only once by installers when the system is first installed. Startup allows the installer to select one of four programming templates that provide defaults when programming the Norstar system. It initializes all data back to default.

### Configuration

Performed by installers to program basic line and set characteristics.

Configuration Code: This code gives installers access to:

D.	Maintenance

### General Administration

Performed by installers or by system coordinators to customize the system at installation and on an ongoing basis.

For installers only, B. General admin is accessible through Configuration programming.

For System Coordinators, Administration programming can be accessed using an Administration Code. An optional password may be used after inputting the Administration Code.

Note: This Administration Code does not allow access to

### Set Copy

Performed by installers to copy all the system programming (for Configuration and from Administration) from one telephone set to another. User programming on individual telephones can also be copied but system-level programming will be copied along with it. Set Copy appears on the display as C. Set copy and is accessible through Configuration.

#### Maintenance


Refer to the *Norstar Modular Pocket Maintenance Guide* for information and procedures.

Performed by installers (or repair personnel) to identify the cause of system problems and to solve them. The maintenance alarms generated by the system to alert users or installers to problems are logged in a Maintenance file in the system called the Sys Test Log. Maintenance is accessed through Configuration programming.

### Set Profile and Line Profile

This feature allows you to check the accuracy of the programming by enabling you to browse through, but not change, Configuration and General Administration data. The Set Profile and Line Profile features can be used by installers, repair personnel and System Coordinators during installation, maintenance and normal use of the M7310 and M7324 Norstar telephones to check what has been programmed.

No overlay or password is required.

### **Programming Record**

The Programming Record may already have been completed before installation. It describes the settings to be programmed into a Norstar system. Also, the Programming Record serves as a record of the settings programmed at initial installation and during subsequent upgrades or maintenance. The Programming Record lists how the customer may contact the installer or Service Representative.

**Default settings:** Many of the programming settings are preselected during System Startup (according to the templates described in section 11 System Startup). These can be

changed during Configuration and General admin. On the Programming Record these default settings are shown in large, **bold** characters for the Square Template.

### **Programming Overlay**



Figure 10.1 - Programming Overlay




Figure 10.2 - M7310 with overlay Figure 10.3 - M7324 with overlay

The Programming Overlay, illustrated in Figure 10.1, is placed over the buttons of the M7324 or M7310 Norstar telephones to allow them to be used for programming (as shown in Figure 10.2 and Figure 10.3). The Programming Overlay can be found in the back of the *Norstar Modular System Coordinator Guide*.

Note: The M7208 telephone can NOT be used for programming the Modular system.

### **Buttons on the Programming Overlay**

Indicators appear beside the four buttons referred to by the Overlay. When you press one of these buttons, the display message changes in the way described in Chart 10.3.

Button	Change in Display Message
Heading	Returns you to a subheading within the programming activity or to or to one of the main headings.
Show	Allows you to enter a programming cycle.
Back	Moves you to the previous display message.
Next	Moves you to the next display message.

### **Display buttons**

These frequently-used buttons appear on the telephone display during programming.

Line type, Mode, Auxiliary Ringing, Full Auto-hold on undialed outgoing line, and Prime set.

2. Line Access (in Configuration)

Line assignment, Answer DNs, Ringing, Line pool access, Intercom buttons, Prime line.

4. Restrictions (in Administration)

Application of Restrictions to lines & sets.

5. Overnides (in Administration)

Application of Overrides to lines & sets.

6. Permissions (in Administration)

Full handsfree, HF Answerback, Pickup group, Page zone, Auxiliary ringer, Forward no answer, Priority call.

7. Night Service (in Administration)

Night Control Set, Night Ringing Set, Night Auxiliary Ringer.

# 11 System Startup

### **Explanation of System Startup**

Startup is to be used for initial installation only. Do not use Startup after Norstar is in operation because the procedure erases all system administration data.

Perform Startup after the system hardware has been installed and powered up.

**System Startup Code:** This code, and a password, are used only by installers for access to the System Startup process. The System Startup Code performs the initialization procedure which erases any existing system memory and resets it to the default values. The Startup process selects one of four default configuration settings to make subsequent programming faster and easier.

To be accepted, the correct Startup Code must be entered no later than 15 minutes after the Norstar System has been powered up.

A Startup Code entered at any time after the 15-minute time out results in the message: Startup denied

If 15 minutes has elapsed since you powered up the system, re-power the system to prepare the system again for the Startup Process.

All configuration and administration data will be retained for at least three days if the power fails or if the Norstar System is powered OFF. After three days without power, it may be necessary to perform System Startup again.

Note: Do not attempt Directory Number (DN) changes within two minutes of System Startup (for example, changing three-digit DNs to four-digit DNs). Attempting a DN change may disable the ports. Also, wait at least two minutes before attempting Maintenance diagnostic tests or the disabling/enabling of a module.

## **System Templates**

System Startup is used by the installer to choose the appropriate template to begin programming. There are four template types available in the Norstar system: Square, Centrex, Hybrid and PBX. The charts shows the default settings for each type of template. The Square template defaults are listed fully on the charts. For Centrex, Hybrid and PBX templates, the defaults are the same as for the Square unless indicated otherwise.




Chart 11.1 - System Startup




Chart 12.1 - Configuration Overview

For each Line Pool, the external line which is least likely to be used for an incoming call should be connected to the port with the highest port number.

• Each line can only have one Prime Phone.

- Any Prime Phone can be assigned to provide backup answering for more than one outside line. All these lines do not necessarily have to appear on a line button with an indicator; however, monitoring lines is made easier if there is a Line button for every outside line.




Chart 12.2 - Line Data

When you are finished programming the Line Access settings for a set, you may copy those settings to another set by using the COPY display button.

### Entering the set to be programmed

Show set:

**Options:** 

A directory number (DN).

**Instructions:** Enter any available DN. The DN must be the correct length according to the DN numbering plan (2, 3 or 4 digits). Ensure that the highest and lowest DN that you use are correct for the installed hardware.

Hints:

- A non-expanded system (no expansion) cartridge) can have any of the three DN lengths (default is 2 digits).
- An expanded system can have a DN length of 3 (the default) or 4 digits. Assignment of a four digit length, or any change to the default length, must be done in 5. Change DNs of Configuration programming.
- The lowest possible default DN is 21, 221, or 2221 (depending on the DN length in effect).
- Settings are automatically applied for the Analog Terminal Adapter (ATA) if installed.

to the set.

Hints:

- A minimum of two Intercom Keys are required for conferencing with two other Norstar sets in the same system.
- A minimum of one Intercom key is required if inside calls are to be made or received from the set or Line Pools are to be accessed from the set.

Prime line:

**Instructions:** Assign the one Prime Line for the set.

Hints:

· A Prime Line is not related to the operation of

a Prime Set.

 The Prime Line is the first line to be automatically provided at a set when you make a call. The appropriate Prime Line will depend on the customers requirements.

#### **Incoming Line Pools**

In some installations, you may want an attendant telephone to be able to cover more lines than are accommodated by the number of line buttons on the telephone (the buttons with indicators). The Answer Button feature can be used to create an Incoming Line Pool. The extra lines in the pool will ring on an Answer Button on the attendant telephone (or on an intercom button if the Answer Button is in use).

The following method allows you to control which lines ring on the set without having dedicated line buttons (much like an incoming line pool).

1. Choose a Directory Number (DN) that will not be required for any telephone set on the system (such a DN will always exist). This will be used as a non-existent, or virtual, telephone set.

2. Enter A. Configuration 2. Line Access and select the heading Line assignment To the virtual telephone assign any external lines that you want to ring at the attendant telephone without requiring dedicated line buttons. These lines form an incoming line pool. Up to 80 lines can be assigned to the virtual set depending on the hardware configuration.

- 3. At the heading Finswer DNs assign an Answer button on the attendant telephone to answer the external lines on the virtual telephone.
- 4. At the heading Intercom keys:

  assign up to eight intercom buttons to the attendant telephone set. These buttons are used as overflow buttons when more than one of the incoming line pool lines is ringing.
- 5. Enter B. General admin ,

  2. Names to assign a set name, such as "CONSOLE", to the virtual telephone. A set name has a maximum of seven characters.

Any incoming call in the incoming line pool will ring immediately at the attendant set. The call first appears at the Answer button if overflow calls appear at an intercom button.




Chart 12.3 - Line Access

 This feature is not to be confused with Call Pickup Group in Administration programming, which allows you to answer a call at any set within a specific group without specifying the




Chart 12.4 - Call Handling

 If this feature is enabled, ensure that an external music source has been connected to the KSU. Installation instructions are found

in Chapter 8, Optional Equipment.

**Instructions:** Assign the set which will ring when you dial '0'

on an intercom line.

Alarm set:

**Options:** 

Any valid DN (21/221/2221), or None.

Instructions: Assign the set which will receive Norstar alarm

messages when the system has detected a

problem.

Link time:

**Options:** 

300, 400, 500, **600**, 700, 800, 900, 1000

**Instructions:** Assign the Link Time in milliseconds.

Hints:

 The Link Time required will depend on the requirements of a PBX, Centrex, or other switching system that must be accessed by Norstar.

 Link Time is another name for Recall or Flash.

Set relocation:

**Options:** 

Yes, No

**Instructions:** Choose if the Set Relocation feature is to be

active.

Hints:

· It is advisable to turn Set Relocation ON after the set installation and programming has been done. This provides you with more flexibility in testing equipment. If this feature is disabled, and a set is moved, that set's DN and Administration data remain with the physical port.




Chart 12.5 - Miscellaneous

# Change DNs

Change DNs

Use this to change the DN of an individual set, or to make a system-wide change of the DN length.

**Note:** Do **not** attempt Directory Number (DN) changes within two minutes of System Startup (for example, three-digit to four-digit DNs).

## Change DNs Characteristics

Individual DNs

Options:

Any valid directory number (DN).

**Instructions:** Enter the appropriate DN when you are prompted for the old and the new DN. A message will appear on the display if either DN is invalid (according to the installed hardware).

Hints:

- No DN changes occur until the Configuration session ends.
- · The ability to change DNs allows you to coordinate (if applicable) the Norstar DNs to that of a host system (such as a PBX). If the "new DN" already existed for another set. that set will be given the "old DN".
- There can be only one telephone set for each DN.
- An intercom number is the same as a DN.

DN length:

**Options:** 

2, 3, 4 (default of **two** for a non-expanded

system, or **three** for an expanded system)

**Instructions:** Enter the desired new DN length.

#### Hints:

- A non-expanded system (of DN length two) is automatically changed to a DN length of three after an expansion cartridge is installed and power is restored to the KSU.
- The removal of an expansion cartridge will result in a DN length of two and loss of all programming data when power is restored.
- Inside Autodial buttons on individual sets are not updated.
- Inside Autodial buttons on the Central Answering Position (CAP) Module are updated to the new default settings.
- All calls are dropped if the length is changed.
   The installer must ensure that there is no call activity on the system.

#### **Changing Directory Numbers (DN)**

To keep track of the DN changes:

- List all the current DNs you want to change down the left side of a chart (as on the following page) in the column "Default or Current DN (Old DN)". These are the DNs that already exist on the system, either default DNs or DNs changed in a previous session.
- 2. Write the new DN number, to which you want to change, in the column "New DN".
- 3. **Important:** The example below shows that DN 227 is to be changed to DN 253. In a case where DN 253 already exists for another telephone set, you should re-assign DN 253 (or the system will re-assign it arbitrarily to an available DN). List old DN 253 in the left column "Default or Current DN" and assign it to a new DN in the same way as DN 227.
- 4. Exit from the session. This will cause the DN changes to occur. Any affected set that is in use receives a warning

tone and several display messages, and is then forced to become idle while the DN change is applied.




Chart 12.6 - Change DNs

# 13 General admin

General Administration programming is performed by installers or by System Coordinators to customize the system on an ongoing basis.

If the installer is performing General Administration programming, he or she should ensure that the System Coordinator obtains a copy of these settings. Either the installer or the System Coordinator should record the settings in the job aids section of the *System Coordinator Guide*.

#### **Access to Administration Programming**

There are two ways to enter Administration programming:

- For installers only, it is accessible by entering Configuration Programming with the Configuration Access Code (see Chapter 12, Configuration).
- For System Coordinators, Administration programming can be accessed using the Administration Access Code.
   An optional Administration Password may be assigned.

The Administration Access Code does not allow access to:

A.	Configuration
C.	Set copy
D.	Maintenance

#### **Administration Settings**

An Administration session provides access to settings that are programmed initially by the installer, or by the System Coordinator, and are subsequently altered from time to time by the System Coordinator. General Administration settings are programmed under the following headings:

- 5. Overrides
- 6. Permissions
- 7. Night service
- 8. Passwords




Chart 13.1 - General Administration Overview




Chart 13.2 - Sys Speed Dial

For example: one press on the 2 button enters an "A", a second press changes the entry to "B", a third press changes the entry to a "C", a fourth press changes the entry to the digit "2", and a fifth press returns to "A".

You can use the display buttons to help you edit the name. The button labelled BKSF will delete the preceding character. The display buttons with the arrows will move the cursor left --> or right --> . Select Next to move on to the next name.

#### Hints:

- The length of the set number (DN) will be two, three or four depending on the DN length assigned in Configuration programming.
- Customize each Name to provide the best description. A Name for a set could be a person's name (example: ALAN M) or a location (example: ROOM 5). A Name for a line could describe a particular use for the line (example: WATS 1).
- The '\*' and '#' symbols cannot be used in a Name.
- Though it is not advisable (because of possible confusion), set and a line can have the same Name, and two sets can have the same Name. (The '#' synbol moves the cursor right one character space.)
- Two lines cannot have the same Name.
- Record the names in the Programming Record, and ensure that the Names are available to the System Coordinator for recording in the Job Aids section of the System Coordinator Guide.




Chart 13.3 - Names




Chart 13.4 - Time and Date

# **Restrictions**

#### Restrictions

Use this to program Restrictions. A Restriction is a digit or a series of digits that is not permitted in the dialed digits of an outside phone call. You can apply these Restrictions to individual sets or lines . If anyone tries to dial a restricted number, they hear an error tone from the phone and see the display message: Restricted call The call will then be dropped.

Restrictions can be used to prevent the dialing of long distance calls from a set (for example, a set that is in a reception area and is available to the general public).




Chart 13.6 - Restrictions

# **Overrides**




Chart 13.8 - Overrides




Chart 13.9 - Permissions




Chart 13.10 - Night Service




Chart 13.11 - Passwords






Chart 15.3 - Set Profile Overview




Chart 15.4 - Line Access (Set Profile)




Chart 15.5 - Restrictions (Set Profile)




Chart 15.6 - Overrides (Set Profile)




Chart 15.7 - Permissions (Set Profile)




Chart 15.8 - Line Profile Overview




Chart 15.9 - Line Data (Line Profile)




Chart 15.10 - Restrictions (Line Profile)




Chart 15.11 - Overrides (Line Profile)




Chart 15.12 - Night Service (Line Profile)

# 18 Glossary

### A

**Access Code:** A sequence of characters used to gain entry into Norstar programming. There are Access Codes to begin Startup, Configuration programming, and Administration programming.

**Access Signalling:** Your Norstar telephone can access a remote system (such as a Centrex or a PBX) connected to the telephone system, or dial a number on an alternate carrier by means of Access Signalling (also referred to as End-to-End signalling). There are five features that provide specialized signalling: Link, Long Tones, Pause, Run/Stop, and Timed Release.

**Administration:** The programming of certain settings on the Norstar system. This is usually done by the System Coordinator. These settings include the following:

- 1. System Speed Dial, 2. Names, 3. Time and Date,
- 4. Restrictions, 5. Overrides, 6. Permissions,
- 7. Night Service, and 8. Passwords.

# Administration Access Code: These characters (Feature \* \* 2 3 6 4 4 or Feature \* \* A D M I N ) must be entered to access Administration programming. The code cannot be used to enter Configuration programming, System Startup, Set

Copy, or Maintenance.

**Administration Password:** This optional one to six digit Password prevents unauthorized access to Norstar Administration. The Administration password is assigned in section "8. Passwords" of Administration programming.

**Alarm Set (Alarm Phone):** The Alarm Set is the telephone designated to receive reports of system problems. The Alarm Set is usually assigned to a Prime Phone, but it can be changed by the Installer in section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming.

Analog Terminal Adapter (ATA): This device permits analog telecommunication devices (for example, FAX, answering machines, and single line telephones) to connect to the Norstar system. Programmable settings for the ATA are automatically assigned by the system. Refer to the ATA User Card for more information on ATA programming.

Answer Button: An Answer button is a telephone button (with indicator) that is used to monitor another telephone within an Answer Group. One telephone can have up to four Answer buttons. Pressing one of these buttons provides immediate access to the Intercom or outside line that is ringing at the monitored telephone. An Answer button is automatically assigned to a telephone when that telephone is assigned an Answer DN in section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming.

Answer DN: The Directory Number (DN) of a telephone in an Answer Group that is monitored by an Answer Button on the telephone being programmed. In section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming, the Installer can assign up to four Answer DNs to be associated with the telephone being programmed.

**Answer Group:** An Answer Group consists of at least two telephones that are associated by an Answer button. The Answer button, on one of these telephones, indicates incoming calls destined for the other telephone. Someone working at a telephone with Answer buttons (a receptionist, for example)

can monitor the Answer Group (a group of managers), receive all ringing and visual indication of incoming calls, and answer the calls accordingly.

**Applied to lines:** This sub-heading appears in section "4. Restrictions" and section "5. Overrides" of Administration programming. If you select Show, you will be prompted to assign Restrictions or Overrides to each line.

**Applied to sets:** This sub-heading appears in section "4. Restrictions" and section "5. Overrides" of Administration programming. If you select Show, you will be prompted to assign Restrictions or Overrides to each telephone.

**Autodial Button:** The Autodial button provides one-touch dialing of outside numbers, Intercom numbers, or feature codes. You program a button to be an Autodial button.

**Automatic Hold:** This feature will automatically place an active call on hold if another line is selected.

Automatic Phone Relocation: The Automatic Phone Relocation feature allows a telephone to retain its personal and system programming when it is re-connected to another physical location. This feature is activated in section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming.

**Auxiliary Ringer:** This is a separate external telephone ringer or bell. It is typically mounted on a wall, and is louder than a regular telephone so that it can be heard over a wide area. It can be programmed to ring when a line (section "1. Line Data" of Configuration), a telephone (section "6. Permissions" of Administration), or both ring; or, when Night Service (section "7. Night Service" of Administration) is active.

#### B

Background Music: This feature allows music from an external source, such as a radio, to play over the speaker of the telephone. This feature should not be activated unless a music source (customer supplied) has been connected to the Norstar System. Background Music is activated in section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming.

**B Channels:** The B1 and the B2 channels are paths for transmitting digital information. Each DN Port number has one B1 DN and one B2 DN associated with it. Devices such as the Norstar M7208, M7310, and M7324 telephones only need the B1 channel and the B1 DN. Other devices may need more channels.

Busy Lamp Field (BLF): This device, which attaches onto the M7310 telephone, has a panel of Liquid Crystal Display (LCD) indicators that show the busy/not busy and DND (Do Not Disturb) status of up to 24 telephones in the Norstar system. Each of the dual memory buttons that are programmed as Inside Autodial buttons on the M7310 will indicate the status of an office telephone. The BLF will also indicate if a telephone is involved in a programming session. The BLF is typically used on a receptionist's telephone.

**Button Caps:** These interchangeable plastic squares fit over the buttons of Norstar telephones, and allow you to label the features programmed onto each programmable button location. Button caps can be either pre-printed or have clear windows which allow people to label other features, lines, and autodial numbers.

**Button Inquiry:** This feature allows you to check the function of each programmable memory button on a Norstar telephone.

#### C

Call Forward (No Answer): This feature forwards all unanswered calls at one telephone to another designated telephone after a specified number of rings (see "Forward Delay"). This feature is useful if you will temporarily be unavailable to answer calls at your telephone, or you will be working near another telephone. The Call Forward feature is assigned in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming.

Call Handling: A collection of some Norstar features and their parameters which are programmed in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming. Call Handling includes settings for the following features: Held Line Reminder, Delayed Ring Transfer, Transfer Callback, Park Timeout, Directed Pickup, and Music/Tones/Silence On Hold.

Call Park: Call Park places a connected call on hold, allowing it to be retrieved from any other telephone in your system. You can retrieve the call from any telephone by selecting an intercom line, and then entering the Retrieve Park code (which automatically appears on the display of the telephone which parked the call). Up to nine calls can be parked at once in the system.

Call Park Callback: See "Callback".

**Call Pickup (Directed):** This feature allows anyone to answer a call ringing at any telephone by specifying the Intercom number of that telephone before taking the call. Call Pickup (Directed) is activated in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

Call Pickup (Group): See "Pickup Group".

**Callback:** Callback occurs at a telephone which attempts an unsuccessful Transfer or Call Park for an outside call. After a specified period of time, an unanswered call returns to the telephone which originally made the Transfer or parked the call.

**CAP Module:** The CAP Module provides 48 inside Autodial buttons, and is connected to the M7324 telephone to create the Central Answering Position. An M7324 with CAP Modules can assist an office receptionist in monitoring and answering calls. A maximum of two CAP Modules can be connected to a single M7324 telephone.

**Central Answering Position (CAP):** The CAP consists of an M7324 telephone and one or two CAP Modules. The CAP can be used to monitor the telephones in a Norstar system, and to control incoming telephone calls.

Centrex (Template): This is one of the four Norstar system Templates. Centrex is a business system service provided by the telephone company, offering local lines and a variety of other features. The Centrex Template assigns one unique outside line to each telephone until the maximum number of lines is reached (example: Line 01 to telephone 221, Line 02 to telephone 222, and so on). Any remaining telephones do not receive a default line assignment.

The Centrex Template also modifies the Restriction and Override tables (a "9" precedes the default entries) to accommodate dialing outside the Centrex system, rather than within it. The Centrex Template is assigned during System Startup.

**Change DNs:** The Installer can change the length of all DNs in the system or replace an existing DN with a new number in section "5. Change DNs" of Configuration programming (for more information, see "Directory Number Length").

**CO Line (Central Office Line):** This is an external or outside telephone line.

**Configuration:** This is a type of programming that assigns certain settings to lines and telephones, as well as some system-wide settings. Configuration is performed by the telephone company Installer or Service Representative rather than by System Coordinators. "Installer Only" appears in the *Meridian Norstar Modular Programming Record* for each Configuration programming section to be programmed by the Installer.

**Configuration Access Code:** A sequence of digits which are dialed on the dialpad to provide access to Configuration programming. The Installer Password must be entered before any Configuration programming can be done.

Copy: The GOPY display button appears during Configuration and Administration programming. This button allows you to duplicate certain programmed settings from one line to another, or from one telephone to another. Line programmable settings that can be copied are Line Data, Restrictions, Overrides, and Night Service. Telephone (set) programmable settings that can be copied are Line Access, Restrictions, Overrides, and Permissions.

**Cursor:** This is a short line which appears on the telephone display to indicate that digits or letters can be entered using the dialpad.

D

Date: See "Time and Date".

**Data Terminals:** Devices which can be used to transfer data instead of only voice (as with a telephone). The settings for these devices are not programmed with Configuration or Administration programming.

**Default Setting:** This is a feature setting which is in effect upon initial installation unless manually changed through programming. Default settings are automatically assigned to correspond to the Square Template during System Startup. In the *Meridian Norstar Modular Programming Record*, default settings are shown in **Bold** text.

**Delay:** The time period before certain features become active. A delay can be programmed for the following features: Call Forward (No Answer), Call Park Callback, Delayed Ring Transfer, Held Line Reminder, and Transfer Callback features.

**Delayed Ring Transfer (DRT) to Prime:** After a specified number of rings, this feature transfers an unanswered ringing call to the Prime Phone associated with the line the call is on. This feature is activated in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

**Device:** A Norstar component connected to the Key Service Unit by a Time Compression Multiplexing (TCM) line. Examples of devices are the Norstar telephones and the Analog Terminal Adapter.

**Dial-0 Set (Dial Zero Phone):** A telephone which is assigned to ring when someone dials "0" from another Norstar telephone. Dial-0 provides an easily remembered number and

quick access to a central telephone, such as an operator at a Central Answering Position. This feature is assigned in section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming.

Directed Pickup: See "Call Pickup (Directed)".

**Directory Number (DN):** A unique number which is automatically assigned to each telephone or Data Terminal during System Startup. The DN, also referred to as an Intercom number, allows the Norstar system to identify each device connected to the Key Service Unit or Expansion Module. The DN is often used to identify a telephone when settings are assigned during Configuration and Administration programming.

Directory Number (DN) Length: A non-expanded system can have a DN length of 2, 3, or 4 digits. An expanded system (a system with an Expansion Cartridge installed) can have a DN length of 3 or 4 digits. All Directory numbers for a system must be the same length. The default DN length is two digits for a non-expanded system, and three digits for an expanded system. The lowest default DN is "21" in a two digit system, "221" in a three digit system, and "2221" in a four digit system.

**Display:** A Liquid Crystal Display (LCD) on the telephone that provides information related to feature operation and programming.

**Display Button:** The Norstar M7310 and M7324 telephones are each equipped with three buttons located directly beneath the Liquid Crystal Display. During feature operation or programming, some or all of these buttons may be used to provide you with further options. If an option is available, it is shown in the bottom row of the two column display, directly above the corresponding Display Button.

**DRT Delay:** The number of rings before a Delayed Ring Transfer occurs. This is assigned in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

**DRT to Prime:** See "Delayed Ring Transfer (DRT) to Prime".

#### E

**Emergency Telephone:** A single line telephone (also referred to as a 500/2500 telephone) that becomes active when there is no power to the Key Service Unit.

**Event Codes:** A number associated with an Alarm Message that indicates a certain type of problem with the Norstar system.

**Event Message:** A display message on a telephone which describes an activity that has occurred in the system. Event messages are displayed in the System Test Log when you run a Maintenance session.

Expansion Cartridge: The Expansion Cartridge allows Expansion Modules to connect to the Key Service Unit, providing the opportunity to increase the number of outside and Intercom lines that the system can handle (beyond the 8X24 Key Service Unit). The Expansion Cartridge is inserted into the Key Service Unit, and a DS-30 cable connects the Expansion Cartridge to each Expansion Module. Expansion Cartridges are available with two or six ports.

**Expansion Module:** A Trunk Module or a Station Module. A maximum of six Modules may be installed with the use of the six port Expansion Cartridge. A maximum of two Modules may be installed with a two port Expansion Cartridge.

**External Paging:** A Norstar feature that allows voice announcements to be made over an externally mounted loudspeaker (supplied by the customer) connected to the Key Service Unit.

#### F

**Feature:** A Norstar feature performs a useful task that uses system-wide, telephone, or line parameters in helping you to optimize your use of the Norstar equipment.

**Feature Button:** This oblong grey button is the first button you press when using a feature, or to gain access to programming with an Access Code. This button indicates to the system that the string of digits which follows is a feature code.

**Feature Cartridge:** A replaceable software cartridge containing the Norstar features. The Feature Cartridge is inserted into the Key Service Unit.

Feature Code: This is a number that is used to activate a particular feature. Features are activated by first pressing the Feature button and then entering the feature's numeric code on the dialpad.

**Flexible Numbering Plan:** Norstar allows you to individually assign Directory Numbers (DNs) and Line Pool Access Codes, and the system-wide DN length can be set to 2, 3, or 4 digits (see "Directory Number Length").

**Flow Charts:** These diagrams show the pathways from one display message to the next during programming, and which buttons to press to move between display messages.

**Forward Delay:** Forward Delay is the number of rings before an unanswered call is forwarded to another telephone with the Call Forward (No Answer) feature. Forward Delay is assigned in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming.

Forward No Answer: See "Call Forward (No Answer)".

**Forward to:** The DN entered for this setting during Administration programming is the Intercom number of the telephone to which the Call Forward (No Answer) feature will forward unanswered calls. The DN is assigned in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming.

**Full Autohold (on idle line):** If you select an idle external line without dialing on it, and then perform another action which selects another line, this feature will place the original feature on hold. This setting is assigned in section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming.

Full Handsfree: See "Handsfree".

#### G

**General admin:** This heading appears as "B. General admin". See "Administration" for more details.

#### H

**Handset:** This is another name for the hand-held receiver of a telephone.

**Handsfree:** This feature lets you talk and listen to calls without lifting the receiver of the telephone. Full Handsfree is activated in section "6. Permissions" of Administration

programming. When assigned to a telephone, a button is automatically assigned to the telephone. Pressing this button will toggle the feature ON and OFF.

Handsfree (HF) Answerback: This feature, when activated, automatically turns ON the microphone at a telephone receiving a Voice Call so that the person receiving the call can respond without lifting the receiver. This feature is activated in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming.

Handsfree/Mute Button: See "Handsfree".

**Headset:** Norstar telephones support the use of headsets (customer supplied), which are small head or ear mounted telephone receivers that are used instead of the hand held receiver.

Held (Line) Reminder: A reminder tone and a "Held Call" display message occur at a Norstar telephone when a call has been placed on hold for a programmed period of time. The Held Line Reminder feature and Remind Delay are programmed in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

HF Answerback: See "Handsfree Answerback".

**Hold button:** This red button [Hold], is used to suspend calls so that the person using the telephone can perform another task without disconnecting the caller.

Hybrid (Template): This is one of the four Norstar system Templates. In the Hybrid Template, Line 1 appears on each telephone, and each telephone has access to Line Pool 1. The Template is assigned in System Startup when the Installer first does hardware installation and system programming.

I/C: An abbreviation for the word Intercom.

Individual DNs: This sub-heading, in section "5. Change DNs" of Configuration programming, allows the Installer to change the Intercom number of a telephone within your system.

Installer Password: A Password that is used to prevent unauthorized access to Configuration programming. Only the Installer should know this Password. The default Installer Password must be used to enter Configuration unless changed in section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration Programming.

Intercom Buttons: These buttons provide access to inside (Intercom) lines used for calls within a Norstar system or for access to outside lines through a Line Pool. A telephone may be assigned up to eight Intercom buttons, or none. The number of Intercom buttons on a telephone may be assigned in section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming.

Intercom Keys: See "Intercom Buttons".

**Intercom Lines:** These lines, also known as inside lines or extensions, are used for calls within a Norstar system or to access outside lines through a Line Pool.

#### J

**Job Aids:** These charts are used to record the settings from Administration programming, allowing each Norstar system's records to be kept up to date.

#### K

Key Service Unit (KSU): The central hardware component in the Norstar system. The KSU has its own processor and memory, and provides a physical point of connection for the various types of Data Terminals, telephones, and Expansion Modules. The KSU can function on its own as a basic system (with 24 Norstar telephones and 8 CO lines), or with the addition of a Trunk Module (TM) which adds more CO lines, or with a Station Module (SM) which supports more Norstar telephones.

#### L

**Line:** An external or outside telephone line. This is also referred to as a Central Office (CO) line. Each Norstar line can have different characteristics assigned to it through Configuration programming.

Line Access: These Configuration settings allow you to program certain line parameters to an individual telephone. Section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming includes Line Assignment, Answer DNs, Ringing, Line Pool Access, Intercom Keys, and Prime Line.

**Line Assignment:** Line Assignment lets you define which lines are accessible to an individual telephone. An outside line assigned to a telephone must appear on a Line button with an

indicator. The maximum number of lines that can be assigned for each model of telephone are: 8 for the M7208, 10 for the M7310, and 24 for the M7324. The use of programmed feature buttons, such as Handsfree , will reduce the number of buttons available for Line appearances. Line Assignment is programmed in section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming.

**Line Data:** These settings let you program certain parameters specific to an individual line. Section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming includes Line Type, Line Mode, Auxiliary Ring, Full Auto-Hold on idle line, and Prime Set.

**Line Names:** This sub-heading of section "2. Names" of Administration Programming allows you to assign Names to outside lines.

**Line Number:** A two digit number which identifies a line connected to the KSU. The maximum number of lines depends on how many Trunk Modules are installed. Line numbers range from 01 to 80.

Line Pool: A Line Pool is a specific group of lines used for making outside calls. Line Pools are an efficient way of providing a telephone with access to outside lines without taking up many Line buttons. Each of Norstar's nine Line Pools (if assigned) are accessed by dialling a Line Pool Access code on an Intercom line or by pressing a preprogrammed Line Pool button. A line in a Line Pool cannot be a "Public" or "Private" line. It can, however, be a "Prime Line". A line is assigned to be a member of a Line Pool in section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming.

**Line Pool Access:** This sub-heading assigns the Line Pools that a telephone may access. Line Pool Access is assigned in section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming.

Line Pool Access Code: The Line Pool Access Code is a number used to identify a specific Line Pool when you want to use the Line Pool feature (pressing a pre-programmed Line Pool button could also do this for you). Rules governing the assignment of Line Pool Access Codes are:

- 1) the code can be a number from one to four digits in length,
- 2) the first number of the code cannot be the same as a Directory Number (DN),
- 3) codes starting with the same digit must be the same length. Line Pool Access Codes are assigned in section
  - "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming.

Link Time: This is a specific time delay that allows access to PBX or Centrex features through a Norstar system. Link Time is also referred to as a "Hookswitch Flash" or "Recall". Link time is assigned by the Installer in section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming. (Installers: call the PBX or Centrex customer service department for information on the required Link Time.)

#### M

**M7208:** The Meridian model M7208 telephone has a single line display, and eight programmable buttons with indicators.

**M7310:** The Meridian model M7310 telephone has a two line display with three display buttons, 10 programmable buttons with indicators, and 12 dual programmable buttons without indicators.

**M7324:** The Meridian model M7324 telephone has a two line display with three display buttons, and 24 programmable buttons with indicators.

**Maintenance:** The menu heading "D. Maintenance" of Configuration programming allows the Installer or Service Representative to diagnose and repair any problems with the system. Maintenance requires no programmable settings.

**Memory Buttons:** These buttons can be programmed to activate automatic dialing or frequently used features. All three Norstar telephones have memory buttons with indicators, and the M7310 has an additional 12 dual memory buttons without indicators.

**Message:** A message, which appears on the telephone display, will inform the recipient to call the person who sent the message. Messages can only be sent within the Norstar system.

**Miscellaneous:** Section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming is a collection of assorted system-wide settings. Miscellaneous includes: Background Music, Dial-0 Set, Alarm Set, Link Time, Set Relocation, Line Pool Codes, and Installer Password.

**Mode:** The signaling mode of an outside telephone line can be either Pulse or Tone. The default setting is Pulse, but the Tone mode is often required for a system to interact with Centrex or other special features. The mode can be changed by the Installer in section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming.

**Music Source:** An external music source (customer supplied), such as a radio, can be connected to the Key Service Unit for Music on Hold, Background Music, or both.

#### N

Names: This section of Administration programming is used to assign an optional name to identify and personalize each telephone or line. This name appears on a display during the use of certain features. A name can be any combination of letters or numbers up to seven characters in length. Names are assigned in section "2. Names" of Administration programming. If no name is assigned, the line number or DN (for a telephone) will appear instead on the display.

**Night Auxiliary Ring:** This setting controls whether or not calls arriving at a Night Set will also ring at the Auxiliary Ringer. Night Auxiliary Ring is assigned within section "7. Night Service" of Administration programming.

**Night Control:** A Night Control telephone can place the lines for which it has responsibility in or out of Night Service. Night Control is assigned to a telephone in section "7. Night Service" of Administration programming.

**Night Ring:** A telephone (the "Night Set") can be assigned to ring when a line has been placed into Night Service. The telephone is assigned in section "7. Night Service" of Administration programming.

**Night Service:** Certain features become active when Norstar is placed into an operating mode called "Night Service". This is usually done to provide special ringing and Dial Zero access after normal office hours or when there are few people available to answer calls. These features are: Trunk Answer, Night Zero Set, Night Control, Night Ring, and Night Auxiliary Ring. Night Service settings are programmed in section "7. Night Service" of Administration programming.

Glossary

Night Set (Night Phone): See "Night Ring".

Night-0 Set (Night Zero Phone): This setting assigns a certain telephone as an additional Dial Zero telephone when Night Service is active (Note: Calls which ring at the Night Zero telephone will also ring at the other Dial Zero telephone assigned in section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming). Night-0 Set is assigned in section "7. Night Service" of Administration programming.

Norstar Programming Overlay: This Overlay is placed over the top four memory buttons on the M7310 or M7324 telephones. The Overlay labels indicate the special function that each of the four buttons have during programming. The functions are: Heading, Back, Show, and Next. You use these buttons to provide options for moving through the display messages.



**On Hold:** This setting controls whether your callers hear music, periodic tones, or silence when they are placed on hold. This system-wide feature is assigned in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

Overlay: See "Norstar Programming Overlay".

Overrides: These are selected exceptions to the call Restrictions placed on lines and telephones. There is a system-wide maximum of 10 Overrides. A telephone caller may, for example, be prevented from dialing numbers which start with the digit "1", but may have an override of "1403". This would allow the user to dial any number which starts with "1403". Overrides are defined, and then assigned to certain lines or telephones, in section "5. Overrides" of Administration programming.

Override index number: A number between 1 and 10 which identifies an Override.

#### P

Page: This Norstar feature allows you to make announcements from your telephone which can be heard by many people at the same time. There are three Page options, selected by you at your telephone when the Page is made: Internal Page (announce over the telephone speakers), External Page (announce over an externally mounted, customer supplied loudspeaker), and both Internal and External Page together.

Page Zone: A local area in the office that can receive directed Page announcements independently of the remainder of the office. Each Page Zone is identified by a number from 1 to 6. Each telephone is assigned to a unique Page Zone in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming.

Park Timeout: This is the period of time before an unanswered Call Park call is redirected to the set that parked the call for the line the call is on. Park Timeout is defined in "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

**Password:** A Password is a specific sequence of digits which is entered from the dialpad to gain access to Norstar programming. A Password is required for System Startup, Administration programming, and Configuration programming (also, see "Restriction Override Password".)

**PBX:** See "Private Branch Exchange (Template)".

**Permissions:** These are specific characteristics that can be assigned to an individual telephone. Permissions includes

Full Handsfree, Handsfree Answerback, Pickup Group, Page Zone, Auxiliary Ringer, Forward No Answer, and Priority Call. Permissions are programmed in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming.

Personal Speed Dial: These two-digit code numbers (71-94) can be programmed to dial outside telephone numbers up to 16 digits in length. Personal Speed Dial codes are programmed on individual telephones within your system and can only be used from the telephone on which they are programmed.

**Pickup Group:** A telephone can be placed into one of nine Call Pickup Groups. A call ringing at a telephone within a Pickup Group can be picked up by any other telephone within the same Pickup Group. A Pickup Group is assigned to a telephone in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming.

Pool: See "Line Pool".

**Port Number:** The identification number of a specific point of connection at the Key Service Unit, Station Module, or Trunk Module. Telephones and Data Terminals are connected to these ports (Note: The Port Number assignment on an expansion cartridge is **not directly associated** with this type of Port number.)

**Prime Line:** A telephone can be programmed to automatically select a certain line type whenever a call is made by lifting the receiver or pressing the Handsfree button. This line is called the Prime Line, and is assigned in section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming.

Prime Set (Prime Phone): This telephone provides backup answering for incoming calls on outside lines. The Prime Phone is typically used by a receptionist. Special features which redirect the unanswered calls are available at a Prime Phone (such as Delayed Ring Transfer and Held Line Reminder). A Prime Phone may be assigned to a line in section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming. The default Prime Phone DN is 21 for a non-expanded system, and 221 or 2221 for an expanded system (depending on the DN length in effect).

**Priority Call:** This feature allows you to make an urgent Voice Call to another telephone when the other telephone is busy or has Do Not Disturb activated. Priority Call should not be made available to everyone, and should be selectively programmed. This feature is enabled for a telephone in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming.

Private Branch Exchange (Template): This is one of the four Norstar System Startup Templates. In the Private Branch Exchange (PBX) Template, specified Lines are in a Line Pool. You must first press an Intercom button and then dial 9, or press a Line Pool button, to make outside calls. Each telephone is assigned access to Line Pool 1.

**Private to:** An external (CO) line may be assigned to one telephone as a private line. The line does not appear on any other telephone. Private lines cannot be placed in Line Pools. A line may be assigned as a Private line in section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming.

**Programming:** The designation of various characteristics within the Norstar system. This includes the activation of certain optional features (turning the feature ON or OFF), the assigning of parameters used by certain features (such as a

DN), and the designation of various settings for lines and telephones. Programming can only be done from the M7310 or M7324 telephones, and makes use of a sequence of steps that prompts the Installer or System Coordinator to enter a value or choose a menu option.

Programming Overlay: See "Norstar Programming Overlay".

**Public:** This refers to an outside line which can be assigned to any telephone. A line is assigned as Public in section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming.

**Pulse:** This is a dialing mode for outside lines that is traditionally used by rotary dial telephones. The Pulse setting, which is necessay for Pulse dialing, is the default setting in section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming.

#### R

Radio Frequency (RF) Filter Kit: A Norstar device designed to alleviate problems associated with radio frequency interference that you may experience while using a headset or external Auxiliary Ringer with your telephone.

Recall: See Link Time.

**Release button:** The RIs button ends a call in the same way that hanging up your receiver does. It also ends any current feature programming.

**Remind Delay:** The period of time from when a call is put on hold to when a reminder tone is heard and a message appears on the telephone display. Remind Delay, a parameter of the Held Line Reminder feature, is assigned in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

**Restriction index number:** A number between 1 and 30 which identifies a Restriction.

**Restrictions:** Preselected telephones and lines may be restricted from dialing certain telephone numbers (such as long distance, directory assistance and other toll calls). Restrictions are defined and assigned to certain lines or telephones in section "4. Restriction" of Administration programming. There is a maximum of 30 Restrictions.

**Restriction Override Password:** This four-digit Password allows a caller to override system-wide Restrictions when making an outside call. This Password must be entered before the call is dialed. Up to 100 Restriction Override Passwords may be defined in section "8. Passwords" of Administration programming.

Ring/No ring: See "Ringing".

**Ringing:** In section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming, a line or Answer DN can be assigned to ring or not to ring at a telephone for incoming calls. If a line has been assigned as "No ring", an incoming call is still shown by a flashing indicator.

#### S

**Set:** Set is another name for a telephone.

**Set Copy:** Set Copy allows the Installer to duplicate the characteristics of one telephone to another telephone. Set Copy is available through menu heading "C. Set Copy". The Installer has the option of duplicating System data (data from Configuration and Administration programming) and User data (from personal programming), or just System data. Set Copy

does not provide the same copy capability as does the display button, which allows you to be more selective of the settings which are to be duplicated.

**Set Names:** This sub-heading of section "2. Names" of Administration Programming allows you to assign Names to telephones.

**Set Relocation:** See "Automatic Phone Relocation".

**Set Profile and Line Profile:** This feature allows you to review, from a M7310 or M7324 telephone, the settings programmed to telephones (sets) and lines in Configuration and Administration programming. You can not change any of the settings with this feature.

**Shift Button:** This small triangular button is located beside the dual memory buttons on the upper half of the M7310 telephone. The shift button must be pressed to store or access features on the top half of the dual memory buttons.

**Shoulder Rest:** The shoulder rest is designed to allow you to comfortably rest the receiver on your shoulder so that your hands are free to do other tasks.

**Square (Template):** This is one of the four Norstar system Templates. In the Square Template, Lines 1 and 2 are assigned to each telephone. The Square Template is the default during System Startup. All defaults shown in the *Meridian Norstar Modular Programming Record* correspond to the Square Template settings.

**Station:** This is another way of referring to an individual telephone or to a telephone's location.

**Station Auxiliary Power Supply:** This device is used to provide power to a CAP Module, or a Norstar telephone that is connected more than 305 m (1000 ft.) and less than 760 m (2500 ft) from the Key Service Unit.

**Station Module (SM):** An Expansion Module that provides the Norstar system with access to 16 more telephones. Up to six of these Modules may be installed with the use of a six-port Expansion Cartridge.

**System Coordinator:** This is the title assigned to the person responsible for Norstar Administration programming and the training of co-workers on the Norstar system.

**System Data:** Programmable settings from System Startup, Configuration and Administration programming.

**System Speed Dial:** These two digit numbers (01 to 70) can each be programmed to dial telephone numbers up to 16 digits in length. System Speed Dial codes are programmed for the entire system in section "1. System Speed Dial" of Administration programming.

**System Startup:** When a Norstar system is first installed and powered up, the Installer must perform a System Startup before continuing on to Configuration or Administration programming. Startup lets the Installer initialize the system with a predetermined customer Template system setting.

System Startup Access Code: A sequence of digits which are dialed on the dialpad to provide access to System Startup. A Password is required before programming can begin. System Startup is only performed by the Installer.

#### T

**Table entries:** A sub-heading in sections "4. Restrictions" and "5. Overrides" of Administration programming. Table entries allows you to assign a Restriction to one or more of the 30 Restriction numbers, and an Override to one or more of the 10 Override numbers.

**TCM Line (Time Compression Multiplexing Line):** A two wire digital station loop joining the cross-connect at the Key Service Unit to a station set.

**Template:** A system-wide setting assigned during System Startup. The most important effects of a Template are the number of lines assigned to the telephones, and the assignment of Line Pool Access. Templates will also assign other system-wide defaults, such as Prime Line and Ringing Line assignment. The choice of one of four Templates is not affected by Configuration or Administration programming. It is important to understand that a Template is only provided as a convenience, and that any settings effected by the Template can be changed.

**Time and Date:** The current Time and Date appear on the display of idle Norstar telephones. The Time and Date can be changed in section "3. Time and date" of Administration programming.

**Tone:** This is a dialing access for outside lines. Tone is also referred to as "Touchtone" or DTMF (Dual Tone Multi Frequency) Tones. Tones may be required for Access Signalling to PBX or Centrex systems. In section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming, the Installer can select this option on any line for which Tone dialing is necessary.

**Transfer:** This feature allows you to redirect a call to another telephone. There are three types of Transfer: Transfer using Hold, Transfer using Conference, and Transfer (with or without Announcement).

**Transfer Callback:** After a specified number of rings, an unanswered transferred call will return to the telephone which originally made the transfer. The number of rings can be assigned in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

**Trunk Answer:** This feature lets you answer a ringing call from any Norstar telephone in the system on any line that has Night Service activated. Trunk Answer is assigned in section "7. Night Service" of Administration programming.

**Trunk Cartridge (TC):** A cartridge that is inserted into the Trunk Module, and provides the connection to outside lines. Up to three cartridges can be used in one Trunk Module. Each cartridge can support four outside lines.

**Trunk Module (TM):** An expansion module that provides the Norstar system with up to 12 additional outside lines, depending on the number of Trunk Cartridges installed.

**Type:** This setting controls whether each line assigned to a telephone is Public, Private, or assigned to one of Norstar's nine Line Pools. Line Type is assigned in section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming.



**User Data:** User Data is an option in the Set Copy function. User Data refers to the personal settings which are unique to an individual telephone, and are not programmed in Configuration or Administration programming. You program these settings for your telephone at your telephone. Such settings, for example, include Personal Speed Dial and the assignment of programmable buttons.

**Voice Call:** This feature allows you to make a voice announcement or begin a conversation through the speaker of another telephone in your system.

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

Introduction

# Why Program the Telephones?

As your company grows and changes, the turnover in staff, new business contacts, and other changes will make many demands upon your communication system. Staff names and Speed Dial numbers are just two examples of data that need to be accurately recorded in the Norstar System if you are to use your telephones to their full potential.

Administration programming, described in this Guide, puts you in control of the many responsive Norstar features. Spend a few minutes reviewing this Guide and you will find that the programming procedures are both effective and easy to learn.

# How to Use This Guide

The Guide contains nine chapters: an Introduction, Norstar Orientation, Norstar Administration, Feature Operations, Display Messages, Flow Charts, Job Aids, a Glossary of Terms, and an Index.

#### Introduction and Orientation

These first two chapters introduce you to the Norstar system and all of its components. They explain the different ways in which your system may be set up, the three different Norstar telephones, and the default settings of both the system and the telephones.

#### **Flow Charts**

The flow charts are a visual aid to Administration programming. They are especially designed as a quick reference guide to the experienced System Coordinator and provide a good overview of Norstar Administration.

#### Job Aids

These charts assist you in maintaining your system records most effectively. There are job aids for each of the sections of Norstar Administration Programming, excepting Time and Date.

### **Glossary of Terms**

This chapter provides definitions of terms used in this Guide which may be unfamiliar to you.

#### Index

The index provides an alphabetical listing of subjects covered in the Guide, with page number references to help you locate information quickly.

# **Language Choice**

Administration programming, like other Norstar operations, can be performed in either English or an Alternate Language. All display messages are available in both languages on your telephones.

## **Templates**

When your system is first installed, your Installer or Service Representative assigns a default template, or form of organization, for your office telephones. These templates are designed to provide your Norstar Business Communication System with the most useful arrangement of lines and telephones in relationship to your office's situation. The four possible templates are as follows:

- **Square** This template assigns Line 1 and Line 2 to all telephones within your system. The Square template is the default when your system is first installed.
- Centrex This template is most useful for Norstar systems connected to a Centrex system. It assigns a separate outside line to each telephone until all lines are used. If there are more telephones than lines in your system, the telephones with higher Intercom numbers do not receive default line settings.
- Hybrid This template assigns Line 1 to each telephone in the system, as well as assigning a button for Line Pool 1 All outside lines except Line 1 are in Line Pool 1, and must be accessed using a Line Pool Access code.
- PBX No telephone in the PBX (Private Branch Exchange) template has direct access to outside lines. All Lines are assigned to Line Pool 1, and must be accessed using a Line Pool Access code.

The difference between direct access to an outside line and the use of a Line Pool is simple: you can make and receive outside calls on a Line button, but you can only make outside calls, not receive them, using a Line Pool button.

Introduction

If outside lines are assigned to Line Pools, instead of being assigned individually to telephones, each telephone in your system is still able to make outgoing calls using any of the lines. By assigning lines to Line Pools, you are making more efficient use of outside lines and leaving more buttons on each telephone free to store Norstar features.

Remember that these descriptions are only defaults for the various templates. By the time you actually use your system, your Installer or Service Representative will probably have altered these settings to make your telephone system much more effective for your individual needs.

# **Before You Begin**

The next few pages provide a general introduction to Norstar Administration programming.

If you are new to Administration programming, take a few minutes to look over this introduction. Take note of the overview flow chart of the system and read the descriptions of the settings which are controlled under the eight Administration headings. You can also refer to the complete flow charts at the end of this Guide.

When you begin your first Administration session, it is a good idea to follow the directions in the Norstar Orientation chapter of this Guide, to ensure that you can easily find your way through the Administration process. Make sure you have all the information you need before you begin to change settings (for example, the various charts in the Job Aids chapter of this Guide). Avoid changing any settings until you clearly understand the effects.

# **Norstar Telephones**

# **Button Layout**

Your Norstar system has three telephones designed specifically for use with Norstar features. These are the M7324, the M7310, and the M7208. The telephone displays and buttons are arranged to facilitate easy use. The layout of these displays and buttons is shown on the diagrams of the three telephones which appear on the following pages.

# **Button Caps**

Each Meridian Norstar telephone is provided with a number of printed or hand-labelled removable caps for the buttons with indicators. Dual memory buttons on the M7310 have clear plastic caps, and can be labelled using the split colored squares provided with the button caps.

Each Norstar telephone comes with default functions assigned to its buttons. The button caps for these functions are already placed on each telephone, and a selection of other pre-printed button caps is provided to label other features you may want to program on your telephone.

# **Button Cap Colors**

n Cap Colors
Green caps are placed on the Line and Handsfree buttons,
while grey caps are used for the Feature button, Intercom
buttons and buttons that can be programmed to access Norstar
features. Caps with clear plastic windows and paper inserts are
provided to assist people in labelling autodial buttons and buttons
for extra Norstar features. Use the grey paper inserts for Norstar
features and the green paper inserts for extra Line and
Answer buttons.
Answer buttons are labelled using the clear plastic windows, so that in addition to the word "Answer", you can write the name of the person whose telephone the Answer button is monitoring. See the "Answer Groups" section of the Feature Operations chapter for more details.
The Hold and Ris buttons are brighter colors than the other telephone buttons. This makes it easy to locate these important and often-used buttons. The Hold button is red, and the Ris button is orange.

# **Button Caps for Norstar Features**

Line , Intercom , Answer and Handsfree buttons (if assigned) cannot be used to store programmed Norstar features.

Some button caps have abbreviations of the feature names printed on them. The following list shows what each abbreviated label means.

## **Button Inquiry**

When you are labelling your telephone's buttons, the Button Inquiry feature should be turned ON. This not only lets you know what the function of each button is as you label it, but also prevents you from accidentally activating your Norstar features as you press the button caps onto the buttons. See the Button Inquiry section of the Feature Operations chapter for details.

# **Default Button Functions**


The photographs and lists on the next few pages indicate where the various feature, Intercom and outside line buttons are positioned on each type of telephone when the telephone is first plugged into the system.

Norstar has an established order of precedence for your telephone buttons. If too many activities which require buttons are assigned to your telephone, the buttons are assigned in the following order:

Handsfree Mute	is assigned first,
Intercom	buttons are second,
Answer	buttons are third,
Line	buttons are fourth, and the remaining buttons are
assigned a	s programmable memory buttons.

The default settings in the descriptions which follow are for the Square Template. Differences between this and the other three Norstar templates are listed with each description.

# The M7324 Telephone



The M7324 has a two line display; the top line shows messages and prompts and the bottom line shows labels for the display buttons which are used with the M7324 and M7310 telephones.

The M7324 has two panels of twelve programmable buttons, each panel has its own liquid crystal display (LCD). When a line or programmed feature is in use, an triangular indicator ▶ appears on the display beside the appropriate button.



The M7310 telephone has the same display as the M7324; it shows both messages and prompts and labels the display buttons.

The M7310 telephone contains ten programmable memory buttons with triangular indicators on an LCD and twelve programmable dual memory buttons without indicators.

Each dual memory button can be programmed to perform two activities; one on the lower half of the button and one on the upper half of the button. To program and access the top half of the dual memory buttons, press the Shift button located beside the panel of dual memory buttons before pressing the dual memory button.



## **Dual Memory Buttons Without Indicators**

The dual memory buttons for all four templates are the same. The diagram below shows the defaults for a Norstar system with three-digit Intercom numbers. The two-digit Intercom numbers are positioned the same, but begins at 21 rather than 221.

Dual memory buttons are pre-programmed as shown below even if the system does not have some of the telephones associated with the Intercom numbers.





# Other pre-determined settings

Norstar Orientation In addition to Norstar Administration programming, there is another type of system programming, which is not fully covered in this Guide. This is known as **Configuration** programming.

Configuration programming is performed by the Installer of your Norstar system or your Service Representative, and is not accessible to System Coordinators. If your system needs changes to any of the following Configuration settings, call your Installer or Service Representative.

To find out how your individual system has been configured, you can use the System Settings feature. This feature allows you to see all of your system settings without changing any of them. For more information, see the "System Settings" section of the Feature Operations chapter of this Guide.

While your Installer or Service Representative is programming in Configuration, you and your co-workers will be unable to program some of your Norstar features.

Definitions of Configuration settings are provided in the Glossary of this Guide. Default settings, which appear before the Installer or Service Representative changes the settings to suit your particular office needs, are shown in large **bold** letters.

## 5. Change DNs

#### **B.** General Administration

This area allows the Installer or Service Representative to access your system's Administration through Norstar Configuration. This is necessary if the Installer assists you by partially or fully administering your system, or if you have forgotten the Administration password and cannot access Norstar Administration. As System Coordinator, you may be responsible for your system's Administration. Norstar Administration procedures are covered in detail for you later in this Guide.

# C. Set Copy

Under this heading, the Installer can copy all system settings from one telephone to another, or can copy both the system settings and the individual telephone's settings to another telephone.

#### D. Maintenance

#### 1. System Version

This section allows the Installer to make sure that the specified components of your system are compatible with one another.

#### 2. Port/DN Status

This section allows the Installer to determine what piece of equipment (for example a Norstar telephone or an Analog Terminal Adapter) is connected to any given port in your system, and whether or not the equipment is compatible with your system. It also allows the Installer to discover the status of the piece of equipment (for example busy or idle), and to turn it ON or OFF as required.

#### 3. Module Status

This section allows the Installer to check the Trunk and Station Modules connected to your Key Service Unit and to turn them ON or OFF as required.

#### 4. Diagnostics

This section allows the Installer to perform various predefined tests to identify problems within your system.

#### 5. System Test log

This section provides the Installer with a list of the 20 most recent tests which have been performed on your system or alarm messages which have appeared on the Alarm Set. This log shows each occurrence of problem related messages and tests.

## 6. System Administration log

This section provides the Installer with a list of the ten most recent system restarts, Configuration sessions in which changes were made, and unsuccessful attempts to enter your system's Configuration programming. Norstar Orientation

# Preparing to administer your system

Norstar Orientation Choose the right telephone: Administration can only be performed from an M7324 or M7310 telephone, and only one telephone can access Norstar Administration at one time.

Choose the right time: While you are operating Norstar Administration, the telephone you are using will be unable to make or receive calls. Your co-workers will still be able to make and receive calls on their telephones, but they will be unable to change some of the settings on their telephones, such as Autodial buttons and Personal Speed Dial codes.


**Ending the session:** At any time during Administration, you can end the session by pressing the orange RIs button on the Norstar telephone. Norstar records all changes to your system as you make them, so it is not possible to Exit from Administration without "saving" your changes.

# **Useful aids**

**User Cards:** Each Norstar telephone comes with its own User Card. These cards list the most commonly used Norstar features, and explain how to use them.

**Receiver Cards:** Located underneath the receiver of each Norstar telephone is a small card covered by a plastic window. This card lists the Feature codes for Norstar's most commonly used features in your requested language.

Norstar Programming Overlay: At the back of this Guide, you will find four copies of the Programming Overlay. One copy should be placed over the buttons of the telephone while you perform Administration tasks. If you do not have a copy of the Programming Record, you may record all of your Administration settings in the Job Aids chapter of this Guide. The Programming Record (or the Job Aids chapter) is represented in this Guide by the following symbol:





When you see this symbol, remember to record the changes you make in the appropriate area of the Programming Record or the Job Aids chapter of this Guide.

# **Default Settings**

If you are performing Administration on a new system, you will find that many of the settings are pre-selected. These are called the default settings. You have the option of leaving them as they are, or changing them.



# **Norstar Administration**

This chapter of the Guide will help you to understand the variety of features and settings available through Norstar Administration programming. The detailed descriptions and step-by-step instructions included in each of the following sections will enable you to be completely at ease with administering the Norstar System.

Read each section carefully in order to learn how the various features work together to make your office telephone system highly efficient.



# **Entering Administration**

#### To Enter Administration:

- 1. Release all calls on your M7324 or M7310 telephone. Indicators for calls on other telephones stay ON.
- 2. Enter the Administration code:

3. If the display changes to Password: , enter the Administration password. The password does not appear on the display as you enter it.

If the proper password is entered (or no password is required) the display shows 1.Sys speed dial and three triangular indicators > appear on the liquid crystal display (LCD) between the rows of buttons.

If an incorrect password is entered, no change occurs on the display. Check the password. Press the RETRY display button and re-enter the password. The display should show 1.Sys speed dial





# 1. System Speed Dial

## **How It Works**

System Speed Dialprovides a list of up to 70 telephone numbers that can be dialed from any telephone in your system by means of a two-digit code (01 to 70). The maximum length of a Speed Dial Number is **16 digits**.


Entries in the System Speed Dial list should be emergency numbers or outside telephone numbers that are called regularly by many people in the office. Numbers used by few people, or only one person, should be Autodial or Personal Speed Dial entries on individual telephones. The Personal Speed Dial feature works the same way as the System Speed Dial feature, but uses a different range of codes (71-94). Consult the "Autodial" and "Speed Dial - Personal" sections in the Feature Operation chapter of this Guide for further information.

In Administration, you can see the numbers entered in your system, and add or delete entries. A new system contains no default Speed Dial entries. To use System Speed Dial codes, follow the procedures in the Feature Operation chapter of this Guide, or on the User Cards for each telephone.

The Job Aids chapter of this Guide contains a convenient chart that you can photocopy, fill out, and distribute to your co-workers as a reference to System Speed Dial codes and the corresponding telephone numbers. Keep the page in the Job Aids chapter blank, and use it as a master copy.





# **Programming Overview of System Speed Dial**

#### **Explanation of System Speed Dial Overview**

From the 1. Sys speed dial heading, press Show to cause sub-heading to appear. You can enter the Show set:\_ the two-digit Speed Dial code of the Speed Dial number you wish to see or press Next to see the entry (if there is one) for the lowest System Speed Dial code: number 01. Pressing Next repeatedly allows you to scroll forward through the list, moving up by one number with each press. You can scan the list as far as #70 if you wish. From #70, pressing Next twice moves you to the next heading: 2. Names When the display shows any Speed Dial code number, pressing Back scrolls backward through the list. When a particular code is shown on the display. you can enter a telephone number or change the existing entry by pressing the CHANGE display button, then entering the desired digits or symbols from the dialpad.

## **Notes on System Speed Dial**

The maximum length of a telephone number stored as a System Speed Dial code is **16 digits**.

The method for using both System and Personal Speed Dial codes is the same. The same Speed Dial button can access both System and Personal Speed Dial numbers, but the code used is different for the two types of Speed Dial features: System Speed Dial codes range from 01 to 70, Personal Speed Dial codes range from 71 to 94.

Personal Speed Dial numbers are programmed at individual telephones within your Norstar system. They can not be programmed using Norstar Administration.

# 2. Names

### **How It Works**

Programming Names allows you to assign names, consisting of letters and numbers, to your outside telephone lines and to your coworkers' telephones. As a result, when an outside call comes to a telephone, the display may show the line name

(PRIVATE calling) instead of the line number (Line 34 calling). When an inside call comes to a telephone, the display may show the caller's name (DOUG calling) instead of the phone's Intercom number (Set 227 calling).

This personal touch provides your company's staff with instant recognition of their calls. Conference/Transfer, Call Forward, Message, and other Norstar features are made more effective when the name of the line or caller appears on the display.

The word "set" is another name for a telephone. The set number for each telephone is the same as its Intercom number: the two, three, or four-digit number used to call between telephones within your office system.

Names can be assigned to lines which are used for only one specific purpose, such as a private line, or a line which is only assigned to one particular telephone (for example, "SHOP" or "RM 105"). Lines can also be named by the seven-digit telephone numbers associated with them (for example 555 1234). This makes it easy to identify which line a call is on, and therefore who is likely to be calling, and how important the call is likely to be.

The Name assigned to a line or telephone can be no longer than **seven** characters, and can contain both letters and numbers. Periods, hyphens, or other symbols cannot be used.

The Job Aids chapter of this Guide contains a convenient chart that you can photocopy, fill out, and distribute to your co-workers as a reference to Line and Intercom Numbers and the corresponding Names. Keep the page in the Job Aids chapter blank, and use it as a master copy.

Entering Characters: While programming in the under the Names heading of Administration, you can enter the characters of Names from the numbered dialpad buttons on the telephone. Each button has three or four letters and numbers on it that are entered by pressing the button one, two, three or four times, depending on the letter or number desired. For example, one press on the 2 button on the dialpad enters an "A", a second press changes the entry to "B", a third press to the same button changes the entry to a "C", and a fourth changes the letter to the number "2". A fifth press would change the entry back to an "A".

Cursor Controls: The cursor is the small line which appears on the display beneath a blank space: Set 221: \_\_\_\_\_\_\_ Characters which are entered using the dialpad appear above the cursor.

#	Moves the cursor right
*	Moves the cursor left
BKSP	Moves the cursor left, erasing the letter above the

Enter a blank space by pressing # or the -> display button twice before entering the next character. This moves the cursor two spaces to the right, placing a blank space between characters. This is useful if you want to include an initial in the name. For example, you can differentiate between 'PAT L" and 'PAT M".





# **Programming Overview of Names**

This flow chart is intended to provide a basic outline of Names programming. For a more complete view, see the "Flow Charts" chapter of this Guide.





#### **Explanation of Names Overview**

The 2. Names Overview Flow Chart shows the two sub-headings which allow you to program Names for the telephones or outside lines in your system. By pressing Show and following the display prompts, you can scan through the assigned names of lines or telephones, and erase or change the Names.

#### **Notes on Names**

Programmed Names of lines and telephones in your Norstar system can be no more than **seven characters** long. Hyphens, periods and other symbols cannot be used. Letters are automatically stored as upper case letters.

Entering letters from the dialpad only happens in Names programming. At all other times, pressing the dialpad buttons enters only the number of the button you press.

The Name and Intercom Number of a telephone will remain the same if the telephone is moved to another location within your system.

Before assigning Names to telephones, it is a good idea to check with the people involved to ensure that the proposed Names are acceptable.

Line names must be unique, in order that any line which may be having trouble can be reported correctly. If you enter a Line Name which has already been used, you will hear an error tone, and Use unique name will appear on your display.

Two or more telephones in your office, or a telephone and a line in your system, can be given the same Name. The system allows this, but it could become a source of confusion. Use creative combinations of initials, abbreviations, and possibly nicknames to give each telephone a unique Name.

If some of the telephones in your system are used by many people, it may be more sensible to name them after their location—such as LAB, GATE, or RM 123—rather than giving them a person's Name.

### 3. Time and Date

### **How It Works**

When a Norstar telephone is in its normal rest state, the display shows the current Time and Date. For example:

Mar 31 3:45 pm

As with any electric clock, the display will have to be reset after a power interruption, which may cause your clocks to temporarily stop.


Entries to the Time and Date display must be in numeric form, using one or two digits. For example, the third month (March in most countries) can be entered as either "3" or "03".

**During normal service:** The English display reading is always in 12-hour format, and the Alternate language display is always in 24-hour format.

In Administration: When you adjust the time, the hour is shown in 24-hour format. For example, 2 p.m. appears as 14:00. The hour may be entered in 12-hour or 24-hour format. If the system is being administered in English and the hour entered is less than 13, the display prompts you to specify "am" or "pm".





# **Programming Overview of Time and Date**

This flow chart is intended to provide a basic outline of Time and Date programming. For a more complete view, see the "Flow Charts" chapter of this Guide.



From the 3. Time and Date heading, pressing Show displays the Time sub-heading. Press Next to see the Date sub-heading. From either of these sub-headings, you can press the CHANGE display button and Next to see the separate divisions of the sub-section: for example, Hours and Minutes under the "Time" sub-heading. When one of these parts shows on the display, you can change it by pressing CHANGE and entering the correct digits from the dialpad. The AM/PM choice is presented only if you enter an hour of 12 or less while your telephone display is in English.

### **Notes on Time and Date**

The Time and Date display on each telephone indicates that the telephone is properly connected to the Key Service Unit (KSU) and is in its idle state (not active on a call or feature. If the display is blank, the telephone may be disconnected, or there may be no power to the KSU. If the power fails, your Norstar clock will stop. Once the power is restored to your system, the clock begins to run again, but the time will be incorrect.

Some Norstar features cause a particular message to appear on your display as long as the feature is active. The Message Waiting feature, for example, shows the display Message for you, rather than the Time and Date display, until you return or cancel the messages.

The time display in English is always in 12-hour format with "am" or "pm"; on the Alternate language display, the time is always displayed in 24-hour format:

English	May 24	3:22 pm
French	24 mai	15h22
Spanish	24 May	15:22

The Time and Date will revert to its default setting if the power is out for more than three consecutive days, or if your system defaults are intentionally reset. The display will show Jan 1 1:00 am when the system has been restarted.

### 4. Restrictions

### **How It Works**

A Restriction prohibits calls from your office to call numbers containing specified digits. You can apply these Restrictions to individual lines or telephones to prevent abuse of your office system. If anyone tries to dial a restricted number, they will hear an error tone and see the message Restricted call The call will then be dropped.

Restrictions can range from the very general, such as preventing all long-distance calls from any telephone, to the very particular, such as preventing calls to a specific taxi company from the telephone near the front door.



Two other sections of Administration programming that relate to Restrictions are 5. Overnides and 8. Passwords

Each of these sections allows certain people or certain telephone numbers to avoid the programmed Restrictions.

Your Norstar system comes with the five pre-set (default)
Restrictions listed on the following table, but they are not applied to
any lines or telephone sets. In order for the default Restrictions to
function, they must be applied to the appropriate lines and
telephones. The following procedures explain how to apply the
Restrictions to lines or sets to suit your office needs.

Restriction Number	Restricted Digit or Sequence	Purpose	
#1	0	Prevents calls to the Operator, which could result in operator-handled long-distance calls	
#2	1	Prevents all direct-dialed long-distance calls.	
#3	411	Prevents calls to local Directory Assistance, for which there is often a charge.	
#4	1*1*	Prevents long-distance calls to any area code with a 1 as the middle digit. For example: 416. The asterisk (*) is a "wild card" character that stands for any digit.	
#5	1*0*	Prevents long-distance calls to any area code with a 0 as the middle digit.	

Restricted digits apply to the beginning of a dialed telephone number. The "1" Restriction, for example, will prohibit long-distance calls that begin with a 1, but will not prohibit the dialing of a number that contains a 1 in any other position.

The two default Restrictions 1\*1\* and 1\*0\* together prevent any long-distance calls outside your area code, while permitting long-distance calls within your area code.

The maximum length of a restricted sequence is **eight characters**. The maximum number of Restrictions allowed in any Norstar system is 30. Any or all of these Restrictions can be applied to any line or telephone in your office system.

A call can be prevented by a Restriction placed on either the line or the telephone being used. Restrictions applied to a telephone affect calls on any line from that telephone. Restrictions applied to a line affect calls on that line from any telephone set.

Restrictions that apply to a line can be easily copied as a group to another line, using the line copy routine described near the end of this section. Similarly, Restrictions that apply to a set can be copied to another set. This procedure is a great time saver, especially when new telephones or new lines are being added to an established system.

When entering line numbers during programming, use a two-digit format. Line numbers less than 10 must be preceded by a zero.



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# **Programming Overview of Restrictions**

This flow chart is intended to provide a basic outline of Restrictions programming. For a more complete view, see the "Flow Charts" chapter of this Guide.



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### **Explanation of Restrictions Overview**

From the 4. Restrictions heading, press Show to get to the first sub-heading Table entries The other two sub-headings are Applied to lines and Applied to sets You can move from one sub-heading to another by pressing Back or Next

From the Table entries sub-heading you can see the actual entries (restricted digits) by pressing Show and then Next repeatedly. Enter a string of digits or erase an existing entry by pressing CHANGE when the desired entry number shows on the display, then entering the new digits from the dialpad or pressing Next

Programming under Applied to lines follows the same format as programming under Applied to sets From either sub-heading, press Show then enter the desired line or set number. As the last digit is pressed, the display shows the first table entry along with a Y (Yes) or N (No) to indicate whether the Restriction is applied. You can apply or remove any Restriction showing on the display by pressing CHANGE

All of the Restrictions applied to a line or a telephone can be copied to others by returning to the appropriate sub-heading, pressing the COPY display button, and following the prompts which appear on the display.

#### **Notes on Restrictions**

The maximum length of a Restriction sequence is **eight characters**, including digits and asterisks.

The maximum number of Restrictions which can be programmed for a system is 30. These can be assigned to individual lines and telephones in the system.

If the Restrictions in your system are too limiting, see the "Overrides" section which follows. Overrides allow you to disable Restrictions on individual lines or telephones, or to permit calls to certain numbers or area codes.

If the Restrictions in your system are not preventing certain types of calls as intended, look for the following conditions:

- The Restrictions may not be applied to all of the necessary lines or sets.
- If you have activated a Restriction Password, some unauthorized people may be using it.
- One of the Overrides may be too general, allowing too many calls to override a Restriction.

Centrex or PBX features, such as Link or Timed Release, cannot override Restrictions in your Norstar system.

If you want to reserve a certain line or telephone for incoming calls only, apply a Restriction that consists of a single asterisk \* . This blocks the dialing of any digit, thereby prohibiting all outgoing calls.

A Restriction only prevents calls to telephone numbers with the same or a greater number of digits. For example, a Restriction of eight asterisks \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* applied to a line or telephone prevents all calls to telephone numbers longer than seven digits on that line or telephone.



### 5. Overrides

#### **How It Works**

An Override is a sequence of digits that is programmed to bypass a corresponding Restriction. For example, if your system is programmed with a general Restriction against long-distance calls, you may still want to allow long distance calls to the head office of your company on certain lines or certain telephones. To do this, program the digits of the head office number as an Override, and apply it to the desired lines or telephones.

Your Norstar system comes with five pre-set (default), as listed on the table below; however, they are not applied to any lines or telephones. In order for the Overrides to function, they must be applied to the appropriate lines and telephones. The following procedures explain how to apply the Overrides to lines or telephones to suit your needs.

Override Permitted Digit Purpose Number Sequences #1 1800 Permits long-distance calls to toll-free numbers beginning with 1800. #2 1555 Permits calls to long-distance directory information within the caller's area code. Permits calls to long-distance directory information in any area code that has a #3 1\*1\*555 middle digit of 1. Example: 416 The asterisk (\*) is a "wild card" character that stands for any digit. Permits calls to long-distance directory #4 1\*0\*555 information in any area code that has a middle digit of 0. For example: 709. #5 911 Permits calls to the general emergency number (911) for fire, police, or ambulance service.

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Notice that Override digits, like those above, are applied to the beginning of a dialed telephone number. The "1800" Override, for example, permits long-distance calls that begin with 1800, but does not allow long-distance calls that contain 1800 in any other position.

The maximum length of an Override sequence is **14 characters**. The maximum number of Overrides in any Norstar system is 10.

Overrides, like Restrictions, are applied independently to lines and telephones. For example, if a particular Restriction were applied to both Line 2 and Set 221, then the Override would need to be applied to both Line 2 and Set 221 for all telephones to use all lines. If the Override were applied only to Set 221, then Set 221 could make the restricted call on all lines except Line 2. If the Override were applied only to Line 2, then all telephones except Set 221 could make the call on Line 2. Set 221 could not make the call. An Override applied to a particular telephone will not remove any Restrictions applied to lines which that telephone uses.

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Overrides that apply to a line can be easily copied as a group to another line, using the line copy routine described near the end of this section. Similarly, Overrides that apply to one telephone can be copied to another set. This procedure is a great time saver, especially when new sets or new lines are being added to an established system.

When entering line numbers during programming, use a two-digit format; line numbers less than 10 must be preceded by a zero.



### **Explanation of Overrides Overview**

From the Table entries sub-heading you can see the actual entries (permitted digits) by pressing Show and then pressing Next repeatedly. Enter a string of digits or erase an existing entry by pressing CHANGE when the desired entry number is showing on the display, then entering the new digits from the dialpad or pressing Next

Programming under <a href="#">Fplied to lines</a> follows the same format as programming under <a href="#">Applied to sets</a> From either sub-heading, press <a href="#">Show</a> then enter the desired line or set number. As the last digit is pressed, the display shows the first table entry along with a Y (Yes) or N (No) to indicate whether the Override is applied. You can apply or remove any Override showing on the display by pressing <a href="#">CHANGE</a>

All of the Overrides applied to a line or a telephone can be copied to others by returning to the appropriate sub-heading, pressing the COPY display button, and following the prompts which appear on the display.

#### **Notes on Overrides**

The maximum length of an Override sequence is **14 characters**, including digits and asterisks.

The maximum number of Overrides which can be programmed for a system is 10. These can be turned ON and OFF for individual lines and telephones in the system.

The universal Override for all Restrictions is a string of 14 asterisks \* . When this Override is applied to a line or telephone, it bypasses all digits in any Restriction on that line or telephone.

If the Overrides in your system are not allowing certain types of calls as intended, look for the following conditions:

- The Overrides may not be applied to all of the necessary lines or sets.
- A certain telephone number may bypass one Restriction because of an Override, only to be prevented by another Restriction that also needs an Override.
- A telephone number may bypass a Restriction on a telephone set, but be prevented by a Restriction on a line.

Restrictions can also be overridden using Restriction Passwords, which you can activate and change under the

8. Passwords section of Norstar Administration. If activated, these passwords will override all Restrictions applied to any lines or telephones within your Norstar office system.



# 6. Permissions

### **How It Works**

Permissions are a series of seven features that you can control for each telephone in your system. The features are listed and briefly described in the table below.

Permission	Default Setting	Other Settings
Full Handsfree: Allows a person to make or receive calls without having to pick up the receiver. This feature also allows a headset to be used with the telephone.	No	Yes

The default settings for permissions may be the best for your office, or you may wish to experiment a bit before arriving at the ideal arrangement. Here are some points to consider about Permissions:

Full Handsfree is necessary for a person who wants to use a headset or the telephone speaker and microphone. As the name implies, Handsfree is appreciated by anyone who wants to keep their hands free for writing or other manual tasks while talking on the telephone. It is also useful in executive offices or meeting rooms where two or more people may want to hold a teleconference with another person. Full Handsfree is seldom used on telephones in open work areas where people need to use the receiver to keep conversations private, or where background noise would be picked up by the Handsfree microphone.



- Handsfree Answerback can be turned OFF at a telephone that never receives Voice Calls—such as a courtesy telephone in a reception area—or a telephone in any location where the person receiving the Voice Call does not need to respond, or wishes to respond only by using the receiver.
- Pickup groups are generally formed within working units of the office so that an outside caller can speak to someone who works with the person he or she is trying to reach. If, for example, the Sales Department does not want to take messages for the Engineering Department, they should be in different Pickup groups.
- Page Zone should be specified as NO at telephones where page announcements would be disruptive or would convey irrelevant information, such as in a conference room. Before programming this feature, consider who in your company will use page messages, and who they will wish to contact, so that you assign the most appropriate Page Zone to each telephone.
- Auxiliary Ringer should receive calls only from telephones and lines that are accessible to people hearing the ringer. Otherwise, the calls may go unanswered.

Call Forward No Answer: Make sure that you only forward unanswered calls to telephones where those calls will be answered. A Central Answering Position, Prime Phones, receptionist's or secretary's telephones are useful for receiving calls forwarded by this feature.

**Priority Call:** This feature permits the person using the programmed telephone to interrupt a co-worker who is active on a call or using Do Not Disturb mode. Only permit this feature at telephones where this will be necessary for important office communications.



Begin with **6**. Permissions on the display, then follow the steps below.

- 1. Press Show The display changes to Show Set: \_
- 2. Enter the Intercom Number of the telephone you want to check. After the final digit is entered, the display changes to Full handsfree:
- 3. Press Next six times. The display shows
  Priority call: with a Y (Yes) or N (No) to show if this feature is permitted.
- 4. Press CHANGE to alter the setting. Another press changes it back again.
- 5. When you are finished, follow the Exit procedure on the next page.



# To copy Permissionsfrom one telephone to another:

Begin with 6. Permissions on the display, then follow the steps below.

- 1. Press Show The display changes to Show set:\_
- 2. Press COPY The display changes to Source: \_
- 3. Enter the number of the telephone you want to copy. The display changes to Copy to set: \_
- 4. Enter the number of the telephone that is to receive the Permissions. The message Copied XXX > YYY (with appropriate set numbers in place of the Xs and Ys) appears for a few seconds on the display to indicate that copying has been successful. After a few seconds, the display changes to Copy to set: \_ This allows you to copy the same Permissions to another telephone.
- 5. When you are finished, follow the Exit procedure below.



# **Programming Overview of Permissions**

This flow chart is intended to provide a basic outline of Permissions programming. For a more complete view, see the "Flow Charts" chapter of this Guide.



## **Explanation of Permissions Overview**

From the 6. Permissions heading, press Show to reach the Show set: \_ sub-heading. This is a point to which you will return several times if you are programming a number of telephones. After entering an Intercom Number, you can scroll through the Permissions settings for the specified telephone. Any setting can be changed by pressing CHANGE when the setting appears on the display.

All of the permissions for a telephone can be copied to other telephones by returning to the Show set: \_\_\_\_\_ sub-heading, pressing the COPY display button, and following the prompts which appear on the display.

# **Notes on Permissions**

When you change any of the settings in the "Permissions" section of Administration programming, you **must** notify your co-workers of any changes. They can then change the button caps on their telephones if necessary, and begin to use the features. Remind your co-workers to use the Button Inquiry feature when changing button caps in order to avoid activating the feature programmed on each button.

**Full Handsfree**: People who want to use Handsfree will probably need a brief demonstration of how it works. Instructions are available in the Feature Operations chapter of this Guide and on the User Cards for the telephones. The following activities are particularly important:

- Placing a Handsfree call
- Receiving a Handsfree call
- Muting the microphone during a call, then turning it ON again
- Changing from Handsfree mode to Receiver mode, then back to Handsfree
- Placing a Handsfree call on hold to answer another call, then returning to the call on hold.

When Handsfree/Mute is assigned to a telephone in Administration programming, a Handsfree button appears on the lowest programmable button on the right side of the panel of triangular indicators.

People who wish to use a headset with their telephone need a Handsfree button. See "Headset" in the Feature Operations chapter for more details.

Norstar Administration Handsfree Answerback: People with telephones that have this feature activated may need to be reminded that when they receive a voice call, the microphone on their telephone is turned ON and the caller can hear them.

**Pickup group:** Each telephone can be in only one of Norstar's nine Pickup groups. Calls on private lines cannot usually be picked up on another telephone, even if both telephones are in the same Pickup group. If a group of telephones have the same lines appearing on their telephones, they can answer each other's calls directly. They do not need to be in the same Pickup group and do not need to use the Call Pickup feature.

**Page Zone:** Page reception can be temporarily prevented or interrupted at any telephone by activating Do Not Disturb. A page announcement will also be cut off if a person makes a call, answers a call, or rejoins a call on hold.

**Auxiliary Ringer:** The Auxiliary Ringer is an external ringer, purchased separately and connected to your Norstar system. A customer supplied external ringer must be connected to your system before this feature can function.

The ringer may be driven not only by the telephones you select in Permissions, but also by all calls on certain outside lines. If this causes confusion, contact your Installer or Service Representative and request a change to the configuration of your system.

Inside calls will not cause the Auxiliary Ringer to ring if the telephone which receives the calls is in Do Not Disturb mode.

No call will cause the Auxiliary Ringer to ring if the telephone which receives the call is forwarded to a telephone which cannot drive the Auxiliary Ringer.

For temporary assignment of calls to an Auxiliary Ringer, forward your calls to a telephone that is already programmed to drive the ringer. This redirects all calls from the forwarded telephone, even if they are on lines not normally accessible to the telephone that drives the ringer.

Night Ringing Phones can also be administered to drive the Auxiliary Ringer. You can easily control this in the "Night Service" section of Administration programming.

Call Forward No Answer: Norstar will permit a call to be forwarded repeatedly, which could result in a call being forwarded from one phone to another, then back again. At any point, the call can be answered at one telephone or the other. You may wish to use this aspect of the Call Forward No Answer feature to enable two co-workers to answer each other's calls at all times. You may wish to avoid a Call Forward loop, however, if it means that calls will go unanswered.

**Priority Call:** This feature allows you or one of your co-workers to interrupt another person's telephone call, or override the Do Not Disturb setting on a telephone. It should only be permitted where this will be necessary to allow important calls to be answered immediately.

# 7. Night Service

## **How It Works**

When Night Service is turned ON for an outside line in your system, all incoming calls on that line ring at a specified Night Ringing Phone in addition to ringing at their normal destinations.

Night Service programming is extremely flexible; it allows you to arrange almost any imaginable variation of your system for afterhour telephone calls. In the "Night Service" section of Administration, you can select a different Night Ringing Phone for each outside line in your Norstar system and assign a Night Control Phone to each line or, alternatively, you can assign the same Night Ringing Phone and Night Control Phone for all or any selection of lines in your system.

Night Service for individual lines can only be activated from the specified Night Control Phones.

In "Night Service", you can also choose whether or not each Night Ringing Phone will drive the Auxiliary Ringer when Night Service is active.

Night Service also allows you to assign a Night Dial Zero Phone in addition to the normal Dial Zero Phone. When Night Service is active, you can contact this telephone from any telephone in your Norstar system simply by dialing "0".

If a call arrives at a Night Ringing Phone, it can be answered at other telephones using features such as Call Pickup (Directed or Group) if these features are programmed for the telephone being used to answer the call. The Trunk Answer feature (if activated) allows the call to be answered at any telephone whether or not Call Pickup can be used.

When you designate Night Ringing Phones, choose telephones that can be answered after normal working hours, for example, at a security guard's desk or in a residence connected to the workplace.

# **Examples of Possible Night Service Arrangements**

Night Service can be used not only after your regular office hours, but at any time when you want a specific line to be answered at a different location. The following examples are only a few of the many possible options available with the flexibility of Norstar Night Service programming.

# Having your calls ring at a Central Answering Position (CAP) after office hours.

A person who receives calls after regular office hours may want to have those calls answered by at a CAP (or any central telephone) where there is a person available to take calls at night. To arrange this, program Night Service as follows for the lines assigned to the telephone needing to be answered at the CAP.

- 1. Assign the telephone which will be answered at the CAP as the Night Control Phone: Night ctrl:
- 2. Assign the CAP M7324 telephone as the Night Ringing Phone: Night ring:
- Make sure that each line is programmed as "Ringing" by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Line Data" section of Configuration programming.

Night Service should be turned ON at the Night Control Phone after hours, and turned OFF every morning. The person whose lines are forwarded to the CAP has the control over when Night Service for those lines is turned ON and OFF.

# Having your daytime calls answered by another person.

A busy manager may want to have all his calls answered by his secretary or receptionist during the day. One way of achieving this (even on Private lines) is to use the Night Service feature. You can program Night Service so that the manager's lines are answered at the secretary's telephone during the day, but ring at the manager's telephone when the secretary is not there. To do this, program Night Service as follows for the manager's lines.

- 1. Assign the secretary's telephone as the Night Control Phone.
- 2. Assign the secretary's telephone as the Night Ringing Phone also.
- Make sure that each line on the manager's telephone is programmed as "Ringing" by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Line Data" section of Configuration programming.



Using this arrangement, the secretary can allow calls to be answered by the manager directly when the manager is in the office but the secretary is not. The secretary's telephone has control of when Night Service is turned ON and OFF.

### Having your telephone ring at two locations.

If you are often working in two locations, for example in your office and in a laboratory, you may want your calls to ring sometimes in at both locations. To achieve this, program Night Service as follows for the lines assigned to your telephone.

- 1. Assign the more commonly used telephone as the Night Control Phone.
- 2. Assign the less commonly used telephone as the Night Ringing Phone.
- Make sure that each line is programmed as "Ringing" by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Line Data" section of Configuration programming.

On the days that you will be often in both places, or will be mostly in the location of the less commonly used telephone, Night Service should be turned ON. All calls will then ring at both telephones and can be answered regardless of which location you are working in at the time.

# **Night Service Procedures**

### **Entering Administration:**

- 3. If the display changes to Password: \_\_\_\_\_\_\_, enter the Administration password. If the proper password is entered, the display changes to \_\_\_\_\_\_\_\_ 1. Sys speed \_\_\_\_\_\_\_ and three triangular indicators ▶ appear on the LCD panel between the rows of buttons.

- 2. Press CHANGE The Y (Yes) changes to a N (No). Another press changes it back again.
- 3. When you are finished, follow the Exit procedure at the end of this section.

# To assign a Night Dial Zero Phone for your system:

Begin with [7.Night Service] on the display, then follow the steps below.

- 1. Press Show The display shows Trunk answer: with a Y (Yes) or N (No) to indicate if this feature is turned ON.
- 2. Press Next The display shows Night-0 set: XXX (with the appropriate numbers in place of the Xs).
- 3. Press CHANGE A cursor replaces the numbers.
- Enter the Intercom number of the telephone which you want to be the Night Dial Zero Phone for your system. The numbers appear after the colon as you enter them.
- Press Next to continue setting Night Service
   OR
   Follow the Exit procedure at the end of this section.

### To change the Night Control Phone for a line:

Begin with 7. Night Service on the display, then follow the steps below.

- 1. Press Show The display shows Trunk answer: with a Y (Yes) or N (No) to indicate if this feature is turned ON.
- 2. Press Next twice. The display shows Show line: \_
- 3. Enter the number of the line for which you wish to change the Night Service settings.

  The display shows Night crt1: XXX (with the appropriate numbers in place of the Xs).

- 5. Enter the Intercom number of the telephone which you want as the Night Control Phone for this line. The numbers appear after the colon as you enter them.





# **Programming Overview of Night Service**

This flow chart is intended to provide a basic outline of Night Service programming. For a more complete view, see the "Flow Charts" chapter of this Guide.





## **Explanation of Night Service Overview**

Pressing the Show button when the 7.Night Service heading appears on the display shows whether or not the Trunk Answer feature is turned ON. To change this, press the CHANGE display button.

Move to the "Night Dial Zero Phone" selection by pressing Next The Intercom number of the Night Dial Zero Phone appears after the colon on the display. You can alter this by pressing CHANGE and entering another telephone's Intercom number.

Press Next again to move to the Show I ine: \_\_\_\_ subheading. From here, you can set the Night Service for each outside line in your system. Enter the number of the line for which you wish to change the settings. You can change the Night Control Phone and the Night Ringing Phone. At each appropriate display, by pressing CHRNGE and entering a telephone Intercom number you can alter the settings to suit your needs. You can also control whether or not calls which ring at a Night Ringing Phone will also ring the Auxiliary Ringer by pressing CHRNGE when the Night aux ring: Y display appears.

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You can press Next to return to the Show line: \_ subheading and program Night Service for other lines in your system.

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# **Notes on Night Service**

Night Service can only be turned ON or OFF from the designated Night Control Phone. To make this easier, you can program the feature code Feature 8 7 onto a programmable button, and label the button Night Service Instructions for programming features can be found on each telephone's individual User Card, or under "Feature Access" in the Feature Operations chapter of this Guide. Once the feature is programmed, you can activate Night Service by pressing only one button.

In order to have your system's Night Dial Zero Phone work, you must turn Night Service ON at the regular Dial Zero Phone (by pressing Feature 8 7 or Night Service).

A Prime Phone can be designated as a Night Ringing Phone if you wish. The main reason for doing this would be to enable a Prime Phone to drive the Auxiliary Ringer only when it is in Night Service mode.

When Night Service is active, calls will not ring at the Night Ringing Phone if it is in either Do Not Disturb or Call Forward mode. Do Not Disturb will cause the calls to ring at an appropriate Prime Phone if it does not ring on any other telephones in your system; Call Forward will cause the calls to ring at the specified destination telephone.

# 8. Passwords

# **How It Works**

Norstar Passwordsare an optional feature that can be activated to prevent abuse of your telephone system. The following two types of passwords can be programmed:

- Administration password: When activated, this code of six digits or less must be entered before any Administration tasks can be performed. The Administration Password prevents any unauthorized changes to Norstar Administration settings.
- Restriction passwords: Your Norstar system supports up to 100 four-digit codes which can be used to override all call Restrictions in your system. When Restriction Passwords are implemented, they are usually provided only to senior executives of the company and others whose job requires them to make long-distance calls.

Norstar Administration

Copy your Passwords in a safe place. If you lose the Administration password, you will not be able to access Norstar Administration. There is a section for recording your Passwords in the Job Aids chapter of this Guide, but you may wish to record the passwords elsewhere if this Guide is made available to your entire office.

For security purposes, it is a good idea to change passwords periodically. The procedure for doing this is described in the following pages.





# **Explanation of Passwords Overview**

From the 8. Passwords heading, press Show to see the first sub-heading: Admin. password Move between here and the other sub-heading, Restriction pswd, by pressing Back or Next as required.

From the Admin. password sub-heading, you can change, create, or erase the Password by pressing the CHANGE display button and following the prompts which appear on the display.

From the Restriction pswd sub-heading, you can change, create, or erase the Password by pressing Show, then the CHANGE display button and following the prompts which appear on the display.

## **Notes on Passwords**

**Administration password** 

Be sure to write your password somewhere that is safe and secure. If you lose the password, you cannot enter Administration programming. In this case, call your Installer or Service Representative for assistance, as he or she can cancel your password or create a new one through Norstar Configuration.

# **Restriction password**

For security purposes, it is a good idea to change passwords periodically, and inform only those who are entitled to use the password.

See <u>5. Overrides</u> for an alternate way to bypass call Restrictions on certain lines or telephones.


The Job Aids chapter of this Guide has an appropriate place for recording your passwords, but you may not want to record your passwords in the Job Aids chapter if this Guide is made accessible to your co-workers. Keep the pages in this Guide blank, and use them as a master copy. Photocopy the pages and fill in the duplicates, which can then be kept in a safe place.

# Keeping your Norstar System up to date

You have now finished programming in Norstar Administration, and should be quite familiar with the necessary procedures. Through Norstar Administration, you can continue to keep your office telephone system running smoothly and efficiently.

Keeping your Norstar Administration settings up to date is even easier than programming the feature settings the first time. Changes only need to be made when your office organization changes, or if you discover that different feature settings would be more advantageous to you and your co-workers.

The following chapters of this Guide should help you and your coworkers learn even more about the various features available with your Norstar Business Communication System.



# 4

# **Feature Operations**

This chapter has been written for you and your co-workers to use as a reference to how Norstar features operate.

Some Norstar features may not be available in your system because of the settings assigned in Norstar Configuration or Administration programming. If a feature is controlled by this programming, there will be a note telling where in Administration or Configuration the settings can be changed. This will help you to know whether you can change the appropriate settings, or whether you must contact your Installer or Service Representative.

The Norstar system has many more features than any telephone could have buttons. You can help your co-workers determine which features they will use frequently and help them program these features onto memory buttons. When the Norstar system is first installed, every telephone will function with pre-programmed (default) features.

Feature Operations

Remember while reading this chapter that "set" is another word for a telephone.

Before you begin programming memory buttons, you should be aware of what features are already programmed on your telephone. The steps below explain how to use the Button Inquiry feature to determine what each button is programmed to do.

# To determine which features are already programmed:

- 1. Press Feature \* 0
- 2. Press any button. The button's function will appear on the display.

# To determine the set number (Intercom number) of a telephone:

- 1. Press Feature \* 0
- 2. Press Intercom

The Intercom number, set Name, and port number (for the Installer's use only) appear on the display.

# Feature Operations

# **Programming Reference Guide**

## Checking programmed buttons using Button Inquiry

- 1. Press Feature \* 0
- One at a time, press the buttons you wish to check. The display shows the name of the feature programmed on each button.
- 3. Press Feature to cancel the Button Inquiry. You can now continue on and program new features on your telephone buttons.

Activate this feature as you label your telephone buttons. This will prevent accidental activation of the programmed features.

# **Programming Outside Autodial Buttons**

- 1. Press Feature \* 1
- 2. Press the memory button you wish to program.
- 3. Enter the telephone number from the dialpad.
- 4. Press the Hold button or the OK display button (M7310 and M7324 telephones).
  - Key programmed appears on the display.
- 5. Label the button with the appropriate name or telephone number.

# **Programming Inside Autodial Buttons**

- 1. Press Feature \* 2
- 2. Press a memory button.
- 3. Enter the Intercom number.

  Key programmed appears on the display.
- 4. Label the button with the appropriate name or Intercom number.

# **Programming Feature Access Buttons**

- 1. Press Feature \* 3
- 2. Press a memory button.
- 3. Press Feature and the appropriate code.

  Key programmed appears on the display.
- 4. Label the button with the feature name.

# **Programming Personal Speed Dial Codes**

- 1. Press Feature \* 4
- 2. Press the Personal Speed Dial code (71 to 94).
- 3. Press the phone number to be stored (up to **16** digits).
- 4. Press the Hold button or the OK display button (M7310 and M7324 telephones).
- 5. Record the Personal Speed Dial code and the telephone number on your Personal Speed Dial Card (located on a pull-out tray beneath your telephone) or in an appropriate place near your telephone.

**Setting Ring Type** 

- 1. Press Feature \* 6
- 2. Press 1, 2, 3 or 4 or the NEXT display button (M7310 and M7324 telephones) to choose a suitable ring type.
- 3. Press Hold (M7208 telephone) or OK display button (M7310 and M7324 telephones) or wait for 15 seconds. The display shows

  New ring stored



## **Setting Display Contrast**

- 1. Press Feature \* 7
- 2. Press 1, 2, 3 or 4 or use the UP and DOWN display buttons (M7310 and M7324 telephones) to adjust the contrast to suit the lighting in your workplace.
- 3. Press the Hold button (M7208 telephone) or the OK display button (M7310 and M7324 telephones) when you have the correct contrast adjustment.

# **Setting Ring Volume**

- 1. Press Feature \* 8 0
- 2. Press either end of the Volume Bar repeatedly until you reach the desired volume.

# **Programming Suggestions**

It is usually best to program features onto memory buttons with indicators, as the indicators can then show when some features are being used. On the M7310 telephone, features can also be programmed onto dual memory buttons without indicators.

Autodial for inside and outside calls can be programmed onto memory buttons with or without indicators.

The position of the Line , Intercom , Answer and Handsfree buttons can only be changed through Norstar Administration. The Handsfree button, which is optional, appears on the lowest button on the right side on the LCD panel if it is assigned in Administration programming. The Handsfree button takes the place of the lowest Intercom button (if programmed), and shifts Intercom line(s) and any Answer buttons upwards one position.

When you store a feature on a programmable memory button, your Norstar system automatically stores the Feature cancellation code after the feature code. You can activate the feature by pressing the memory button, and when the feature is active, you can cancel the feature by pressing the same memory button. This allows you to program only one button to activate and cancel the feature, leaving room for more Norstar features on your other programmable memory buttons.

# **Alphabetical Feature Reference Guide**

# **Access Signaling**

Your Meridian Norstar telephone can control a remote device connected to the telephone system, or dial a number on an alternate carrier by means of Access Signaling, also known as Endto-End Signaling.

Besides the standard dialpad digits and symbols, access signaling may require the following codes in some instances:

Link:

Feature 7 1

Long Tones:

Feature 8 0 8

Pause:

Feature 7 8

Run/Stop:

Feature \* 9

Timed Release:

Feature 7 2

Further information about Link, Long Tones, Timed Release, Pause, and Run/Stop is provided under separate entries for these features.

# **Access Signaling with Pulse Dialing**

If your outside lines are programmed for pulse dialing, pressing # allows you to switch from pulse to tone dialing. Once you hang-up, your telephone returns to pulse dialing. Tone dialing enables your telephone to emit Short Tones in order to communicate with devices and services that respond to tone rather that pulse signals (for example, automatic switchboards, FAX and answering machines, and Centrex features).

You can check to see if your telephone is programmed for Pulse or Tone dialing by using the System Settings feature described later in this chapter.

Whether your telephone is programmed for pulse or tone dialing, you may activate Long Tones by pressing the Long Tones feature code: Feature 8 0 8 To cancel this feature, press the Feature button.

Short Tones are used in most cases where tone dialing is required. The length of a tone can be controlled through Long Tones, which allows access to devices which require tones of a longer duration than that of a Short Tone (120ms).

# Feature Operations

## **Autodial Access Signaling**

You can store dialed sequences of up to **16 characters** in length on Autodial buttons or in Speed Dial codes. These sequences can include feature codes such as the five listed above. If, for example, you often make calls which require an access code and an account code, these codes can be stored on a memory button to be dialed with a single press. Features for Centrex and similar systems can also be stored on Autodial buttons by storing the Norstar Link sequence (Feature 7 1) followed by the Centrex or other system's feature code.

# To store an Access Signal on an Autodial button:

- 1. Press Feature \* 1

  The display prompts you to Press a key

  (A "key" is the same as a button).
- Press the memory button you want to program. The display prompts you to <u>Enter digits</u> (M7324 and M7310 telephones) or <u>Program and HOLD</u> (M7208 telephone).
- 3. Enter the complete sequence of digits and characters required for the access signal.
- 4. Press Hold or the OK display button (M7324 and M7310 telephones). The display shows

# To store a Pause between two codes (for pulse or tone lines):

- 1. Enter the first code.
- 2. Press Feature 7 8 to provide a 1.5 second pause.
- 3. Enter the second code. This code is stored as three digits in the access sequence (maximum 16 digits).

# To store a Pause between two codes (for pulse lines only):

- 1. Enter the first code.
- 2. Press \*\tau\$ to provide a 1.5 second pause.
- 3. Enter the second code. This code is stored as only one digit in the access sequence (maximum 16 digits).

If you need greater control over the interval between the dialing of the two codes, include a Run/Stop break point between the access code and the account code by storing Feature \* 9 Your first press of the Autodial button will dial the access code. When ready, press the button again to dial the code that follows the break point.

## Speed Dial Access Signaling

Access sequences can also be stored in System Speed Dial codes (01-70) or Personal Speed Dial codes (71-94). As with Autodial buttons, Speed Dial codes can store a maximum of **16 characters**. Access codes used by many people on the system are best stored as System Speed Dial entries. Personal Speed Dial is better for storing codes tailored to the needs of individual office workers. See the entries for "Speed Dial—Personal" and "Speed Dial—System" for further information and instructions.

# **Accidental Disconnect Protection**

This feature allows you to retain a call if you accidentally drop the receiver back into the cradle while trying to pick it up. As long as the receiver is picked up within one second of being dropped, the call will remain connected.

This feature does not need to be programmed all Norstar systems support Accidental Disconnect Protection.

# Feature Operations

## To retrieve your call:

1. Pick up the receiver.

OR

Press Handsfree

# Alarm Set

Your Norstar Business Communication System has an Alarm Set which is programmed and turned ON or OFF by your Installer or Service Representative in Configuration programming.

The Alarm Set is used very rarely; it signals you that a problem has occurred with your system. If a problem does arise, the Alarm Set display will show the appropriate alarm message ("Alarm" followed by a number and possibly one or two letters). For example:

Alarm 52-X-Y

These number and letters are the Alarm code, which the Installer or Service Representative needs to know in order to determine what has gone wrong.

You and your co-workers do not need to know what each numbered Alarm code means, nor how to assign the Alarm Set. This is handled only by the Installer or Service Representative.

If an Alarm message appears on the Alarm Set's display, do not panic and do not attempt to fix the system yourself. Follow the instructions below to get assistance.

- 1. Record the Alarm number.
- 2. Press the TIME display button. The display shows the time at which the alarm occurred.
- 3. Record the time shown on the display.
- 4. Press the CLEAR display button. The display shows | Alarm cleared
- 5. Call your Installer or Service Representative. They are able to identify and correct the problems which cause alarm messages. Be sure to notify them of the Alarm number you have recorded.

This feature is controlled by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Miscellaneous" section of Configuration programming.

# **Answer Groups**

An Answer Group consists of two telephones connected by means of an Answer button. This is most useful for a secretary who monitors all incoming calls to a manager's telephone, but is not necessarily responsible for answering all of them.

The Answer button is a memory button with an indicator. It is controlled through Norstar Configuration, and appears immediately above the Intercom and Handsfree buttons (if programmed) on all telephones.

Once an Answer button is assigned to a telephone, features cannot be programmed on that button. If there are not enough buttons on the telephone to represent all the lines assigned to the telephone, Handsfree button and Intercom lines take precedence over the Answer button, but all three take precedence over Line buttons and programmable memory buttons.

When an outside or inside call arrives at the manager's telephone, the indicator beside the Answer button on the secretary's telephone flashes ON and OFF, and the secretary's telephone may ring. The secretary then has the option of answering the call, or letting the manager respond to it. In most cases, the secretary would answer the call, find out who is calling, and transfer the call to the manager if appropriate.

The Answer button on the secretary's telephone stays OFF if a call is on an outside line which is shared between both telephones, if a call is forwarded to the manager's telephone, or if a call arrives at the manager's telephone on a Private Line.

As with other calls, there are two ways to respond to an incoming call which appears on the Answer button.

Feature Operations

# To answer any ringing call (inside or outside):

1. Lift the receiver

OR

Press the Handsfree button.

The call to the manager's telephone is automatically selected if it is the highest priority call ringing at the secretary's telephone. If it is not the highest priority call, you must use the procedures below.

## To answer any call (ringing or not ringing):

- 1. Press the Answer button.

  The system selects a line for the call to appear on.
- 2 Lift the receiver

OR

Press Handsfree

If more than one call is ringing at the manager's telephone, the first call to ring appears on the secretary's Answer button. The following calls will appear on the secretary's Intercom buttons if they are available.

## Calls within an Answer Group

The Answer button cannot be used to place outgoing calls. Calls from the secretary's telephone to the manager's telephone can be made using a programmed Inside Autodial button. Label the Autodial button with the manager's name, and the Answer button with "Answer" followed by the manager's name. This creates a distinction between Autodial and Answer buttons, as well as between Answer buttons for different telephones in the system.

If a secretary calls the manager or the manager calls the secretary, the call appears on an <u>Intercom</u> button. It does not appear on the secretary's <u>Answer</u> button.

Answer buttons cannot be linked together to form a chain. For example, if a call appears on an Answer button at the manager's telephone, it will not appear on the secretary's Answer button for the manager's telephone.

### Other ways to use Answer Groups

The Answer button monitors calls to specified line and Intercom numbers whether or not the telephone to which those numbers are assigned actually exists. By programming lines and telephones to an Answer Group which has no "manager's" telephone, the "secretary" can expand the number of private inside and outside lines available at the telephone with the Answer button.

More than one telephone can have an Answer button for one manager's telephone. This allows two or more secretaries to handle the calls for a busy manager. In a similar way, one secretary can handle the calls for up to four managers, using separate Answer buttons for each manager's telephone.

A small group of co-workers (up to five members) can form an Answer Group, each person having an Answer button for each of the other group members. This allows one person to take the calls of any of the others at any time.

# Assigning extra lines to a telephone

If you wish to assign a large number of lines to a telephone within your Norstar system, but do not want to use a large number of Outside Line buttons, you can use the Answer Group feature. This is especially useful for telephones with CAP Modules or for telephones which are used to answer many people's calls.

Your Installer or Service Representative can configure your system so that an Answer button monitors a non-existent telephone. Any lines you want to ring at the telephone with the Answer button can be assigned to the non-existent telephone. Calls on those lines can then be answered at the monitoring telephone, and redirected to the appropriate people.

Make sure that a telephone which has an Answer button for many other lines also has as many Intercom buttons assigned to it as possible. These Intercom buttons will be used to answer calls on the monitored lines if the Answer button is already in use.

Feature Operations

## **Answer Groups and Other Norstar Features**

Answer Groups work in conjunction with many other Norstar features, and occasionally perform very similar functions. The following descriptions show the differences between Answer Groups and similar Norstar features, as well as the interactions between Answer Groups and other call processing features. All other features work in the same way with a call ringing in an Answer Group as they do with a regular ringing call.

#### **Autodial buttons**

A secretary will almost certainly have an Inside Autodial button for the manager. In normal functioning (without the Answer Group feature), the Autodial button may or may not monitor the busy/not busy status of the manager's telephone. The secretary using the Answer button must know whether or not the manager's telephone is busy in order to efficiently deal with incoming calls. For this reason, the Answer Group feature allows the busy/not busy status of the manager's telephone to be monitored in all situations, provided that the secretary's telephone has a memory button with an indicator programmed as the Inside Autodial button for the manager's telephone.

#### **Call Forward**

If the secretary's telephone is forwarded, all calls including calls ringing at the Answer button are forwarded to the destination telephone. If the Answer button is not programmed to ring, however, calls arriving at the Answer button will not be forwarded.

If the manager's telephone is forwarded to a telephone outside the Answer Group, the Answer button will show all incoming calls as if the manager's telephone were not forwarded.

#### Callback

Call Park Callback and Transfer Callback are both directed to a particular telephone within the system: more specifically, to the telephone which attempted the Call Park or Transfer. If Callback occurs at the manager's set, it does not appear on the secretary's <a href="Answer">Answer</a> button. When the manager answers the call, the indicator beside the Inside Autodial button on the secretary's telephone appears beside the button.

#### Do Not Disturb

If the secretary's telephone is in Do Not Disturb mode, calls which normally ring at the Answer button will not ring, but the indicator beside the button will flash to show that a call is arriving at the manager's telephone.

If the manager's telephone is in Do Not Disturb mode, calls arriving at it still ring on the secretary's Answer button. If the secretary wishes to transfer a call to the manager, a normal Intercom call or Transfer will not work. In order to transfer the call, the secretary must first place it on Hold or use the Call Park feature. Then, in order to contact the manager, the secretary must use the Priority Call or Page features, or contact the manager personally. The manager can then either turn Do Not Disturb OFF, or retrieve the call from a held or parked state.

### **Priority Call**

If a telephone outside the Answer Group attempts to use the Priority Call feature to contact the Answer Group, the call will take effect at the manager's telephone. The call does not appear on the secretary's Answer button.

Feature Operations

#### Ring Again

If the manager turns Ring Again ON, the secretary's telephone is not notified when the Ring Again offer is made to the manager's telephone.

#### **Voice Call**

If a telephone outside the Answer Group attempts to make a Voice Call to the manager, and is successful, the call does not appear on the secretary's Answer button. If the Voice Call is unsuccessful, and arrives at the manager's telephone as a regular ringing call, the call appears on the secretary's Answer button.

Answer Groups are assigned by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Line Access" section of Configuration programming.

## **Autodial**

The Autodial feature allows anyone to program buttons on their Norstar telephones for one-touch dialing of outside numbers, Intercom numbers, or feature codes. Autodial telephone numbers are described in the following pages. For details on programming Autodial buttons with feature codes, refer to Feature Access.

#### Inside Autodial

For one-button access to frequently-dialed Intercom numbers within the Norstar system, use the Inside Autodial feature. Be sure that your co-workers know how to program Inside Autodial numbers, as they will probably have to change them from time to time.

Inside Autodial buttons can be programmed to dial any Intercom numbers within your Norstar system, with the exception of "0", which calls the Dial Zero Phone.

With the Central Answering Position, composed of an M7324 telephone and one or two CAP Modules, Inside Autodial buttons function in the same way as the Busy Lamp Field on an M7310 telephone. The indicators on the LCD panel indicate whether or not the telephone associated with a Autodial button is active on a call. For further details, see the "Busy Lamp Field" and "Central Answering Position" sections of this chapter.

To program Inside Autodial numbers:

- 1. Press Feature \* 2 The display shows Press a key
- 2. Press a memory button. The display shows

  Intercom #:\_

  On the M7310 telephone, remember to press the shift

button to program into the top half of a dual memory button.

- 3. Enter the Intercom code to be stored. The display shows Key programmed
- 4. Label the memory button.

#### To use Inside Autodial:

1. Press an Inside Autodial button to make a call to a selected inside number. The system selects a free inside line, then places the call.

#### OR

Press an Inside Autodial button while connected to another call. The first call is held automatically and the new call is started.


### **Default Dual Memory Buttons**

The M7310 telephone has 12 dual memory buttons which can be programmed for access to features or Autodial numbers. By using the Shift button with the dual memory buttons, you can program up to 24 features or Autodial numbers. These buttons are located above the M7310 telephone's display, as shown on the photograph below.



### The M7310 Telephone

Dual memory buttons (on the M7310 telephone only) are preprogrammed as Inside Autodial numbers corresponding to the various telephones in the Norstar system. The default arrangement of the Inside Autodial buttons is shown below. The diagram shows the defaults for a system with three-digit Intercom numbers. Norstar systems can have two, three, or four-digit Intercom numbers; the choice is controlled by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Change DNs" section of Configuration programming.



**Default Dual Memory Buttons** 

**Dual Memory Buttons** are pre-set, in the three-digit system, to dial the Intercom numbers shown above, even if there are not enough telephones in the system to match each of the numbers.

No telephone can have an Intercom button to dial its own number. Therefore, each telephone that has a number which would normally appear as a default setting has a blank button in place of its own number on the chart above.

If you move an Inside Autodial number from one button to another, it will automatically be erased from its former location. If this happens, the message Feature moved appears on the display to let you know that the move has been successful.

#### **Outside Autodial**

For one-button access to frequently dialed numbers outside your office, use the Outside Autodial feature. You can store an outside number on any memory button.

Autodial numbers are subject to Call Restrictions and Overrides. If the power is OFF for more than three days, Autodial numbers may be lost.

## To program Outside Autodial numbers:

### M7310 and M7324 Telephones

- 1. Press Feature \* 1 The display shows Press a key
- Press a memory button. The display shows
   Enter digits
   On the M7310 telephone, remember to use the shift button to program the top of a dual-memory button.
- 3. Dial the telephone number to be stored.
- 4. Press the Hold or OK button.
  The display shows Key programmed
- 5. Label the memory button.

## M7208 Telephone

- 1. Press Feature \* 1 The display shows Press a key
- 2. Press a memory button. The display shows Program and HOLD
- 3. Dial the telephone number to be stored.
- 4. Press Hold button. The display shows Key programmed
- 5. Label the memory button.

#### To use Outside Autodial:

#### With Prime Line Select Feature

 Press an outside Autodial button.
 Your call will be dialed on the your telephone's Prime Line if it is free

OR

If your Prime Line is busy, you must first manually select a free line.

#### Without Prime Line Select Feature

- 1. Select an outside line manually or use Line Pool
- Press the Autodial button.The stored number is dialed on the selected line.

#### **Prime Line Selection**

If your telephone has Prime Line selection, Autodial selects that line, pauses for two seconds and then dials the stored sequence. If your telephone has no prime line selection, you are prompted to Select a line

Autodial feature is available to all telephones in your Norstar system. Prime Lines are assigned by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Line Access" section of Configuration.



# **Automatic Line Selection**

## **Incoming Calls**

When more than one call begins to ring at your telephone at the same time, your telephone automatically selects one call when you lift the receiver or press the Handsfree button. Calls are answered in the following order:

- calls on your Prime Line (if you have one)
- calls on outside lines
- calls on inside lines.

If there is more than one call on any one type of line, the call which has been ringing the longest is answered first.

#### To override automatic line selection:

- 1. Press the line button of the call you want to answer.
- 2. Pick up the receiver.

OR

Press Handsfree

## **Outgoing Calls**

#### If your telephone has a Prime Line

1. Lift the receiver.

OR

Press Handsfree

The Prime Line is selected for your call.

Make a call.

#### If the Prime Line is in use

- 1. Select a line manually or use the Line Pool.
- 2. Lift the receiver.

OR

Press Handsfree

Make a call.

## **Automatic Phone Relocation**

If Automatic Phone Relocation is turned ON in Configuration programming, you can move your telephone to a new location within the Norstar system without losing the settings you have programmed. The Intercom number, Autodial settings, Personal Speed Dial codes and features programmed on your memory buttons remain with your telephone when it is unplugged. To move a telephone, simply unplug it from one location, and plug it in again at another. Norstar will retain the information programmed into the telephone set. If you plug a **new** telephone into the Norstar system before you reconnect the old telephone at a new location, Norstar will assign your old telephone's information to the new telephone, and your old telephone will no longer be recognized by the system. Relocate all the telephones you wish to move before you add new telephones. This will allow the telephones you are moving to retain their programmed settings.

If the telephone you are replacing is of a different type and has more buttons than your new telephone, automatic outgoing line selection (See "Lines" in this chapter) may not work with the Handsfree/Mute feature. You may have to select a line manually.

This feature is controlled by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Miscellaneous" section of Configuration programming. If you wish to have your telephone's set number changed when you relocate, see your Installer or Service Representative.

## **Auxiliary Ringer**

An Auxiliary Ringer is a loud ringer device that allows you to hear your telephone ring when you are not within hearing distance of the actual telephone set. This device must be purchased separately and properly installed before it can be used with your Norstar system.

Calls on specific lines or to specific telephones may ring at an Auxiliary Ringer if one has been installed for your office. Night Ringing Phones can also be programmed to ring the Auxiliary Ringer.

A telephone programmed to ring at the Auxiliary Ringer can receive Voice Calls, but the Auxiliary Ringer will not be activated. The Auxiliary Ringer will not ring for inside calls if the telephone that drives it is in Do Not Disturb or is forwarded to a telephone which does not drive the Auxiliary Ringer.

This feature is controlled in the "Permissions" and "Night Service" sections of Administration and by your Installer in the "Line Data" section of Configuration programming.

Feature Operations

## **Background Music/Radio**

You can listen to music or the radio through your telephone speaker if an external sound source is connected to the KSU. The music automatically stops when you make or answer a call. Adjust the level of the music with the Volume button.

## To turn Background Music ON:

1. Press the Music button.

OR

Press Feature 8 6

You will hear music through your telephone speaker.

## To cancel Background Music:

1. Press the Music button again.

OR

Press Feature # 8 6

The background music is cancelled.

This feature is controlled by your Installer in the "Miscellaneous" section of Configuration programming.

## **Busy Lamp Field**

The Busy Lamp Field (BLF) is an add-on device for the Norstar M7310 telephone that displays the busy/not busy and Do Not Disturb status of other Norstar telephones. It is particularly useful for a secretary or receptionist who is responsible for connecting calls to a number of other telephones.


The BLF replaces the regular M7310 telephone base and has a display that is mounted above and behind the dual memory buttons as shown in the photo below:



The Busy Lamp Field mounted on an M7310 Telephone

### **How the Busy Lamp Field works**

There are two states: ON (which indicates a telephone which occupied) and OFF (which indicates a telephone which is free to receive a call).



If a telephone's BLF indicator is active, the telephone may be connected on an inside or outside call, or be in Do Not Disturb mode, or be active in Norstar Administration. Calls on hold appear as idle lines on the BLF.

The 12 dual boxes on the BLF correspond to the 12 dual memory buttons on the telephone, which means that the BLF can monitor up to 24 telephones. All telephones that are to be monitored on the BLF must be programmed for Inside Autodial on one of the dual memory buttons of the telephone to which the BLF is attached. Either the top or bottom of a button may be used for this purpose. When a telephone is active on a call, the appropriate half of a BLF indicator will appear dark.

If your telephone has an Answer button for another telephone in your system, you to monitor that telephone's busy/not busy status. The indicator beside an Inside Autodial button programmed to dial the second telephone turns ON when the telephone is busy or in Do Not Disturb mode.

The M7324 telephone also has the capacity to monitor the busy/not busy status of other telephones by means of the Inside Autodial feature. Norstar telephone Intercom numbers can be programmed onto memory buttons with indicators. When the telephone which corresponds to a programmed memory button is active on a call, the indicator light is ON.

The Central Answering Position (CAP) also monitors the busy/not busy status of calls on Norstar telephones. A CAP Module must be connected to an M7324 telephone in order to monitor calls on the module's 48 Inside Autodial buttons. For further information, see the "Central Answering Position" section of this chapter.

## Feature Operations

## **Button Inquiry**

You can check the function of each Line, Intercom and memory button on your Norstar telephone. This is a very important feature, as it allows you to know what is currently programmed on a button before you attempt to reprogram the button's function.

When installing memory button labels, activate Button Inquiry so that the action of pressing the labels into place does not activate the feature programmed onto the button.

### Button Inquiry can not be used while you are on a call.

Incoming calls to your telephone will ring, and you can answer them by lifting your receiver. This turns the Button Inquiry feature OFF.

### To use Button Inquiry:

- 1. Press Feature \* 0 The display shows Press any key
- 2. Press a button you want to check.
- 3. Read the display.
- 4. Repeat Steps 2 and 3 as often as necessary.

### To return to normal operation:

1. Press Feature

OR

Press the **EXIT** display button (M7324 and M7310 telephones only)

OR

Press RIs

Press this button:	The display reads:

## **Call Duration Timer**

You can measure the duration of telephone calls for your records. The approximate length of time that the most recent call was connected, or the approximate time the current call has been connected, is displayed when requested.

Call Duration Timer begins to time a call on an outside line 10 seconds after the line is selected, whether or not the call is connected. On an inside line, timing begins only once the connection between telephones has been made.

Call Duration Timer also works for Voice Calls; if you receive a Voice Call, the time displayed when you use the Call Duration Timer feature is for your last call, whether that was a Voice Call or a regular ringing call.

#### To measure the length of calls:

Press the Timer button.
 OR
 Press Feature 7 7

Feature Operations

You can see the approximate length of the current or most recent call. The length is shown in hours, minutes and seconds. The time is displayed for a few seconds.

**Note:** The Call Duration Timer feature does not work for calls which are active while you are setting your system's clock.

## Feature Operations

## Call Forward (All Calls)

If you wish to have another person answer your calls or want to answer your calls at another location, forward your calls to another telephone. Any inside or outside calls can then be directed to that telephone. If calls come to your telephone on outside lines that do not appear on the telephone to which your calls are forwarded, the calls will still go through using Intercom lines.

When Call Forward is used, the line indicators flash for incoming calls. Although the call has been forwarded to another telephone, you can still answer it by pressing the flashing line indicator. You can also continue to make outgoing calls while Call Forward is active.

#### To use Call Forward:

1. Press the Call Fwd button.

#### OR

Press Feature 4 appears on the display.

2. Dial the Intercom number of the telephone to which the calls will be sent.

#### OR

Press the Inside Autodial button for the telephone to which the calls are sent.

When forwarding is in use, the display shows

Forward> <name> where <name> can be a

programmed name or the set number. The > symbol
indicates that the call is being transferred to the specified
telephone.

#### To cancel Cali Forward:

1. Press the Call Fwd button again.

#### OR

Press Feature # 4

#### OR

Press CANCEL (M7324 and M7310 telephones only). The display shows Cancel Forward for a few seconds, then returns to the current time and date display.

## Call Forward (No Answer)

Call Forward (No Answer) forwards all unanswered calls arriving at one telephone to another specified telephone. The destination telephone is controlled in Norstar Administration programming, as is the number of rings required before the call is forwarded. If you are often absent from your desk, you may wish to have Call Forward (No Answer) assigned to your telephone, so that all inside and outside calls which you are unable to answer can be answered by an assigned co-worker.

Call Forward (No Answer) strongly resembles Norstar's Delayed Ring Transfer feature. The differences between these features are two: where Delayed Ring Transfer forwards all calls on a specific line, Call Forward (No Answer) forwards all calls arriving at a specific telephone, regardless of what line the call is on; and where Delayed Ring Transfer is turned ON or OFF for your entire system, Call Forward (No Answer) is controlled individually for each telephone.

When you telephone forwards a call using the Call Forward (No Answer) feature, the telephone which receives the call shows the display message <name> <name> where the first <name> is the programmed name (or default number) of the line which the incoming call is on or the Norstar telephone which originated the call, and the second <name> is the programmed name or Intercom number of the telephone which forwarded the call.

If the call was originally placed at a telephone within your system, the display at that telephone shows the message

\[
\left(\text{name} \right) \left(\text{name}\right) \text{ is the programmed} \]
name or Intercom number of the telephone which is being called, and the second \(\text{name}\right) \text{ is the programmed name or Intercom} \)
number of the telephone to which the call is being forwarded.

Call Forward (No Answer) is turned ON or OFF, and the Forward Delay is set, in the "Permissions" section of Administration programming.

## **Call Forward Override**

If calls have been forwarded to your telephone, you can override Call Forward and call the forwarding party in the normal manner. This is useful when you have an important call for the person, or if you want to ask that forwarding be cancelled.

This feature is available at all telephones in your Norstar system to which another telephone's calls have been forwarded. Only the telephone to which the calls are forwarded call use the Call Forward Override feature.

Call Forward Override is sometimes called 'secretarial filtering'. If, for example, your manager places his or her telephone on Call Forward to the receptionist, all inside or outside calls to the manager will go to the receptionist's telephone. If the receptionist wants to contact the manager for any reason—for example, if a visitor has arrived—dialing the manager's Intercom number from the receptionist's telephone will override the Call Forward feature, and the call will go through. The manager can be called by either pressing the correct Autodial button, or dialing the manager's Intercom number.

## **Call Identification**

Your telephone display shows the name or telephone number of the person you are talking to on all inside calls. When making an inside call, the display shows whether the telephone being called is busy, on another call, or is using Do Not Disturb or Call Forward.

Call Identification displays appear even if you are active on a call. When a new inside or outside call comes into your telephone, the display shows the Call Identification message for a few seconds before returning to the display message associated with your active call. Call Identification messages will not overwrite feature prompts.

When you make an outside call, the display shows the dialed number. When an outside call arrives at your telephone while you are busy on another call, the display shows the name or number of the line which the call is on. If your telephone is idle when an outside call arrives at your telephone, the display will not change.

For example, an incoming Intercom call from "Room 56" would appear on the display as shown below. The example shows the display of an M7324 or an M7310 telephone; on an M7208 telephone, the message is the same. ROOM 56 calling

### Call Park

Call Park is like Hold, except that it allows a parked call to be retrieved from any telephone within your Norstar system by means of a Retrieve Park code (101-109). When you park a call, your system assigns the Retrieve Park code, and the message Parked on 10X (where X is a number between 1 and 9) appears on your telephone display. You can then inform your coworkers of the Retrieve Park code so that the appropriate person responds to the call.

When you park a call, a PAGE display button appears in order to make paging easier and an EXIT display button appears in case you do not wish to use the Page feature. These buttons stay active until one of them is pressed, until the parked call is retrieved, or until the person who parked the call performs another activity on the telephone.

If parked call is not retrieved after a specified amount of time, Callback occurs at the telephone which parked the call. For a busy office, this is more advantageous than the Hold feature, as it is an automatic reminder of calls which have been waiting for a long time. For more information, see the "Call Park Callback" section of this chapter.

es ON ark uny

If a outside call is parked, the indicator beside the line flashes ON and OFF, and the call can be retrieved using the Retrieve Park code on an Intercom line, or by pressing the line button on any telephone which has a button for that line. If an inside call is parked, the Intercom button becomes idle, in order to allow that Intercom button to be used for another call.

You cannot park a call which you have placed on Hold. In order to park the call, you must first reconnect yourself to it, and then activate the Call Park feature.

Conference Calls cannot be parked. In order to transfer a Conference Call using Call Park; split the Conference, park both parties, and inform your co-worker of your action. When the calls are retrieved, the Conference Call can be re-established.

Feature Operations

#### To park a call:

- 1. Answer an incoming call and determine that the call should be parked.
- 2. Press the Call Park button

#### OR

Press Feature 7 4

The display shows the Retrieve Park code:

Parked on: 10x where x is a digit between 1 and 9. A PAGE display button appears on M7324 and M7310 telephones.

- 3. Record the code.
- 4. Use the Page feature ( PAGE or Feature 6 0 ) to inform your co-workers of the Retrieve Park code and announce whom the call is for.

#### To retrieve a parked call:

- 1. When the Page announcement is aired, record the Retrieve Park code.
- 2. Lift the telephone receiver.
- 3. Select an Intercom line in order to hear an inside dial tone.
- 4. Press the digits of the Retrieve Park code on the dialpad, for example: 101
  You are then connected to your call.

## **Call Park Callback**

Callback to your telephone occurs if you have used the Call Park features and the call is not retrieved. After a specified time, the outside call returns to your telephone. Callback is a convenient feature for receptionists, as it allows them to take messages from outside callers. Callback does not occur with inside calls.

If the caller hangs up, Callback may still occur. When you answer the Callback call, you will hear a dial tone.

Callback occurs only at the telephone that parked the call. If the call came in on an outside line, the Callback call rings on that line if it is assigned to the telephone; otherwise, the call rings on an Intercom line. If no free line is available, the Callback call is transferred to the Prime Phone.

On a system that has a Prime Phone and Delayed Ring Transfer activated, a Callback call will be directed to the Prime Phone after three rings if the original telephone does not answer. If a Callback line is not answered at the Prime Phone within three minutes, the outside call is disconnected.

Because a Callback call is no longer in the "parked" state, it cannot be answered using the Retrieve Park code. It can only be answered at the telephone which originally parked the call.

Call Pickup, Call Forward, and the Auxiliary Ringer operate normally in relation to calls which activate the Callback feature. Do Not Disturb cancels the ringing for a Callback call, but not the flashing of the indicator.

Callback cannot occur at a telephone that is initializing your system, or is in an Administration, Configuration, or Maintenance session.

# To reconnect with your original caller (M7324 and M7310 telephones):

 Press the CALLBACK display button OR

Press the line button which the call is on.
You are connected with the call you originally parked.
If you have parked more than one call, pressing

CALLBACK will connect you with the call which has been waiting to be answered for the longest period of time.

To reconnect with your original caller (M7208 telephone): On the M7208 telephone, a call arriving at your telephone through the Callback feature will appear as a regular ringing call.

The amount of time before a Call Park Callback occurs is programmed by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Call Handling" section of Configuration programming.

## Call Pickup (Directed)

Call Pickup (Directed) enables you to answer any telephone which is ringing in your Norstar system by specifying that telephone's Intercom number. This allows calls to be answered at any telephone, regardless of its Pickup Group assignment.

In order for a call to be picked up, it must be ringing at a telephone. If, for example, the auxiliary ringer is ringing, but the call is not programmed to ring at a telephone, the call cannot be answered using Call Pickup. It must be answered at the telephone with a flashing indicator or using the Trunk Answer feature.

If a call is ringing in an Answer Group, Call Pickup (Directed) can be used to answer the call; entering either the secretary's Intercom number or the manager's Intercom number will connect you to the call.

## To use Call Pickup (Directed):

1. Press Feature 7 6

OR

Press a programmed Directed Pickup button. The display shows Pick up:

2. Enter the Intercom number of the telephone which is ringing

OR

Press the Inside Autodial button for the telephone which is ringing.

You are immediately connected to that call.

If you decide not to answer a ringing call once you have activated Call Pickup (Directed), you can cancel the feature by pressing Feature instead of entering an Intercom number or pressing an Inside Autodial button.

This feature is controlled by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Call Handling" section of Configuration programming.

## Call Pickup (Group)

Pickup Groups ensure that calls are answered by the most appropriate people when someone is out of the office. Any member of a Pickup group can answer an inside or outside call ringing at another telephone in the group. Your office can have up to nine Pickup groups.

Call Pickup is used to connect with an outside call coming in on a line which does not ring at your telephone. If you attempt to use Call Pickup on a call which is ringing at your telephone, the display will show Pickup denied and an error tone will sound.

In order for you to pick up a call, it must be on a line which is programmed to ring at another telephone in your system (this is done by the Installer in Norstar Configuration). Call Pickup cannot be used to access Private Lines.

## To use Call Pickup (Group):

1. Press the Pick-up button.

OR

Press Feature 7 5

The highest priority call ringing in the group is answered. Priority is as follows:

- Prime Line (if applicable)
- outside line
- inside line.

The picked up call appears on the indicator beside a line or Intercom button.

You can pick up more than one call without losing your first call:

## To pick up a second call

- 1. Press a line button next to a flashing indicator. The first call is automatically put on hold.
- 2. Press the Pick-up button.

OR

Press Feature 7 5

This feature is controlled in the "Permissions" section of Administration programming.

## **Call Restrictions and Overrides**

#### Restrictions

Call Restrictions are used to prohibit certain phone numbers, area codes, or types of calls from being used on the Norstar system. These Restrictions can be applied to specific telephones or telephone lines through Administration programming.

The maximum length of a Restriction sequence is **eight characters**. The maximum number of Restrictions allowed in any Norstar system is **30**.

A call can be prevented by a Restriction placed on either the line or the telephone set being used. Restrictions applied to a telephone set affect calls from that telephone set on any line. Restrictions applied to a line affect calls on that line from any telephone set.

#### **Overrides**

An Override is a programmed sequence of digits that bypass an active Restriction. This enables selected lines and telephones to make calls that would otherwise be prevented by Norstar system Administration.

The maximum length of an Override sequence is **14 characters**. The maximum number of Overrides in any Norstar system is **ten**.


Overrides applied to a telephone set permit calls on any line from that telephone set, except where specific Line Restrictions apply. Similarly, Overrides applied to a line permit calls on that line from any telephone set, except where specific Set Restrictions apply.

For another method of overriding Restrictions, see the "Restriction Passwords" section of this chapter.

Restrictions and Overrides are programmed and applied to telephones and lines in the "Restrictions" and "Overrides" sections of Administration programming. For further information, see the "Restrictions" and "Overrides" sections of the Administration chapter of this Guide.

## **Central Answering Position**

The Central Answering Position (CAP) consists of one or two Norstar CAP Modules connected to a Norstar M7324 telephone.



#### **The Central Answering Position**

The CAP Module displays the busy/not busy and Do Not Disturb status of the telephones in your system by using the triangular indicators beside Inside Autodial buttons. Buttons on a CAP Module can only be programmed as Inside Autodial buttons. They cannot be programmed as Outside Autodial or feature buttons.

Feature Operations

The triangular indicator beside an Inside Autodial button on a CAP Module is ON or OFF, depending upon the status of the Norstar telephone which is associated with the Inside Autodial button.

#### The indicator is ON

When the telephone is active on an inside or outside line

When a call at the telephone has been put on Hold by another person

OR

When the telephone is using the Do Not Disturb feature.

#### The indicator is OFF

When the telephone is idle

OR

When the telephone is ringing

OR

When the telephone has one or more calls on Hold, but is not connected to any active calls.


If you dial the Intercom number of a telephone, instead of using an existing Inside Autodial button, the indicator beside the button on the CAP Module will still turn ON. If no Inside Autodial button is programmed for an Intercom number, the status of that telephone is not monitored by the CAP Module.


## **Default settings**

When a CAP Module is first plugged into your system each button is preset to automatically dial an Intercom (inside) number.

Your telephone system may have two, three, or four digit Intercom numbers, which are controlled by your Installer in Configuration programming. The CAP Module recognizes which system it is being plugged into, and assigns pre-determined (default) values for the Inside Autodial buttons accordingly.

The diagram below shows the three-digit system which ranges from 221 to 268 and 269 to 316; a two-digit system ranges from 21 to 68 and 69 to 99 (the remainder of the buttons will be blank); a four digit system ranges from 2221 to 2268 and 2269 to 2316.





If an Inside Autodial number is already programmed on your M7324 telephone or on another CAP Module attached to the telephone, it will still appear in its default position. If an Autodial number is not assigned to a telephone within your system, it may still appear on a CAP Module. If you press this button, the telephone display will show the message Not in service

Your Autodial number may be pre-programmed on a CAP Module. If you press this button, the telephone display shows

If you wish to have a CAP Module (or a second CAP Module) added to your M7324 telephone, contact your Installer or Service Representative.

## **Centrex Features**

If your system is located behind a Centrex system, Meridian Norstar offers you convenient access to Centrex features that require extra signals from the dialpad. Codes for Link, Long Tones, Pause, Run/Stop and Timed Release are provided below. These codes, along with other digits required by your Centrex, can be programmed onto Autodial buttons or placed in Speed Dial so that you can activate special features with a minimum number of button presses.

The basic Centrex feature codes are as follows:

Link

Feature 7 1

Long Tones:

Feature 8 0 8

Pause:

Feature 7 8

Run/Stop:

Feature \* 9

Timed Release:

Feature 7 2

If your outside lines are programmed for pulse dialing, pressing # allows you to switch from pulse to tone dialing. When you hang-up, your telephone returns to pulse dialing.

Further information about Link, Long Tones, Pause, Run/Stop, and Timed Release is provided in this chapter under separate entries for each feature.

See also **Access Signaling** for information about using Meridian Norstar telephones to contact remote devices and gain access to alternate telephone carriers.

#### **Autodial Centrex Features**

Program an Autodial button on your telephone to activate a Centrex feature with one press. For example, if you must press Link to activate your Centrex transfer feature, follow the steps below to create an Autodial Link button.

## To program an Autodial Centrex feature button:

- 1. Press Feature \* 3
- 2. Press the memory button on which you want to store the feature.
- 3. Press the desired Centrex feature code, for example, Feature 7 1 to store a Link signal.
- 4. Label the button Link

Features for Centrex and similar systems can also be stored on Autodial buttons by storing the Norstar Link sequence (Feature 7 1) followed by the Centrex or other system's feature code.

The steps on the preceding page allow you to store only feature codes on a button. If you want the button to store the Link signal plus an extension number to which you frequently transfer calls, such as the main reception desk, follow the steps below.

# To program an Autodial Centrex feature and a dialing sequence:

- 1. Press Feature \* 1
- 2. Press the memory button on which you want to store the sequence.
- 3. Press the desired Centrex feature code.
- 4. Press the sequence of digits or characters to be dialed after the feature code. The button can store up to 16 total characters, the same number that it takes to fill the first line of the telephone display.
- 5. Press the Hold button or press the OK display button (M7324 or M7310 telephones only) to end the programming.
- 6. Label the button.

## **Speed Dial Centrex Features**

Centrex features, with or without additional dialed characters, can be stored in System Speed Dial codes (01-70) or Personal Speed Dial codes (71-94). As with Autodial buttons, Speed Dial codes can store a maximum of **16 characters** (including a single character ("F") for each press of the Feature button). Centrex features that are used by many people on the system are appropriate for System Speed Dial entries. Personal Speed Dial is better for storing features that are tailored to individual requirements. For example, a person who regularly places his or her telephone in Call Forward to a particular telephone in the Centrex system could program one Speed Dial code to dial the Centrex Link and Call Forward codes and the extension number of the other telephone.

## Conference/Transfer

Conference/Transfer establishes a three-party conference between two calls at your telephone. This feature allows you to make or answer a call and set up a conference with a new or existing call.

Establish each call individually before using the Conference feature. If the second call is busy or there is no answer, disconnect the line by pressing Ris This will not disconnect the original call.

When a three-way conference call is established, the display on one Norstar telephone connected to the call shows both other parties in the call. An outside call appears as the number of the line it is on; an inside call appears as the Intercom number or programmed name of the telephone.

#### To establish a Conference call:

- 1. Make or answer the first call.
- 2. Put the call on hold. This can be done automatically (by pressing another Line or Intercom button) or manually (by pressing Hold ).
- 3. Dial the second call.

OR

Press the line button of an existing held call.

4. When the second call is connected, press Conf/Trans
OR

Press Feature 3

The display shows Press held line

5. Press the line button of the first held call to establish a conference. The temporary message

Conference call appears on the display. The display then changes to <name> <name> where the first <name> represents the first call, and the second <name> the second call.

### To establish a Conference call using Inside Autodial:

- 1. Make or answer the first call.
- 2. Press an Inside Autodial button.
- 3. Follow steps 3 through 5 above.

#### **Conference Operations**

Once a conference is connected, several operations can be used:

- Consultation

- Split a Conference
- Disconnect one party
- Transfer from a Conference
- Independently Hold two calls

#### Consultation

Consultation allows you to put a Conference call on hold while you consult with someone in your office or on another line.

1. To consult with an outside party while connected on a Conference call, press another Line or Intercombutton to make or answer a call.

The Conference call is put on hold automatically.

#### OR

Press Hold The conference call is put on Hold and you are free to make or answer a call, or to consult with someone in your office.

The two other parties will still be able to confer.

2. To reconnect to the conference, press either of the held line buttons.

## Disconnect one party

This method of using Conference/Transfer allows you to disconnect one of the parties from the Conference Call and remain connected with the other:

- 1. Press the Line or Intercom button of the call that you wish to disconnect.
- 2. The other party is automatically placed on hold.
- 3. Press Ris to disconnect.
- 4. Press the held line button to return to the first party.

## Independently Hold two calls

Another way to Hold a conference Call is to use both the Split and Consultation forms of Holding the call. This will place the two parties on Hold independently (unable to consult with one another).

## To put the two parties on Hold independently:

- 1. Press the Line or Intercom button of one party. The other party is automatically placed on hold.
- 2. Press Hold The second party is placed on Hold. The two parties are unable to consult with one another.

#### To re-join the conference call:

- 1. Press the Line or Intercom button of one held call.
- 2. Press Conf/Trans
- 3. Press the Line or Intercom button of the second held call. The conference call is re-established.

### Split a Conference

Splitting a Conference Call allows the originator of the conference to talk with one of the parties while the other party is on hold.

#### To split a conference call:

1. Press the Line or Intercom button of the party with whom you wish to speak. The other party is automatically placed on hold.

#### To re-join the conference call:

1. Press the Line or Intercom button of the held call. You are reconnected to the conference call.

#### Transfer from a Conference

The Transfer feature allows you to leave the other two parties conferring while you disconnect from the conference. One of the two parties remaining must be inside the Norstar system. You cannot connect two outside calls with this procedure.

## To transfer a call to another telephone within your office

- 1. Establish a conference call.
- 2. Press Ris

OR

Press TRANSFER (M7310 and M7324 telephones only).

#### To connect two outside calls

- 1. Establish a conference call with two outside lines.
- Put the Conference on Hold. You cannot disconnect yourself without dropping the conference call. In order for the two outside lines to remain connected, they must be linked through your telephone set.
- 3. Monitor the active lines by occasionally reconnecting with the call. The indicator will stay ON until you disconnect from the conference call, even if the other parties have disconnected.
- 4. After both parties have hung up, press Ris

## **Contrast Adjustment**

The contrast on your telephone display can be adjusted so you can read it more easily under different lighting conditions. The contrast is different if you are standing or sitting (and have a different angle of vision to the telephone), so make sure you adjust the contrast level from the position in which you use the telephone most often.

### M7310 and M7324 Telephones

- 1. Press Feature \* 7
- 2. Press the UP or DOWN display button to adjust the display to the desired level.
- 3. Press the OK display button

OR

Press Feature

OR

Wait 15 seconds to store the new contrast level.

#### M7208 Telephone

- 1. Press Feature \* 7
- 2 Press 1, 2, 3 or 4 from the dialpad to adjust the display to the desired level.
- 3. Press Hold

OR

Press Feature

OR

Wait 15 seconds to store the new contrast level.

## **Delayed Ring Transfer (DRT)**

Delayed Ring Transfer forwards your unanswered outside calls to a Prime Phone. This feature ensures that your outside calls will be answered.

If one of your outside lines is assigned a Prime Phone which is using Delayed Ring Transfer, an unanswered outside call on that line will begin to ring at the Prime Phone after a specified number of rings. The Prime Phone displays the message DRT I ine <name> where <name> is the number or programmed name of the line that the call is on.

This feature is controlled by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Call Handling" section of Configuration programming.

### Dial-0 Set

The Dial Zero Phone is the one telephone in your Norstar system which can be reached from any other telephone merely by dialing "0". This is most useful if it is located at the receptionist's or secretary's desk or in a central location. The Dial Zero Phone is most often part of a Central Answering Position (CAP), or has been assigned as a Prime Phone and is used to monitor much of your office's telephone activity.

Using the Messages feature, the Dial Zero Phone can send up to 30 messages, which allows for better communication between you and your co-workers.

In addition to the presence of a Dial Zero Phone, Norstar also supports a Night Dial Zero Phone. See "Night Service" in this chapter for further details.

This feature is controlled by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Miscellaneous" section of Configuration programming.

## Do Not Disturb (DND)

If you activate DND while you are not active on a call, you are in DND mode. DND mode suppresses ringing, paging announcements and Ring Again. It stops all tones and ringing, except Held Line Reminder. When the telephone is in DND mode, the display will continually show the Do not disturb reminder message. An incoming outside call will cause the line indicator to flash, but the call will be forwarded to the Prime Phone if it is not answered at another telephone which has the same line. This feature is useful when you wish to program your telephone without interruption.

If you press DND while an outside call is ringing at your telephone, the call will be transferred to the Prime Phone. For more information, see the "Selective Call Forward" section of this chapter.

A telephone in DND mode can still be used for outgoing calls.

#### To activate Do Not Disturb:

1. Press the DND button.

OR

Press Feature 8 5

The display shows Do not disturb

All tones and ringing except for Held Line Reminder tones are stopped. Outside calls are transferred to the Prime Phone.

## Feature Operations

#### To cancel Do Not Disturb:

1. Press the DND button again.

OR

Press Feature # 8 5 The temporary message Allow calls appears on the display.

## **Do Not Disturb Override**

If the telephone you are trying to reach is in Do Not Disturb mode, and it is essential that you get through, you may be able to use the Priority Call feature to override the Do Not Disturb setting.

By making a Priority Call, you are effectively placing a Voice Call to your co-worker. Your co-worker will have the option of denying your Priority Call, but will nonetheless be notified that an important message is waiting.

For further information about Priority Call, see the "Priority Call" section of this chapter.

This feature is controlled in the "Permissions" section of Administration programming.

## **Emergency Transfer/Power Failure Cut-Through**

This feature provides basic telephone service if the power fails or if a system error occurs.

A dial or push-button single line telephone must be connected to the Key Service Unit (KSU). This single line telephone acts independently of the Norstar system and can be used as an Emergency Telephone.

Each KSU can support two Emergency Telephones, and each Trunk Module can support an additional Emergency Telephone.

Power failures can be reported using these telephones.
Check the appropriate area of your *Norstar Modular Programming Record* to find out whether or not you have an Emergency Telephone or , if no other information is available, contact your Installer or Service Representative.

## **Erasing a Button**

To erase the setting on a programmable button, follow the procedures below:

#### M7310 and M7324 Telephones

- 1. Press Feature \* 1 The display shows Press a key
- 2. Press the button you wish to erase.
  The display shows Enter digits
- 3. Press the OK display button
  OR
  Press Hold
  The display shows Key erased

#### M7208 Telephone

- 1. Press Feature \* 1 The display shows Press a key
- Press the button you wish to erase.
   The display shows Program and HOLD
- 3. Press Hold The display shows Key erased

# Feature Access

Every Norstar telephone has numerous buttons that can be programmed to dial frequently called numbers (see Autodial), or to activate Norstar features. Any button not programmed as an outside Line, an Intercom line, or Hangsfree is available for programming features.

You can program any feature on a memory button, whether or not your system supports that feature. Pressing a programmed memory button is like pressing the entire feature code manually, but easier. If the feature is not supported by your system, pressing the memory button will cause an error message and tone.

When you store a feature on a programmable memory button, your Norstar system automatically stores the cancellation code after the feature code, if a cancellation code exists for the feature. Long Tones, for example, does not have a feature cancellation code, and therefore does not create a toggled button. For toggled memory buttons, you can activate the feature by pressing the memory button, and when the feature is active, you can cancel the feature by pressing the same memory button. If a feature does not have a cancellation code, the Feature button can often be used to turn the feature OFF.

Feature Operations If your system does not support a particular feature, check your Administration and Configuration settings. You may be able to change your Administration settings, or get your Installer to change your Configuration settings, to allow the use of that feature.

#### To program for Feature Access:

- 1. Press Feature \* 3
  The display shows Press a key
- 2. Press any memory button except the Line, Intercom or Happing buttons.

  The display shows Feature code:

  (On the M7310, remember to press the shift button before programming the top half of the dual memory buttons.)
- 3. Press Feature and the desired feature code. The display shows Key programmed

#### To Erase a Feature:

### M7310 and M7324 Telephones

- 1. Press Feature \* 1 The display shows Press a key
- 2. Press the memory button you wish to erase. The display shows Enter digits
- 3. Press the OK display button

OR

Press Hold

The display shows Key erased

## M7208 Telephone

- 1. Press Feature 1 The display shows Press a key
- 2. Press the button you wish to erase.

The display shows Program and HOLD

3. Press Hold

The display shows Key erased

## Flexible Numbering Plan

Your Norstar system can have two, three, or four-digit Intercom numbers. It can also have one to four-digit Line Pool Access codes which must be entered before you can use one of Norstar's nine Line Pools. These numbers are controlled by your Installer in Configuration programming, but it may be interesting for you to understand how they are related.

All Intercom numbers must all be the same number of digits in length, but Line Pool Access codes do not have to be the same length as one another.

Intercom numbers and Line Pool Access codes cannot begin with the same digit. If two Line Pool Access codes begin with the same digit, they must then be the same length. For example, the Line Pool Access code 2345 can co-exist with code 321, but not with code 231.

No Intercom number or Line Pool Access code can begin with the numbers "0" or "1"; "0" is reserved for the Dial Zero Phone, and "1" is reserved as the first digit of Retrieve Park codes.

Symbols such as an asterisk (\*) or a pound sign (#) cannot be used in Intercom numbers or Line Pool Access codes.

The same sequence of digits cannot be used for two Intercom numbers, for two Line Pool Access codes, or for both an Intercom number and a Line Pool Access code. All numbers must be unique.

For more information about Intercom numbers and Line Pool Access code, see the "Intercom numbers" and "Line Pools" sections of this chapter.

This feature is controlled by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Change DNs" section of Configuration programming.

## Feature Operations

## Handsfree/Mute

allows you to use your telephone without picking up the receiver. The Mute function allows you to turn OFF the microphone temporarily if you wish to speak privately with someone else in the room.

Handsfree is available to the system or to an individual telephone through Administration programming. When is in use, you can adjust the volume of the Handsfree/Mute speaker with the Volume button.

You may wish to photocopy the "Using Handsfree/Mute" Job Aid in the Job Aids chapter of this Guide and distribute it to your coworkers. This Job Aid lists hints to be followed for the most effective Handsfree communication.

### Using Handsfree /Mute

To make a call:

- 1. Press Handsfree
- 2. If no line is selected, press a free line. Once a line is selected the Handsfree/Mute microphone is turned ON.
- 3. Make a call.

While on a regular call:

- 1. Press Handsfree
- 2. Hang-up the receiver and continue your call.

## To mute the microphone

- 1. While on a Handsfree call, press Handsfree
  The display shows Microphone muted
  The indicator ▶ flashes beside the Handsfree button to show that the caller cannot hear you, although you can still hear the caller.
- 2. Press Handsfree again to turn the microphone back ON to continue your Handsfree call.

#### To end Handsfree:

Lift the receiver to conduct a private conversation.
 OR

Press Ris to end the call.

This feature is controlled under the "Full Handsfree" and the "HF Answerback" sub-headings in the "Permissions" section of Administration programming.

### Headset

A headset provides convenient Handsfree telephone operation while maintaining the privacy of calls.

When you plug a headset into your telephone while on a call, your telephone microphone and speaker (or your receiver if you are on a regular call) are turned OFF and your headset microphone and earpiece are turned ON. If you unplug your headset while on a call, your telephone microphone and speaker turn ON (the call becomes a Handsfree call).

While you are using the headset, the receiver and the "hook-switch" do not work. To cancel a call, press RIS

Make sure you have Handsfree assigned to your telephone if you wish to use a headset. If you do not have a Handsfree button, you cannot turn your microphone ON and OFF nor use Handsfree to select an incoming call.

If you press Handsfree while you are active on a headset call, your headset microphone turns ON or OFF. If you press Handsfree while an incoming call is ringing, the Handsfree/Mute feature selects the line that the ringing call is on, and enables your headset so that you can respond to the call.

The Headset volume can be adjusted using the Volume button.

While you are using the headset, tones associated with some features (such as Page and Held Line Reminder) will be transmitted through your telephone's speaker rather than through your Headset.

Handsfree/Mute is controlled under the "Full Handsfree" and the "HF Answerback" sub-headings in the "Permissions" section of Administration programming.

## **Hearing Aid Compatibility**

The receivers on your Norstar M7324, M7310 and M7208 telephones are compatible with hearing aids.

## Feature Operations

#### Hold

The Hold feature is used to temporarily suspend a call while you perform another task.

When a call is on hold, its indicator flashes on all telephones having access to that line. Any of these telephones can be used to retrieve the call. This is useful when transferring a call within your office.

A call can be held either by pressing the Hold button or by activating another line on your telephone (Automatic Hold).

The **Exclusive Hold** feature assures that your call can only be retrieved at the telephone from which it was put on hold. The line indicator does not flash on any other telephone.

**Listen on Hold** allows a person who has been put on hold to hangup their receiver and continue working while listening for the other person to return to the call.

#### To use Automatic Hold:

While on a call:

1. Press another line button.

OR

Press an Autodial button.

You can return to the first call by pressing its line button. You can switch from one call to another using the line buttons.

## To transfer using Automatic Hold:

While on a call:

1. Press another line button and call the telephone to which the first call will be transferred.

OR

Press an Autodial button.

2. Tell the person you are calling on which line the first call is being held. The destination telephone must have a button for the line which the call is on. Pressing this button transfers the call.

Refer to the Conference/Transfer or Transfer features for other methods of transferring calls.

#### To use Exclusive Hold:

While on an outside call:

1. Press the Exclusive Hold button.

OR

Press the Feature button and then the Hold button.

OR

Press Feature 7 9

The call on hold can only be picked up on the telephone from which it was put on hold.

#### To use Listen on Hold:

Using the Hold button:

- 1. While on a call, press Hold
- 2. Hang up the receiver.
- 3. Press the line button for the call.
- 4. Listen through the speaker.
- 5. When you are ready to speak, lift the receiver OR

Handsfree press

Using the Handsfree button:

- While on a call, press Handsfree twice. The call is muted.
- 2. Hang up the receiver.
- 3. Listen through the speaker.
- When you are ready to speak, lift the receiver OR

Handsfree press

**Feature** Operations

#### **Held Line Reminder**

When an outside call is placed on hold, two periodic reminder tones are heard until the call is removed from hold. Inside calls on hold do not activate this feature.

#### Music/Tone/Silence on Hold for Outside Callers

A caller on hold hears either music, a periodic tone or silence depending on the setting for your office system.

Held Line Reminder and Music/Tones/Silence on Hold are controlled by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Call Handling" section of Configuration programming.

## **Intercom (Inside Telephone) Numbers**

Communication inside your office is easy with Norstar inside telephone numbers. Each telephone in the Norstar system has its own two, three, or four-digit Intercom number. The length of your system's Intercom numbers is controlled by your Installer or Service Representative in Configuration programming. These numbers can only be called on the Intercom lines of your system.

Each Norstar telephone can have up to eight Intercom lines assigned to it which can be used to contact other telephones within your Norstar system.

The lowest default Intercom numbers in any system are 21 for the two-digit system, 221 for the three digit-system, and 2221 for the four-digit system. Your system can have a combination of 120 Intercom numbers and outside telephone lines. Normally, the range of your Intercom numbers will begin at 21, 221, or 2221 and end at no more than 44, 340, or 2340. They can, however, be changed by your Installer or Service Representative.

#### To use Intercom Numbers:

- Press a free <u>Intercom</u> line button.
   The indicator is turned ON.
   A dial tone is heard.
- 2. Dial the Intercom number from the list in the Job Aids chapter of this Guide.
  When dialing is complete, Call Identification is displayed at both the originating and destination telephones.
  The display shows Calling <name> at the originating telephone and <name> calling at the destination telephone.

**Note:** Ensure that all your co-workers know how to use Intercom lines to contact one another.

Distribute a list of names and Intercom numbers to everyone on your office telephone system. Refer to the Job Aids chapter this Guide for a table that you can photocopy and fill in.

This feature is controlled by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Line Access" and "Change DNs" sections of Configuration programming.

## Language Choice

The buttons, labels and display information on your Norstar telephones are provided in a bilingual format. On systems sold in the United States, the two languages are English and Spanish. If your company has bought a Canadian system, the two languages are English and French.

When your system is first installed, the default language is English. If you wish to change the setting, follow the steps below.

To make a Language Choice:

1.	Press Feature * 5 0 1
	The display shows In English
	OR
	Press Feature * 5 0 2
	The display shows En español or
	En français depending upon the system your
	company has purchased.

The Language Choice feature can be assigned to a programmable memory button using the code: Feature \* 5 0 1

The memory button can then be used to alternate between the two available languages. Label the Language Choice memory button: Language

Feature Operations

### **Last Number Redial**

Last Number Redial saves time when you are trying to reach an outside number that was previously busy or unanswered. This feature automatically redials the last outside number dialed. The maximum length of a stored number is **16 digits**.

#### To use Last Number Redial:

Press Feature 5
 OR
 Press Last No. after getting a dial tone on an outside line.

If a line is not selected before Last Number Redial is used, Automatic Line Selection selects a free line if one is available.

### Lines

Inside Line Access (see also "Intercom Numbers")

You can use Intercom (inside) lines to make and answer calls within the Norstar system. Each telephone has its own associated two, three or four-digit Intercom number, and up to eight Intercom lines which can be used to contact other Norstar telephones. Make sure all the people in your office are supplied with a list of Intercom numbers.

#### To use inside (Intercom) lines:

If an <u>Intercom</u> line is free, the indicator beside the button is OFF.

- Press an Intercom line button.
   The indicator turns ON.
   You hear a dial tone.
- 2. Dial an inside number using the dialpad.

OR

Press an Inside Autodial button.

#### **Line Pools**

Line Pools allow each telephone to access a collection of outside lines using Norstar's Intercom (inside) lines and the Line Pool button, Feature 6 4, or a Line Pool Access code. For further information, see the Line Pools section of this chapter.

#### Manual Line Selection

Manual Line Selection allows you to select any free or ringing line and to override Automatic Line Selection. For example, if your telephone is on Do Not Disturb or Call Forward and you see a line indicator flashing with an incoming call, you can take the call by pushing the indicated line button.

You must select an outside line when there is no Prime Line defined for the telephone.

### **Multiple Line Buttons**

Multiple Line buttons give you immediate access to more than one line, and allow you to handle and monitor calls easily. These buttons also have a Call Waiting function when you are on another call. The indicator beside the line button flashes when a line is ringing or on hold.

Line indicators flash at three different rates, depending on whether the line is ringing, held by you, or held on another telephone. If a call is ringing, the indicator turns ON and OFF for equal amounts of time. If you have put a call on Hold, the indicator flashes more quickly. If one of your co-workers has put a call on Hold on a line appears at your telephone, the indicator stays ON for a longer period of time than it is OFF.

Each telephone has a maximum number of outside line buttons which it can support. As their names suggest, the M7324 telephone can have up to 24 outside line buttons, the M7310 telephone can have 10, and the M7208 telephone can have eight. If the maximum possible outside lines are assigned to a telephone, however, nothing else can be programmed on the programmable memory buttons with indicators. In order to assign more lines to a telephone than the telephone has line buttons, you can either use Line Pools (see "Line Pools" in this chapter) or the Answer Group feature (see "Answer Groups" in this chapter).

#### **Outside Line Access**

Your Norstar system can have many outside lines. The number of telephones and outside lines in your system can add up to as many as 120. Each telephone can have as many lines assigned to it as the system has, but for practical purposes the number of lines assigned to a telephone is limited by the number of buttons which can be used as outside Line buttons. The outside Line buttons are used to make and answer calls to or from parties outside the Norstar system.

#### To use outside lines:

If the line is free, the indicator is OFF.

- 1. Press an outside Line button. The indicator appears beside the button.
  - You hear a dial tone.
- 2. Dial an outside number using:
  - the dialpad
  - a Speed Dial number using Speed Dial or Feature 0 (plus the two-digit number)
  - an Autodial button.

Inside and outside line assignments are controlled by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Line Access" section of Configuration programming.

#### **Line Pools**

Line Pools let you make efficient use of outside lines. A number of outside lines in a line pool can be shared by a group of telephones without requiring each telephone to have a button for each line in the pool. Telephones gain access to outside lines through Intercom lines, leaving more buttons free to store Autodial numbers or features.

Each Norstar system has nine Line Pools. Each Line Pool can be accessed by entering the one to four-digit Line Pool Access code on the dialpad. A Line Pool cannot be used unless your Installer has assigned a Line Pool Access code to the Line Pool in Configuration programming.

### To program a Line Pool button:

- 1. Press Feature \* 3
- 2. Press the button you wish to program.
- 3. Press Feature 6 4 and the Line Pool Access code for a Line Pool. Direct access to that Line Pool is programmed on the button.
- 4. Label the button Line Pool

#### To use a Line Pool:

1. Press Intercom and dial the Line Pool Access code

Press Feature 6 4 and dial the Line Pool Access code OR

Press Line pool

**Note:** Pressing Feature 6 4 or Line Pool selects a line automatically.

- 2. Listen for the dial tone. If there is none, the display message provides an explanation.
- 3. Dial the number you wish to call.

A Line Pool button cannot be used to answer outside calls.

The Job Aids chapter of this Guide has a list of your system's nine Line Pools. Photocopy this page, and keep the original as a master copy. In the Job Aid, record each Line Pool Access code (provided by your Installer) and the telephones which can use each Line Pool.

Your Installer or Service Representative assigns telephones to Line Pools in the "Line Access" section of Configuration programming and assigns Line Pool Access codes in the "Miscellaneous" section of Configuration programming.

### Link

If your Meridian Norstar system is located behind a Private Branch Exchange (PBX) or Centrex system, you may want to use a Link signal to access special features on the PBX or Centrex.

The Link signal is a short "hook-switch flash" with a programmable duration. The default value is 600 milliseconds, but it can be set from 300 to 1000 milliseconds, in increments of 100 milliseconds. You can generate a Link signal by pressing Feature 7 1 To obtain the signal with a single press, store the feature code on an Autodial button. See "Feature Access" in this chapter for specific instructions. The Link signal can also be included as part of a longer stored sequence on an Autodial button or in a Speed Dial code. See "PBX Features" or "Centrex Features" in this chapter for further details.

A programmed Link button works only on an active line.

The duration of a Link signal is controlled by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Miscellaneous" section of Configuration programming.

Feature Operations

## **Long Tones**

If your Norstar system uses Access signaling, it may be necessary to transmit Dual Tone Multi-Frequency (DTMF) tones of a longer duration than the standard 120ms (short tone) duration. This is necessary for use with some devices which use tones with a continual (long) duration, such as FAX and message machines.

The Long Tones feature code allows you to control the length of the tone. A Long Tone lasts as long as you press a dialpad key after activating the feature. Long Tones feature remains active until it is turned OFF, or until the call has ended or is placed on Hold.

Long Tones can be used on either an outside or an inside call. This allows you to use Norstar Intercom lines to activate a device in another area of your office.

Long Tones cannot be used on a Conference call, or during a Page. If you press Long Tones while on a Conference call, you hear an error tone and the display shows Tones denied If you attempt to use Long Tones while making a Page announcement, the announcement is cancelled.

Because the Long Tones feature is controlled manually, the feature code cannot be stored in an Autodial or Speed Dial sequence. The Long Tones feature code, however, can be stored on one of the programmable memory buttons on any of the Norstar telephones.

#### To use Long Tones for Access signaling:

- 1. Place a call.
- 2. Press the Long Tones button OR

Press Feature 8 0 8

This changes the mode to Long Tones.

- 3. At the appropriate time, press any dialpad button. Hold the button down for as long as is necessary.
- When you are finished, end the call
   OR
   Cancel Long Tones using one of the methods below.

#### To cancel Long Tones without disconnecting your call:

1. Press the Feature button

OR

Press Hold (The call is placed on Hold and Long Tones is cancelled).

Long Tones feature is also cancelled if you are using it on an inside call and the person you are calling presses [Hold]

When Long Tones is cancelled, the telephone dial mode reverts to the mode it was in when Long Tones was activated (either short tones or pulse dialing).

The choice between Tone and Pulse dialing is made by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Line Data" section of Configuration programming.

## Messages (Send/Reply/Waiting)

You can leave messages on the telephone displays of your coworkers to request that they call you back. The display on a telephone which receives a message shows Message for you or Messages for you if more than one message has been received.

After you have sent a message, you or the person who received it may wish to cancel it. Any message can be cancelled by either the person who sent it or the person who received it. If you have sent a message and wish to cancel it, use the Cancel Sent Message feature. If you wish to cancel a message which has been sent to you, use the Cancel Message Waiting feature.

If you respond to a message and your call is picked up at a different telephone by the Call Pickup feature, the message you are answering remains on your telephone until you cancel the message or successfully contact the telephone which left the message.

Each message list can send or store up to four different messages before Their list full or Your list full appears on the displays. The Dial Zero Phone, however, can send up to 30 messages.

Feature Operations

#### To Send a message:

- 1. Press Feature 1
  - OR

Press Send Message

- 2. Press the ADD display button (M7324 and M7310 telephones only . The display then shows

  Message to: On the M7208, the

  Message to: display appears as soon as you press the feature access code or button.
- 3. Dial the Intercom number

#### OR

Press an Inside Autodial button.

The display shows Message> <name> where <name> is the programmed name of another Norstar telephone in your system.

#### To Reply to a message:

#### M7324 and M7310 Telephones

When Message for you is on the display of your telephone:

- 1. Press the MSG display button. The display shows the first (or only) message, as in the example:

  1. JILL called, along with the following display buttons: CALL and ERASE

  The NEXT display button also appears if there is more than one message waiting. If the message which appears is not the message to which you want to reply, move through the list by pressing NEXT repeatedly.
- 2. Press CALL A call is automatically dialed to the person who left the message.

#### M7208 Telephone

When Message for you is on the display of your telephone:

1. Press Feature 6 5
A call is automatically dialed to the person who left the first message. The display shows the programmed name of the telephone which you are calling.

To reply to other messages without replying to the first, you must record the name which appears on the display, cancel the first message, and then use the Reply Message feature.

### To Show a Waiting Message (M7310 and M7324 only):

When Message for you is on the display of your telephone:

1. Press MSG

OR

Press Feature 6 5

The display shows the first (or only) message, as in the example

1. JILL called, along with the following display buttons: CALL and ERASE The NEXT display button also appears if there is more than one message waiting.

- 2. Press NEXT again if there is more than one message.
- 3. Press Feature to end the "show message" cycle.

### To Cancel a Waiting Message:

When Message for you shows on the display of your telephone:

#### M7324 and M7310 Telephones

- 1. Follow the above procedure for "How to Show a Waiting Message" until the desired message is on the display.
- 2. Press the **ERRSE** display button. The next Message Waiting replaces the erased message.

#### M7208 Telephone

1. Press Feature # 6 5 The display shows the cancellation as in the following example:

Cancel > JILL

#### To Show a Sent Message (M7324 and M7310 only):

1. Press Feature 1

OR

Press Send Message

The display shows Message I ist along with the three display buttons: SHOW, ADD and EXIT

- 2. Press the SHOW display button. The first (or only) message is shown. If the SHOW button label disappears, there are no more messages. If the label changes to NEXT, there are more messages.
- 3. Press NEXT to see other messages in the list.
- 4. Press EXIT (M7324 and M7310 telephones only)
  OR

Press Feature to end the "show message" cycle.

#### To Cancel a Sent Message:

#### M7324 and M7310 Telephones

- 1. Follow the above procedure for "How to Show a Sent Message" until the desired message is on the display.
- 2. Press the ERASE display button.

#### M7208 Telephone

1. Press Feature # 1

OR

Press Cancel Send Msg

The display shows Cancel for: \_

2. Dial the Intercom number

OR

Press an Inside Autodial button.

The display shows Cancel > <name > with the appropriate name or set number.

Feature Operations

### **Names**

Each Norstar telephone and outside line can have an individual name assigned to it. This personal touch provides your company's staff with instant recognition of their calls.

When a call arrives at your telephone, or a feature forwards a call to you, your telephone display shows the name of the telephone that is calling (if it is within your Norstar system) or the name of the outside line which the call is on.

For example, if you receive a call on your Private line while you are busy on another line, PRIVATE calling appears on your display if the programmed name of that line is "PRIVATE".

The programmed Name or a telephone or line can be no more than **seven** characters in length. Names for lines and telephones can consist of letters and numbers, but no symbols such as periods or hyphens can be used. Characters are entered using the telephone's dialpad.

It is convenient to use numbers rather than letters for situations such as naming a telephone according to its location ("RM 321") or naming an outside line by the telephone number used to dial onto it ("5551234").

Line names must be unique, in order that any line which may be having trouble can be reported correctly. If you enter a Line Name which has already been used, you will hear an error tone, and Use unique name will appear on the display.

Two or more telephones in your office can be given the same Name. The system allows this, but it could become a source of confusion. Use creative combinations of initials, abbreviations, and possibly nicknames to give each telephone a unique Name.

The Name of a telephone will remain the same if the telephone is moved to another location within your system.

Telephone and line Names are programmed in the "Names" section of Administration programming. For instructions on how to enter characters and assign Names, see the appropriate section of the Norstar Administration chapter.

## **Night Service**

Night Service allows you to change your office telephone system for more efficient after hour service. For each outside line in your system, you can assign a Night Ringing Phone which receives calls when Night Service is ON and a Night Control Phone which turns Night Service ON or OFF for that line. You can also control whether or not calls arriving on lines which are in Night Service will drive an auxiliary ringer (if one is connected to your system). Night Service also allows you to control two system-wide features: the Night Dial Zero Phone and the Trunk Answer feature.

For further information on how to program Night Service settings, see the "Night Service" section of the Administration chapter of this Guide.

### **Multiple Night Ringing Phones**

Norstar supports a Night Ringing Phone for each outside line connected to your system. When a Night Ringing Phone is assigned to a line and Night Service is turned ON, all calls on that line will ring as usual, and also ring at the Night Ringing Phone.

Each line can have only one Night Ringing Phone, but one telephone can be the Night Ringing Phone for any or all of your outside lines. The Night Ringing Phone and the Night Control Phone for a line can be the same telephone, but do not have to be and usually are not.

Night Ringing Phones are assigned under the "Night ring" subheading of the "Night Service" section of Administration.

### **Night Auxiliary Ringer**

If an Auxiliary Ringer is present, it can be used as a Night Auxiliary Ringer for calls that ring at the Night Ringing Phone.

If your Auxiliary Ringer is programmed to ring for some lines and telephones during normal service, it will continue to do so and will also ring for calls arriving on a line that is in Night Service.

### **Night Control Phone**

A separate Night Control Phone can be assigned for each outside line which will be using Night Service. Each line can have only one Night Control Phone, but one telephone can control Night Service for any or all of your outside lines.

Night Service can only be turned ON and OFF at the Night Control Phone.

### **Night Dial Zero Phone**

A Dial Zero Phone which is different from the normal Dial Zero Phone can be assigned to lines which use Night Service. In order to contact the Night Dial Zero Phone by dialing "0', Night Service must be turned ON at the regular Dial Zero Phone.

If the Dial Zero Phone is changed while Night Service (and therefore the Night Dial Zero Phone) is ON, you must turn the Night Dial Zero Phone OFF at the new Dial Zero Phone. Turning Night Service OFF at the old Dial Zero Phone cancels Night Service for outside lines, but will not turn the Night Dial Zero Phone OFF.

### Trunk Answer (from any telephone)

This feature is turned ON or OFF for your entire system. If it is turned ON, calls ringing on a line which is in Night Service can be answered from any telephone within your system. For further information on the Trunk Answer feature, see the "Trunk Answer" section of this chapter.

#### **Using Night Service**

#### To use Night Service:

1. Press the Night Service button.

OR

Press Feature 8 7

The display shows Night Service ON

#### To cancel Night Service:

1. Press the Night Service button again.

OR

Press Feature # 8 7

The display shows Normal service

The features described in the previous section are controlled in the "Night Service" section of Administration programming.

## **On-Hook Dialing**

On-hook dialing allows you to dial a call without picking up the receiver.

#### To use On-Hook Dialing

- 1. Press a Line button for a free line.
- 2. Dial a call.
- 3. Listen through the speaker and when the call is answered, lift the receiver or press Handsfree (if equipped).

The call may be dialed using the dialpad, or one of the following Norstar features: Autodial, Last Number Redial, Saved Number Redial, or Speed Dial. The call can also be placed using the Message Reply feature or the Ring Again feature.

## **Page Origination and Reception**

Announcements through Norstar telephones or extension speakers give you fast, effective communication to many people at once.

The announcement does not disturb a person on an active call or using Norstar Administration, but can be heard by anyone near a paged telephone that is not in use.

There are three possible types of paging announcements:

- Internal
- External
- · External and Internal.

Each telephone in your Norstar system may be assigned to one of six different Page Zones, or be assigned to no zone, through the "Permissions" section of Administration programming. You can page to any specified zone, or to all zones at once, by using the different Page Zone codes described below.

The various different options for Norstar paging are as follows:

Page -General

Feature 6 0 + code (1-3)

Page -Zone

Feature 6 1 + Zone (1-6)

Page - External

Feature 6 2

Page -Zone and External

Feature 6 3 + Zone (1-6)

Two different Page Zones may be activated at one time, providing that both do not attempt to use the External speaker. When a second page using the speaker is attempted, the display at the originating telephone shows the Paging busy error message.

External pages can only be made if your company has supplied an external speaker for the purpose. This speaker is not standard Meridian Norstar equipment.

Page announcements are restricted to a maximum of two minutes, after which the page call ends automatically.

### To program a one-step Page button

- 1. Press Feature \* 3
- 2. Enter the feature code and the desired Page Zone. Example: for internal Page Zone 1, Feature 6 1 1
- 3. Label the button "Page Zone 1". To make an internal page announcement to Page Zone 1, you need only select a line, press the new Page button, and speak.

Please make sure that you remember to enter the Page Zone after the Feature code, as the system will not prompt you to do so. In order to activate a Page announcement by pressing only one button, you must program both the Feature code and the Page Zone onto the button.

#### To end Paging:

1. Press RIs

OR

Hang up the receiver

OR

Press another line button.

The paging channel cannot be placed on hold.

The Job Aids chapter of this Guide has a list of your system's six Page Zones. Photocopy the Page Zones Job Aid and keep the original to use as a master copy. In the appropriate areas of the list, record each telephone which has access to the different Page Zones.

Page Zones are controlled in the "Permissions" section of Administration programming.

### **Pause**

The Pause feature is used to provide an automatic delay of 1.5 seconds in a dialing sequence. This is often required in access signaling of remote devices, or when reaching through to PBX or Centrex features.

Insert a Pause in a dialed sequence by pressing Feature 7 8
This code is stored as three digits in the sequence you are dialing (a total of 16 digits is permitted). You can obtain a pause with one press if you program the feature code onto an Autodial button. See the "Feature Access" section of this chapter for instructions.

The Pause feature works only on an active line.

### **PBX Features**

If your system is located behind a Private Branch Exchange (PBX) system, Meridian Norstar provides you with convenient access to PBX features that require extra signals from the dialpad. Codes for Link, Long Tones, Pause, Run/Stop and Timed Release are provided below. These codes, along with other digits required by your PBX, can be programmed onto Autodial buttons or placed in Speed Dial so that you can activate special features with a minimum number of button presses.

The basic PBX feature codes are as follows:

Link:

Feature 7 1

Long Tones: Pause:

Feature 8 0 8

Run/Stop:

Feature 7 8 Feature \* 9

Timed Release:

Feature 7 2

If your outside lines are programmed for pulse dialing, pressing # allows you to switch from pulse to tone dialing.

Further information about Link, Long Tones, Pause, Run/Stop, and Timed Release is provided under separate entries for these features.

See also **Access Signaling** for information about using Meridian Norstar telephones to contact remote devices and gain access to alternate telephone carriers.

#### Autodial PBX Features

Program an Autodial button on your telephone to activate a PBX feature with one press. For example, if you must press Link to activate your PBX transfer feature, follow the steps below to create an Autodial Link button.

### To program an Autodial PBX feature button:

- 1. Press Feature \* 3
- 2. Press the memory button on which you want to store the feature.
- 3. Press the desired PBX feature code, for example, Feature 7 1 to store a Link signal.

Features for Centrex and similar systems can also be stored on Autodial buttons by storing the Norstar Link sequence followed by the Centrex or other system's feature code.

The preceding instructions explain how to store a single feature code on a button. Follow the steps below to store the Link signal plus an extension number to which you frequently transfer calls.

#### To program an Autodial PBX feature and a dialing sequence:

- 1. Press Feature \* 1
- 2. Press the memory button on which you want to store the sequence.
- 3. Press the desired PBX feature code.
- 4. Press the sequence of digits or characters to be dialed after the feature code. The button can store a total of **16** characters.
- 5. Press the Hold button or the OK display button (M7324 or M7310 telephones only) to end the programming.

### Speed Dial PBX Features

PBX features, with or without additional dialed characters, can be stored in System Speed Dial codes (01-70) or Personal Speed Dial codes (71-94). As with Autodial buttons, Speed Dial codes can store a maximum of 16 characters, including a single character ("F") for each press of the Feature button. PBX features that are used by many people on the system are appropriate for System Speed Dial entries. Personal Speed Dial is better for storing features that are tailored to individual requirements. For example, a person who regularly places his or her telephone in Call Forward to a particular telephone in the PBX system could program a Speed Dial code to dial the PBX Link and Call Forward codes plus the extension number of the other telephone.

## **Pickup Group**

When a call is ringing on a telephone, it can be answered on any telephone in the same Pickup group. This feature makes it easy for people to answer calls for absent co-workers.

Norstar provides nine Pickup Groups so that groups of people who can effectively answer one another's telephone calls can be assigned to an individual Pickup Group. Each telephone can be in one of the groups, or excluded from all groups. For example, a telephone in a customer waiting area may be left out of Pickup groups within the office to prevent customers from answering incoming calls by mistake.

Answering a call from another telephone in your Pickup group requires the use of the Pick-up button or Feature 7 5 For complete instructions, see the "Call Pick-up" section of this chapter.

Calls ringing on a telephone's private line cannot be picked up from another telephone in your Pickup group, but any other call (inside or outside) can be answered.

For another method of answering a call which is ringing at another telephone, see "Call Pickup (Directed)" in this chapter.

Each telephone in your system can be assigned to a Pickup Group, or to none, in the "Permissions" section of Administration programming.

### **Prime Line**

Your telephone can be programmed to automatically select one of the following line types whenever the receiver is lifted or the handsfree button is pushed:

- Outside line
- · Intercom line
- Line Pool
- None

If an outside line or Line Pool has been assigned as the Prime Line for your telephone, there is no need to first select an outside line before making a call or using outside Autodial, Speed Dial or Last Number Redial. Automatic Outgoing Line Selection will select a free line if you are not already using your telephone and the Prime Line is free.

If your telephone has no Prime Line or if the Prime Line is busy, press an outside line button before using outside Autodial, Speed Dial, or Last Number Redial.

This feature is controlled by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Line Access" section of Configuration programming.

## **Prime Phones (Multiple)**

Prime Phones occupy a central position in the Norstar system and provide backup answering for lines that normally ring at other telephones. If your office has a main reception area, that is where a Prime Phone is most useful.

Multiple Prime Phones allows you to distribute the responsibility for call handling among numerous telephones within your Norstar system. Each outside telephone line supported by your system can have its own Prime Phone assigned in Configuration programming. Each line can have only one Prime Phone, but a single telephone can be the Prime Phone for more than one line. This allows various areas of your office which share outside lines to also share a Prime Phone to handle unanswered calls.

If your outside line has a Prime Phone, you can use the following Norstar features to help manage your calls:

- Delayed Ring Transfer (DRT) transfers your outside calls to the Prime Phone if they are unanswered after a specified number of rings. DRT functions only for calls on an outside line which has a Prime Phone assigned to it. DRT is turned ON or OFF in Administration programming.
- **Do Not Disturb** transfers incoming calls on an outside line to that line's Prime Phone.
- If **Call Forward** directs your calls to a telephone that is unable to take a call, the call will be directed to the Prime Phone assigned to the outside line which the call is on.
- If a call resulting from Call Park Callback or Transfer Callback cannot ring at the telephone which parked or transferred the call, the call will be forwarded to the Prime Phone assigned to the outside line which the call was originally on.
- Held Line Reminder is activated at a Prime Phone two minutes after it begins at the originating telephone. Held Line Reminder functions only for calls on a line which is not private and has a Prime Phone assigned to it.

If your telephone is designated as a Prime Phone, you can use Call Forward (No Answer), Call Forward (All Calls) or Do Not Disturb to prevent incoming calls. When Call Forward is active, all calls arriving at your telephone will be redirected to the specified telephone, whether or not they have already been forwarded to your telephone from another. Because a Prime Phone is a backup answering telephone for various lines in your system, make sure that you do not forward calls to a telephone at which they will remain unanswered.

Prime Phone assignment is controlled by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Line Data" section of Configuration programming.

## **Priority Call**

This feature should be used carefully, or only for urgent calls.

Priority Call allows you to force a connection with another telephone in your office, when that telephone is busy or using Do Not Disturb. You can also use Priority Call to make a Voice Call to a telephone which has Voice Call Deny turned ON.

Priority Call will not override Call Forward. If this feature is active at the telephone you are trying to reach, your call will be forwarded. You can use Priority Call (if necessary) to contact the telephone to which your call is forwarded, but not to contact the original destination telephone.

There are three perspectives to a Priority Call: that of the person making the call, that of the person receiving the call, and that of a third person whose call is forced onto Exclusive Hold. The ways in which Priority Call feature affects these three people are explained below.

#### When you make a Priority Call:

If the telephone you are trying to contact has an available Intercom button, your call will proceed as a Voice Call on that button. In this case, both telephones can put the call on Hold. If a Priority Call is placed on Hold at either telephone, or is transferred, it is no longer a Priority Call.

If the telephone you are trying to contact does not have an available Intercom button, your call will proceed like a Page. The person you are contacting will only be able to use the Ris button.

If you contact one of your co-workers, and Do not disturb appears on your display, the Priority Call feature will connect your call as a Voice Call immediately. During the Priority Call, the person you are calling will hear a periodic tone which indicates that the telephone microphone is ON, and you can hear the person whom you are calling.

If you contact one of your co-workers, and your display shows

On another call or <name> busy , the Priority Call feature will place your co-worker's active call on Exclusive Hold, and connect you with your co-worker's telephone.

If your display shows On another call , you will not hear a busy signal. This means that your co-worker is active on another call, but still has an available Intercom line.

#### When you receive a Priority Call:

If you are active on a call and someone makes a Priority call to your telephone, Priority call appears on your display, and the indicator beside a programmed DND (Do Not Disturb) button flashes. On the M7324 and M7310 telephones, BLOCK appears beneath the display message. You have the option of preventing the Priority Call by pressing the DND button or the BLOCK display button. If you do not, the Priority Call will force your active call on Exclusive Hold after eight seconds. Remember to notify the person to whom you are speaking that the call is about to be placed on Hold.

If you use the DND button to block a Priority Call, the Do Not Disturb feature is **not** turned ON at your telephone. Your telephone will continue to function as normal.

When a Priority Call ends, you are immediately re-connected to your original call. When you accept a Priority Call which places an active call on Exclusive Hold, do not end the call yourself. If both you and the person who made the Priority Call happen to press RIs at the same time, your active call may be disconnected.

Feature Operations

If you are not active on a call, but have Do Not Disturb or Voice Call Deny turned ON, a Priority Call to your telephone will proceed immediately as a Voice Call. You will not be given the option of blocking the call.

When the person you are speaking to receives a Priority Call: If the person you are speaking to receives a Priority Call attempt, the call will either be blocked or accepted.

If the person presses the BLOCK display button, or the DND button, the Priority Call is blocked. You will be unable to detect that a Priority Call attempt has been made.

If the person accepts the Priority Call, you will be warned that your call will be placed on Hold within eight seconds. While your call is Held, it can only be retrieved from the telephone at which it was placed on Hold.

#### To make a Priority Call:

- 1. Make an inside call. Calling <name> appears on your display for three seconds.
- 2. Wait for the Call Identification message to change and show the status of the telephone you are calling. If the display shows Do not disturb On another call or <name> busy

3. Press Feature 6 9

#### OR

Press the Priority Call button

#### OR

Press PRIORITY (M7324 and M7310 telephones only).

If your co-worker's telephone is in Do Not Disturb mode, your call is connected immediately.

If you are interrupting an active call, your display will show Please wait... for eight seconds while your co-worker has the option of blocking your call. If your co-worker blocks your call, Call blocked appears on your display. If not, your call is connected.

4. When your call is finished, press RIs

### To block a Priority Call:

When a Priority Call attempts to interrupt an active call on your telephone, your display shows Priority call, the indicator beside a programmed DND button flashes, and the BLOCK display button appears beneath the message on M7324 and M7310 telephones.

1. Press DND

#### OR

Press BLOCK (M7324 and M7310 telephones only). The Priority Call is blocked. The display shows the temporary message | Call blocked | to confirm that the block has been successful.

2. Continue with your original call. The person with whom you are speaking cannot tell that there has been a Priority Call attempted at your telephone.

The Priority Call feature is assigned to a telephone in the "Permissions" section of Administration programming.

## **Privacy**

When you are on an inside or outside call, no other telephone with the same line can disturb your call. If you put a call on Hold, the call can be picked up on another telephone. Once the call is taken off hold, it is private again.

Use **Exclusive Hold** to keep a call private while on hold. The call's indicator will flash only on your telephone. From other telephones, the call will appear to be a connected call.

#### **Private Line**

A Private Line guarantees call privacy and line availability.

If your telephone is assigned a Private Line, that line is exclusive to your telephone (and the Prime Phone if desired). Calls that are put on hold or left unanswered on this line cannot be picked up on any other telephone. If unanswered after three rings, **Delayed Ring Transfer** causes your calls to ring at the Prime Phone.

**Call Forward**, **Transfer**, and other call handling features operate in the same way on a private line as on a public or pool line.

This feature is controlled by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Line Data" section of Configuration programming.

# Feature Operations

## Pulse/Tone Dialing

Each outside line is assigned either pulse or tone dialing by the Installer or Service Representative in Configuration programming.

Pulse dialing is the traditional method of dialing used by rotary dial or push button single line telephones. It is less advantageous than tone dialing, but is necessary to gain access to certain types of outside lines.

Tone dialing is a more advanced system, as the tones allow telephones to communicate with other devices such as a data communication device or computer. Tone dialing is also necessary to access Centrex or PBX features if your system is connected to a Centrex or Public Branch Exchange.

You can check to see whether your telephone is programmed for Pulse or Tone dialing by using the System Settings feature described later in this chapter.

This feature is controlled by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Line Data" section of Configuration programming.

## Release Button RIs

Pressing Ris ends a call without putting the receiver down, ends a Handsfree call, or ends feature programming.

Do not press the orange Ris to end a feature that you are using while active on a call (such as Contrast Adjustment or Show Message). The grey Feature button should be used in such cases, as the Ris button will disconnect the active call.

### **Restriction Passwords**

A Restriction Password is a **four-digit** password which allows a person to make calls normally not permitted because of Call Restrictions. Norstar supports the use of up to 100 separate Restriction Passwords.

The Restriction Password feature code ( Feature 6 8 or the Override) button can be pressed either before or after selecting a line for your call. The Restriction Password feature does not select a line automatically.

If you do not enter a four-digit password within 15 seconds after activating the Restriction Password feature, your display shows

Feature timeout and you hear an error tone.

#### To use a Restriction Password:

- Press the Override button OR
  - Press Feature 6 8
- 2. Enter the password recorded in your Programming Record or in the Job Aids chapter of this Guide.
- 3. Dial your call.

Restriction Passwords are programmed in the "Passwords" section of Administration programming.

## Ring Again on Busy

Ring Again eliminates the need to make repeated attempts to contact people within your office. Ring Again on Busy alerts you when a busy inside telephone becomes available.

This feature must be activated before you disconnect your call.

When you call a telephone which is busy, your display shows

Calling <name> for three seconds, and then shows

On another call or <name> busy On the M7324 and

M7310 telephones, the PRIORITY and LATER display buttons appear.

#### To use Ring Again on Busy:

1. While the call is ringing, press Ring Again OR

Press Feature 2

The call is disconnected.

The display shows Ring Again ON

2. When the telephone you were calling becomes available, you hear an alerting tone. Call <name>? appears on the display, and an indicator beside the Handsfree button or an Intercom button flashes. Press the button beside the flashing indicator. The Ring Again feature dials the Intercom number of the telephone you wish to contact.

### To use Ring Again on Busy (M7310 or M7324 telephones only):

- 1. While the call is ringing, press the LATER display button. The display shows Ring again?
- 2. Press the YES display button.
- 3. When the telephone you were calling becomes available, you hear an alerting tone. Call <name>? appears on the display, and an indicator beside the Handsfree button or an Intercom button flashes.

  Press the YES display button or the button beside the flashing indicator. The Ring Again feature dials the Intercom number of the telephone you wish to contact.

#### To cancel Ring Again:

1. Press Ring Again again.

OR

Press Feature # 2

#### Ring Again on Busy Line Pool

Norstar allows up to three Ring Again requests to exist for each Line Pool in your system. If you get a busy signal or the No free lines message when you attempt to use a Line Pool, activate Ring Again. When a line becomes available in the Line Pool, you will hear an alerting tone and your display will show Use line pool?

If more than one Ring Again request is active on a single Line Pool, a free line will offer the free line to the first telephone which activated Ring Again.

#### Feature Operations

## Ring Again on No Answer

Ring Again on No Answer alerts you when activity next occurs at an inside telephone where there was previously no answer. When the activity at the other telephone ends, your telephone alerts you. Ring Again cannot be used on a call made as a Voice Call.

### To use Ring Again on No Answer:

1. While the call is ringing, press Ring Again

OR

Press Feature 2

The call is disconnected. The display shows the temporary message: Ring Again ON

When the telephone you were calling becomes available, you hear an alerting tone. Call <name>?

appears on the display, and an indicator beside the Handsfree button or an Intercom button flashes.

2. Press the button beside the flashing indicator. The Ring Again feature dials the Intercom number of the telephone you wish to contact.

# To use Ring Again on No Answer (M7310 or M7324 telephones):

- 1. While the call is ringing, press the LATER display button.
  - The display shows Ring again?
- 2. Press the YES display button.

  The call is disconnected. The display shows the temporary message: Ring Again DN

  When the telephone you were calling becomes available, you hear an alerting tone. Call <name>?

  appears on the display, and an indicator beside the Handsfree button or an Intercom button flashes.
- 3. Press the YES display button or the button beside the flashing indicator. The Ring Again feature dials the Intercom number of the telephone you wish to contact.

#### To cancel Ring Again:

When Ring Again is active:

1. Press Ring Again
OR

Press Feature # 2

## Ring Type

One of four different tone combinations can be selected to give your telephone a distinctive ring. This makes it easier to identify your telephone's ring where telephones are grouped together in an open office.

#### To select a Ring Type:

M7324 and	M7310	Teleph	ones
-----------	-------	--------	------

1. Press Feature \* 6

Your hear one of the ring types for two seconds.

2. Press the NEXT display button

OR

Press 1, 2, 3, or 4 from the dialpad.

The display shows Ring type  $\langle \times \rangle$  where  $\times$  is 1,2, 3, or 4.

You hear the selected ring type for two seconds.

3. Repeat step 2 until you hear the ring type you prefer.

4. Press the OK display button.

OR

Press the Feature button.

OR

Wait a few seconds.

The telephone records the last ring type selected.

### M7208 Telephone

1. Press Feature \* 6

You hear one of the ring types for two seconds.

2. Press 1, 2, 3, or 4 on the dialpad. You hear the selected ring type for two seconds.

3. Repeat step 2 until you hear the type of ring you prefer.

4. Press the Hold button

OR

Press the Feature button

OR

Wait a few seconds.

The telephone records the last ring type selected.

## **Ringing Line Preference**

Each telephone in a Meridian Norstar system can be programmed to ring for incoming calls on some or all of the outside lines that appear on the telephone. For example, a telephone can have buttons for Lines 1 to 6, but have only Lines 3 and 4 programmed as ringing lines. An incoming call on any of the six lines will cause the appropriate line button indicator to flash, and the telephone can be used to answer the call. But only calls on lines 3 and 4 will cause the telephone to ring. This is especially useful for people who monitor other telephone lines, but only want their own lines to actually ring.

If a telephone has a Prime Line, that line is usually a ringing line. A Prime Phone or a receptionist's telephone usually has many ringing lines.

The ringing lines for a telephone are specified by the Installer in the "Line Access" section of Configuration programming.

## **Ring Volume**

The volume of the ring on a Meridian Norstar telephone can be adjusted either when it is ringing with an incoming call, or when ringing is caused by following the procedures below. Once adjusted, the telephone will ring at the same volume each time until it is adjusted again.

#### To adjust Ring Volume:

- 1. Press Feature \* 8 0
  The telephone rings for four seconds.
- 2. Press the Volume bar repeatedly to adjust the ring volume.

## Run/Stop Code

The Run/Stop code Feature \* 9 is used to insert a break point in a sequence of dialed numbers or characters that is stored for automatic dialing. It is best to make sure that your telephone is using "Tone" rather than "Pulse" dialing, as pulse signals may not be understood by PBX, Centrex, nor similar systems.

Whereas Pause and Timed Release insert time delays of a specific length into a dialed sequence, the Run/Stop code allows you to manually control the delay period, or to dial certain sequences in a repeating cycle.

When you use Run/Stop codes, one press of an Autodial button or Speed Dial code dials the programmed sequence up to the break point. The next press dials from the break point to the next break point or to the end of the sequence. Another press begins again from the beginning of the sequence.

Your Norstar system only stores up to **three** Run/Stop sequences on each Personal Speed Dial code or Autodial button. Digits stored after a fourth Run/Stop sequence are ignored. A System Speed Dial code can hold only **one** Run/Stop sequence.

Each Meridian Norstar telephone retains its position in a Run/Stop sequence indefinitely, even across power interruptions. If a memory button is used to dial a stored sequence up to a break point, and the button is not pressed again for several months, the next press will still dial the sequence after the break point.

Each Meridian Norstar telephone uses sequences containing break points independently. If one telephone is left in a position to dial the sequence after the break point, another telephone in the system still dials the first part of the sequence by using the same Autodial button or Speed Dial code.

Refer to the "Centrex" and "PBX" sections of this chapter for further information regarding the Run/Stop code.

The following instructions provide a good example of the uses of the Run/Stop feature is placing a call to a company which has an Automated Attendant. When your call reaches the main switchboard, you are prompted to dial the extension number of the person with whom you want to speak. If you call often to one particular person in that company, you may wish to program the company number, a break point, then the extension number as one Autodial button. The following instructions show how this can be done.

### To program an Autodial button using Run/Stop:

- 1. Press Feature \* 1
- 2. Press the Autodial (memory) button which you wish to program.
- 3. Dial the first part of the dialing sequence (the company phone number).
- 4. Press Feature \* 9 to store a break point in the sequence.
- 5. Dial the remainder of the sequence (the extension number you wish to reach).
- 6. Press Hold The display shows Key programmed

#### To use the Autodial button with Run/Stop:

- Press the Autodial button.
   The Run/Stop feature dials the first half of the programmed number sequence, then stops.
- 2. Wait for the recording to prompt you to dial the extension number.
- Press the Autodial button again.
   The Run/Stop feature dials the remaining digits of the sequence and your call is connected.

### **Saved Number Redial**

Saved Number Redial allows you to store the number of your active outside call in Norstar's memory, and dial the same number later by pressing only one button.

Saved Number Redial stores up to **16** digits if the number you have dialed is longer, only the first **16** digits will be stored.

You can use the dialpad, Speed Dial, an Autodial button, or Last Number Redial to dial a number which you want to save. If you are using a Line Pool when you save an outside telephone number, Saved Number Redial does not store the Line Pool Access code. Saved Number Redial stores one number for each telephone in your system, but if you have more than one outside line on your telephone, Saved Number Redial does not store a number for each line.

#### To save a number:

- 1. Make a call to an outside telephone number.
- 2. At any point during the call, press Feature 6 7 OR

Press the Saved Number button.

Your display shows Number saved and then shows the digits of the number which it has saved.

#### To use Saved Number Redial (with an outside Prime Line):

1. Press Feature 6 7

OR

Press the Saved Number button.

Your display shows the saved number, and the Saved Number Redial feature automatically selects a line. If no number is stored for your telephone, the display shows

No saved number

2. Wait for two seconds. After this time, the Saved Number Redial feature dials the number shown on the display.

If the Prime Line setting for your telephone is assigned in Configuration as "None", the Saved Number Redial feature will not select an outside line automatically. When you attempt to use this feature, you will hear an error tone and your display will show Select a line

If the Prime Line setting for your telephone is assigned in Configuration as an Intercom line, the Saved Number Redial feature attempts to dial the outgoing call on a Line Pool line. If your telephone is not assigned to a Line Pool, you will hear an error tone and your display will show Select a line

## To use Saved Number Redial (with no Prime Line):

- 1. Press a Line button.
- 2. Press Feature 6 7

OR

Press the Saved Number button.

The display shows the digits of the saved number. If no number is stored for your telephone, the display shows

No saved number

3. Wait for two seconds. After this time, the Saved Number Redial feature dials the number shown on the display.

If you attempt to use Saved Number Redial while you are on either an incoming outside call or on an inside call, your display will show No number saved and you will hear an error tone.

Prime Lines is assigned to your telephones by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Line Access" section of Configuration programming.



# **Selective Call Forward**

Selective Call Forward is a means of using the Do Not Disturb feature to send an incoming call on an outside line to the Prime Phone instead of answering it yourself. Your telephone will be left in Do Not Disturb mode after using this feature.

#### To use Selective Call Forward:

While an outside call is ringing:

1. Press the DND (Do Not Disturb) button.

OR

Press Feature 8 5

The display shows Do not disturb

The call is transferred to the Prime Phone associated with the outside line the call is on. Your telephone remains in Do Not Disturb mode.

Prime Phone line assignment is determined by your Installer or Service Representative in the "Line Access" section of Configuration programming.

# **Speed Dial — Personal**

Speed Dial gives you fast access to frequently-called numbers by entering a two-digit code. Anyone with a Norstar telephone can store up to 24 outside phone numbers using Personal Speed Dial codes and can change the phone numbers at any time.

The Personal Speed Dial memory for each telephone is independent; if the telephone is moved within the system, the Personal Speed Dial numbers will be retained with the phone.

The Personal Speed Dial codes range from 71 to 94. Each Speed Dial number may contain up to **16 digits**.

You may have a Personal Speed Dial card attached to the base of your telephone in a pull out drawer. When you need a quick reference to programmed Personal Speed Dial numbers, pull the tab, and the chart will swing out so that you can check the numbers. If you do not have Personal Speed Dial cards for your office's telephones, see your Service Representative to place an order.

Other Norstar features that also provide convenient access to stored phone numbers are System Speed Dial and Autodial.

## To store Personal Speed Dial codes (M7208):

- 1. Press Feature \* 4 The display shows Enter code:
- Enter a two-digit code between 71 and 94.
   The display shows Program and HOLD
- 3. Enter the desired outside number, including all digits that you must dial when placing the call manually.
- 4. Press Hold The number is now stored.
- 5. Record the name and the assigned two-digit code on the Speed Dial Card beneath your telephone (if available), or in a convenient place near your telephone.

# To store Personal Speed Dial codes (M7324 and M7310):

- 1. Press Feature \* 4 The display shows Enter code:
- 2. Enter a two-digit code between 71 and 94. The display shows Enter digits:
- 3. Enter the desired outside number, including all digits that you must dial when placing the call manually.

- 4. Press Hold or OK The number is now stored.
- 5. Record the name and the assigned two-digit code on the Speed Dial Card beneath your telephone (if available), or in a convenient place near your telephone.

## To erase a Personal Speed Dial code:

- 1. Press Feature \* 4
  The display shows Enter code:
- 2. Enter a two-digit code between 71 and 94. The display shows Enter digits: (M7324 and M7310) or Program and HOLD (M7208).
- 3. Press Hold or OK (M7324 and M7310 telephones only). Entry <xx> erased appears on the display. <xx> is the number of the Personal Speed Dial code (71-94) which has been erased.

## To use Personal Speed Dial:

1. Press the Speed Dial button.

OR

Press Feature 0

The display shows Speed dial >

 Enter a Personal Speed Dial code (from 71 to 94). The Speed Dial feature selects a line automatically, and dials the programmed telephone number.

## Feature Operations

# Speed Dial — System

System Speed Dial provides fast access to numbers that are frequently used by everyone in your Norstar Office System. This feature allows up to 70 phone numbers to be shared among all your co-workers. System Speed Dial numbers are stored in the memory of the Key Service Unit (KSU), and can be accessed from all telephones in your Norstar system.

System Speed dial entry numbers range from 01 to 70 inclusive. The entries can be changed only by the System Coordinator in Administration programming.

A chart is printed in the System Speed Dial part of the Job Aids chapter of this Guide for your convenience. You can photocopy the chart, fill it out, then distribute copies to your co-workers.

## To use System Speed Dial:

1. Press the Speed Dial button.

OR

Press Feature 0

The display shows Speed dial >

2. Press a System Speed Dial code (01-70). The Speed Dial feature selects a line automatically, and dials the programmed telephone number.

# System Speed Dial does not work under the following conditions:

#### The caller enters an invalid code.

Entering codes outside the range of 01 through 94 (for both Personal and System Speed Dial) causes an error tone and the display message: Invalid code

# The caller enters a code which does not correspond to a telephone number.

An error tone sounds and the display shows No number stored

# The stored telephone number is prohibited by a system-wide Restriction.

Remove the Restriction or program an Override for this telephone.

System Speed Dial numbers are assigned for your system in the "System Speed Dial" section of Administration programming.

# **System Settings**

Norstar provides a feature which allows you to see all of the Configuration and Administration settings for any individual line or telephone. While using the System Settings feature, you cannot change any settings. The feature is intended to permit you only to check what the settings are in order to understand how each line and telephone in your system is programmed.

# The System Settings feature can only be used on Norstar M7324 and M7310 telephones.

This feature does not show the settings assigned at individual telephones, but only the settings assigned in Configuration and Administration programming.

If you are having problems with a line or telephone, System Settings is the ideal place to look to discover what the problem might be. Before you call your Installer or Service Representative for assistance, check the setting of the line or telephone and make sure that there are no obvious problems. If you call your Installer or Service Representative, be prepared to describe the line or telephone settings over the telephone. With this information, it is very likely that your Installer or Service Representative will be able to help you immediately.

You can use this feature while you are active on a call. This makes it easy to inform another person of the settings you are checking as you check them, and saves you the trouble of recording each setting and introducing possible error.

This feature uses BACK, SHOW and NEXT display buttons in the same way that Administration programming uses the buttons labelled by the Programming Overlay.

## How to check telephone settings

The following procedures describe how to check the settings for a telephone in your system. If a particular setting does not apply to the telephone you are checking, it will not appear on the display of your telephone as you scan these settings. For example, if no Restrictions are applied to the telephone you are checking, the 

\*\*Restrictions\*\* message appears as \*\*D Restrictions\*\* and no \*\*SHOW\*\* display button appears.

## To check the Name of a telephone:

- 1. Press Feature \* \* SET

  OR

  Feature \* \* 738

  The display shows Show set:\_\_\_
- 2. Enter the Intercom number of the telephone you wish to check. The digits appear above the cursor.

  The display changes to the programmed name of that telephone: for example, Set 221: Pat W

  OR

  Pross the FLRST display button. The display shows

Press the FIRST display button. The display shows the programmed name of the telephone with the lowest Intercom number in the system.

# Feature Operations

## To check the lines assigned to a telephone:

Begin with the Set<xxx>: <name> message on the display and follow the steps below. <xxx> can be a two, three, or four-digit number, depending upon the size of your system.

Press SHOW The display shows Line Access
 Press SHOW The display shows Line xx: Ring or Line xx: No ring to tell whether or not the

Line numbered xx is programmed to ring.

3. Press NEXT The display shows the next line assigned to the telephone you are checking. Repeat this step until all lines assigned to the telephone have been shown.

4. Press NEXT The display shows <name>: Ring
or
<name>: No ring to tell whether or not calls
arriving at an Answer button on this telephone will ring.
The number xxx is the Intercom number of the

- The number ××× is the Intercom number of the telephone with which the Answer button is associated.

  5. Press NEXT The display shows Line pool 1:
- with a Y (Yes) or N (No) to indicate whether or not this telephone has access to Line Pool 1.

  6. Press NEXT The display shows the next Line Pool

which is assigned to the telephone. Repeat this step until all assigned Line Pools have been shown.

- 7. Press NEXT The display shows Intercom keys: x where x indicates the number of Intercom buttons assigned to this telephone. This number will not be greater than eight.
- 8. Press NEXT The display shows Prime line: xx where xx is the line number of the Prime Line at this telephone, or is 1/C (Intercom) or pool (Line Pool).
- 9. Press NEXT This moves you to the next series of settings for this telephone: x Restrictions

## To check Restriction settings for a telephone:

Begin with the  $Set < x \times x > : < name >$  message on the display and follow the steps below.

- 1. Press SHOW The display shows Line Access
- 2. Press NEXT The display shows × Restrictions where × is the number of Restrictions assigned to this telephone.
- 3. Press SHOW The display shows the first Restriction assigned to this telephone: for example, O: Y if the default Restrictions have been applied to this telephone.
- 4. Press NEXT The display shows the next assigned Restriction. Repeat this step until all Restrictions assigned to this telephone have been shown.
- 5. Press NEXT This moves you to the next series of settings for this telephone: x Overnides

## To check Override settings for a telephone:

Begin with the Set < xxx > : < name > message on the display and follow the steps below.

- 1. Press SHOW The display shows Line Access
- 2. Press NEXT twice. The display shows

  x Overrides where xx is the number of Overrides assigned to this telephone.
- 3. Press SHOW The display shows the first Override assigned to this telephone: for example, 1800: Y if the default Overrides have been applied to this telephone.
- 4. Press NEXT The display shows the next assigned Override. Repeat this step until all Overrides assigned to this telephone have been shown.
- 5. Press NEXT This moves you to the next series of settings for this telephone: Permissions

# Feature Operations

## To check Permissions for a telephone:

## To access the Permissions settings:

Begin with the Set<xxx>: <name> message on the display and follow the steps below.

- 1. Press SHOW The display shows Line Access
- 2. Press NEXT three times. The display shows

#### To view the Permissions:

The display shows Permissions

- 1. Press SHOW The display shows Full handsfree: with a Y (Yes) or N (No) to indicate if this feature is permitted at this telephone.
- 2. Press NEXT The display shows HF Answerback: with a Y (Yes) or N (No) to indicate if this feature is permitted at this telephone.
- 3. Press <u>NEXT</u> The display shows <u>Pickup group:x</u>
  The x indicates the number of the Pickup Group to which the telephone is assigned, or is None.
- 4. Press NEXT The display shows Page zone: x if that feature is turned ON in Administration. The x indicates the number of the Page Zone to which the telephone is assigned.
- 5. Press NEXT The display shows Aux. Ringer: with a Y (Yes) or N (No) to indicate if calls at this telephone will drive the Auxiliary Ringer.
- 6. Press NEXT The display shows Forward no answr

# To check the Forward No Answer settings:

The display shows Forward no answr

- 1. To view the Intercom number of the destination telephone, press the SHOW display button. The display shows Forward to xxx where xxx is the Intercom number of the telephone to which unanswered calls are forwarded. If the display shows

  Forward to None, go directly to Step 11.
- 2. Press NEXT The display changes to Forward delay: where x is the number of rings before unanswered calls are forwarded.

## To continue checking Permissions:

The display shows Forward delay:

- 1. Press NEXT The display shows Priority call: with a Y (Yes) or N (No) to indicate if this feature is permitted at this telephone.
- 2. Press NEXT This causes the display to return to the Set<xx>: <name> message, allowing you to check the settings for another telephone in your system.
- 3. To check another telephone, press the <u>NEXT</u> display button to check the telephone with the next Intercom number in the sequence.

## How to check the settings for an outside line

The following procedures describe how to check the settings for an outside line for your system. If a particular setting does not apply to the line you are checking, it will not appear on the display of your telephone as you scan these settings. For example, if no Overrides are applied to the line you are checking, the x Overrides message appears as O Overrides and no SHOW display button appears.

Feature Operations

#### To check the Name of an outside line:

- 1. Press Feature \* \* LINE
  OR
  Feature \* \* 5 4 6 3
  The display shows Show line:\_
- 2. Enter the two-digit number of the line you wish to check. The digits appear above the cursor.

The display changes to the programmed name of that line: for example, Line 25: Private

OR

Press the FIRST display button. The display shows the programmed name of the line with the lowest two-digit number.

## To check the settings of an outside line

Begin with the Line < x > : < name > message on the display and follow the steps below. < x > is the two-digit number of an outside line in your system.

- 1. Press SHOW The display shows Line data
- 2. Press SHOW again. The display shows Type: with public, private or pool after the colon.
- 3. Press NEXT The display shows Mode: with pulse or tone after the colon.
- 4. Press NEXT The display shows Aux. ringer: with a Y (Yes) or N (No) to indicate if this line is programmed in Configuration to drive the Auxiliary Ringer.
- 5. Press NEXT The display shows Full autohold with a Y (Yes) or N (No) to indicate whether or not this feature is turned ON for this line.
- 6. Press NEXT The display shows Prime set: xxx
  The number xxx is the Intercom number of the Prime
  Phone assigned to the line, or is None.
- 7. Press <u>NEXT</u> This moves you to the next series of settings for this line: <u>x Restrictions</u>

## To check Restriction settings for an outside line:

Begin with the Line (xx): <name> message on the display and follow the steps below.

- 1. Press SHOW The display shows Line data
- 2. Press NEXT The display shows x Restrictions where x is the number of Restrictions assigned to this line.
- 3. Press SHOW The display shows the first Restriction assigned to this line: for example, O:Y if the default Restrictions have been applied to this line.
- 4. Press NEXT The display shows the next assigned Restriction. Repeat this step until all Restrictions have been shown.
- 5. Press NEXT This moves you to the next series of settings for this line: x Overrides

#### To check Overrides for an outside line

Begin with the  $\boxed{\text{Line} \times \times \times : \langle \text{name} \rangle}$  message on the display and follow the steps below.

- 1. Press SHOW The display shows Line data
- 2. Press NEXT twice. The display shows × Overrides where × is the number of Overrides assigned to this line.
- 3. Press SHOW The display shows the first Override assigned to this line: for example, 1800: Y if the default Overrides have been applied to this line.
- 4. Press NEXT The display shows the next assigned Override. Repeat this step until all Overrides assigned to this line have been shown.
- 5. Press NEXT This moves you to the next series of settings for this line: Night service

## To check the Night Service settings for an outside line:

Begin with the Line (xx): <name> message on the display and follow the steps below.

- 1. Press SHOW The display shows Line data
- 2. Press NEXT three times. The display shows
- 3. Press SHOW The display shows Night ctrl: xxx where xxx is the Intercom number of the telephone at which Night Service for this line can be turned ON or OFF, or is None.
- 4. Press NEXT The display shows Night ring: xxx where xxx is the Intercom number of the telephone which will ring for calls coming in on this line while Night Service is turned ON, or is None.
- 5. Press NEXT The display shows Night aux ring: with a Y (Yes) or N (No) to indicate if calls coming in on this line will drive the Auxiliary Ringer.
- 6. Press NEXT This causes the display to return to the Line < x > : < name > message, allowing you to check the settings for another line in your system.
- 7. To check another line, press the <a>NEXT</a> display button to check the line with the next highest two-digit number.

## To Exit from the System Settings feature:

At any point during your use of the System Settings feature, you can exit from the feature and return to telephone to its regular display message by following the steps below.

> 1. Press Feature The System Settings feature will be cancelled. OR Press the QUIT display button under the Show set:\_\_\_\_\_ or Show line:\_\_ message. The System Settings feature will be cancelled.

## **Time and Date**

The Time and Date appear on the display of your telephone when you are not on a call. The default setting for Time and Date is 1 Jan 1989 1:00 am at the time of initial installation

If your Norstar system suffers a power interruption, the Time and Date display stops, then resumes counting when power is restored. The difference between the displayed time and the actual time is the length of the power interruption.

The English Time and Date display is in 12-hour format, with "am" or "pm" following the time. Alternate language displays are in 24hour format.

English	Sept 13 2:37 pm
Spanish	13 Sep 14:37
French	13 sept 14h37

Note: The Call Duration Timer feature does not work for calls which are active while you are setting your system's clock.

Time and date are adjusted in the "Time and Date" section of Administration programming.

## **Timed Release**

Dial a Timed Release signal whenever you want to release a call from your line but retain the use of the line for another call.

The Timed Release is also required as part of some dialing sequences when signaling a remote device or reaching through a PBX or Centrex system. It inserts a 1.5 second pause into the sequence. For more information, see the "Centrex Features" and "PBX Features" sections of this chapter.

Generate a Timed Release signal by pressing Feature 7 2 You can create a Timed Release button to send the signal with one press if you program an Autodial button with the feature code. See the "Feature Access" section of this chapter for instructions.

Timed Release works only when a line is active.

# **Transfer**

The Meridian Norstar system offers three convenient ways to transfer calls:

Transfer

Feature 7 0

Transfer using Conference

Feature 3

Transfer using Hold

Hold

**Transfer** provides two ideal means of transferring an outside call to someone else in your office.

The fastest method, **Transfer without Announcement**, transfers an incoming call directly to a co-worker's telephone. If there is no answer, the call returns to ring at your telephone.

The second method, **Transfer with Announcement**, allows you to discuss the call with your co-worker before transferring the call. Transfer With Announcement is also useful if your manager asks you to connect him with a person who is hard to reach. Once you have the person on the line, you can call your manager and connect the two calls.

Both methods allow you to reconnect with the party you are attempting to transfer, up until the time you press the final button of the transfer sequence. The procedures for transferring calls using this feature are given in the following pages and on the User Cards for each Norstar telephone.

Feature Operations Transfer using Conference allows you to introduce two people to each other in a three-way conversation before leaving them connected. This feature works best when one of the parties is on your Norstar system, but it does allow you to connect two outside parties by putting a conference on Hold at your telephone. If this method is used, you must monitor the call and disconnect when the two outside parties have finished their call. If you release yourself from the call, both parties will be disconnected.

**Transfer using Hold**, is a simple but effective method of transferring calls. Transfer Using Hold allows you to privately tell someone in your office that there is a call for him on a certain outside line. To accept the call, your co-worker presses the flashing line indicator on his telephone. Otherwise, you can return to the caller and take a message or explain that the other person is unavailable.

# Transferring a call to someone in your office

The following procedures show how a call can be transferred using the methods described above.

## **Transfer without Announcement**

While on a call:

1. Press Transfer

OR

Press Feature 7 0

OR

Press TRANSFER (M7324 and M7310 telephones only).

The display shows Transfer to:

2. Dial the Intercom number of the person to whom the call will be sent.

OR

Press the line button of a held inside call to connect the two parties. The call is immediately transferred, and you are disconnected.

#### **Transfer Callback**

If the telephone to which you have transferred a call is busy, or if your transferred call is not answered after a specified length of time, the Transfer Callback feature returns the call to your telephone.

Refer to "Transfer Callback" in this chapter of the Guide for further information.

## **Transfer using Hold**

Note:

This method can only be used to transfer an outside call to another telephone that has a button for the line that the outside call is using.

#### While on an outside call:

1. Press Hold

OR

Place an inside call to your co-worker. The outside call is automatically placed on hold.

- 2. Tell your co-worker which line button to press to pick up the call.
- 3. After the line indicator ▶ stops flashing on your telephone, hang up or proceed with other calls.

## Transferring an outside call to another outside party

While on a call:

- 1. Put the first call on hold by pressing the Hold button or selecting another line (Automatic Hold).
- 2. Call the person to whom the first call will be transferred. Wait until the call is answered before going to step 3.
- 3. Press Conf/Trans

OR

Press Feature 3

- 4. Press the line button of the held call.
- 5. To remove yourself from the call, press Hold
  If both parties are outside your office, their two lines
  must remain busy at your telephone until the
  conversation is finished. If this method is used, go to
  step 6 only after both parties have hung up.
- 6. Press Ris



## **Transfer Callback**

Callback to your telephone occurs if you have Transfer without Announcement to send an outside call to a co-worker's telephone, and your co-worker does not answer. After a specified number of ring cycles, the outside call returns to your telephone. Callback is a convenient feature for receptionists, as it allows them to take messages from outside callers who have been transferred. Callback does not occur with inside calls.

If a transferred call cannot ring at the destination telephone, Callback occurs immediately. If the caller hangs up, Callback may still occur. When you answer the Callback call, you will hear a dial tone.

Callback occurs only at the telephone that attempted the transfer. If the call came in on an outside line, the Callback call rings on that line if it is available; otherwise, the call rings on an Intercom line. If no free line is available, the Callback call is transferred to the Prime Phone.

On a system that has a Prime Phone and Delayed Ring Transfer activated, a Callback call will be directed to the Prime Phone after a specified number of rings if the original telephone does not answer. If a Callback line is not answered at the Prime Phone within three minutes, the outside call is disconnected.

Do Not Disturb (if it is turned ON at the transferring telephone) cancels the ringing for a Callback call, but not the flashing of the indicator.

Callback cannot occur at a telephone that is initializing your system, or is in an Administration, Configuration, or Maintenance session.

To reconnect with your original caller (M7324 and M7310 telephones):

Press the CALLBACK display button OR

Press the line button which the call is on. You are connected with your original call. If you have attempted to transfer more than one call, pressing CALLBACK will connect you with the call which has been waiting to be answered for the longest period of time.

To reconnect with your original caller (M7208 telephone): On the M7208 telephone, a call arriving at your telephone through the Callback feature will appear as a regular ringing call.

The Callback delay time is controlled by the Installer or Service Representative in the "Call Handling" section of Configuration programming.

# Trunk Answer (from any telephone)

Trunk Answer (from any telephone) allows you to answer a telephone which is ringing in your office from any other telephone within your Norstar system.

This feature only works with calls which are ringing on lines that have Night Service turned ON. If the line does not have Night Service turned ON, it must be answered using another method, such as Call Pickup (Directed or Group).

Trunk Answer cannot be used to answer calls on Private lines.

## To use Trunk Answer (from any telephone):

1. While a call is ringing on a line that is in Night Service, lift the receiver

OR

Press Handsfree

2. Press Feature 8 0 0

OR

Press Trunk Answer

The display shows <a href="mailto:rname">name</a> pickup where <a href="mailto:rname">name</a> is the number or programmed name of the line on which the call is ringing. The call is immediately connected.

This feature is controlled in the "Night Service" section of Administration programming.

# **Voice Call**

The Voice Call feature allows you to make a voice announcement or begin a conversation through the speaker of another telephone in your system. The person you call will hear an alerting tone, followed by your voice. If Handsfree Answerback is active at the called telephone, the person will be able to answer you without picking up the receiver. If Handsfree Answerback is not active, the person will either have to press Handsfree or pick up the receiver to talk to you.

You cannot make a Voice Call if the receiving telephone is busy or if any of the following features are active on the receiving telephone: Call Forward, Do Not Disturb, or Voice Call Deny. Under these conditions, No voice call appears on your display and the call is handled as a regular ringing call.

Once a Voice Call has been answered, it can be held, transferred, or otherwise treated as a normal call.

#### To make a Voice Call:

1. Press the Voice Call button before dialing the call.

Press Feature 6 6

Dial Voice Call appears on the display.

2. Dial the Intercom number of the person you wish to speak to.

After you see the display Voice call, the line is open for you to speak. If the display shows

No voice call, your call proceeds as a regular ringing call. This may mean that you will hear a busy signal, or that the call is being redirected.

#### Handsfree Answerback

The Handsfree microphone is activated when a Voice Call occurs. A tone is given every 15 seconds to remind you that the microphone remains ON until you pick up the receiver or press

Handsfree to acknowledge the call.

Handsfree Answerback is controlled by the System Coordinator in the "Permissions" section of Administration programming. Feature Operations

# **Voice Call Deny**

This feature prevents a telephone from receiving Voice Calls. All incoming inside calls must then be received as ringing calls.

## To use Voice Call Deny:

1. Press the Voice Call Deny button.

OR

Press Feature 8 8

The display shows No voice calls.

## To cancel Voice Call Deny:

1. Press the Voice Call Deny button again.

OR

Press Feature # 8 8

The display shows Allow voice call

## **Volume Button**

The Volume Button is a multi-purpose control for adjusting the volume of the receiver, telephone ring, Handsfree speaker, Headset and Background Music. As you use each feature or Norstar component, press either end of the volume button until the correct level of sound is reached.

Refer to the "Ring Volume" section of this chapter for a separate procedure to adjust this feature.

# **Wall - Mounted Telephones**

All Norstar Telephones can be mounted on a wall. Contact your Installer or Service Representative to have any telephones in your system wall-mounted.

# **Display Messages**

All messages that can appear on the display of your Meridian Norstar telephones—as error messages or to prompt you while using Norstar features—are listed below in alphabetical order. The meaning of each message is explained and, where appropriate, suggestions are given to assist you in using the feature correctly.

For further information concerning the messages which appear on your telephone display, see the appropriate sections of the Feature Operations or Norstar Administration chapters of this Guide.

Programmed line and telephone names that appear in the display messages are listed as <name>; messages beginning with <name> are located at the end of the alphabetical listing.

The arrangement of information is as follows:

#### Access denied

#### **Administration**

You have attempted to access Norstar Administration from an M7208 telephone.

Use an M7324 or M7310 telephone to access Administration.

# Call Pickup (Group)

Your telephone is not a member of a Call Pickup Group. Call Pickup Groups are defined under "Permissions" in Administration programming.

# **Night Service**

The telephone you are using is not a Night Control Phone. In order to activate Night Service, you must use a telephone which is designated as a Night Control Phone. Alarm: <xxx>

#### **Alarm Set**

This message appears on the designated Alarm Phone and indicates a loss of electrical power to your system or the failure of a system component.

## Do not panic.

Write down the code numbers that appear on the display and report these to your Installer or Service Representative as soon as possible.

Allow calls

#### **Cancel Do Not Disturb**

This temporary message indicates that the telephone will accept calls (the telephone is no longer in Do Not Disturb mode).

Allow voice call

## **Cancel Voice Call Deny**

This temporary message indicates that the telephone will accept Voice Calls (Voice Call Deny is no longer activated).

Display Messages

Already joined

#### Call Identification

Your telephone is already connected to the telephone you are trying to call.

Check your active line and Intercom buttons, and use the existing connection for your call.

# Call Pickup

You are already connected to the telephone which made the call. This can happen if you attempt to pick up a call which a co-worker is making while you are already connected on a call to that same co-worker's telephone.

## Announce to: \_

## Transfer (with Announcement)

This message prompts you to dial the Intercom number (or press the Autodial button) of the telephone to which you want to transfer a call.

#### Call blocked

## **Priority Call**

The person you are attempting to contact has blocked your call. Contact the person by using the Page or Message feature, or try to call the person later.

## Call transferred

#### Conference/Transfer and Transfer

This message indicates that the call has been successfully transferred.

#### Call <name>?

# Ring Again



## Calling Set<xxx>

## **Call Identification**

This prompt shows the set number of the telephone (within the Norstar system) that is being called. The set number appears because no name has been entered for the set.

#### Calling <name>

#### Call Identification

This prompt shows the programmed name of the telephone (within the Norstar system) that is being called.

Cancel forward

#### Cancel Call Forward

This message indicates that Call Forward has been successfully cancelled. Incoming calls to the telephone will no longer be forwarded to another number.

# Message (Cancel Sent Message)

This prompt asks which sent message you wish to cancel.

Cancel> <name>

## Message

## (Cancel Message Waiting and Cancel Sent Message)

This temporary prompt indicates that the sent message or message waiting has been successfully cancelled.

Display Messages Can't ring again

# Ring Again

The call you have made will not allow the Ring Again feature (for example, an outside call), or your telephone has no active call.

Use Ring Again only on inside calls when the telephone you are calling is busy, not answering, or when all lines are in use. In any other situation, the call must be attempted later.

# Ring Again to an Answer Group

The telephone you are attempting to contact is not in service. Contact the person who has an Answer button for this telephone, and leave a message.

Code:

#### **Line Pools**

This message prompts you to enter the Line Pool Access code to access one of the nine possible Line Pools in your Norstar system.

## Conference busy

#### Conference/Transfer

The maximum number of conference calls which your system can support has been reached. Depending upon the size of your system, there can be up to 5, 10 or 21 conference calls active at any one time.

#### Denied in admin

## **Call Pickup (Directed)**

This feature is not permitted at your telephone due to the programmed settings of your system.

Your Installer or Service Representative controls this feature in the "Call Handling" section of Configuration programming.

#### **Line Pools**

Your telephone does not have access to the requested Line Pool. Your Installer or Service Representative can assign telephones in your system to the required Line Pools in the "Line Access" section of Configuration programming.

## **Priority Call**

Your telephone is not permitted to make Priority Calls due to Administration programming.

You can turn the Priority Call feature ON for a telephone in the "Permissions" section of Administration programming.



#### Dial memory full

# **Outside Autodial and Personal Speed Dial**

This message indicates that the memory space allotted for storing Outside Autodial and Personal Speed Dial numbers in your Norstar system is full.

#### Dial Voice Call

#### Voice Call

This message prompts you to proceed in dialing a Voice Call after initiating the Voice Call feature.

Do not disturb

#### Call Identification

The telephone you have called is in Do Not Disturb mode. After three rings your call may be directed to a Prime Phone.

#### **Do Not Disturb**

This message remains on the display when your telephone is in Do Not Disturb mode.

DND from <name>

#### Do Not Disturb

This message appears on a Prime Phone when it receives a call forwarded from a telephone using the Do Not Disturb feature.

DND transfer

#### Do Not Disturb

This message appears on a Prime Phone when a call forwarded from a telephone using the Do Not Disturb feature has the highest call priority.

Display Messages

DRT line <x>

# **Delayed Ring Transfer**

This message appears on a Prime Phone when it receives a call forwarded from a telephone by means of the Delayed Ring Transfer (DRT) feature.

# Language Choice

This message indicates that the Language Choice feature has been used to change the display language from English to Spanish. All further prompts and messages on the display will appear in Spanish, until the language is changed again.

## **Language Choice**

This message indicates that the display language has just been changed from English to French. All further prompts and messages on the display will appear in French until the language is changed again.

Enter zone:

## Page

This message prompts you to enter the number of the Page Zone on which you wish to broadcast after activating the Page Zone feature.

Feature timeout

#### **Restriction Passwords**

The 15 seconds allowed for you to enter the four-digit password have elapsed.

Enter the feature code again, and remember to enter the Restriction Password immediately.

Forward denied

#### Call Forward

An incorrect Intercom number or autodial button has been used, or you are trying to forward a telephone to another telephone that is already forwarded to the telephone you are using (Call Forward—All Calls). This would create an endless loop, and therefore is not permitted. Check your number and try to forward your telephone again.

Forward to:

#### Call Forward

This message prompts you to dial the Intercom number of the telephone to which you wish to forward your calls.

Display Messages Forward > <name>

#### Call Forward

This message shows the name of the telephone to which your calls are being forwarded.

Get call first

#### Call Park

You have attempted to park a call when you are not connected to an active call, but do have one or more calls on Hold. If the call you wish to park is on Hold, you must reconnect to the call before you can park it.

Held by <name>

### **Held Line Reminder**

This message appears on the Prime Phone if an outside call is held on any telephone in the system for more than two minutes. The message shows which telephone placed the call on hold, and is accompanied by a Held Line Reminder tone.

Display Messages

Held call

#### Held Line Reminder

This temporary message appears on the display of both the telephone which has the call on hold and the Prime Phone if an outside call is on hold for an excessive length of time. The length of time required to activate this feature is programmed by your Installer or Service Representative.

Held exclusively

#### **Exclusive Hold**

This temporary display will appear when an outside call is placed on Exclusive Hold.

## Language Choice

This message indicates that the Language Choice feature has been used to change the display language to English from the Alternate language. All further prompts and messages will appear in English, until the language is changed again.

#### In maintenance

#### Maintenance

This message appears on your display while your telephone is being tested in a Norstar Maintenance session.

#### in use: <name>

#### Administration

Another telephone in your system (specified by <name>) is presently using Norstar Administration or Configuration.

Locate and use the telephone which is being used, or wait until Norstar Administration or Configuration is no longer in use.

#### Invalid code

# Call Park (Retrieval)

You have entered a number other than 101 through 109. All Retrieve Park codes are between, and include, these two values.

#### **Feature Access**

An incorrect or unprogrammed code has been dialed. Check the code and try again.

#### Line Pool

You have entered an invalid Line Pool Access code. Check the Job Aids chapter of this Guide for a record of the correct programmed codes.

# **Speed Dial**

A number outside of the code range (01-70 for System Speed Dial, 71-94 for Personal Speed Dial) has been dialed.

#### Call Identification

An unavailable Intercom number (beyond the range of your system) has been dialed.

#### Invalid password

## **Restriction Passwords**

You have entered a password which is not programmed in your system. See your System Coordinator for a list of the passwords which you are permitted to use.

## Page

You have entered a code which is not between 1 and 6, the possible Page Zone choices. Enter a valid Page Zone and attempt your page again.

#### Line denied

#### **Prime Phone**

You have attempted to pick up a private call.

Private lines can only be accessed from the telephone to which the line is assigned.

#### Line in use

#### **Exclusive Hold**

You have attempted to pick up a call which is exclusively held on another telephone.

# **Lines (Outside Line Access)**

The line is in use at another set.

Use a different line, or wait until the line is free.

#### Line Pool

The line chosen by the system became active before connecting with your call. Retry the line pool request.

splay essages Line <x>

#### **Automatic Line Selection**

This message appears on the display when a line button is pressed on an idle telephone, such as when a line is selected prior to making an outside call.

Line <x> calling

#### **Call Identification**

This message shows the number of the line that an incoming inside call is using. This message only appears when the call would not normally ring at the telephone (for example, if it is redirected from another telephone by Call Forward).

Line <x> >pickup

## Call Pickup

This temporary message indicates a successful Call Pickup and shows the number (<x>) of the line used by an outside call that you are picking up from another telephone in your pickup group.

Line<x> to prime

#### **Prime Phone**

This message indicates that a call is on an outside line (<×>) which rings at the Prime Phone, but is not administered to ring at any other telephone within the system.

Maintenance test

#### Maintenance

When this message flashes on your display message indicates that your telephone or lines will be tested in a Norstar Maintenance session within one minute.

If this message remains on your display, it indicates that a Maintenance test is currently being performed on your telephone set or lines.

Display Messages Make call first

#### **Call Duration Timer**

No call has been made since the last power interruption (since your telephone's clock was last stopped).

## **Priority Call**

You have attempted to activate the Priority Call feature while you have no ringing or busy tone on the line.

Wait until you hear ringing or a busy signal before activating Priority Call.

#### **Transfer**

You have attempted to transfer a call when you are not connected to one.

Make calls first

#### Conference/Transfer

No calls have been established to form a conference call.

Display Messages Make second call

#### Conference/Transfer

There is no held call to complete the conference call.

Message denied

# Messages (Send Message)

An incorrect Intercom number has been dialed, or the set to which you are sending the message is out of service.

Retry the call, or see your check the Job Aids chapter of this Guide for a list of correct Intercom numbers.

# Messages (Send Message) to an Answer Group

The telephone you are attempting to contact is not in service. Contact the person who has an Answer button for this telephone, and leave a message. You can use the System Settings feature to determine which telephone in your system has an Answer button for the telephone you are trying to reach.

## Message for you

## Messages (Message Waiting)

This display indicates that there is one message recorded in your Message Waiting list.

#### Message to:

## Messages (Send Message)

This message prompts you to dial the Intercom number of the telephone to which you want to send a message.

#### Message > <name>

## Messages (Send Message)

This temporary display indicates that your message has been successfully sent.

## Messages for you

# Messages (Message Waiting)

This display indicates that there are two or more messages recorded in your Message Waiting list.



## Microphone muted

## Handsfree/Mute

This message indicates that the microphone on your telephone has been turned OFF. The speaker, however, is still operating. You can hear the person on the other end of the line, but he or she cannot hear you.

#### Music OFF

# **Cancel Background Music**

This temporary message indicates that the Background Music feature has been turned OFF.

Music ON

## **Background Music**

This temporary message indicates that music can be heard through your telephone speaker when no call is in progress.

Need Handsfree

#### Headset

This message indicates that Handsfree/Mute is not programmed for your telephone. In order to use a Headset, make sure the Handsfree/Mute feature is turned ON in the "Permissions" section of Administration programming.

If you are not using a Headset, this message indicates that you have plugged your telephone receiver into the Headset outlet on the bottom of the telephone. Check to make sure that your receiver is plugged into the correct outlet.

New Ring Again

Ring Again

This temporary message indicates that you have activated the Ring Again feature, replacing a previously requested Ring Again.

Night service ON

# **Night Service**

This message appears on the Night Control Phone, and indicates that the Night Service feature has been activated for the specified line.

No call answered

# **Answer Groups**

This message appears if you press your Answer button when there is no call ringing at the telephone associated with that button.

## Call Park (Retrieval)

There was no call parked on the Retrieve Park code you have entered. Enter the correct code to retrieve the parked call.

There are no messages waiting on your telephone.

No number saved

## **Saved Number Redial**

You have attempted to save the number of an incoming outside call, or an Intercom call. You can only save outside numbers which you have dialed.

No number stored

**Speed Dial** 

The two-digit code you dialed is a blank Speed Dial entry. It contains no outside number to be dialed.

No saved number

## **Saved Number Redial**

You have not saved an outside number since the last time your system was restarted. The Saved Number Redial memory is empty.

Display Messages No voice call

#### **Voice Call**

The telephone receiving the call cannot accept Voice Calls for one of the following reasons:

- the telephone is active or ringing with another call
- · the telephone is in Call Forward mode
- · the telephone is in Do Not Disturb mode
- · the telephone has Voice Call Deny turned ON.

The call proceeds automatically as a regular ringing call.

Try your Voice Call later, after the condition that prevented the Voice Call has been removed, or use Priority Call to make a forced Voice Call, if this feature is permitted at your telephone in Administration programming.

No voice calls

## **Voice Call Deny**

This temporary message indicates that no Voice Calls will be accepted by your telephone. It does not prevent you from making Voice Calls to other telephones.

Normal service

## **Night Service**

This temporary message appears on the Night Control Phone to indicate that the line has been taken off Night Service and returned to normal functioning.

Not in service

#### Call Forward

Two or more telephones are linked in a forwarding chain, and one of the telephones is out of service; a telephone is out of service when it is disconnected or when it is being used for programming the system. Wait until the Call Forward has been turned OFF at the telephone which is forwarded to a telephone which is out of service.

#### Call Identification

An invalid Intercom number has been used, or the telephone being called is in an Administration or Configuration session, or has been disconnected.

## **Priority Call**

You have attempted to contact a telephone which is busy in an Administration or Configuration session.

Wait until the telephone is free, or use the Page feature to contact the person you are trying to reach.

## **Night Service**

The Night Ringing Phone you are trying to activate is out of service or defined as "None".

Define the Night Ringing Phone in Administration, or check to make sure the Night Ringing Phone is plugged in and working.

#### Transfer Callback

The telephone to which you are trying to transfer a call is out of service. Notify your caller that the connection cannot be made at this time.

Not set

## Ring Again

The Ring Again feature has not been activated.

Number saved

#### Saved Number Redial

You have successfully stored the outside telephone number which you have dialed. Activating the Saved Number Redial feature will dial the number which appears after this temporary display.

On another call

#### Call Identification

The telephone you have called is active on another call.

If your call is not answered (using the Call Pickup feature), turn Ring Again ON, or try the call later.

Out of service

#### Maintenance

This message appears on your telephone when you attempt to use a line which is being tested in a Norstar Maintenance session.

Use another line to make your call, or wait until the Maintenance session is over.

Page all

## Page

This message confirms that paging is active, and that your announcement will be heard through both the telephone speakers and the external speaker.

Page choice:

## **Page**

When you activate Page - General (Feature 6 0), this message asks you to press 1, 2 or 3 on the dialpad (or use the display buttons provided by the system) to specify the zone in which your page will be heard:

1 — internal (SETS)

2 — external (SPKR)

— both internal and external (BOTH)

Page timeout

## Page

The two minutes allotted for paging have expired.

Page again to complete the message.

Page external

#### **Page**

This message indicates that paging is active, and that your announcement will be heard through the extension speaker.

Page internal

### Page

This message confirms that paging is active, and that your announcement will be heard through the telephone speakers.

Paging ALL

#### Page

This message appears while you are paging all zones in your system.

Paging ALL, SPKR

## Page

This message appears while you are paging all zones in your system as well as the external speaker provided by your company.

Paging busy

## Page

A page is already in process in the Page Zone you have requested. Wait until the present page has ended, then re-try your page.

Paging SPKR

## **Page**

This message appears while you are paging using the external speaker provided by your company.

This message appears during a page and indicates which Page Zone is being used.

This message appears while you are paging a specific zone (<x>) as well as the external speaker provided by your company.

Split the conference first, and park both portions of it under separate Retrieve Park codes. The person who retrieves the calls can reconnect the conference call.

Parked call

## Call Park Callback and Transfer Callback

This message identifies the programmed line name or the two-digit line number of a call which is returning to your telephone after an unsuccessful Transfer or an unretrieved Call Park.

Parked on: XXX

#### Call Park

You have successfully parked a call on the Retrieve Park code XXX (assigned by your system as a number between 101 and 109). This number must be entered at any telephone to retrieve the call.

Parking full

#### Call Park

All nine available Retrieve Park codes (101-109) are in use. Wait until a Retrieve Park code becomes available or transfer your call using another of Norstar's various methods: Transfer, Conference/Transfer, or Transfer using Hold.

Pick up:

## Call Pickup (Directed)

This messages prompts you to enter the Intercom number of the telephone at which the call you want to pick up is ringing.

Pickup denied

## Call Pickup

There is no call ringing which you are able to answer, or the call which was ringing has already been answered. If you hear a call ringing, it may be on a Private line; or, if you are using Call Pickup (Group), it may be ringing outside your Pickup Group.

#### Trunk Answer

The call you are attempting to answer is not ringing at a Night Ringing Phone.—Trunk Answer (from any telephone) can only be used when Night Service is turned ON for the line on which the call is ringing.

Please hang up

#### Maintenance

This temporary message indicates that the line or telephone you are using will be tested in a Norstar Maintenance session after approximately one minute.

Please wait...

### **Priority Call**

This message appears once you have attempted to place a Priority Call to an active telephone. It lasts for five seconds, during which period the person you are attempting to contact can block your call.

Press held line

#### Conference/Transfer

This message prompts you to press the line button of the call on hold in order to connect it to your conference call.

Priority call

## **Priority Call**

This message appears on your telephone display while you are connected on a Priority Call.

Priority denied

## **Priority Call**

You have attempted to place a Priority call to an Answer Group in which the destination telephone is not connected. Contact the telephone which has the Answer button for the Group and leave a message.

Display Messages

Priority > <name>

## **Priority Call**

This message appears on your telephone display when someone is attempting to contact you using the Priority Call feature.

To accept the call, wait five seconds for it to connect. To reject the call, press DND (Do Not Disturb) or the BLOCK display button which appears with this message (M7324 and M7310 telephones only).

Restricted call

## **Call Restrictions and Overrides**

On the M7324 and M7310 telephones, this message asks whether you want to set the Ring Again feature when you cannot get through on a particular inside call. The message is accompanied by the display buttons: <a href="YES">YES</a> <a href="NO">NO</a> and <a href="EXIT">EXIT</a>, with which you can indicate your decision.

This temporary message shows the name or number of the line or telephone which you are answering using Call Pickup or Trunk Answer (from any telephone).

This message shows the name or line number of the call which is being transferred to your telephone.

#### Conference/Transfer

This message shows the names or line numbers of the two parties connected with you in a conference call.

## **Answer Groups**

This message appears on the secretary's telephone when a call arrives at the manager's telephone. The first <name> shows the name of the caller's line or telephone; the second <name> shows the name of the manager's telephone. The "> " symbol indicates the direction of the call (the first <name> placed the call to the second <name>).

## Callback (Call Park and Transfer)

When a Callback from a parked call is forwarded to another telephone, this message shows the name or number of the outside line which the original call is on and the name or Intercom number of the telephone which is forwarding the call.

#### **Call Forward**

If you place a call and this message appears, it indicates the person you are calling (first name or Intercom number) and the telephone to which all its calls are forwarded (second name or Intercom number).

If you are active on a call and this message appears, it indicates that a call has been forwarded to your telephone from another telephone in your system. The first <name> is the name or number of the line or Norstar telephone which originally placed the call; the second <name> is the name or Intercom number of the telephone which is forwarding its calls to you.

#### **Transfer**

This message shows the names or line numbers of the call you are transferring and the party to whom you are transferring the call.

<name> h:mm:ss

#### **Call Duration Timer**

This message on any telephone shows the length of that telephone's most recent call in hours, minutes, and seconds. If the call was an inside call, <name> represents the name of the other telephone involved. If the call was an outside call, <name> represents the line used.





## **Administration Overview Flow Chart**













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






The following flow chart shows the relationship between the various display messages which appear in the Permissions section of Norstar Administration.











# Using Handsfree/Mute

Norstar's Handsfree/Mute capabilities can be of great benefit in effective use of your telephone. With the Handsfree/Mute button, you can carry on a telephone conversation without having to hold your receiver or be connected to your telephone by a headset cord. This allows you to have more than one person participating in a call at one telephone.

Your Norstar telephone's microphone and speaker will not both function at the same time. The telephone detects the level of noise in the vicinity, and activates the microphone (to send your voice to another telephone) when the noise level reaches a certain point.

In order to get the maximum amount of benefit from Handsfree communication, below is a list of suggestions which will help you to use Handsfree/Mute more effectively.

### Handsfree etiquette

- 1. Direct your voice towards the telephone. The closer you are to the telephone, the easier it is for the microphone to transmit a clear voice to your listener.
- Wait for your caller to finish speaking before you begin. Because the
  microphone and speaker cannot both be ON, your caller's voice may
  be cut off if you both speak at the same time.
- 3. To prevent a possible echo, keep the area around your telephone free of papers and other objects which might screen your microphone. Turning down your microphone volume (using the Volume bar below the telephone dialpad) will also help prevent echo.
- 4. Always tell the person or people to whom you are speaking that you are using Handsfree, and let them know who else is listening to the conversation.
- 5. Handsfree telephone calls may be heard in nearby offices. In open office environments, use a receiver or headset when Handsfree conversation is not necessary, or when you need privacy for a call.
- 6. Speak at a normal level. If you speak too loudly, your voice may have a hollow sound. If this is a problem, try moving your telephone to a more sheltered location.

## Working in a noisy environment

- 1. Place the telephone so that any unavoidable local noise (such as an air conditioner) is behind it. This will limit the amount of background noise in your calls.
- 2. It is possible for noises such as a tapping pencil to be loud enough to turn your microphone ON, which may cut off your caller's speech.
- 3. Keep your office as quiet as possible during the call. Remember that all sounds in the room are picked up by the microphone.

# Glossary

Access Code: A sequence of characters used to gain entry into Norstar programming. There are Access Codes to begin Configuration and Administration programming.

Access Signalling: Your Norstar telephone can access a remote system (such as a Centrex or a PBX) connected to the telephone system, or dial a number on an alternate carrier by means of Access Signalling (also referred to as End-to-End signalling). There are five features that provide specialized signalling: Link, Long Tones, Pause, Run/Stop, and Timed Release.

Administration: The programming of certain settings on the Norstar system. This is usually done by the System Coordinator. These settings include the following: 1. System Speed Dial, 2. Names, 3. Time and Date, 4. Restrictions, 5. Overrides,

6. Permissions, 7. Night Service, and 8. Passwords.

# **Administration Access Code:** These characters

Feature \* \* 23646 or
Feature \* ADMIN must be
entered to access Administration
programming. The code cannot be used
to enter Configuration programming, Set
Copy, or Maintenance.

Administration Password: This optional one to six digit Password prevents unauthorized access to Norstar Administration. The Administration password is assigned in section "8. Passwords" of Administration programming.

Alarm Set (Alarm Phone): The Alarm Set is the telephone designated to receive reports of system problems. The Alarm Set is usually assigned to a Prime Phone, but it can be changed by the Installer in section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming.

Analog Terminal Adapter (ATA): This device permits analog telecommunication devices (for example, FAX, answering machines, and single line telephones) to connect to the Norstar system. Programmable settings for the ATA are automatically assigned by the system. Refer to the ATA User Card for more information on ATA programming.

Answer Button: An Answer button is a telephone button (with indicator) that is used to monitor another telephone within an Answer Group. One telephone can have up to four Answer buttons.

Pressing one of these buttons provides immediate access to the Intercom or outside line that is ringing at the monitored telephone. An Answer button is automatically assigned to a telephone when that telephone is assigned an Answer DN in section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming.

Answer DN: The Directory Number (DN) of a telephone in an Answer Group that is monitored by an Answer button on the telephone being programmed. In section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming, the Installer can assign up to four Answer DNs to be associated with the telephone being programmed.

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Answer Group: An Answer Group consists of at least two telephones that are associated by an Answer button. The Answer button, on one of these telephones, indicates incoming calls destined for the other telephone. Someone working at a telephone with Answer buttons (a receptionist, for example) can monitor the Answer Group (a group of managers), receive all ringing and visual indication of incoming calls, and answer the calls accordingly.

Applied to lines: This sub-heading appears in section "4. Restrictions" and section "5. Overrides" of Administration programming. If you select Show, you will be prompted to assign Restrictions or Overrides to each line.

Applied to sets: This sub-heading appears in section "4. Restrictions" and section "5. Overrides" of Administration programming. If you select Show, you will be prompted to assign Restrictions or Overrides to each telephone.

Autodial Button: The Autodial button provides one-touch dialing of outside numbers, Intercom numbers, or feature codes. You program a button to be an Autodial button.

Automatic Hold: This feature will automatically place an active call on hold if another line is selected.

Glossary Index Automatic Phone Relocation: The Automatic Phone Relocation feature allows a telephone to retain its personal and system programming when it is reconnected to another physical location. This feature is activated in section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming.

Auxiliary Ringer: This is a separate external telephone ringer or bell. It is typically mounted on a wall, and is louder than a regular telephone so that it can be heard over a wide area. It can be programmed to ring when a line (section "1. Line Data" of Configuration), a telephone (section "6. Permissions" of Administration), or both ring; or, when Night Service (section "7. Night Service" of Administration) is active.

Background Music: This feature allows music from an external source, such as a radio, to play over the speaker of the telephone. This feature should not be activated unless a music source (customer supplied) has been connected to the Norstar System. Background Music is activated in section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming.

Busy Lamp Field (BLF): This device, which attaches onto the M7310 telephone, has a panel of Liquid Crystal Display (LCD) indicators that show the busy/not busy and DND (Do Not Disturb) status of up to 24 telephones in the Norstar system. Each of the dual memory buttons that are programmed as Inside Autodial buttons on the M7310 will indicate the status of an office telephone. The BLF will also indicate if a telephone is involved in a programming session. The BLF is typically used on a receptionist's telephone.

Button Caps: These interchangeable plastic squares fit over the buttons of Norstar telephones, and allow you to label the features programmed onto each programmable button location. Button caps can be either pre-printed or have clear windows which allow people to label other features, lines, and autodial numbers.

**Button Inquiry**: This feature allows you to check the function of each programmable memory button on a Norstar telephone.

Call Forward (No Answer): This feature forwards all unanswered calls at one telephone to another designated telephone after a specified number of rings (see "Forward Delay"). This feature is useful if you will temporarily be unavailable to answer calls at your telephone, or you will be working near another telephone. The Call Forward feature is assigned in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming.

Call Handling: A collection of some Norstar features and their parameters which are programmed in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming. Call Handling includes settings for the following features: Held Line Reminder, Delayed Ring Transfer, Transfer Callback, Park Timeout, Directed Pickup, and Music/Tones/Silence On Hold.

Call Park: Call Park places a connected call on hold, allowing it to be retrieved from any other telephone in your system. You can retrieve the call from any telephone by selecting an intercom line, and then entering the Retrieve Park code (which automatically appears on the display of the telephone which parked the call). Up to nine calls can be parked at once in the system.

Call Park Callback: See "Callback".

Call Pickup (Directed): This feature allows anyone to answer a call ringing at any telephone by specifying the Intercom number of that telephone before taking the call. Call Pickup (Directed) is activated in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

Callback: Callback occurs at a telephone which attempts an unsuccessful Transfer or Call Park for an outside call. After a specified period of time, an unanswered call returns to the telephone which originally made the Transfer or parked the call.

CAP Module: The CAP Module provides 48 Inside Autodial buttons, and is connected to the M7324 telephone to create the Central Answering Position. An M7324 with CAP Modules can assist an office receptionist in monitoring and answering calls. A maximum of two CAP Modules can be connected to a single M7324 telephone.

Central Answering Position (CAP): The CAP consists of an M7324 telephone and one or two CAP Modules. The CAP can be used to monitor the telephones in a Norstar system, and to control incoming telephone calls.

Centrex (Template): This is one of the four Norstar system Templates. Centrex is a business system service provided by the telephone company, offering local lines and a variety of other features. The Centrex Template assigns one unique outside line to each telephone until the maximum number of lines is reached (example: Line 1 to telephone 221, Line 2 to telephone 222, and so on). Any remaining telephones do not receive a default line assignment.

The Centrex Template also modifies the Restriction and Override tables (a "9" precedes the default entries) to accommodate dialing outside the Centrex system, rather than within it. The Centrex Template is assigned when your system is first installed.

Change DNs: The Installer can change the length of all DNs in the system or replace an existing DN with a new number in section "5. Change DNs" of Configuration programming (for more information, see "Directory Number Length".)

**CO Line (Central Office Line):** This is an external or outside telephone line.

Configuration: This is a type of programming that assigns certain settings to lines and telephones, as well as some system-wide settings. Configuration is performed by the telephone company Installer or Service Representative rather than by System Coordinators. "Installer Only" appears in the Meridian Norstar Modular Programming Record for each Configuration programming section to be programmed by the Installer.

Configuration Access Code: A sequence of digits which are dialed on the dialpad to provide access to Configuration programming. The Installer Password must be entered before any Configuration programming can be done.

Copy: The COPY display button appears during Configuration and Administration programming. This button allows you to duplicate certain programmed settings from one line to another, or from one telephone to another. Line programmable settings that can be copied are Line Data, Restrictions, Overrides, and Night Service. Telephone (set) programmable settings that can be copied are Line Access, Restrictions, Overrides, and Permissions.

**Cursor**: This is a short line which appears on the telephone display to indicate that digits or letters can be entered using the dialpad. Date: See "Time and Date".

**Data Terminals**: Devices which can be used to transfer data instead of only voice (as with a telephone). The settings for these devices are not programmed with Configuration or Administration programming.

Default Setting: This is a feature setting which is in effect upon initial installation unless manually changed through programming. Default settings are automatically assigned to correspond to the Square Template during your system's installation. In the Meridian Norstar Modular Programming Record, default settings are shown in Bold text.

**Delay:** The time period before certain features become active. A delay can be programmed for the following features: Call Forward (No Answer), Call Park Callback, Delayed Ring Transfer, Held Line Reminder, and Transfer Callback features.

Delayed Ring Transfer (DRT) to Prime:
After a specified number of rings, this
feature transfers an unanswered ringing
call to the Prime Phone associated with the
line the call is on. This feature is activated
in section "3. Call Handling" of
Configuration programming.

Dial-0 Set (Dial Zero Phone): A telephone which is assigned to ring when someone dials "0" from another Norstar telephone. Dial-0 provides an easily remembered number and quick access to a central telephone, such as an operator at a Central Answering Position. This feature is assigned in section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming.

**Directed Pickup**: See "Call Pickup (Directed)".

Directory Number (DN): A unique number which is automatically assigned to each telephone or Data Terminal during your system's installation. The DN, also referred to as an Intercom number, allows the Norstar system to identify each device connected to the Key Service Unit or Expansion Module. The DN is often used to identify a telephone when settings are assigned during Configuration and Administration programming.

Directory Number (DN) Length: A non-expanded system can have a DN length of 2, 3, or 4 digits. An expanded system (a system with an Expansion Cartridge installed) can have a DN length of 3 or 4 digits. All Directory numbers for the system must be the same length. The default DN length is two digits for a non-expanded system, and three digits for an expanded system. The lowest default DN is "21" in a two digit system, "221" in a three digit system, and "2221" in a four digit system.

**Display**: A Liquid Crystal Display (LCD) on the telephone that provides information related to feature operation and programming.

Display Button: The Norstar M7310 and M7324 telephones are each equipped with three buttons located directly beneath the Liquid Crystal Display. During feature operation or programming, some or all of these buttons may be used to provide you with further options. If an option is available, it is shown in the bottom row of the two column display, directly above the corresponding display button.

**DRT Delay**: The number of rings before a Delayed Ring Transfer occurs. This is assigned in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

**DRT to Prime**: See "Delayed Ring Transfer to Prime".

**Emergency Telephone**: A single line telephone (also referred to as a 500/2500 telephone) that becomes active when there is no power to the Key Service Unit.

Expansion Cartridge: The Expansion Cartridge allows Expansion Modules to connect to the Key Service Unit, providing the opportunity to increase the number of outside and Intercom lines that the system can handle (beyond the 8X24 Key Service Unit). The Expansion Cartridge is inserted into the Key Service Unit, and a DS-30 cable connects the Expansion Cartridge to each Expansion Module. Expansion Cartridges are available with two or six ports.

Expansion Module: A Trunk Module or a Station Module. A maximum of six Modules may be installed with the use of the six port Expansion Cartridge. A maximum of two Modules may be installed with a two port Expansion Cartridge.

**External Paging**: A Norstar feature that allows voice announcements to be made over an externally mounted loudspeaker (supplied by the customer) connected to the Key Service Unit.

**Feature:** A Norstar feature performs a useful task that uses system-wide, telephone, or line parameters in helping you to optimize your use of the Norstar equipment.

**Feature Button**: This oblong grey button is the first button you press when using a feature, or to gain access to programming with an Access Code. This button indicates to the system that the string of digits which follows is a feature code.

**Feature Cartridge**: A replaceable software cartridge containing the Norstar features. The Feature Cartridge is inserted into the Key Service Unit.

Feature Code: This is a number that is used to activate a particular feature. Features are activated by first pressing the Feature button and then entering the feature's numeric code on the dialpad.

Flexible Numbering Plan: Norstar allows you to individually assign Directory Numbers (DNs) and Line Pool Access Codes, and the system-wide DN length can be set to 2, 3, or 4 digits (see "Directory Number Length".)

Flow Charts: These diagrams show the pathways from one display message to the next during programming, and which buttons to press to move between display messages.

Forward Delay: Forward Delay is the number of rings before an unanswered call is forwarded to another telephone with the Call Forward (No Answer) feature. Forward Delay is assigned in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming.

**Forward No Answer**: See "Call Forward (No Answer)".

Forward to: The DN entered for this setting is the Intercom number of the telephone to which the Call Forward (No Answer) feature will forward unanswered calls. The DN is assigned in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming.

Full Autohold (on idle line): If you select an idle external line without dialing on it, and then perform another action which selects another line, this feature

will place the original feature on hold. This setting is assigned in section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming.

Full Handsfree: See "Handsfree".

**General admin**: This heading appears as "B. General admin". See "Administration" for more details.

**Handset:** This is another name for the hand-held receiver of a telephone.

Handsfree: This feature lets you talk and listen to calls without lifting the receiver of the telephone. Full Handsfree is activated in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming. When assigned to a telephone, a Handsfree button is automatically assigned to the telephone. Pressing this button will toggle the feature ON and OFF.

Handsfree (HF) Answerback: This feature, when activated, automatically turns ON the microphone at a telephone receiving a Voice Call so that the person receiving the call can respond without lifting the receiver. This feature is activated in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming.

Handsfree/Mute Button: See "Handsfree".

**Headset:** Norstar telephones support the use of headsets (customer supplied), which are small head or ear mounted telephone receivers that are used instead of the hand held receiver.

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Held (Line) Reminder: A reminder tone and a "Held Call" display message occur at a Norstar telephone when a call has been placed on hold for a programmed period of time. The Held Line Reminder feature and Remind Delay are programmed in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

**HF Answerback**: See "Handsfree Answerback".

**Hold button:** This red button, Hold, is used to suspend calls so that the person using the telephone can perform another task without disconnecting the caller.

Hybrid (Template): This is one of the four Norstar system Templates. In the Hybrid Template, Line 1 appears on each telephone, and each telephone has access to Line Pool 1. The Template is assigned when the Installer first does hardware installation and system programming.

I/C: An abbreviation for the word Intercom.

Individual DNs: This sub-heading, in section "5. Change DNs" of Configuration programming, allows the Installer to change the Intercom number of a telephone within your system.

Installer: Someone who installs the Norstar equipment, and performs Configuration programming. The Installer or the System Coordinator can program Administration settings.

Installer Password: A Password that is used to prevent unauthorized access to Configuration programming. Only the Installer should know this Password. The default Installer Password must be used to enter Configuration unless changed in section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration Programming.

Intercom Buttons: These buttons provide access to inside (Intercom) lines used for calls within a Norstar system or for access to outside lines through a Line Pool. A telephone may be assigned up to eight Intercom buttons, or none. The number of Intercom buttons on a telephone may be assigned in section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming.

Intercom Keys: See "Intercom Buttons".

Intercom Lines: These lines, also known as inside lines or extensions, are used for calls within a Norstar system or to access outside lines through a Line Pool.

Job Aids: These charts are used to record the settings from Administration programming, allowing each Norstar system's records to be kept up to date.

Key Service Unit (KSU): The central hardware component in the Norstar system. The KSU has its own processor and memory, and provides a physical point of connection for the various types of Data Terminals, telephones, and Expansion Modules. The KSU can function on its own as a basic system (with 24 Norstar telephones and 8 CO lines), or with the addition of a Trunk Module (TM) which adds more CO lines, or with a Station Module (SM) which supports more Norstar telephones.

Line: An external or outside telephone line. This is also referred to as a Central Office (CO) line. Each Norstar line can have different characteristics assigned to it through Configuration programming.

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Line Access: These Configuration settings allow you to program certain line parameters to an individual telephone. Section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming includes Line Assignment, Answer DNs, Ringing, Line Pool Access, Intercom Keys, and Prime Line.

Line Assignment: Line Assignment lets you define which lines are accessible to an individual telephone. An outside line assigned to a telephone must appear on a Line button with an indicator. The maximum number of lines that can be assigned for each model of telephone are: 8 for the M7208, 10 for the M7310, and 24 for the M7324. The use of programmed feature buttons, such as Handsfree , will reduce the number of buttons available for Line appearances. Line Assignment is programmed in section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming.

Line Data: These settings let you program certain parameters specific to an individual line. Section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming includes Line Type, Line Mode, Auxiliary Ring, Full Auto-Hold on idle line, and Prime Set.

**Line Names:** This sub-heading of section "2. Names" of Administration Programming allows you to assign Names to outside lines.

Line Number: A two digit number which identifies a line connected to the KSU. The maximum number of lines depends on how many Trunk Modules are installed. Line numbers range from 01 to 80. (Installers: see your Meridian Norstar Modular Pocket Installation Guide for tables showing the numerical relationship between DN, Port, and line numbers.)

**Line Pool:** A Line Pool is a specific group of lines used for making outside

calls. Line Pools are an efficient way of providing a telephone with access to outside lines without taking up many Line buttons. Each of Norstar's nine Line Pools (if assigned) are accessed by dialling a Line Pool Access code on an Intercom line or by pressing a preprogrammed x(Line Pool) button. A line in a Line Pool cannot be a "Public" or "Private" line. A line is assigned to be a member of a Line Pool in section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming.

Line Pool Access: This sub-heading assigns the Line Pools that a telephone may access. Line Pool Access is assigned in section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming.

Line Pool Access Code: The Line Pool Access Code is a number that is used to identify a specific Line Pool when you want to use the Line Pool feature (pressing a pre-programmed Line Pool button could also do this for you). Rules governing the assignment of Line Pool Access Codes are: 1) the code can be a number from one to four digits in length, 2) the code cannot be the same as any Directory Number (DN), and 3) codes starting with the same digit must be the same length. Line Pool Access Codes are assigned in section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming.

Link Time: This is a specific time delay that allows access to PBX or Centrex features through a Norstar system. Link Time is also referred to as a "Hookswitch Flash" or "Recall". Link time is assigned by the Installer in section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming. (Installers: call the PBX or Centrex customer service department for information on the required Link Time.)

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**M7208**: The Meridian model M7208 telephone has a single line display, and eight programmable buttons with indicators.

M7310: The Meridian model M7310 telephone has a two line display with three display buttons, 10 programmable buttons with indicators, and 12 dual programmable buttons without indicators.

M7324: The Meridian model M7324 telephone has a two line display with three display buttons, and 24 programmable buttons with indicators.

Maintenance: The menu heading "D. Maintenance" of Configuration programming allows the Installer or Service Representative to diagnose and repair any problems with the system. Maintenance requires no programmable settings.

Memory Buttons: These buttons can be programmed to activate automatic dialing or frequently used features. All three Norstar telephones have memory buttons with indicators, and the M7310 has an additional 12 dual memory buttons without indicators.

**Message**: A message, which appears on the telephone display, will inform the recipient to call the person who sent the message. Messages can only be sent within the Norstar system.

Miscellaneous: Section "4.

Miscellaneous" of Configuration
programming is a collection of assorted
system-wide settings. Miscellaneous
includes: Background Music, Dial-0 Set,
Alarm Set, Link Time, Set Relocation, Line
Pool Codes, and Installer Password.

**Mode:** The signaling mode of an outside telephone line can be either Pulse or Tone.

The default setting is Pulse, but the Tone mode is often required for a system to interact with Centrex or other special features. The mode can be changed by the Installer in section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming.

Music Source: An external music source (customer supplied), such as a radio, can be connected to the Key Service Unit for Music on Hold, Background Music, or both.

Names: This section of Administration programming is used to assign an optional name to identify and personalize each telephone or line. This name appears on a display during the use of certain features. A name can be any combination of letters or numbers up to seven characters in length. Names are assigned in section "2. Names" of Administration programming. If no name is assigned, the line number or DN (for a telephone) will appear instead on the display.

Night Auxiliary Ring: This setting controls whether or not calls arriving at a Night Ringing Phone will also ring at the Auxiliary Ringer. Night Auxiliary Ring is assigned within section "7. Night Service" of Administration programming.

**Night Control**: A Night Control Phone can place the lines for which it has responsibility in or out of Night Service. Night Control is assigned to a telephone in section "7. Night Service" of Administration programming.

**Night Ring**: A telephone (the "Night Ringing Phone") can be assigned to ring when a line has been placed into Night Service. The telephone is assigned in section "7. Night Service" of Administration programming.

Night Ringing Phone: See "Night Ring".

Night Service: Certain features become active when Norstar is placed into an operating mode called "Night Service". This is usually done to provide special ringing and Dial Zero access after normal office hours or when there are few people available to answer calls. These features are: Trunk Answer, Night Zero Set, Night Control, Night Ring, and Night Auxiliary Ring. Night Service settings are programmed in section "7. Night Service" of Administration programming.

#### Night-0 Set (Night Dial Zero Phone):

This setting assigns a certain telephone as an additional Dial Zero telephone when Night Service is active (Note: Calls which ring at the Night Dial Zero telephone will also ring at the other Dial Zero telephone assigned in section

"4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming). Night-0 Set is assigned in section "7. Night Service" of Administration programming.

Norstar Programming Overlay: This Overlay is placed over the top four memory buttons on the M7310 or M7324 telephones. The Overlay labels indicate the special function that each of the four buttons have during programming. The functions are: Heading, Back, Show, and Next. You use these buttons to provide options for moving through the display messages.

On Hold: This setting controls whether your callers hear music, periodic tones, or silence when they are placed on hold. This system-wide feature is assigned in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

Overlay".

Overlay: See "Norstar Programming

Overrides: These are selected exceptions to the call Restrictions placed on lines and telephones. There is a system-wide maximum of 10 Overrides. A telephone caller may, for example, be prevented from dialing numbers which start with the digit "1", but may have an override of "1403". This would allow the user to dial any number which starts with "1403". Overrides are defined, and then assigned to certain lines or telephones, in section "5. Overrides" of Administration programming.

Override Index Number: A number between 1 and 10 which identifies an Override.

Page: This Norstar feature allows you to make announcements from your telephone which can be heard by many people at the same time. There are three Page options, selected by you at your telephone when the Page is made: Internal Page (announce over the telephone speakers), External Page (announce over an externally mounted, customer supplied loudspeaker), and both Internal and External Page together.

Page Zone: A local area in the office that can receive directed Page announcements independently of the remainder of the office. Each Page Zone is identified by a number from 1 to 6. Each telephone is assigned to a unique Page Zone in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming.

Park Timeout: This is the period of time before an unanswered Call Park call is redirected to the Prime Phone for the line the call is on. Park Timeout is defined in "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

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Password: A Password is a specific sequence of digits which is entered from the dialpad to gain access to Norstar programming. A Password is required for to initialize your system, and for Administration and Configuration programming (also, see "Restriction Override Password".)

**PBX**: See "Private Branch Exchange (Template)".

Permissions: These are specific characteristics that can be assigned to an individual telephone. Permissions includes Full Handsfree, Handsfree Answerback, Pickup Group, Page Zone, Auxiliary Ringer, Forward No Answer, and Priority Call. Permissions are programmed in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming.

Personal Speed Dial: These two-digit code numbers (71-94) can be programmed to dial outside telephone numbers up to 16 digits in length. Personal Speed Dial codes are programmed on individual telephones within your system and can only be used from the telephone on which they are programmed.

Pickup Group: A telephone can be placed into one of nine Call Pickup Groups. A call ringing at a telephone within a Pickup Group can be picked up by any other telephone within the same Pickup Group. A Pickup Group is assigned to a telephone in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming

Pool: See "Line Pool".

**Prime Line**: A telephone can be programmed to automatically select a certain line type whenever a call is made by lifting the receiver or pressing the

Prime Line, and is assigned in section

"2. Line Access" of Configuration programming.

Prime Set (Prime Phone): This telephone provides backup answering for incoming calls on outside lines. The Prime Phone is typically used by a receptionist. Special features which redirect the unanswered calls are available at a Prime Phone (such as Delayed Ring Transfer and Held Line Reminder). A Prime Phone may be assigned to a line in section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming. The default Prime Phone DN is 21 for a non-expanded system, and 221 or 2221 for an expanded system (depending on the DN length in effect).

Priority Call: This feature allows you to make an urgent Voice Call to another telephone when the other telephone is busy or has Do Not Disturb activated. Priority Call should not be made available to everyone, and should be selectively programmed. This feature is enabled for a telephone in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming.

#### **Private Branch Exchange (Template):**

This is one of the four Norstar System Templates. In the Private Branch Exchange (PBX) Template, specified Lines are in a Line Pool. You must first press an Intercom button and then dial 9, or press a Line Pool button, to make outside calls. Each telephone is assigned access to Line Pool 1.

Private to: An external (CO) line may be assigned to one telephone as a private line. The line does not appear on any other telephone. Private lines cannot be placed in Line Pools. A line may be assigned as a Private line in section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming.

Programming: The designation of various characteristics within the Norstar system. This includes the activation of certain optional features (turning the feature ON or OFF), the assigning of parameters used by certain features (such as a DN), and the designation of various settings for lines and telephones. Programming can only be done from the M7310 or M7324 telephones, and makes use of a sequence of steps that prompts the Installer or System Coordinator to enter a value or choose a menu option.

**Programming Overlay**: See "Norstar Programming Overlay".

**Public**: This refers to an outside line which can be assigned to any telephone. A line is assigned as Public in section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming.

**Pulse**: This is a dialing mode for outside lines that is traditionally used by rotary dial telephones. In section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming, the Installer can select this option on any line for which Pulse dialing is necessary.

Release button: The Ris button ends a call in the same way that hanging up your receiver does. It also ends any current feature programming. If there is any activity on your telephone, pressing Ris cancels it.

Glossary Index Remind Delay: The period of time from when a call is put on hold to when a reminder tone is heard and a message appears on the telephone display. Remind Delay, a parameter of the Held Line Reminder feature, is assigned in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

**Restriction Index Number:** A number between 1 and 30 which identifies a Restriction.

Restrictions: Preselected telephones and lines may be restricted from dialing certain telephone numbers (such as long distance, directory assistance and other toll calls). Restrictions are defined and assigned to certain lines or telephones in section "4. Restrictions" of Administration programming. There is a maximum of 30 Restrictions.

Restriction Override Password: This four-digit Password allows a caller to override system-wide Restrictions when making an outside call. This Password must be entered before the call is dialed. Up to 100 Restriction Override Passwords may be defined in section "8. Passwords" of Administration programming.

Ring/No ring: See "Ringing".

Ringing: In section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming, a line can be assigned to ring or not to ring at a telephone for incoming calls. If a line has been assigned as "No ring", an incoming call is still shown by a flashing indicator.

Set: Set is another name for a telephone.

Set Copy: Set Copy allows the Installer to duplicate the characteristics of one telephone to another telephone. Set Copy is available through menu heading "C. Set Copy". The Installer has the option of duplicating System data (data from Configuration and Administration programming) and User data (from personal programming), or just System data. Set Copy does not provide the same copy capability as does the COPY display button, which allows you to be more selective of the settings which are to be duplicated.

**Set Names**: This sub-heading of section "2. Names" of Administration Programming allows you to assign Names to telephones.

**Set Relocation**: See "Automatic Phone Relocation".

Set/Line Profile: This feature allows you to review, from a M7310 or M7324 telephone, the settings programmed to telephones (sets) and lines in Configuration and Administration programming. You can not change any of the settings with this feature.

**Shift Button:** This small triangular button is located beside the dual memory buttons on the upper half of the M7310 telephone. The shift button must be pressed to store or access features on the top half of the dual memory buttons.

**Shoulder Rest**: The shoulder rest is designed to allow you to comfortably rest the receiver on your shoulder so that your hands are free to do other tasks.

Square (Template): This is one of the four Norstar system Templates. In the Square Template, Lines 1 and 2 are assigned to each telephone. The Square Template is the default assigned during your system's installation. All defaults shown in the Meridian Norstar Modular Programming Record correspond to the Square Template settings.

**Station:** This is another way of referring to an individual telephone or to a telephone's location.

Station Auxiliary Power Supply: This device is used to provide power to a CAP Module, or a Norstar telephone that is connected more than 300 m (1000 ft.) and less than 760 m (2500 ft) from the Key Service Unit.

Station Module (SM): An Expansion Module that provides the Norstar system with access to 16 more telephones. Up to six of these Modules may be installed with the use of a six-port Expansion Cartridge.

**System Coordinator**: This is the title assigned to the person responsible for Norstar Administration programming and the training of co-workers on the Norstar system.

**System Data**: Programmable settings from your system's installation, and from Configuration and Administration programming.

System Speed Dial: These two digit numbers (01 to 70) can each be programmed to dial telephone numbers up to 16 digits in length. System Speed Dial codes are programmed for the entire system in section "1. System Speed Dial" of Administration programming.

**Table entries:** A sub-heading in sections "4. Restrictions" and "5. Overrides" of Administration programming. Table entries allows you to assign a Restriction to one or more of the 30 Restriction numbers, and an Override to one or more of the 10 Override numbers.

Template: A system-wide setting assigned during your system's installation. The most important effects of a Template are the number of lines assigned to the telephones, and the assignment of Line Pool Access. Templates will also assign other system-wide defaults, such as Prime Line and Ringing Line assignment. The choice of one of four Templates is not affected by Configuration or Administration programming. It is important to understand that a Template is only provided as a convenience, and that any settings effected by the Template can be changed.

**Time and Date**: The current Time and Date appear on the display of idle Norstar telephones. The Time and Date can be changed in section "3. Time and date" of Administration programming.

Tone: This is a dialing access for outside lines. Tone is also referred to as "Touchtone" or DTMF (Dual Tone Multi-Frequency) Tones. Tones may be required for Access Signalling to PBX or Centrex systems. In section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming, the Installer can select this option on any line for which Tone dialing is necessary.

**Transfer**: This feature allows you to redirect a call to another telephone. There are three types of Transfer: Transfer using Hold, Transfer using Conference, and Transfer (with or without Announcement.)

Transfer Callback: After a specified number of rings, an unanswered transferred call will return to the telephone which originally made the transfer. The number of rings can be assigned in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

**Trunk Answer**: This feature lets you answer a ringing call from any Norstar telephone in the system on any line that has Night Service activated. Trunk Answer is assigned in section "7. Night Service" of Administration programming.

Trunk Cartridge (TC): A cartridge that is inserted into the Trunk Module, and provides the connection to outside lines. Up to three cartridges can be used in one Trunk Module. Each cartridge can support four outside lines.

**Trunk Module (TM)**: An expansion module that provides the Norstar system

with up to 12 additional outside lines, depending on the number of Trunk Cartridges installed.

**Type**: This setting controls whether each line assigned to a telephone is Public, Private, or assigned to one of Norstar's nine Line Pools. Line Type is assigned in section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming.

User Data: User Data is an option in the Set Copy function. User Data refers to the personal settings which are unique to an individual telephone, and are not programmed in Configuration or Administration programming. You program these settings for your telephone at your telephone. Such settings, for example, include Personal Speed Dial and the assignment of programmable buttons.

**Voice Call:** This feature allows you to make a voice announcement or begin a conversation through the speaker of another telephone in your system.

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



- Key Service Unit (KSU). The ATA may be mounted vertically on a wall using an appropriate screw (#8 screw recommended), taking care to ensure the heat vents are not blocked.
- 2. Connect the analog device to the jack labeled (Terminal).
- 3. Connect the jack labeled (Line) to an unoccupied Norstar telephone port.
- Plug the ATA power cord into a standard three-prong ac wall-outlet. Ensure the analog device connected to the ATA is on-hook during power-up.

Note: Maximum transmission loss from the ATA analog device to the central switching office should be 10db or less at 1kHz.

## Finding the ATA Directory Number

The directory number for each ATA must be known in order that administration can be performed.

To determine the directory number for an ATA:

- 1. Connect a single line phone to the ATA.
- 2. Lift the receiver.

If you do not hear dial tone then;

- 3. Press LINK then dial 9 to get an intercom line.
- 4. Dial the intercom number of a known Norstar phone, equipped with a display.

If the called phone does not ring: An overflow tone is heard.

5. Press LINK then dial 9 to get an intercom line and then redial the intercom number of a known Norstar phone equipped with a display.

The called phone rings and displays: Set <nn> calling

- 6. Note the number <nn>. This is the directory number for the ATA.
- 7. Hang up the phone connected to the ATA.

**Note**: The Automatic set relocation feature applies to the ATA.

#### Using the ATA for Data Communications

The Analog Terminal Adapter (ATA) can be used to connect standard analog data devices such as a FAX machine or modem to the Norstar System. This section of this card details the additional steps required to install an ATA for data communications.

#### Data Transmission Requirements

When using the ATA for data transmission verify the following:

Analog Loop Resist. (Data)

200 ohms (max.) = 1,170m (3,850') @ 24 AWG

Note: The central office line assigned to the ATA should conform to the transmission network requirements specified in the data communication device's specifications. Transmission (Baud) rates over 1200 bits per second require a modulation scheme which is compatible with telephone line bandwidth. A conditioned central office line may be required to prevent data corruption during transmission over ordinary telephone lines. Maximum loss from the ATA analog terminal to the

central switching office should be 10db or less at 1kHz, or the line should be conditioned to this loss level.

#### Modem Transmission Compatibility

- FSK Frequency Shift Key
  DPSK Differential Phase Shift Key
  QAM Quadrature Amplitude Modulation.



# Setting TONES to Off

- 1. Before disconnecting the single line phone ensure that the ATA is in the Tones OFF mode.

### ATA Data Requirements

1. Ensure analog loop resistance is less than or equal to 200 ohms for data applications.

# ATA Troubleshooting

#### Check the wiring from;

- ATA to device; must be 200 ohms or less for data applications or 1300 ohms or less for voice applications.
- KSU to ATA; must be equivalent to 1000 feet of 24 AWG wire or less
- Outside line to KSU; outside Line must have dial tone and be properly connected to the KSU.

#### ATA Troubleshooting con't

Check for dial tone at the ATA by; substituting a single line phone for the Data Communications Device.

If there is no dial tone at the ATA:

- 1. Disconnect the LINE side of the ATA and connect a Norstar telephone in place of the ATA and conflect a Norstar telephone in place of the ATA to verify that the connection from the ATA to the KSU is functioning properly.

  2. If the telephone does not function, refer to the Troubleshooting section of the KSU Installation
- Guide.

If there is dial tone at the ATA's Prime Line and

- ringing line(s):

  1. Disconnect the ATA's outside Prime Line from the KSU and connect the data device directly to this
- outside line.

  2. Try a call; if problem persists the device or outside line is likely at fault.

## **Using Speed Dial**

# About Speed Dial Numbers

Speed Dial lets you call outside numbers by dialing a two-digit code. Norstar has two sets of Speed Dial codes, System Speed Dial codes from 41 to 70 (01 to 70, if equipped), and Personal Speed Dial codes from 71 to 94. System Speed Dial codes can be used from any phone in the system. Phone numbers are assigned to System Speed Dial codes by your System Coordinator. You can assign your own set of phone numbers to Personal Speed Dial codes for use exclusively with your phone.

**Note:** You cannot assign Speed Dial numbers while someone is Administering or Configuring your Meridian\* Norstar Business Communication System.

## Assigning phone numbers to Personal Speed Dial codes

- 1. Press Feature \* 4 to enter Personal Speed Dial numbers.
- 2. Enter a two-digit code (from 71 to 94).
- 3. Dial the phone number you wish to assign to that code. Phone numbers cannot exceed 16 digits.
- 4. Press Hold to finish programming.
- 5. Keep a record of each Personal Speed Dial number that you assign. See your System Coordinator for System Speed Dial numbers.



## **Norstar System components**




Figure 1.1 - Norstar Modular KSU




Figure 1.2 - Norstar Modular Trunk Module

The main component in the Norstar Modular System is the Key Service Unit (KSU). Up to six Trunk Modules and/or Station Modules are connected to the KSU by an Expansion Cartridge and DS-30 cables. Figures 1.1, 1.2, and 1.3 show a KSU, a Trunk Module, and a Station Module respectively.




Figure 1.3 - Norstar Modular Station Module

# 2 The Maintenance Session

## What is a Maintenance session?

A Maintenance session is a Norstar software feature which helps you quickly diagnose problems that may occasionally arise within the Norstar system.

The Maintenance session consists of six subheadings:

- 1.System Version
- 2.Port/DN Status
- 3. Module Status
- 4.Diagnostics
- 5.Sys Test Log
- 6.Sys Admin Log

**Preparing to run a Maintenance session**, in this chapter, tells you how to use a Norstar telephone so that you can easily run a Maintenance session.

The next section in this chapter, **Running a Maintenance** session, will help you become familiar with the Maintenance session by providing:

- · written procedures
- example flowcharts.

## Preparing to run a Maintenance session

You may run a Maintenance session from any working Norstar M7310 or M7324 telephone. Keep a pencil handy to record important information using the chapter 8 Maintenance Job Aids.

# **Using the Programming Overlay**




Figure 2.1 - Programming Overlay

The Programming Overlay, shown in Figure 2.1, helps you navigate through a Maintenance session. The System Coordinator can provide you with this Overlay.




Figure 2.2 - M7310 telephone with Programming Overlay

The Overlay fits on the top buttons beside the indicator display. Figure 2.2 shows where to place the Overlay on the M7310 telephone.




Figure 2.3 - M7324 telephone with Programming Overlay

Figure 2.3 shows you where to place the Overlay on the M7324 telephone.

Indicators appear beside the four buttons referred to by the Overlay. When you press one of these buttons, the display message changes in the way described in Chart 2.1.

### To access a Maintenance session:

- 1. Place the Overlay on the telephone.
- 2. From the Norstar M7310 or M7324 telephone dialpad, Press Feature \* \* 2 6 6 3 4 4 Which is the same as:

  Feature \* \* C O N F I G
  The display prompts you to enter the password.
- 3. Press \* \* 2 6 6 3 4 4

  A. Configuration appears on the display.

  OR

If the password is entered incorrectly, you will still see the Password: prompt. In this case, press the RETRY display button, and again enter the password.

4. Press Next three times until appears on the display.

Note: Only one person at a time can access programming.




Figure 2.4 - Maintenance session Overview

# Running a Maintenance session

#### Introduction

This section guides you through a Maintenance session step by step. After you have finished this tour, you should have a good understanding of all the features in a Maintenance session.

# 1. System Version

#### What does it do?

The subheading entitled 1. System Version allows you to note the software version numbers of the two processors in the Modular system:

- System Processor (SP)
- Real Time Processor (RTP)

The SP and RTP use two Norstar software programs. The SP software resides in the Feature Cartridge, while the RTP software resides in the KSU.

## Why do you use it?

You can write down the SP and RTP version numbers on a photocopy of Chart 8.1 (found in the chapter **8 Maintenance Job Aids**). You should then report these numbers to the Norstar distributor so they can determine if the software is the latest release. They can also use the version numbers to trace a software fault if one occurs.

## **Checking the Version Numbers**

From the D. Maintenance display:

- 1. Press Show
  The display shows 1. System Version
- 2. Press Show
  The display shows SP: <xxxxxxx
  where <xxxxxxx represents the version number of the SP.
- Write down the SP version number on a photocopy of Chart 8.1. Chart 8.1 is found in the chapter
   Maintenance Job Aids.
- 4. Press RTP

  RTP: <xxxxxxx appears on the display,
  where <xxxxxxx represents the version number of the
  RTP.
- 5. Write down the RTP version number on the photocopy of Chart 8.1.
- 6. Press Heading
  The display returns to show 1. System Version




Figure 2.5 - System Version

# Maintenance

#### 2. Port/DN Status

#### What does it do?

The subheading entitled 2. Port/DN Status allows you to:

- identify any device or line connected to the Modular system
- check the version number of a telephone (device) for compatibility with the system
- check the state of a device or line (for example, idle or busy)
- disable or enable the device or line.

#### Why do you use it?

Use this subheading to:

- determine which port number corresponds to each DN
- determine the port number of a malfunctioning telephone
- determine if a malfunctioning telephone is incompatible with the system
- disable a device before replacing it. This generates display messages informing telephone users what you are doing.

#### **Important Points**

If you are disabling telephones or modules, you should not run a session when many people are using the system.

The telephone from which you are accessing the Maintenance session cannot disable itself. If you try to do this,

pisable denied appears on the display and you hear an error tone. Therefore if you wish to disable that particular telephone, you will have to conduct the Maintenance session from another telephone.

Do **not** enable or disable ports at the following times:

- · during the first two minutes after a System Startup
- while DS-30 cables are being switched.

If one of the previous two conditions is met, incorrect ports may be enabled or disabled. To recover from this, disable then enable the affected modules. (Refer to **3. Module Status** in this chapter.)

Do not change the DN length in Configuration programming during the first two minutes after a System Startup.

**Note:** The following procedures apply to devices attached to the Modular system. The same procedures apply to lines attached to the Modular system.




Figure 2.6 - Sample Device Identification Display

## Disabling the device when it becomes idle

From the <state> display, when the device is busy:

- 1. Press DISABLE




Figure 2.7 - Port/DN Status




Figure 2.8 - Module Numbering Scheme for a Two-Port Expansion Cartridge




Figure 2.9 - Module Numbering Scheme for a Six-Port Expansion Cartridge




Figure 2.10 - Module Status

## 4. Diagnostics

#### What does it do?

The subheading 4.Diagnostics allows you to:

- select the connectivity test (test #100)
- identify which ports you wish to test
- begin the test
- check the test results.

## Why do you use the connectivity test?

You may run the connectivity test if you suspect that a voice connection is broken. The test first initializes any channels that are not in use. It then attempts to determine if there is a fault in the KSU, in the expansion modules, or in the Time Compression Multiplexing (TCM) line.

## **Important Points**

Do **not** run the connectivity test at the following times:

- while ports or modules are being disabled
- during the first two minutes after a System Startup
- while the DN length is being changed in Administration programming.

If one of the above conditions is met, the test may stop running with ports still disabled. To recover from this, power down then power up the KSU.

### **CAUTION:**

The connectivity test may disrupt service as modules are disabled. Do not run this test when many people are using the Norstar System.




Figure 2.11 - Diagnostics

# 5. Sys Test Log

#### What does it do?

The subheading entitled 5. Sys Test Log (or System Test Log) shows you a list of diagnostic test results, audits, event messages, and alarm codes. By using this feature you can:

- check the items in the log
- check the current alarm (if there is one)
- check when each item in the log occurred
- check the number of consecutive occurrences of an event or an alarm
- erase the log.

Note: The System Test Log holds a maximum of 20 items.
You should check and record these items at regular intervals. Erase the log after dealing with all the items.
Refer to the chapters 5 Alarms and 6 Event
Messages for an explanation of these items.

## Why do you use it?

You may use this subheading to:

- find out which tests, events, or alarms have occurred and take the required action
- perform regular maintenance, making sure to erase the log after you have dealt with all the items.

Checking the items in the log

From the 4.Diagnostics display:

1. Press Next

5. Sys Test Log appears on the display.

2. Press Show




Figure 2.12 - System Test Log




Figure 2.13 - Sys Admin Log

# 3 Troubleshooting

# General troubleshooting procedure

### Introduction

The General troubleshooting procedure allows you to solve many problems in the Norstar system. Follow this procedure before replacing any components. General Troubleshooting is divided into two sections:

- Testing the system
- Checking the hardware

#### WARNING

Replacement of components and servicing of hardware are to be performed by qualified personnel only.

# Testing the system

Verify the system functions and program options by working through the user cards for the telephones and optional equipment as described below:

## **Testing the Norstar telephone operations**

- 1. Place and receive internal and external calls.
- 2. Make notes on the problems.
- 3. Check calls on hold and handsfree (where necessary).

#### Testing the optional equipment

- 1. Follow the procedures in the user cards or installation documentation for the following equipment:
  - Analog Terminal Adapter
  - Busy Lamp Field
  - Music source (customer supplied)
  - Paging (customer supplied)
  - Station Auxiliary Power Supply (SAPS)
  - Headset (customer supplied)

#### Testing the system programming characteristics

1. Try out all the characteristics such as Restrictions, Overrides and System Speed Dial.

#### **Testing Automatic Set Relocation**

- 1. Check that set relocation is set to "Y" (for yes) under the subheading "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming.
- 2. Move the set to another location to test the Norstar feature that allows sets to be re-located without re-wiring or re-configuration.

# Checking the hardware

#### WARNING

To avoid electrical shock, do the following:

- 1. Unplug the power to any module before servicing.
- 2. Do not remove the covers of a module.
- 3. Refer to the *Norstar Modular Pocket Installation Guide* when re-installing components.

Use the following procedures for checking apparent hardware faults:

#### Checking the KSU and Module ac Power Cords

- 1. Check to see if the LED on the KSU or module is ON.
- 2. If the LED is OFF, check that the ac power cords for the KSU and modules (if included in the installation) are plugged into the ac power bar.

#### **Checking the Power Bar ac Power Cords**

1. Check that the ac power cord from the power bar is plugged into a working ac outlet.

**Note:** Two ac power bars are used in an installation with four or more modules attached to the KSU. In this case, make sure that the ac power cord from the second power bar is plugged into the first power bar.

#### **Checking the Feature Cartridge**

 Make sure the cartridge is firmly seated in its slot. ALWAYS POWER DOWN BEFORE REMOVING OR INSERTING THE FEATURE CARTRIDGE.

#### Checking the cross-connects

1. Check to see that both ends of the cross-connect wires are attached and, where required, that the polarity is correct.

#### Checking the Expansion Cartridge

 If the installation requires an Expansion Cartridge in the KSU, make sure it is inserted properly.
 ALWAYS POWER DOWN BEFORE REMOVING OR INSERTING AN EXPANSION CARTRIDGE.

#### **Checking the Trunk Cartridge**

1. If the installation requires a Trunk Module, make sure the Trunk Cartridge is inserted properly. ALWAYS POWER DOWN THE TRUNK MODULE BEFORE REMOVING OR INSERTING A TRUNK CARTRIDGE.

# **Checking the DS-30 Cables**

 Make sure that both ends of the DS-30 cables (if included in the installation) are plugged into the KSU expansion Cartridge and the module connectors.

#### Checking the 50-pin connectors

1. Make sure these connectors for the CO lines and for the station set wiring are plugged in and fastened securely. Refer to Charts 7.1, 7.2 and 7.3 in the chapter **7 Technical Reference.** 

#### Checking the 25-pair wiring

1. Ensure that the wires are terminated on the distribution block and that the wires are connected to the correct pins. Refer to Charts 7.1, 7.2 and 7.3 in the chapter 7 Technical Reference.

# Checking the Inside wiring

- 1. Check that the station loop resistance does not exceed 59 ohms of 24 gauge wire.
- 2. If the loop length is greater than 1000 ft, ensure that the Norstar Stationary Auxiliary Power Supply is in place and functional.

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#### Specific troubleshooting procedures

#### Introduction

This section presents a number of symptoms which you might observe in the Norstar system. The symptoms are listed alphabetically, and appear in boxes, for example:

#### <symptom>

Underneath each symptom are procedures to help you solve the problem.

#### **Analog Terminal Adapter (ATA) trouble**

- 1. Check the single line set by using a test set.
- 2. Check the connections to the jack.
- Check the connections to the ATA.
   Disconnect the ATA and replace it with a working Norstar telephone.

If the telephone still works properly, this verifies that the KSU and/or the SM are operating properly.

- 5. Verify that the programming has been done as described in the chapter 9 Optional Equipment in the Norstar Modular Pocket Installation Guide.
- 6. If the trouble seems to be in the KSU or SM, double check all wiring and programming options. If this doesn't help, refer to the section KSU down or Station Module down in this chapter.

#### OR

If the trouble seems to be with the ATA, disable the ATA and replace it with another one.

#### Autodial buttons cannot be programmed

- 1. Refer to the chapter entitled **Feature Operations** in the *Norstar Modular System Coordinator Guide*.
- 2. If the message Autodial full appears, tell the System Coordinator that there is no memory left for Autodial buttons.
- 3. If the message Recess denied appears, the System Coordinator is making some programming changes. Wait five minutes, then try again to program the buttons.
- 4. Run a Maintenance session and look at the events shown under 5. Sys Test Log

#### **Auxiliary Ringer Trouble**

- 1. If the Auxiliary Ringer is used for Night Service, ensure that Night Service is activated from the Night Control set.
- 2. Check the wiring between the Auxiliary Ring generator and the ringing device. Refer to Chart 3.1.
- 3. Check the wiring between the Auxiliary Ring generator and the distribution block:

| Auxiliary Ring (Common) | 18 (Green-Yellow) |

4. Ensure that the Auxiliary Ring contacts are operating by checking for contact operation with an ohmmeter across the pins shown in Chart 3.1.

5. Check that the Auxiliary Ring contacts are programmed to operate in conjunction with any or all of the following features:

**Note:** The current capacity of the Norstar relay contacts is 50 mA dc. They are designed to operate with the Auxiliary Ring Generator or equivalent.

# Dial Tone absent (on CO lines)

- 1. Use Button Inquiry Feature \_ \* \_ 0 \_ to check the feature of a programmable memory button that you think is assigned as a CO line.
- 2. Check for a dial tone by using a test set at the connections for the CO line on the distribution block.
- 3. If equipped, make sure that a Trunk Cartridge for the line is installed in the Trunk Module.
- 4. Refer to the sections **Trunk Cartridges** and **Trunk Module down** in this chapter.
- 5. Run a Maintenance session to ensure that the line is not disabled. (See 2.Port/DN Status in the chapter 2 The Maintenance Session.)
- 6. While you are in the Maintenance session, run a connectivity test on the CO line which has no dial tone.
- 7. Make sure that the Trunk Module DS-30 cable is connected to the Expansion Cartridge on the KSU.

# Troubleshooting

# **Display Unreadable**

If the trouble is with an M7310 or an M7324 telephone:

- 1. Press Feature \* 7
- 2. Press the UP or DOWN display button to adjust the display to the desired level.
- 3. Press the ok display button

OR

Press Feature

OR

Wait 15 seconds to store the new contrast level.

If the trouble is with an M7208 telephone:

- 1. Press Feature \* 7
- 2. Press 1, 2, 3, or 4 from the dialpad to adjust the display to the desired level.
- 3. Press Hold

OR

Press Feature

OR

Wait 15 seconds to store the new contrast level.

If the display is still unreadable:

- 1. Disable the problem telephone.
- 2. Replace the problem telephone with a known working one.
- 3. Enable the working telephone.

# **External Paging trouble**

- 1. Use the Button Inquiry feature Feature \* 0 to verify the feature of a programmable memory button.
- 2. Check the wiring between the 50-pin connector and the paging amplifier or between the connections shown in Chart 3.3.

3. Test the External Paging feature Feature 6 2 to ensure that it is working. The output signal from the Norstar KSU is 775 mV across 600 ohms.

# KSU down

- 1. Refer to the section **General troubleshooting procedure** in this chapter.
- 2. If ac power is present and the LED indicator on the KSU is OFF, replace the KSU. (The location of these LED indicators is described in the *Norstar Modular Pocket Installation Guide*.)

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#### Music on Hold/Background Music trouble

- **Note:** Although Music on Hold and Background Music are separate features, they share the same wiring and music source.
- 1. Ensure that the volume control Feature \* 8 0 is turned up and you are using the proper feature access
- code Feature 8 6

  2. Use the Button Inquiry feature Feature \* 0 to verify the feature of a programmable memory button.
- 3. If there is trouble with Music on Hold, check

  3.Call Handling in Configuration.

OR

If there is trouble with Background Music, check 4. Miscellaneous in Configuration.

4. Check the wiring between the music source and the 50-pin connector:

- **Note:** Also check the polarity of the connections between the music source and the distribution block
- Ensure that the music source is turned ON, is operational, and has the volume control set properly.
- **Note:** Any music source with a low output impedance (for example, less than 3,300 ohms) can be connected. Nominal output level should be less than one volt.

# Outside calls cannot be made

#### **Troubleshooting**

- 1. Refer to the **General troubleshooting procedure** in this chapter.
- 2. Press Feature \* 0
- 3. Press a Line button.
- 4. If an incorrect line number or name appears on the display, check the Configuration settings.

#### OR

- If the correct line number or name appears on the display, make sure the CO lines are properly cross-connected.
- 5. Check the CO line by terminating a test set directly on the distribution block or equivalent which connects to the Trunk Module.
- 6. Ensure that the 25-pair cable is properly connected to the modules or the KSU.
- 7. If equipped, refer to the sections **Trunk Cartridges** and **Trunk Module down** in this chapter.

#### Running a Maintenance session

- Run a Maintenance session to ensure that the line (and the Trunk Cartridge) is not disabled or unequipped. (See 2.Port/DN Status in the chapter 2 The Maintenance Session.)
- 2. Disable the appropriate modules using the subheading **3.Module Status**.
- 3. Enable the appropriate modules using the subheading **3.Module Status**.
- 4. If you still cannot make outside calls, power down then power up the KSU.

# Personal Speed Dial entries cannot be programmed

1. See **Autodial buttons cannot be programmed** in this section.

#### Station Module down

- See the section General troubleshooting procedure in this chapter.
- 2. Run a Maintenance session to ensure that the module is not disabled. (See **3.Module Status** in the chapter **2 The Maintenance Session**.)
- Disable the Station Module using the subheading 3.Module Status.
- 4. Enable the Station Module using the subheading **3.Module Status**.
- If the Station Module is still down, power down then power up the KSU.

If the problem persists, follow only as many of the next steps as are required to solve the problem:

- If ac power is present and the LED indicator on the Station Module is OFF, replace the Station Module.
- Replace the DS-30 cable (refer to the section Replacing components later in this chapter).
- 3. Replace the Expansion Cartridge (refer to the section **Replacing components** later in this chapter).
- 4. Replace the KSU (refer to the section **Replacing** components later in this chapter).

# Telephone dead

#### **Troubleshooting**

- 1. If more than one set is affected, refer to the section in this chapter entitled **Station Module down**.
- 2. Check for dial tone.
- 3. Check the display.
- 4. If the problem persists, replace the telephone with a known working Norstar telephone.
- 5. Check the station wiring at both the modular jack and the distribution cross connect.
- 6. Check the line cord.

**Note:** A TCM port should have between 15 and 20 V dc across the Tip and Ring when the phone is disconnected.

# **Running a Maintenance session**

- Run a Maintenance session to ensure that the telephone is not disabled. (See 2. Port/DN Status in the chapter 2 The Maintenance Session.)
- 2. While you are in the Maintenance session, run a connectivity test on the port connected to the telephone.
- 3. Disable the port connected to the telephone using the subheading **2.Port/DN Status**.
- 4. Enable the port connected to the telephone using the subheading **2.Port/DN Status**.

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#### **Trunk Cartridges**

- Check that the cartridge is properly inserted in the Trunk Module.
- Run a Maintenance session to ensure that the cartridge is not disabled. (See 3. Module Status in the chapter 2 The Maintenance Session.)
- 3. While you are in the Maintenance session, run a connectivity test on the appropriate ports.

If the problem persists, follow only as many of the next steps as are required to solve the problem:

- If ac power is present and the LED indicator on the Trunk Module is OFF, replace the Trunk Module.
- 2. Replace the DS-30 cable (refer to the section **Replacing** components later in this chapter).
- 3. Replace the Trunk Cartridge (refer to the section **Replacing components** later in this chapter).
- 4. Replace the Expansion Cartridge (refer to the section **Replacing components** later in this chapter).
- Replace the KSU (refer to the section Replacing components later in this chapter).

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#### Trunk Module down

- See the General troubleshooting procedure in this chapter.
- Run a Maintenance session to ensure that the Trunk Module is not disabled. (See 3. Module Status in the chapter 2 The Maintenance Session.)
- 3. Disable the module using the subheading **3.Module Status**.
- 4. Enable the module using the subheading 3.Module Status.
- While you are in the Maintenance session, run a connectivity test on the appropriate ports.
- 6. Check the CO line by terminating a single-line telephone directly on the distribution block or equivalent which connects to the Trunk Module.

If the problem persists, follow only as many of the next steps as are required to solve the problem:

- If ac power is present and the LED indicator on the Trunk Module is OFF, replace the Trunk Module.
- Replace the DS-30 cable (refer to the section Replacing components later in this chapter).
- 3. Replace the Trunk Cartridge (refer to the section **Replacing components** later in this chapter).
- 4. Replace the Expansion Cartridge (refer to the section **Replacing components** later in this chapter).
- 5. Replace the KSU (refer to the section **Replacing** components later in this chapter).

# Replacing components

#### Introduction

In a Norstar system, you should disable then replace faulty components rather than repair them. The chapter entitled

**2 The Maintenance Session** tells you how to disable Norstar components. The following sections tell you how to replace these components.

#### WARNING

To avoid electrical shock, do the following:

- 1. Unplug the power to any module before servicing.
- 2. Do not remove the covers of a module.
- 3. Refer to the *Norstar Modular Pocket Installation Guide* when re-installing components.

# Replacing the KSU, TM or SM

You can replace the KSU, a TM or a SM from the installation, without having to remove other components. Removing a TM or an SM, and replacing it with a new module of the same type does not affect the system's programming.

**Note:** Removing a module without first disabling it causes an alarm to appear on the alarm set (if available). See the chapter **5 Alarms**.

To replace the module do the following:

- 1. Disable the module by running a Maintenance session.
- 2. Unplug the module's ac power cord from the ac power bar. Detach the cord from the cable clip in the cable trough shelf.
- 3. Unplug the DS-30 cable(s) and detach them from the cable clip on the front of the module.
- 4. Unplug the 50-pin connector(s) and detach the cable from the cable clip on the front of the module.

- 5. Lift the module gently from underneath to free it from the cable trough and from the mounting bracket. Both cable trough and mounting bracket remain attached to the wall.
- 6. To replace the module with a new one, simply slide it onto the mounting bracket, taking care that the prongs on the bottom of the module fit back into the cable trough properly.
- 7. Re-connect the 50-pin connector(s), DS-30 cables and ac power cord to the same connector from where they were removed.
  - (The DS-30 cables should have been labeled with the Port number previously during initial installation.)
- 8. If the KSU was replaced, re-program the system.
- 9. Enable the new module by running a Maintenance session.

# Replacing the Trunk Cartridge or Feature Cartridge

#### CAUTION:

Do not touch the printed circuit board. This is an electrostatic-sensitive device.

- CAUTION: To avoid possible equipment damage ensure that the module power is OFF during the replacement of the Cartridge(s).
- 2. While holding the latches open, remove the defective Cartridge from the slot.
- 3. While wearing a grounding strap, remove the replacement Cartridge from its anti-static package.
- 4. While holding the latches open, insert the new Cartridge into the appropriate slot and close the latches at the same time to align the cartridge properly.

**Note:** The Trunk Cartridges are installed starting from the left slot to the right.

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#### Replacing the Expansion Cartridge

#### **CAUTION:**

If you replace a 6-port Expansion Cartridge with a 2-port Expansion Cartridge, the system will lose **all** Configuration and Administration programming. No programming is lost, however, if you upgrade from a 2-port to a 6-port Expansion Cartridge.

 To replace the Expansion Cartridge, follow the same procedure as described in the section entitled Replacing the Trunk Cartridge or Feature Cartridge.

#### **Set Profile and Line Profile**

Use this feature to check programming data for Configuration and General Administration. It enables you to browse through data programmed into the Norstar system but not to change it.

Password: Not required. Overlay: Not required.

The commands SHOW, NEXT and BACK appear as display buttons on the M7310 and M7324 telephone displays. You cannot access Set Profile or Line Profile from the M7208 telephone.

#### Access to Set Profile & Line Profile

#### Multi-user access:

More than one user can browse through the data at the same time.

#### Access during calls:

Users have access to Set Profile & Line Profile during active and held calls at their telephone sets. This means, for example, that they can see the data while they are talking on the telephone to a maintenance person.

#### **Access during System Administration:**

During Configuration and General Administration, Set Profile & Line Profile is still available from another telephone. The latest programming changes can be seen as soon as they have been entered.

# 4 Feature Information

# Introduction

Some Norstar users may perceive a fault with the system merely because they don't understand the features' limitations or interactions with each other. The following sections explain some Norstar features which could be misunderstood. The features are listed alphabetically.

# **Answer Groups**

Answer Groups work in conjunction with many other Norstar features, and occasionally perform very similar functions. The following descriptions show the differences between Answer Groups and similar Norstar features, as well as the interactions between Answer Groups and other call processing features. All features not mentioned in the following sections work in the same way with a call ringing in an Answer Group as they do with a regular ringing call. For further information on how an Answer Group works, refer to the *Norstar Modular System Coordinator Guide*.

#### **Call Forward**

If the secretary's telephone is forwarded, all calls including calls ringing at the Answer button are forwarded to the destination telephone. If the Answer button is not programmed to ring, however, calls arriving at the Answer button will not be forwarded.

If the manager's telephone is forwarded to a telephone outside the Answer Group, the Answer button will show all incoming calls as if the manager's telephone were not forwarded.

#### Callback

Call Park Callback and Transfer Callback are both directed to a particular telephone within the system: more specifically, to the telephone which attempted the Call Park or Transfer. If Callback occurs at the manager's set, it does not appear on the secretary's Answer button, but it can be detected if the manager answers the call. When the manager's telephone becomes active, the indicator beside the Inside Autodial button on the secretary's telephone will turn ON.

#### Call Pickup

A telephone which is a part of an Answer Group is not necessarily a part of a Call Pickup Group.

#### Do Not Disturb

If the secretary's telephone is in Do Not Disturb mode, calls which normally ring at the Answer button will not ring, but the indicator beside the button will flash to show that a call is arriving at the manager's telephone.

If the manager's telephone is in Do Not Disturb mode, calls arriving at it still ring on the secretary's Answer button. If the secretary wishes to transfer a call to the manager, a normal Intercom call or Transfer will not work. In order to transfer the call, the secretary must first place it on Hold or use the Call Park feature. Then, in order to contact the manager, the secretary must use the Priority Call or Page feature, or contact the manager personally. The manager can then either turn Do Not Disturb OFF, or retrieve the call from a held or parked state.

Troubleshooting

#### **Priority Call**

If a telephone outside the Answer Group attempts to use the Priority Call feature to contact the Answer Group, the call will be received at the manager's telephone. The call does not appear on the secretary's Answer button.

# Ring Again

If the manager turns Ring Again ON, the secretary's telephone is not notified when the Ring Again offer is made to the manager's telephone.

If another telephone within the system sets Ring Again on the manager's telephone, the secretary's telephone is not notified until the Ring Again offer is accepted, and the call begins to ring at the manager's telephone.

#### Voice Call

If a telephone outside the Answer Group attempts to make a Voice Call to the manager and is successful, the call does not appear on the secretary's Answer button. If the Voice Call is unsuccessful, and arrives at the manager's telephone as a regular ringing call, the call appears on the secretary's Answer button.

#### **Autodial Buttons**

#### **Default Dual Memory Buttons**

The M7310 telephone has 12 dual memory buttons which can be programmed for access to features or Autodial numbers. By using the Shift button with the dual memory buttons, up to 24 features or Autodial numbers can be programmed.




Figure 4.1 - Default three-digit Dual Memory buttons

Dual memory buttons (on the M7310 telephone only) are preprogrammed as Inside Autodial numbers corresponding to the various telephones in the Norstar system. The DN length (either two, three, or four digits) is programmed in the subheading "5. Change DNs" of Configuration programming. The default arrangement of the Dual Memory buttons for a three-digit numbering system is shown in Figure 4.1.

**Dual memory buttons** are pre-set to dial the intercom numbers shown in Figure 4.1, even if there are not enough telephones in the system to match each of the numbers.

No telephone can have an intercom button to dial its own number. Therefore, each telephone numbered between 221 and 244 has a blank button in place of its own number on the chart on the previous page.

If an Inside Autodial code is moved from one button to another, it will automatically be erased from its former location. If this happens, the temporary message Feature moved appears on the display to confirm that the move has been successful.

#### **Automatic Set Relocation**

If Automatic Set Relocation is activated, a telephone can be moved to a new location within the Norstar system without losing the settings that are programmed in it. The Intercom number, Autodial settings, and Personal Speed Dial codes remain with the telephone when it is unplugged.

To move a telephone, it is simply unplugged from one location and plugged in again at another. Norstar will retain the information programmed into the telephone set.

If a **new** telephone is plugged into the Norstar system before the old telephone is reconnected at a new location, Norstar will assign the old telephone's information to the new telephone, and the old telephone will no longer be recognized by the system.

**Note:** All telephones being moved should be relocated **before** new telephones are added. This allows the moved telephones to retain their programmed settings.

If the telephone being replaced has more lines than the new telephone, automatic outgoing line selection may not work with the Handsfree/Mute feature. A line must be selected manually.

**Note:** Wait one minute after Automatic Set Relocation before changing the DN in Administration programming.

#### **Auxiliary Ringer**

If the Auxiliary Ringer is activated for both CO lines and Night Service use, ensure that an Auxiliary Ringer is connected to the KSU. If you want the Auxiliary Ringer for Night Service only, do not select the Auxiliary ringer when programming in Line Data.

#### **Call Forward (No Answer)**

Call Forward (No Answer) strongly resembles Norstar's Delayed Ring Transfer feature. The differences between these two features are two: where Delayed Ring Transfer forwards all calls on a specific line, Call Forward (No Answer) forwards all calls arriving at a specific telephone, regardless of what line the call is on; and where Delayed Ring Transfer is turned ON or OFF for your entire system, Call Forward (No Answer) is controlled individually for each telephone.

# Call Park (with Callback)

If the caller on a parked call hangs up, Callback may still occur. When you answer the Callback call, you will hear a dial tone.

Call Park with Callback occurs only at the telephone that sets Call Park. If the call came in on an external line, the Callback call rings on that line if it is available; otherwise, the call rings on an intercom line. If no free line is available, the Callback call is transferred to the Prime Phone.

If there is a Prime Phone for the external line, and if Delayed Ring Transfer is activated, a Callback call will be directed to the Prime Phone if the original telephone does not answer. If a Callback call is not answered within three minutes, the external call is disconnected.

Call Pickup, Call Forward, and the Auxiliary Ringer operate normally in relation to calls which activate the Callback feature. Do Not Disturb cancels the ringing for a Callback call, but not the flashing of the indicator.

Callback cannot occur at a telephone that is in an Administration, Configuration, or Maintenance session.

#### Call Pickup

Call Pickup Groups can answer inside as well as outside calls.

A group of telephones which are assigned the same lines do not have to be in the same Pickup Group.

There is no point in putting a set with only Private lines into a Call Pickup group since it cannot be picked up.

In order for you to pick up a call, it must be on a line which is programmed to ring at another telephone in the group.

#### **Call Restrictions and Overrides**

#### Restrictions

The maximum length of a Restriction sequence is eight characters. The maximum number of Restrictions allowed in any Norstar system is 30.

A call can be prevented by a Restriction placed on either the line or the telephone set being used. Restrictions applied to a telephone set affect calls from that telephone set on any line. Restrictions applied to a line affect calls from any Norstar set using that line.

#### **Overrides**

The maximum length of an Override sequence is 14 characters. The maximum number of Overrides in any Norstar system is ten.

Troubleshooting

Overrides applied to a telephone set permit calls on any line from that telephone set, except where specific Line Restrictions apply. Similarly, Overrides applied to a line permit calls on that line from any telephone set, except where specific set Restrictions apply.

# **Delayed Ring Transfer**

If you assign one of the outside lines to a Prime Phone which is using Delayed Ring Transfer, an unanswered outside call on that line will begin to ring at the Prime Phone after a specified number of rings. The Prime Phone displays the message DRT line <line #>

Delayed Ring Transfer and Call Forward No Answer can both occur at the same time.

Delayed Ring Transfer can occur for an unanswered Callback call if the following conditions are met:

- The Delayed Ring Transfer setting is set to "YES" during programming.
- There is a Prime Phone associated with the external line.

# Flexible Numbering Plan

You can assign two, three, or four-digit Intercom numbers. You can also assign one to four-digit Line Pool access codes.

All Intercom numbers must be the same number of digits in length. Line Pool access codes do not have to be the same length as the Intercom numbers, nor as one another. Line Pool numbers can be any length from 1 to 4 digits. A Line Pool number cannot start with the same digit as an Intercom number. For example, the Intercom number 2345 can co-exist with the Line Pool access code 321, but not with the Line Pool access code 231.

Symbols such as an asterisk (\*) or a pound sign (#) cannot be used in Intercom numbers or Line Pool access codes.

No Intercom number or Line Pool access code can begin with the numbers "0" or "1". "0" is reserved for the Dial 0 feature, while "1" is reserved for the Retrieve Park Codes feature.

The same digits cannot be used for two Intercom numbers, for two Line Pool access codes, or for both an Intercom number and a Line Pool access code. All numbers must be unique.

#### Headset

Full Handsfree must be activated if a headset is going to be used with the telephone. While you are using the headset, tones and messages associated with some features (such as Page and Held Line Reminder) are transmitted through your telephone's speaker rather than through your headset.

#### **Line Pools**

Each Norstar system has nine possible Line Pools. Each Line Pool can be accessed by pressing the Line Pool access code on the dialpad after pressing Intercom or dialing Feature 6 4 A Line Pool button may not be used to answer outside calls ringing on a Line Pool line. If a telephone has more than one Line Pool, only one of those Line Pools can be assigned as the Prime Line.

If you assign a Line Pool as a Prime Line, then that set must have that Line Pool assigned in Line Access, part of Configuration programming. A line could be placed into a Line Pool, but not assigned to any set. This line can then be used for only making outgoing calls.

#### The Line Pool Access Code:

- can be a one to four-digit number
- cannot include the symbols \* and #
- cannot have the first digit of any directory number as its first digit
- must be the same length as every other Line Pool Access
   Code beginning with the same digit
- cannot be part of an autodial sequence
- will be deleted if there is a directory number changed to one using the same digits
- cannot start with the digits "0" or "1".

#### **Names**

A telephone set and a line can both have the same name, as can two sets. However, two lines cannot have the same name.

# Night Service (Flexible)

For each outside line in your system, you can assign a Night Set which receives calls when Night Service is ON and a Night Control telephone which turns Night Service ON or OFF for that line. You can also control whether or not calls arriving on lines which are in Night Service will drive an Auxiliary Ringer. Night Service also allows you to control two system wide features: the Night Dial Zero Phone and the Trunk Answer feature.

#### The Night Set

Each line can have only one Night Set, but one telephone can be the Night Set for any or all of your outside lines. The Night Set and the Night Control telephone for a line can be the same telephone, but do not have to be.

#### **Night Dial Zero Phone**

You can assign a Dial Zero Phone which is different from the regular Dial Zero Telephone to lines which use Night Service. The Night Dial Zero feature is turned ON and OFF at the regular Night Control telephone.

# **Night Control telephone**

You can assign a separate Night Control telephone for each outside line which will be using Night Service.

Each line can have only one Night Control telephone, but one telephone can control Night Service for any or all of your outside lines.

Night Service can only be turned ON and OFF at a Night Control telephone.

#### **Prime Phones**

You can assign each Prime Phone to an outside telephone line in Configuration programming. Each line can have only one Prime Phone, but a single telephone can be the Prime Phone for more than one line. This allows various areas of your office which share outside lines to also share a Prime Phone.

If the outside line has a Prime Phone, the following Norstar features help manage calls:

**Delayed Ring Transfer** transfers outside calls to the Prime Phone if they are unanswered after a specified number of rings. Delayed Ring Transfer functions only for calls on an outside line which has a Prime Phone assigned to it. Delayed Ring Transfer is turned ON or OFF in Administration programming.

**Do Not Disturb** transfers incoming calls on an outside line to that line's Prime Phone.

If **Call Forward** directs a call to a telephone that is unable to take a call, it will then be directed to the Prime Phone assigned to the outside line which the call is on.

If a call resulting from **Call Park Callback** or **Transfer Callback** cannot ring at the telephone which parked or transferred the call, the call will be forwarded to the Prime Phone assigned to the outside line which the call was originally on.

**Held Line Reminder** is activated at a Prime Phone two minutes after it begins at the originating telephone.

Like other telephones in the Norstar system, a Prime Phone can use Call Forward (No Answer), Call Forward (All Calls), or Do Not Disturb to redirect or prevent incoming calls.

# **Priority Call**

A Priority Call forces a connection with another telephone on the Norstar system, when that telephone is busy or using Do Not Disturb. A Priority Call can also be used to make a Voice Call to a telephone which has Voice Call Deny turned ON.

Priority Call will not override Call Forward. If either of these features is active at the telephone being called, the call will be forwarded. Priority Call can be used (if necessary) to contact the telephone to which the call is forwarded, but not to contact the original destination telephone.

If a call is placed to an idle Norstar telephone, and the display shows Do not disturb , the Priority Call feature connects the call as a Voice Call. During the Priority Call, the person being called hears a periodic tone which indicates that the telephone microphone is ON.

# **Set Copy**

The Directory Number and eight other settings are **not** copied.

Both telephone sets must be the same model before data can be transferred between two telephones. Data cannot be copied for CAP modules or any other device which does not store its settings in the KSU.

# **Speed Dial-Personal**

Anyone with a Norstar telephone can store up to 24 outside phone numbers using Personal Speed Dial codes and can change the phone numbers at any time. The Personal Speed Dial memory on each telephone is independent; if the telephone is moved within the system, the Speed Dial numbers are retained.

The Personal Speed Dial codes range from 71 to 94. Each Speed Dial number may contain up to 16 digits.

# Speed Dial-System

This feature allows up to 70 phone numbers to be shared among all the telephones in the Norstar system.

System Speed Dial codes range from 01 to 70 inclusive. The entries can be changed only by the System Coordinator in Administration programming.

# **Transfer Callback**

Callback to your telephone occurs if you have used Transfer without Announcement to send an outside call to a co-worker's telephone, and your co-worker does not answer. After a specified number of ring cycles, the outside call returns to your telephone. Callback is a convenient feature for receptionists, as it allows them to take messages from outside callers who have not been transferred successfully. Callback does not occur with internal calls.

The number of ring cycles required to activate Callback is specified in Configuration programming.

If a transferred call cannot ring at the destination telephone, Callback occurs immediately. If the caller hangs up, Callback may still occur. When you answer the Callback call, you will hear a dial tone.

Transfer Callback occurs only at the telephone that attempted the transfer. If the call came in on an external line, the Callback call rings on that line if it is available; otherwise, the call rings on an intercom line. If no free line is available, the Callback call is transferred to the Prime Phone.

On a system that has a Prime Phone for the external line and Delayed Ring Transfer activated, a Callback call will be directed to the Prime Phone if the original telephone does not answer. If a Callback call is not answered at the Prime Phone within four minutes, it is disconnected.

Call Pickup, Call Forward, and the Auxiliary Ringer operate normally in relation to calls which activate the Callback feature. Do Not Disturb cancels the ringing for a Callback call, but not the flashing of the indicator.

Callback cannot occur at a telephone that is in an Administration, Configuration, or Maintenance session.

#### **Trunk Answer from any Telephone**

This feature only works with calls which are ringing on lines that have Night Service turned ON. If a call is ringing on a line which does not have Night Service turned ON, it must be answered using a different method, such as Call Pickup (Directed) or Call Pickup Group.

Trunk Answer cannot be used to answer calls on Private lines.

## 5 Alarms

#### **Alarm Codes**




Figure 5.1 - Alarm display

The Modular KSU generates alarm codes in the event of system disconnections. All alarms are displayed at the Alarm Set (preset as station 221). Alarms also appear in the System Test Log (see the section **5. Sys Test Log** in the Chapter **2 The Maintenance Session**). Figure 5.1 shows how an alarm code appears on the telephone display.

**Note:** Alarms have a higher severity than events (see the chapter **6 Event Messages**). Attend to alarm messages before event messages.

If you see an alarm code, do the following:

- 1. Write the alarm code on a photocopy of Chart 8.2. Chart 8.2 is found in the chapter 8 Maintenance Job Aids.
- 2. Find out the cause of the alarm code from Chart 5.1.
- 3. Follow the section **Alarm troubleshooting** in this chapter.
- 4. Press the TIME display button to see when the alarm occurred.
- 5. Press the CLEAR display button to clear the alarm.

Momentary (transient) as well as permanent disconnections are detected. Alarms are not displayed for up to two minutes after the disconnection occurs. If the KSU is powered OFF when the disconnection occurs, the alarm is not displayed until two minutes after the KSU is powered ON.

## Alarm troubleshooting

*Note:* Refer to Chart 5.1 before following these procedures.

#### Alarm: 10 (All KSU telephones disconnected)

- 1. Check to see if there is a telephone connected to the KSU (that has a port number beginning with the number "1").
- 2. If there are no telephones connected to the KSU, connect one and then press the CLEAR display button.
- 3. If there are any telephones connected to the KSU, check all the wiring associated with the telephones.
- 4. Refer to **KSU down** in the chapter **3 Troubleshooting**.

#### Alarm: 11 (Internal KSU failure)

- 1. Power down the KSU and then power it up.
- 2. If the alarm persists, replace the KSU.

#### Alarm: 50-X (All telephones on SM disconnected)

- 1. Check to see if there is a telephone connected to the Station Module (that has a port number beginning with a number from 3 to 8).
- 2. If there are no telephones connected to the Station Module, connect one and then press the CLEAR display button.
- 3. If there are any telephones connected to the Station Module, check all the wiring associated with the telephones.
- Refer to Station Module down in the chapter
   Troubleshooting.

#### Alarm: 51-X (All Trunk Cartridges in TM disconnected)

- 1. Check the wiring from the KSU to the TM.
- 2. Follow the procedure in the section Checking the Trunk Cartridge in the General troubleshooting procedure in the chapter 3 Troubleshooting.
- Refer to Trunk Module down in the chapter
   Troubleshooting.

#### Alarm: 52-X-Y (Trunk Cartridge disconnected from TM)

- Follow the procedure in the section Checking the Trunk
   Cartridge in the General troubleshooting procedure in the chapter 3 Troubleshooting.
- 2. If the problem persists, replace the Trunk Cartridge number Y on DS-30 port X (see Chart 5.1 for the definition of "X" and "Y").

## **6 Event Messages**

#### Introduction

Event messages appear as items in the System Administration Log or the System Test Log (see the sections **5. Sys Test Log** and **6.Sys Admin Log** in the chapter **2 The Maintenance Session** ). Most of these event messages can only be caused by a software fault, and should rarely occur.

**Note:** The section **Event messages relevant to the Installer** in this chapter does not describe event numbers caused by software faults. These event numbers are referred to in the section **Complete list of event numbers** in this chapter.

Each event is assigned a severity number. In most cases this severity is denoted in the event message by Skeeperity number. If the Log is full, new event messages with a higher severity number replace existing event messages of a lower severity. For this reason, you should check event messages at regular intervals. You can then deal with all messages before they are replaced.

## Required action

For every event message that you see, do the following:

- Record the event on a photocopy of the appropriate chart (8.2 or 8.3). These charts are found in the chapter
   Maintenance Job Aids.
- 2. Consult the section in this chapter entitled **Event** messages relevant to the Installer.
- Consult the section in this chapter entitled Complete list of event numbers to see if the event caused the system to automatically restart.

#### Event messages relevant to the Installer

Chart 6.1 lists event messages which are relevant to maintenance activities. The time that the message is recorded is also provided. This will help you in performing maintenance on the Norstar system.

## Complete list of event numbers

You should rarely see any event messages that are not described in the section **Event messages relevant to the Installer**. If you do see one of these event messages, it is due to an unusual combination of system events. Although the problem is not a serious one, repeated occurrences of the event number should be reported to the Central Support Center as soon as possible.

As a result of some events, the Norstar system automatically restarts itself. Check each event number in Chart 6.2 to see if the system has automatically restarted itself ("Y"=yes, "N"=no).

## **Port Numbering**

The following sections describe numbering schemes for Ports, CO lines and Directory Numbers (DNs). Charts are provided which show port numbering for the KSU, and for two and sixport Expansion Cartridges.

## **Key Service Unit (KSU)**

The Key Service Unit (KSU) controls the eight lines and twenty four station sets used in a non-expanded system. Charts 7.4 and 7.5 show the Port and Station numbers assigned to lines and sets in the KSU.

Note: Modules 1 and 2 are inside the KSU.

# Upgrading from a two-port Expansion Cartridge to a six-port Expansion Cartridge

Note: Refer to Replacing the Expansion Cartridge.

To avoid gaps in the numbering plan, use the following procedure. This procedure is consistent with the rules previously mentioned for plugging in DS-30s:

- 1. Plug the Trunk Module DS-30s in the TOP Port and work down.
- 2. Plug the Station Module DS-30s in the BOTTOM Port and work up.

#### To remove the two-port Expansion Cartridge:

- 1. Unplug the ac power from the KSU.
- 2. Unplug the DS-30 cables from the two-port Expansion Cartridge.

**Note:** Label the DS-30 cables if you have not already done so.

3. Remove the two-port Expansion Cartridge.

#### To upgrade with a six-port Expansion Cartridge:

- 1. Install the six-port Expansion Cartridge.
- 2. Plug the DS-30 cables from the SMs into the six-port Expansion Cartridge starting from the BOTTOM Port (#3) and working UP.
- 3. Plug the DS-30 cables from the TMs back into the six-port Expansion Cartridge, starting from the TOP Port (#8) and working DOWN.

**Note:** Re-label the DS-30 at both ends with the new Port number on the six-port Expansion Cartridge.

 Plug in the DS-30s for additional modules required for this installation by working down from the TOP for Trunk Modules and working up from the BOTTOM for Station Modules.

# Glossary

## 9 Glossary

## A

**Access Code**: A sequence of characters used to gain entry into Norstar programming. There are Access Codes to begin Startup, Configuration programming, and Administration programming.

Access Signaling: Norstar telephones can access a remote system (such as a Centrex or a PBX), or dial a number on an alternate carrier by means of Access Signaling (also referred to as "End-to-End" Signaling). There are five features that provide Access Signaling: Link, Long Tones, Pause, Run/Stop, and Timed Release.

**Administration**: Administration is the programming of certain settings on the Norstar system. These settings include:

- 1.System Speed Dial
- 2.Names
- 3. Time and Date
- 4. Restrictions
- 5.Overrides
- 6.Permissions
- 7. Night Service
- 8. Passwords.

**Administration Access Code**: This Access Code must be entered to access Administration programming:

System Startup, Set Copy, or Maintenance.

**Administration Password**: This optional one to six digit Password prevents unauthorized access to Administration programming. The Administration Password is assigned in section "8. Passwords" of Administration programming (the default is no Password).

**Alarm Code**: A number which designates an alarm that appears in section "5.Sys Test Log" of the Maintenance session, or appears at the Alarm Set.

Alarm Set (Alarm Phone): The Alarm Set is the telephone designated to receive reports of system problems. The Alarm Set is usually assigned to a Prime Phone, but it can be changed in section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming.

Analog Terminal Adapter (ATA): This device permits analog telecommunication devices (for example, FAX, answering machines, and single line telephones) to connect to the Norstar system. Programmed defaults for the ATA are automatically assigned by the system.

Answer Button: An Answer button is a telephone button (with indicator) that is used to monitor another telephone within an Answer Group. One telephone can have up to four Answer buttons. Pressing one of these buttons provides immediate access to the Intercom or outside line that is ringing at the monitored telephone. An Answer button is automatically assigned to a telephone when that telephone is assigned an Answer DN in section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming.

**Answer DN**: An Answer DN is the Directory Number (DN) of a telephone in an Answer Group that is monitored by an Answer Button on the telephone being programmed. In section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming, up to four

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Answer DNs can be assigned to the telephone being programmed.

Answer Group: An Answer Group consists of at least two telephones that are associated by an Answer button. The Answer button, on one of these telephones, indicates incoming calls destined for the other telephone. Someone working at a telephone with Answer buttons (a receptionist, for example) can monitor the Answer Group (a group of managers), receive all ringing and visual indication of incoming calls, and answer the calls accordingly.

**Applied to lines**: This sub-heading appears in section "4. Restrictions" and section "5. Overrides" of Administration programming. Restrictions and Overrides are assigned to each line.

**Applied to sets**: This sub-heading appears in section "4. Restrictions" and section "5. Overrides" of Administration programming. Restrictions and Overrides are assigned to each telephone.

**Autodial Button**: An Autodial button provides one-touch dialing of outside numbers, Intercom numbers, or feature codes.

**Automatic Hold**: This feature will automatically place an active call on hold if another line is selected.

Automatic Phone Relocation: The Automatic Phone Relocation feature allows a telephone to retain its personal and system programming when it is reconnected to another physical location. This feature is activated in section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming.



Auxiliary Ringer: This is a separate external telephone ringer or bell. It can be programmed to ring when a line (section "1. Line Data" of Configuration), a telephone (section "6. Permissions" of Administration), or both ring; or when Night Service (section "7. Night Service" of Administration) is active.

#### B

**Background Music**: This feature allows music from an external source, such as a radio, to play over the speaker of the telephone. This feature should not be activated unless a music source (customer supplied) has been connected to the Norstar system. Background Music is activated in section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming.

**B Channels**: The B1 and the B2 channels are paths for transmitting digital voice or data. Each Port number has one B1 DN and one B2 DN associated with it. Devices such as the Norstar M7208, M7310, and M7324 telephones only need the B1 channel and the B1 DN. Other devices may need more channels.

Busy Lamp Field (BLF): This device, which attaches onto the M7310 telephone, has a panel of Liquid Crystal Display (LCD) indicators that show the busy/not busy and DND (Do Not Disturb) status of up to 24 telephones in the Norstar system. Each of the dual memory buttons that are programmed as Inside Autodial buttons on the M7310 will indicate the status of an office telephone. The BLF will also indicate if a Norstar telephone is involved in a programming session.

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**Button Caps**: These interchangeable plastic squares fit over the buttons of Norstar telephones, and are used to label the features programmed onto each programmable button location. Button caps can be either pre-printed or have clear

windows which allow features, lines, and autodial numbers to be labelled on the button.

**Button Inquiry**: This feature provides a method of checking the function of each programmable memory button on a Norstar telephone.

#### C

Call Forward (No Answer): This feature forwards all unanswered calls at one telephone to another designated telephone after a specified number of rings (see "Forward Delay"). The Call Forward feature is assigned in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming.

Call Handling: Call Handling is a collection of some Norstar features and their parameters which are programmed in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming. Call Handling includes settings for the following features: Held Line Reminder, Delayed Ring Transfer, Transfer Callback, Park Timeout, Directed Pickup, and Music/Tones/Silence On Hold.

Call Park: Call Park places a connected call on hold, allowing it to be retrieved from any other telephone in the system. A call can be retrieved from any telephone by the selection of an intercom line, followed by dialing the Retrieve Park code (which automatically appears on the display of the telephone which parked the call). Up to nine calls can be parked at once in the system.

Call Park Callback: See "Callback".

Call Pickup (Directed): This feature allows anyone to answer a call ringing at any telephone by specifying the Intercom



number of that telephone before taking the call. Call Pickup (Directed) is activated in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

Call Pickup (Group): See Pickup Group.

**Callback**: Callback occurs at a telephone which attempts an unsuccessful Transfer or Call Park for an outside call. After a specified period of time, an unanswered call returns to the telephone which originally made the Transfer or parked the

**CAP Module**: The CAP Module provides 48 inside Autodial buttons, and is connected to the M7324 telephone. A maximum of two CAP Modules can be connected to a single M7324 telephone.

**Central Answering Position (CAP)**: The CAP consists of an M7324 telephone and one or two CAP Modules. The CAP can be used to monitor the telephones in a Norstar system.

Centrex (template): This is one of the four Norstar system templates. The Centrex template assigns one unique outside line to each telephone until the maximum number of lines is reached (example: Line 01 to telephone 221, Line 02 to telephone 222, and so on). Any remaining telephones do not receive a default line assignment.

The Centrex template also modifies the Restriction and Override tables (a "9" precedes the default entries) to accommodate dialing outside the Centrex system, rather than within it. The Centrex template is assigned during System Startup.

Change DNs: The length of all Directory Numbers (DNs) in the system can be changed, or existing DNs can be replaced



with a new number in section "5. Change DNs" of Configuration programming (for more information, see "Directory Number Length").

**Configuration**: This is a type of programming that assigns certain settings to lines and telephones, as well as some system-wide settings. Configuration is usually performed by the telephone company Installer or Service Representative, and not by the System Coordinator.

**Configuration Access Code**: A sequence of digits which are dialed on the dialpad to provide access to Configuration programming. The Installer Password must be entered before any Configuration programming can be done.

Copy: The GOPY display button appears during Configuration and Administration programming. With this button, certain programmed settings can be copied from one line to another, or from one telephone to another. Line programmable settings that can be copied are Line Data, Restrictions, Overrides, and Night Service. Telephone (set) programmable settings that can be copied are Line Access, Restrictions, Overrides, and Permissions.

**Cursor**: This is a short line which appears on the telephone display to indicate that digits or letters can be entered using the dialpad.

## D

Date: See "Time and Date".

**Data Terminals**: Devices which can be used to transfer data instead of only voice (as with a telephone). The settings for these devices are not programmed with Configuration or Administration programming.

**Default Setting**: This is a feature setting which is in effect upon initial installation unless manually changed through programming. Default settings are automatically assigned to correspond to the Square template during System Startup. In the *Meridian Norstar Modular Programming Record*, default settings are shown in **Bold** text.

**Delay**: The time period before certain features become active. A delay can be programmed for the following features: Call Forward (No Answer), Call Park Callback, Delayed Ring Transfer, Held Line Reminder, and Transfer Callback features.

**Delayed Ring Transfer (DRT) to Prime**: After a specified number of rings, this feature transfers an unanswered ringing call to the Prime Phone associated with the line the call is on. This feature is activated in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

**Device**: A Norstar component connected to the Key Service Unit by a Time Compression Multiplexing (TCM) line. Examples of devices are the Norstar telephones and the Analog Terminal Adapter.

**Dial-0 Set (Dial Zero Phone)**: A telephone which is assigned to ring when someone dials "0" from another Norstar telephone. This feature is assigned in section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming.

**Directed Pickup**: See "Call Pickup (Directed)".

Glossary Index **Directory Number (DN)**: A unique number which is automatically assigned to each telephone or Data Terminal during System Startup. The DN, also referred to as an Intercom number, is often used to identify a telephone when settings are assigned during Configuration and Administration programming.

Directory Number (DN) Length: A non-expanded system can have a DN length of two, three or four digits. An expanded system (a system with an Expansion Cartridge installed) can have a DN length of three or four digits. All Directory numbers for the system must be the same length. The default DN length is two digits for a non-expanded system, and three digits for an expanded system. The lowest default DN is "21" in a two digit system, "221" in a three digit system, and "2221" in a four digit system.

**Disable**: The DISABLE display button appears under the "2.Port/DN Status" or "3.Module Status" headings during a Maintenance session. Pressing this button can place a device, line, or module out of service. If a Norstar telephone is to be disabled, a display message informs the user of the disabling action.

**Display Button**: The Norstar M7310 and M7324 telephones are each equipped with three buttons located directly beneath the Liquid Crystal Display. During feature operation or programming, some or all of these buttons may be used to provide further options. If an option is available, it is shown in the bottom row of the two row display, directly above the corresponding display button.

**DRT Delay**: The number of rings before a Delayed Ring Transfer occurs. This is assigned in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

DRT to Prime: See "Delayed Ring Transfer to Prime".

## E

**Emergency Telephone**: A single line telephone (also referred to as a 500/2500 telephone) that becomes active when there is no power to the Key Service Unit.



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**Enable**: The ENABLE display button appears under the "2.Port/DN Status" or "3.Module Status" headings during a Maintenance session. Pressing this button can place a device, line, or module back into service.

**Event Codes**: A number associated with an Event Message in sections "5.Sys Test Log" and "6.Sys Admin Log" of the Maintenance session. The Event Code indicates certain information about the Norstar system.

**Event Message**: A display message on a telephone which describes an activity that has occurred in the system. Event messages are displayed in section "5.Sys Test Log" and "6.Sys Admin Log" when a Maintenance session is run.

Expansion Cartridge: The Expansion Cartridge allows Expansion Modules to connect to the Key Service Unit, providing the opportunity to increase the number of outside and Intercom lines that the system can handle (beyond the Key Service Unit). The Expansion Cartridge is inserted into the Key Service Unit, and a DS-30 cable connects the Expansion Cartridge to each Expansion Module. Expansion Cartridges are available with two or six ports.

**Expansion Module**: A Trunk Module or a Station Module. A maximum of six Modules may be installed with the use of the six port Expansion Cartridge. A maximum of two Modules may be installed with a two port Expansion Cartridge.

**External Paging**: A Norstar feature that allows voice announcements to be made over an externally mounted loudspeaker (supplied by the customer) connected to the Key Service Unit.



**Feature Button**: This button is the first button pressed on a Norstar telephone before a feature code is entered when using a feature, or to gain access to programming with an Access Code.

**Feature Cartridge**: A replaceable software cartridge containing the Norstar features. The Feature Cartridge is inserted into the Key Service Unit.

**Feature Code**: This is a number that is used to activate a particular feature.

**Flexible Numbering Plan**: Individual Directory Numbers (DNs) and Line Pool Access Codes can be assigned, and the system-wide DN length can be set to two, three or four digits (see "Directory Number Length").

**Forward Delay**: Forward Delay is the number of rings before an unanswered call is forwarded to another telephone with the Call Forward (No Answer) feature. Forward Delay is assigned in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming.

Forward No Answer: See "Call Forward (No Answer)".

**Forward to**: The DN entered for this setting is the Intercom number of the telephone to which the Call Forward (No Answer) feature will forward unanswered calls. The DN is assigned in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming.

**Full Autohold (on idle line)**: If an idle external line is selected without a number being dialed, and an action is performed which selects another line, this feature will place the

original line on hold. This setting is assigned in section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming.

Full Handsfree: See "Handsfree".

### G

**General admin**: This heading appears as "B. General admin". See "Administration" for more details.

### H

Handsfree: This feature allows calls to be made without use of the telephone receiver. Full Handsfree is activated in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming. When programmed, a Handsfree button is automatically assigned to the telephone.

Handsfree (HF) Answerback: This feature, when activated, automatically turns ON the microphone at a telephone receiving a Voice Call so that the person receiving the call can respond without lifting the receiver. This feature is activated in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming.

Handsfree/Mute Button: See "Handsfree".

Held (Line) Reminder: A reminder tone and a "Held Call" display message occur at a Norstar telephone when a call has been placed on hold for a programmed period of time. The Held Line Reminder feature and Remind Delay are programmed in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

Glossary Index **Hybrid (template)**: This is one of the four Norstar system templates. In the Hybrid template, Line 01 appears on each telephone, and each telephone has access to Line Pool 1. The template is assigned in System Startup.

**Individual DNs**: This sub-heading, in section "5. Change DNs" of Configuration programming, is used to change the Intercom number of a telephone within the system.

**Installer Password**: A Password that is used to prevent unauthorized access to Configuration programming. The default Installer Password must be used to enter Configuration unless changed in section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration Programming.

Intercom Buttons: These buttons provide access to inside (Intercom) lines used for calls within a Norstar system or for access to outside lines through a Line Pool. A telephone may be assigned up to eight Intercom buttons, or none. The number of Intercom buttons on a telephone may be assigned in section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming.

**Intercom Lines**: These lines, also known as inside lines or extensions, are used for calls within a Norstar system or to access outside lines through a Line Pool.

## K

Key Service Unit (KSU): The central hardware component in the Norstar system. The KSU has its own processor and memory, and provides a physical point of connection for the various types of Data Terminals, telephones, and Expansion Modules. The KSU can function on its own as a basic system (with 24 Norstar telephones and 8 CO lines), or with the addition of a Trunk Module (TM) which adds more CO lines, or with a Station Module (SM) which supports more Norstar telephones.

## L

**Line Access**: These Configuration settings allow you to program certain line parameters to an individual telephone. Section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming includes Line Assignment, Answer DNs, Ringing, Line Pool Access, Intercom Keys, and Prime Line.

Line Assignment: Line Assignment lets you define which lines are accessible to an individual telephone. An outside line assigned to a telephone must appear on a Line button with an indicator. The maximum number of lines that can be assigned for each model of telephone are: eight for the M7208, 10 for the M7310, and 24 for the M7324. The use of programmed feature buttons, such as handsfree Mute, will reduce the number of buttons available for Line appearances. Line Assignment is programmed in section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming.

Line Data: These settings are used to program certain parameters specific to an individual line. Section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming includes Line Type, Line Mode, Auxiliary Ring, Full Auto-Hold on idle line, and Prime Set.

` Glossary Index **Line Names**: This sub-heading of section "2. Names" of Administration Programming allows Names to be programmed to outside lines.

**Line Number**: A two-digit number which identifies a line connected to the KSU. The maximum number of lines

depends on how many Trunk Modules are installed. Line numbers range from 01 to 80 (see the Meridian Norstar Modular Pocket Installation Guide for tables showing the numerical relationship between DN, Port, and line numbers).

**Line Pool**: A Line Pool is a specific group of lines used for making outside calls. Each of Norstar's nine Line Pools provides an efficient way of giving a telephone access to outside lines without taking up many Line buttons. A line in a Line Pool cannot be a "Public" or "Private" line. A line is assigned to be a member of a Line Pool in section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming.

**Line Pool Access**: This sub-heading assigns the Line Pools that a telephone may access. Line Pool Access is assigned in section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming.

**Line Pool Access Code**: The Line Pool Access Code is a number that is used to identify a specific Line Pool when using the Line Pool feature. Rules governing the assignment of Line Pool Access Codes are:

- the code can be a number from one to four digits in length,
- the first number of the code cannot be the same as any Directory Number (DN), and
- codes starting with the same digit must be the same length.
   Line Pool Access Codes are assigned in section
   Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming.

**Link Time**: This is a specific time delay that allows access to PBX or Centrex features through a Norstar system. Link Time is also referred to as a "hookswitch flash" or "Recall". Link Time is assigned in section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming (call the PBX or Centrex customer service department for information on the required Link Time).

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### M

**M7208**: The Meridian M7208 telephone has a single line display, and eight programmable buttons with indicators.

**M7310**: The Meridian M7310 telephone has a two line display with three display buttons, 10 programmable buttons with indicators, and 12 dual programmable buttons without indicators.

**M7324**: The Meridian M7324 telephone has a two line display with three display buttons, and 24 programmable buttons with indicators.

**Maintenance**: The menu heading "D. Maintenance" allows the diagnosis and repair of any problems with the system. Maintenance requires no programmable settings.

**Miscellaneous**: Section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming is a collection of assorted system-wide settings. Miscellaneous includes: Background Music, Dial-0 Set, Alarm Set, Link Time, Set Relocation, Line Pool Codes, and Installer Password.

**Mode**: The signaling mode of an outside telephone line can be either Pulse or Tone. The mode can be changed in section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming.

**Music Source**: An external music source (customer supplied), such as a radio, can be connected to the Key Service Unit for Music on Hold, Background Music, or both.



# N

Names: This section of Administration programming is used to assign an optional name to identify and personalize each telephone or line. This name appears on a display during the use of certain features. A name can be any combination of letters or numbers up to seven characters in length. Names are assigned in section "2. Names" of Administration programming. If no Name is assigned, the line number or DN (for a telephone) will appear on the display instead of a Name.

**Night Auxiliary Ringer**: This setting controls whether or not calls arriving at a Night Ringing Set will also ring at the Auxiliary Ringer. Night Auxiliary Ringer is assigned within section "7. Night Service" of Administration programming.

Night Control Set (Night Control Phone): A Night Control Phone can place the lines for which it has responsibility in or out of Night Service. Night Control Phone is assigned to a telephone in section "7. Night Service" of Administration programming.

Night Ring: See "Night Ringing Set".

**Night Ringing Set (Night Ringing Phone)**: This telephone can be assigned to ring when a line has been placed into Night Service. The telephone is assigned in section "7. Night Service" of Administration programming.

**Night Service**: Certain features become active when one or more lines are placed into an operating mode called Night Service. This is usually done to provide special ringing and Dial Zero access after normal office hours, or when there are few people available to answer calls. These features are: Trunk Answer, Night Dial Zero Phone, Night Control Phone,

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Night Ringing Phone, and Night Auxiliary Ringer. Night Service settings are programmed in section "7. Night Service" of Administration programming.

Night Set (Night Phone): See "Night Ringing Set".

Night-0 Set (Night Dial Zero Phone): This setting assigns a certain telephone as an additional Dial Zero telephone when Night Service is active. Calls which ring at the Night Dial Zero Phone will also ring at the other Dial Zero telephone assigned in section "4. Miscellaneous" of Configuration programming. Night-0 Set is assigned in section "7. Night Service" of Administration programming.

### O

**On Hold**: This setting controls whether callers hear music, periodic tones, or silence when they are placed on hold. This system-wide feature is assigned in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

Overrides: These are selected exceptions to the call Restrictions placed on lines and telephones. There is a system-wide maximum of 10 Overrides. A telephone caller may, for example, be prevented from dialing numbers which start with the digit "1", but may have an override of "1403". This would allow the caller to dial any number which starts with "1403". Overrides are defined, and then assigned to certain lines or telephones, in section "5. Overrides" of Administration programming.

# Glossary Index

### P

Page: This Norstar feature allows announcements to be made from a telephone which can be heard by many people at

the same time. There are three Page options, selected by the telephone where the Page is made: Internal Page (announce over the telephone speakers), External Page (announce over an externally mounted, customer-supplied loudspeaker), and both Internal and External Page together.

Page Zone: A local area in the office that can receive directed Page announcements independently of the remainder of the office. Each Page Zone is identified by a number from 1 to 6. Each telephone is assigned to a unique Page Zone in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming.

Park Timeout: This is the period of time before an unanswered Call Park call is redirected to the set that parked the call for the line the call is on. Park Timeout is defined in "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

**Password**: A Password is a specific sequence of digits that are entered from the dialpad to gain access to Norstar programming. A Password is required for System Startup, Administration programming, and Configuration programming (also, see "Restriction Override Password".)

**PBX**: See "Private Branch Exchange (template)".

**Permissions**: These are specific characteristics that can be assigned to an individual telephone. Permissions includes Full Handsfree, Handsfree Answerback, Pickup Group, Page Zone, Auxiliary Ringer, Forward No Answer, and Priority Call. Permissions are programmed in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming.

**Personal Speed Dial**: These two-digit code numbers (71-94) can be programmed to dial outside telephone numbers up to 16 digits in length. Personal Speed Dial codes are

programmed for each telephone, and can only be used at the telephone on which they are programmed.

**Pickup Group**: A telephone can be placed into one of nine Call Pickup Groups. A call ringing at a telephone within a Pickup Group can be picked up by any other telephone within the same Pickup Group. A Pickup Group is assigned to a telephone in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming

**Port Number**: The identification number of a specific point of connection at the Key Service Unit, Station Module, or Trunk Module. Telephones and Data Terminals are connected to these ports. The Port Number assignment on an expansion cartridge is not directly associated with this type of Port number.

**Prime Line**: A telephone can be programmed to automatically select a certain line type whenever a call is made by lifting the receiver or pressing the Handsfree button. This line is called the Prime Line, and is assigned in section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming.

Prime Set (Prime Phone): This telephone provides backup answering for incoming calls on outside lines. If a telephone is assigned as a Prime Phone for a line, then the telephone will ring for any unanswered calls on that line. A Prime Phone may be assigned to a line in section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming. The default Prime Phone DN is 21 for a non-expanded system, and 221 or 2221 for an expanded system (depending on the DN length in effect). A Norstar system can have more than one Prime Phone.

**Priority Cal**l: This feature allows an urgent Intercom Voice Call to be made when the called telephone is busy or has Do Not Disturb activated. Priority Call should not be made

available to everyone, and should be selectively programmed. This feature is enabled for a telephone in section "6. Permissions" of Administration programming.

Private Branch Exchange (template): This is one of the four Norstar System Startup templates. In the Private Branch Exchange (PBX) template, specified Lines are in a Line Pool. Each telephone is assigned access to Line Pool 1.

**Private to**: An external (CO) line may be assigned to one telephone as a private line. The line does not appear on any other telephone. Private lines cannot be placed in Line Pools. A line may be assigned as a Private line in section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming.

**Public**: This refers to an outside line which can be assigned to any telephone. A line is assigned as Public in section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming.

**Pulse**: This is a dialing mode for outside lines that is traditionally used by rotary dial telephones. In section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming, this option can be selected for any line on which Pulse dialing is required.

## R

Radio Frequency (RF) Filter Kit: A Norstar device designed to alleviate problems associated with radio frequency interference that may be experienced when a headset or external Auxiliary Ringer is used with a telephone.

Recall: See "Link Time".

**Remind Delay**: The period of time from when a call is put on hold to when a reminder tone is heard and a message appears

on the telephone display. Remind Delay, a parameter of the Held Line Reminder feature, is assigned in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

**Restrictions**: Preselected telephones and lines may be restricted from dialing certain telephone numbers (such as long distance, directory assistance and other toll calls). Restrictions are defined and assigned to certain lines or telephones in section "4. Restriction" of Administration programming. There is a maximum of 30 Restrictions.

**Restriction Override Password**: This four-digit Password allows a caller to override system-wide Restrictions when making an outside call. This Password must be entered before the call is dialed. Up to 100 Restriction Override Passwords may be defined in section "8. Passwords" of Administration programming.

Ring/No ring: See "Ringing".

**Ringing**: In section "2. Line Access" of Configuration programming, a line or Answer DN can be assigned to ring or not to ring at a telephone for incoming calls. If a line has been assigned as "No ring", an incoming call is still shown by a flashing indicator.

## S

**Set Copy**: Set Copy allows the duplication of programmable settings from one telephone to another telephone. Set Copy, available through menu heading "C. Set Copy", provides two options: duplicating System Data and User Data, or duplicating System Data only. Set Copy does not provide the same copy capability as the COPY display button, which is more selective of the settings to be duplicated.

**Set Names**: This sub-heading of section "2. Names" of Administration Programming allows Names to be assigned to telephones.

**Set Relocation**: See "Automatic Phone Relocation".

**Set/Line Profile**: This feature allows the review, using a M7310 or M7324 telephone, of the settings programmed to telephones (sets) and lines in Configuration and Administration programming. The settings cannot be changed with this feature.

**Shift Button**: This small triangular button is located beside the dual memory buttons on the upper half of the M7310 telephone. The shift button must be pressed to store or access features on the top half of the dual memory buttons.

**Square (template)**: This is one of the four Norstar system templates. In the Square template, Lines 01 and 02 are assigned to each telephone. The Square template is the default during System Startup. All defaults shown in the Meridian Norstar Modular Programming Record correspond to the Square template settings.

**Station Auxiliary Power Supply**: This device is used to provide power to a CAP Module, or a Norstar telephone that is connected more than 305 m (1000 ft) and less than 760 m (2500 ft) from the Key Service Unit.

**Station Module (SM)**: An Expansion Module that provides the Norstar system with access to 16 more telephones. Up to six of these Modules may be installed with the use of a six-port Expansion Cartridge.

**System Coordinator**: This is the title assigned to the person responsible for Norstar Administration programming and the training of co-workers on the Norstar system.

**System Data**: Programmable settings from System Startup, Configuration and Administration programming.

**System Speed Dial**: These two digit numbers (01 to 70) can each be programmed to dial telephone numbers up to 16 digits in length. System Speed Dial codes are programmed for the entire system in section "1. System Speed Dial" of Administration programming.

**System Startup**: When a Norstar system is first installed and powered up, System Startup must be performed before Configuration or Administration programming can be done. Startup initializes the system with a predetermined template system setting, and clears the system memory.

**System Startup Access Code**: A sequence of digits which are dialed on the dialpad to provide access to System Startup. A Password is required before System Startup can begin.

### T

**Table entries**: A sub-heading in sections "4. Restrictions" and "5. Overrides" of Administration programming. Table entries allows the assignment of a Restriction to one or more of the 30 Restriction Index numbers, and an Override to one or more of the 10 Override Index numbers.

Glossary Index **TCM Line (Time Compression Multiplexing Line)**: A two-wire digital station loop joining the cross-connect at the Key Service Unit to a station set.

Template: A system-wide setting assigned during System Startup. The most important effects of a template are the number of lines assigned to the telephones, and the assignment of Line Pool Access. Templates will also assign other system-wide defaults, such as Prime Line and Ringing Line assignment. The choice of one of four templates is not affected by Configuration or Administration programming. It is important to understand that a template is only provided as a convenience, and that any settings affected by the template can be changed.

**Time and Date**: The current time and date appear on the display of idle Norstar telephones. The time and date can be changed in section "3. Time and date" of Administration programming.

**Tone**: This is a dialing mode for outside lines. Tone is also referred to as "Touchtone" or DTMF (Dual Tone Multi Frequency) Tones. Tones may be required for Access Signaling to Private Branch Exchange (PBX) or Centrex systems. In section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming, this option can be assigned for any line on which Tone dialing is required.

**Transfer Callback**: After a specified number of rings, an unanswered transferred call will return to the telephone which originally made the transfer. The number of rings can be assigned in section "3. Call Handling" of Configuration programming.

**Trunk Answer**: This feature allows a ringing call to be answered from any Norstar telephone in the system on any line that has Night Service activated. Trunk Answer is assigned in section "7. Night Service" of Administration programming.

**Trunk Cartridge (TC)**: The Trunk Cartridge is inserted into the Trunk Module, and provides the connection to outside lines. Up to three cartridges can be used in one Trunk Module. Each cartridge can support four outside lines.

**Trunk Module (TM)**: An expansion module that provides up to 12 additional outside lines, depending on the number of Trunk Cartridges installed.

**Type**: This setting controls whether each line assigned to a telephone is Public, Private, or assigned to one of Norstar's nine Line Pools. Line Type is assigned in section "1. Line Data" of Configuration programming.

**User Data**: User Data is an option in the Set Copy function. User Data refers to the personal settings which are unique to an individual telephone, and are not programmed in Configuration or Administration programming. User Data is programmed at each telephone. These settings, for example, include Personal Speed Dial and the assignment of programmable buttons.

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

### Using the Busy Lamp Field


The BLF indicator shows you the busy/not busy status of any Norstar telephone within your office. When a call for one of your co-workers comes to your telephone, there are many possible ways to handle it. The lists below show some of these options. As soon as you learn who a call is for, check the appropriate indicator on the BLF.

### If the indicator is ON

- Use Send Message
   OR
- Use Ring Again on Busy OR
- Try to call on an intercom line.
   The person you call will hear a low volume ringing.

#### If the indicator is OFF

- Transfer the incoming call immediately using the Transfer feature (if equipped) OR
- Announce your call using the Conference/Transfer or Transfer feature.



You will quickly become familiar with the layout of your Inside Autodial buttons and the matching layout of the Busy Lamp Field indicators. Remember you can change any Inside Autodial number on a dual memory button and the BLF automatically changes too.

Please be sure to read your *M7310 User Card* and your *Prime Phone User Card* (if applicable). They contain a great deal of information which will help you to use Norstar features effectively with your BLF.

The Meridian Norstar\* Busy Lamp Field (BLF) is a small device with indicators that turn ON individually when telephones in your office are in use. The BLF attaches to your M7310 telephone and is a welcome aid when you are answering the telephone for co-workers or operating a message center. You can tell at a glance which telephones are in use and avoid interrupting people who are busy on calls.



The Busy Lamp Field attached to an M7310 telephone

The Busy Lamp Field indicators are arranged to match up with the dual memory buttons above the display of your M7310 telephone. Each half of a dual memory button that has been programmed as an Inside Autodial button is matched with one half of a BLF indicator. The top portion of a BLF indicator turns ON when showing a call on the top half of a dual memory button; the bottom portion turns ON when showing a call on the bottom half of a dual memory button.


If you move an Inside Autodial number from one button to another, the BLF indicator moves automatically. Only those indicators corresponding to Inside Autodial buttons turn ON and OFF.

### The BLF indicator is ON

- When a call is active on a telephone
   OR
- When a call handling feature such as Conference is being used.

### The BLF indicator is OFF

- When there is no active call at that telephone
   OR
- When a call is being held at a telephone and there is no other call active.



### Norstar Configuration Requirements

- Enter Norstar Configuration from an appropriate type of Norstar set.
   See the programming section of the System Coordinator Guide and/or Installation Guide for programming details.
- 2. Ensure that the following assignments have been made for the ATA's station number:
  - assign only one outside line to appear on the set.
  - set the ringing on/off as applicable
  - assign only one intercom line.
  - assign either the outside line or the intercom line as the Prime Line.

Note: The default programming on the Norstar Compact system is **No** Prime Line Select, thus no dial tone will be given to the ATA set when going off-hook unless a Prime Line has been assigned in programming.

The default programming on the Norstar Modular system is prime Intercom Select.

Important: Do Not Assign a Line Pool as Prime Line.

- ensure that Full Handsfree is disabled.
- ensure Answerback is disabled.
- ensure Paging Reception is disabled.
- 3. The following system options should also be set:
  - ensure Held Line Reminder is ON.

Note: As the Installer or System Coordinator, check for any special conditions to be configured (for example, Tone or Pulse dialing, Restrictions, Overrides, Line Pool access etc.) where they apply.

- 4. Exit Configuration by pressing RIs to end the session.
- Set the the ATA to Tones ON or Tones OFF depending on the user requirements. Refer to Analog Terminal Adapter User Card for details. (Default is Tones OFF)

### Introduction

The Norstar Analog Terminal Adapter (ATA) is used to connect standard analog voice devices such as a single line telephone or telephone answering machine as well as data communication devices like fax machines or modems to the Norstar System. This card details the use of both single line analog phones and data devices connected to an ATA.

**Note:** Refer to the Data Communications section of this card for using modems, fax machines and other similar data communications devices with an ATA.

### Checking the Norstar Configuration

- Ensure a Prime Line is assigned as either an Outside or Intercom line.
   See Prime Line Feature for definition.
   (Do Not Assign a Line Pool as the Prime Line)
- Check with the System Coordinator or Installer for details on Norstar Configuration programming, or information about any of the Meridian Norstar features.

**Note:** Norstar Call Restrictions and Overrides will apply to the single line phone. Executive Password cannot be used with this phone.

### LINK button

Several Norstar features can be accessed by a single line phone through the ATA. The ATA Features are accessed by using the LINK button on your phone and then dialing a one or two digit access code.

If your telephone has a LINK button:

- 1. Access a feature by lifting the receiver and pressing LINK.
- 2. Dial the one or two digit feature code on the dial pad.

If your telephone does not have a LINK button:

- 1. Press the receiver button down (located under the receiver) for about half a second, then release.

  This action is hereafter referred to as LINK.
- 2. Dial the one or two digit feature code on the dial pad.

Note: A dropped or fumbled receiver may be interpreted by the ATA as a **LINK** and no dial tone can be heard.

### Prime Line

The ATA can be programmed to select one of the system's outside lines or an Intercom line. This line is automatically selected when you lift your phone receiver.

### **Alternate Line**

If you use Last Number Redial feature while on an intercom call, the intercom call is automatically put on hold and the last number is dialed for you on an outside line. The Prime Line must be an outside line for automatic selection of an outside line, otherwise an error tone will sound.

If you have an intercom Prime Line:

 Use the Alternate Line feature to switch to your outside line then use the Last Number Redial feature.

### System Speed Dial

You can use any of the Norstar System Speed Dial numbers by dialing its two-digit access code.

- 1. Lift the receiver and select the outside line and press LINK then dial 0 .
- 2. Dial the two-digit System Speed Dial code.

#### Troubleshooting (Data)

If you are having trouble, check the following before calling a repair person:

- 1. Check to see that the following data parameters are set correctly Parity, Baud Rate, etc.
- 2. Ensure that the ATA is in the Tones OFF Mode.
- Make sure you are calling out on the proper line-Intercom or Outside Line. Contact the System Coordinator to change your Prime Line or use the Alternate Line feature.
- 4. Substitute a Single line set for your modem or FAX machine. If you receive Dial Tone on the Single Line Set you may have a problem with the Data Communications device.

System Speed Dial codes can be used from any phone in the system. Phone numbers are assigned to System Speed Dial codes by your System Coordinator. You can assign your own set of phone numbers to Personal Speed Dial codes for use exclusively with your telephone.

### The Central Answering Position and CAP Module


### Why use the CAP?

The Meridian Norstar\* Central Answering Position (CAP) consists of a specified M7324 telephone and one or two CAP Modules. The addition of a CAP Module helps you to perform two essential tasks:

- You can monitor the busy/not busy and Do Not Disturb status of the telephones in your Norstar system.
- You can answer outside calls and extend them to your co-workers.

### What is a CAP Module?

A CAP Module is a device which provides an extra 48 Inside Autodial buttons for the M7324 telephone. The CAP Module is connected to the side of the M7324 by a cable, and can have a second CAP Module connected to it. When two CAP Modules are connected to an M7324 telephone, the telephone is given an additional 96 Inside Autodial buttons, which allows the Central Answering Position to monitor (in most cases) all of the telephones in the Norstar system.



#### The Central Answering Position (CAP)

The memory buttons on the CAP Module can only be programmed as Inside Autodial buttons. When you press one of these buttons, your M7324 telephone will automatically dial the telephone associated with the Autodial button you pressed.

**Note:** For handsfree use of your M7324 telephone and CAP Module, a headset may be plugged into the side of the telephone, as shown in the photograph above.

### Other Norstar documents

Please be sure to read your *M7324 User Card* and your *Prime Phone User Card* (if applicable). They contain a great deal of information which will help you to use Norstar features effectively with your CAP.



#### Norstar CAP **Applications**

The Norstar Station Auxiliary Power Kit is required to provide power for the Norstar M7324 telephones when it is equipped with one or two CAP modules. If only one CAP is added to an M7324 telephone the actual wiring should remain the same to allow for future addition of another CAP to that telephone. Norstar M7324 telephones equipped with CAP modules are limited to maximum loop lengths of 305m (1000 ft.); they will not operate in long loop applications.

#### Installation

- Ensure that each M7324 telephone that you will be adding a CAP Module(s) to has 6 conductor station wiring between the station block and the common equipment room. (See Figure 2)
- At the station connection block (#625 type, or equivalent), connect the 6 wires of the station wiring cable to the 6 screw terminals as shown in Figure 2. Note the color
- codes of the positive and negative wires.

  If the M7324 telephone is equipped with a 2 or 4 conductor line cord, replace it with the 6 conductor cord provided with the CAP Module.
- In the common equipment room, terminate the positive station wire (noted in step 2) on the positive screw terminal of the power supply. Terminate the negative station wire on the negative screw terminal of the power
- Connect the remaining pair of wires from the M7324 and CAP module station run to its Norstar KSU station port. Plug in the power supply and test Norstar telephones. 5.



### Reassigned Settings

When the CAP Module is first plugged into your system each button is preset to automatically dial an Intercom (inside) number.

## The Norstar numbering system


Your telephone system may have two, three, or four digit Intercom numbers, which are controlled by your Installer in Configuration programming. The CAP Module recognizes the length of the Intercom numbers in the system it is being plugged into, and assigns pre-determined (default) values for the Inside Autodial buttons accordingly.

The diagram below shows the three-digit system which ranges from 221 to 268 and from 269 to 316; a two-digit system ranges from 21 to 68 and from 69 to 99 (the remainder of the buttons will be blank); a four digit system ranges from 2221 to 2268 and from 2269 to 2316.

#### Default Inside Autodial numbers

If an Inside Autodial number is already programmed on your M7324 telephone or on another CAP Module attached to the telephone, it will still appear in its default position. If an Autodial button does not correspond to a telephone in your system, it may still appear on a CAP Module. If you press this button, the telephone display will show the message [Hot in service]

#### Manitaring your office telephones:

It is important that you pay attention to the CAP Module's indicator; this will enable you to decide what to do with outside calls arriving at your telephone.

The CAP Module displays the status of the telephones in your system by using the indicators beside the Inside Autodial buttons. The triangular indicator is ON or OFF, depending upon the status of the Norstar telephone which is associated with the Inside Autodial button.

#### The indicator is ON

- When the telephone is active on an inside or outside line OR
- When a call at the telephone has been put on Hold by another person
   OR
- When the telephone is using the **Do Not Disturb** feature.

#### The indicator is OFF

- When the telephone is idle OR
- When the telephone is ringing
   OR
- When the telephone has one or more calls on Hold, but is not connected to any active calls.

If you dial the Intercom number of a telephone, instead of using an existing Inside Autodial button, the indicator beside the button on the CAP Module will still turn ON. If no Inside Autodial button is programmed for a telephone, the status of that telephone is not monitored by the CAP Module.

### Answering and transferring a call

Most of the telephone calls which you deal with will involve the following procedures:

- 1. Answer an incoming call.
- 2. Determine whom the call is for.
- 3. Check the status of the destination telephone on the CAP Module.
- 4. If the indicator is OFF, Transfer the call to that telephone OR
   If the indicator > is ON, use the Send Message or Ring Again on Busy feature.
- 5. Release yourself from the transferred call.
